## COUNTY PRIMARY INTEREST GROWING

### Grand Jury Probing Reasnor Girl's Death

### Moody's Friends Confident But Foes Concede Nothing; Mayfield Handicapped; Lee Against Field

#### Three Negroes Held in Jail at Breckenridge While Fatality of Saturday Night Is Investigated

The grand jury of the 90th district court of Stephens county in session today at Breckenridge, is investigating the accident which occurred on the Cisco-Breckenridge highway Saturday night, in which Betty Jane Reasnor, Wichita Falls, lost her life. Three negroes, two men and a woman, who were reported to have been in the car that crashed into the Stephens county jail pending the result of the grand jury investigation. One of the men and the woman were arrested Saturday night and taken to Breckenridge. Gus Foxhall, the other negro, surrendered to Cisco police this morning, and the sheriff's department at Breckenridge was notified, and an officer from that place came here and took Foxhall to Breckenridge. All three of the negroes live in that city.

#### JAPS KILL 600 NATIONALISTS AT SHANTUNG

LONDON, July 23.—Six hundred nationalistic Chinese troops were reported killed in fighting with the Japanese along the Tingtung-Sinanantow line in Shantung Sunday, according to an unconfirmed dispatch from Tingtung today. The fighting dispatch to the Daily Telegraph reports that the nationalist government has broken off relations with Japan.

#### DYNAMOS BOW TO HINSON AND HUMBLE, 3 TO 0

The Humble baseball club won a well played game of ball from the Dynamo team of Breckenridge today at Cisco. The Dynamo team of 3 to 0. A base on balls by Campbell, a single by Petty, and a triple by Pippin enabled Humble to score two runs in the second inning. Pippin was caught on the plate trying to stretch the hit into a home run. A walk to Petty, a single by Campbell and an overthrow of the ball enabled Humble to score their other run. Both pitchers were in rare form. "Rip" Hinson, pitching for Humble, struck out 12 Dynamo players, and Martin, for the Dynamos, struck 10 Humble players. Very few balls were hit to the infield, most of the putouts being strike outs or flies to the outfield. Pettibone and Mauck made two sensational catches of line drives hit to their respective fields.

#### ZAPPI FILCHED COMPANION OF COAT, CHARGE

MOSCOW, July 23.—Sensational charges that Captain Zappi, one of the survivors of the Italia tragedy in the far north, not only abandoned Dr. Pinn Malmgren, Swedish scientist, but also partially stripped him of his clothing are made today by correspondent Telegram of a Moscow newspaper. The correspondent is now aboard the icebreaker Krassin which rescued Zappi and Captain Ariano from an ice floe. He claims that Zappi wore Malmgren's overcoat and heavy woollen socks when he was rescued.

Mariano Reported Dead. LONDON, July 23.—Rumors are current today that Captain Ariano, rescued survivor of the Norge expedition, had died as a result of his long exposure in the Arctic weather.

May Keep Public From Noble. BERLIN, July 23.—General Umberto Noble, leader of the ill-fated polar expedition, may be taken across Europe to Italy in a sealed railway car to prevent interviews, according to a Stockholm dispatch which quoting Swedish newspapers, while other members of the noble's crew have been summoned to the city by Premier Mussolini.

#### BANK ROBBERY CONFESSED BY TWO SUSPECTS

ST. LOUIS, July 23.—Police today arrested Leonard Martin and Marion C. Williams, of Vinita, Okla. State Bank Thursday in which \$2,500 loot was taken. The police said both men admitted the robbery and waived extradition.

#### G. W. TAYLOR'S BONES BROKEN IN AUTO WRECK

G. W. Taylor is in the Graham sanitarium suffering from a broken shoulder and collar bone, and probably other injuries, sustained when his automobile skidded and overturned on the Breckenridge highway about 11 o'clock this morning. Taylor, about 65, was accompanied by a niece. The accident occurred near the Taylor home, about four miles out on the highway, just beyond the I. N. Hart farm.

#### Successful Fight Is Being Made by City Against Mosquitoes; All Stagnant Water Oiled Regularly

The city administration is making a successful fight against mosquitoes and flies to prevent their infection of Cisco. A permanent man is kept busy locating stagnant water, such as pools, open cisterns and other water that may be allowed to stand in vessels or places in the city limits. As soon as these places are discovered they are given a good oiling, and are visited once each week, or oftener, to see that no mosquitoes are allowed to breed and infest the city.

#### HOME HERE BOUGHT BY PURCELL, OIL OPERATOR

W. M. Purcell, oil operator, with interests in the fields of West Texas, but whose family has resided in Cisco for some time, was the purchaser of the new residence recently erected by A. D. Dabney, in the 1000 block on West Fifth street. Purcell has taken possession of his new purchase and moved his family into the building.

Jim Boggs is in charge of this feature of Cisco's sanitary regulations, and it is his duty to look out for all places that may become the breeding spots for flies and mosquitoes.

"I believe I have located all the open cisterns in Cisco," Boggs said, "but there may be others. I found three last week in the 300 block on West Seventh street. Two of these were under the houses. As soon as found they were well oiled, and I hardly look for any further trouble from them. I cannot understand why these open cisterns are not reserved to the city by the owners. All know that the city is spending large sums of money to keep the city free of mosquitoes, and owners of property that have open cisterns should give this information to the city authorities, and I will see that they are well oiled. Besides the three open cisterns located last week I found two others previously in the 100 block on West Fourth street.

#### AUTO IS STOLEN WHILE CISCOAN IS AT CHURCH

R. A. Williams, assistant manager of the West Texas Utilities Co. reported to the police that "some unregenerated heathen" had feloniously appropriated his Chevrolet coupe from its parking in front of the First Methodist church Sunday night, while he was performing his religious duties at divine worship.

#### TO VOTE IN PRIMARY DOES NOT REQUIRE PROMISE TO SUPPORT NATIONAL TICKET, COX SAYS

Ed P. Cox, chairman of the county Democratic executive committee has ruled that those casting ballots in next Saturday's Democratic primary will not, by so doing, bind themselves to support the national party ticket in the November general election. Absentee ballots may be cast with the county clerk until Wednesday evening, July 25.

#### Revolt and Bloodshed Believed Averted by Morones Resigning; Assassin of Oregon Confesses

MEXICO CITY, July 23.—Leaders of the Obregonist bloc in the Mexican congress today expressed the belief that bloodshed and possibly attempted revolt have been averted by the enforced resignation of Luis Morones, minister of labor and mines officials from the Calles cabinet. Morones, head of the regional confederation of Mexican labor and other members of the bloc were accused of being the "intellectual authors" of the assassination of President-elect Obregon because their fiery political speeches led Jose De Leon Toral, young religious fanatic, to kill Obregon.

#### GOVERNOR TO REPLY TONIGHT TO CRITICISM

AUSTIN, July 23.—Governor Dan Moody will pay his respects to the Fort Worth Star-Telegram and Record-Telegram in a speech tonight in Capps Park Fort Worth, at 8 o'clock. The speech will be broadcast over Station KFOB. Preparations are being made for a large crowd. Victory for Moody over all his opponents at next Saturday's primary by a majority of two to one, was predicted at the governor's headquarters today.

#### CALLING MEETING TONIGHT OF CISCO LEGION POST

There will be a called meeting of John William Butts post, No. 123, American Legion, at the legion hut tonight at 7:30 for the purpose of perfecting the last minute arrangements for the big celebration here Wednesday, according to C. E. Yates, post adjutant. Practically everything is ready for the dedication and flag-raising ceremonies, and only the last details are to be arranged.

#### SLAIN MAN CARRIED \$10,000 INSURANCE TRIAL SHOWS

BASTROP, July 23.—Testimony was introduced today in the trial of Mrs. W. W. Waybourn, 48, widow charged with the slaying of her husband, a railroad man, showing that he carried five insurance policies totaling \$10,000. He was found beaten to death in bed last March 11. The woman is charged with hiring a Mexican to kill her husband. The state is also attempting to show that she was intoxicated the night of the crime.

#### 3 DALLAS YOUTHS HELD FOR CRIMINAL ASSAULT

DALLAS, July 23.—Three youths were being held today facing charges of criminally assaulting two girls on a road near here last night. One girl is in a hospital unconscious and in a serious condition. Physicians stated that she had been doped and assaulted.

#### LEE IS RAINED OUT OF DATE AT EASTLAND

The engagement of R. Q. Lee, candidate for congress, to speak at Eastland tonight was canceled shortly after noon today when a heavy rain virtually flooded that city and made the unpaved roads near that town hard to travel. It is probable that he will speak there later in the week.

#### E. H. VARNELL IS BACK FROM SHORT COURSE

E. H. Varnell, vocational agriculturist of the high school and Cisco chamber of commerce, has returned from A. & M. college, where he attended the special instructions prescribed by the state department of vocational agriculture. Eastland county will have five vocational instructors in the work during the ensuing year, while last year Cisco was the only town that maintained a vocational agriculturist. The terms that will have regular vocational instructors are Cisco, with Varnell; Ranger, with Ben Whitehouse; Eastland, with J. Colvin; Rising Star, with P. A. Floyd; and Gorman, with Joe W. Edwards. All of these instructors began work as of July 1, the first of the official year. All are under the supervision of the state department of vocational agriculture, and each of these instructors work in cooperation with the local schools and chambers of commerce. Colvin and Edwards are also the chamber of commerce secretaries at Eastland and Gorman. Within a radius of 75 or 100 miles of Cisco there are now 25 to 30 towns with vocational instructors. All do some work in the local schools, Varnell said.

#### FORMER G. O. P. SENATOR LINES UP FOR SMITH

WASHINGTON, July 23.—A special attempt to line up the Republican and independent votes for Governor Smith has been launched here with the formation of the Smith Independent League. Announcing the league organization Sunday, Henry Clay Hansbrough, former Republican Senator from North Dakota, said he considered election of the Democratic candidate "imperative if agriculture is to be saved from a state of peasantry."

#### NEW PRESIDENT OF LIONS INTERNATIONAL SOUTHERNER

BENJAMIN A. RUFFIN. Benjamin A. Ruffin was elected president of the International Association of Lions clubs at the last session of the twelfth annual convention of the association, held in Des Moines, Iowa, July 10-13. Lee Against Field. The race that has more people guessing than any other contest is that for congress. R. Q. Lee of Cisco was the first to announce for the office and he has made a hard scrap from the start. His friends are confident that he will be in the runoff. There is no disputing his strength as the other four candidates, R. N. Grisham of Eastland, Oscar Callaway of Comanche, Homer Shanks of Clyde and T. P. Perkins of Mineral Wells, have been centering their efforts on Lee. It would not be surprising if no candidate received 40 per cent of the total vote in the district.

County Offices Contested. While several county offices are being hotly contested, they are overshadowed by the fights at the head of the ticket. John S. Hart, incumbent, has two opponents for sheriff, L. A. (Loss) Woods and Virge Foster. Frank Sparks, county attorney, is fighting off Joe H. Jones.

Blanton Fighting Hard. Thomas L. Blanton, who has represented this district in congress for some half dozen terms, is making a determined campaign for the United States senate. He should carry every county in this district by comfortable margins and much of the rest of West Texas. Whether he can cut into the more populous counties of East Texas and South Texas remains to be seen. Alvin Owens and Congressman Tom Connelly have been busy rounding up O. voters. Many political dopsters pick one of these ex-service men to fight it out with Mayfield in the August primary.

There are no contests for the other county offices but many of the precinct offices throughout the county are in contest.

Ruffin has been associated with Lions International for a number of years and due to his pleasing personality and eloquent oratorical power he has been constantly in demand as a speaker at district conventions, charter nights and everywhere Lions have gathered.

# \$100 CAMPAIGN CONTRIBUTIONS IS G. O. P. PLAN

WASHINGTON, July 22. — Organization of the national committee to carry on a nationwide solicitation of popular subscriptions of \$100 and under to the presidential campaign fund was announced by J. B. Nutt, treasurer of the Republican national committee.

John W. O'Leary of Chicago, vice president of the Chicago Trust company and a former president of the United States chamber of commerce, will head the new committee. Its headquarters will be in Chicago, where it will share Republican offices already set up at 333 North Michigan avenue. Names of the other committeemen were not announced.

The plan was said to have the approval of Chairman Work, who left Sunday for New York, where he will attend a conference with national committeemen from the New England and other eastern states.

Nutt described the project as an ambitious forward movement in the interests of the campaign, and declared O'Leary's job would be the soliciting of hundreds of thousands of contributions for amounts of less than \$100 each.

"Every contributor, irrespective of the amount of his contribution, will receive an official receipt, executed and signed," he said.

He explained that the idea gives an official check to give all citizens an opportunity to participate in financing the work involved in a presidential campaign.

"Because of Hoover's record, his popularity and his great service to all of the people of the United States," he added, "O'Leary's committee will receive nationwide publicity because of an extensive publicity campaign of an extensive number of contributors."

The committee will begin to function immediately and will be extended rapidly into all the states, Nutt said, adding that the women will be asked to take a leading part.

## TODAY'S POLITICAL SITUATION COMPARED TO THAT OF ISRAEL

"We live in them that are at ease in Zion," said Rev. Thomas Lewis, at the First Christian church, Sunday night.

It is impossible to think of Israel living in a quiet period in the center of a few shepherds and letting the great world be unrepresented in its own history. Amos came to his prophetic because he could not keep silent. He uttered an outcry. He came with the old gospel applied to the existing conditions. The nation was asleep morally.

## 'WHAT ARE YOU WORTH,' TOPIC OF MINISTER

"Religion shows that a man up on the table he is in a material industry," said Rev. P. T. Stanford, Methodist preacher, last night in speaking on "What Are You Worth?" at the age of 30 he is valued at \$5,000, at 40 that is \$10,000, at 50 that is \$15,000, at 60 that is \$20,000, at 70 that is \$25,000, at 80 that is \$30,000, at 90 that is \$35,000, at 100 that is \$40,000. The speaker said in part:

"A man physically is worth about \$7. When we enter the realm of the moral he is at once worth a great deal. The following questions are relative to a man's worth in character and influence. What are you worth to yourself? Not what the neighbors say, but what you do for yourself. What are you worth to your family? Will a noble heritage be left to your children or will you pass out of the world with no legacy behind you? What are you worth to your country? What a preparation is made to better the country?"

## JOHNSON LINES UP TO SUPPORT G.O.P. NOMINEE

PALO ALTO, Cal., July 23.—The Hiram Johnson leadership, which has never been more than lukewarm to the candidacy of Herbert Hoover, is enthusiastically getting aboard the Hoover bandwagon.

Governor C. C. Young of California, a Johnson leader, notified Hoover that he would be his first guest and was invited to lunch. Simultaneously, announcement was made that Johnson himself will be one of the first callers when Hoover opens his palatial villa office for conference this week.

Both Young and Johnson are coming to inform the Republican presidential nominee they will campaign as he desires, according to Hoover's friends. These friends believe whole-hearted support from the Johnson leaders will eliminate whatever chance Governor Alfred E. Smith, Democratic nominee, had of carrying this state, which gave the presidency to Woodrow Wilson, a Democrat, in 1916.

### FOREIGN DIVORCES.

Paris, formerly very accommodating, is now making it harder for Americans to obtain divorces. The minister of justice deals severely with clever lawyers who rush their American clients through the mill regardless of their qualifications. Process servers, too, are disciplined. This will impose hardship on many wealthy Americans. Yet their situation is far from hopeless. In fact, it seems odd to most of their fellow citizens that anybody should go so far for a little thing like a divorce when it is so easy to obtain one at home. The divorce-seeker seldom has to go even to Reno, however flimsy his or her grounds for action. If a foreign divorce is really necessary for fashionable reasons, there remains Mexico, easily accessible and at present eager to oblige Americans in anything.

### FASCISTS AND COMMUNISTS.

Fascism and Communism, as political theories of government are pretty far apart. As practical governmental systems they seemed for a while to be drawing rather close together. At least, outsiders found it hard to distinguish between the two in some of their respective activities. In the cold and terrible Arctic the two have recently played leading but very different roles in a great human tragedy. William Allen White, in the Emporia Gazette, points out the grim humor of a situation in which despised and dreaded Communists have rescued representatives of an expedition "undertaken by the most gaudily reactionary government of Europe." Mussolini set up his Fascist dictatorship to save Italy from the Bolsheviks. Now the Bolsheviks have saved a group of Fascists from the results of their own folly.

### IMMIGRANT SEAMEN.

One of the biggest immigration leaks in this country since the adoption of the quota system is the infiltration of sailors. By the official record there were 23,477 desertions of foreign sailors in American ports last year, and there must have been thousands not reported. Most of these are not real sailors at all. They ship aboard vessels clearing from low-quota countries, often swelling the crews to double or triple their proper size. They do a little work to pay for their passage to carry out the bluff, or they may do none at all. Often they pay for passage. Once in New York or some other American port, they either desert outright or else inform our immigration officers that they expect to re-ship on some other vessel. They are allowed 60 days ashore on that condition. Then they quietly filter into the interior and disappear. It isn't any worse than other kinds of immigrant-smuggling, but is another impressive indication of the pressure of foreign populations to get into this fortunate country, and the difficulty of enforcing the restrictions.

### AMERICANS IN GENEVA.

There are several interesting things about the now celebrated job held by John D. Rockefeller 3d at Geneva. These, for instance: That the services of a Rockefeller are considered worth \$200 for the summer. That a Rockefeller seion is on the payroll of the League of Nations. That his job consists in "receiving the throngs of American visitors at the secretariat, and furnishing them with information and literature explaining the league's aims and accomplishments; and also taking charge of the guides who accompany visitors through the building." This job might be meanly interpreted as a subsidy to interest Americans in the league's work, if the salary amounted to anything and if Americans were not showing so much interest of their own accord as to make the job necessary.

### WRECK LAW FOR AIRPLANES.

A strange situation has arisen with regard to the Bremen, the German airplane which was the first to cross the north Atlantic from Europe. After efforts to fly it to this country were abandoned, the plane was left near Long Point, Quebec, with one guard, Eugene Thibault of the Canadian Transcontinental Airways. No doubt it was thought that the plane would be safe from souvenir hunters in that remote section of Canada. Nevertheless strangers of all types have come from everywhere to see the Bremen, and some of them have tried to strip it. The guard reports that the most serious pillagers are fishermen off the Grand Banks who insist on regarding the Bremen as a wreck and therefore subject to free salvage. They come in groups, sometimes as many as 20 together, and try to make off with valuable parts of the airplane. The Bremen's crew of three has long since returned to Europe. Representatives of the Junkers airplane company in this country apparently have

temporarily stopped attempts to repair and fly the ship or dismantle it and bring it closer to civilization. All of this raises a nice question. Why aren't the fishermen right about it? Isn't this an abandoned wreck? If not, then what does constitute such a wreck legally? Will the right of free salvage never apply to airplanes as it does to seagoing vessels?

### EXPLAINING UNRULY YOUTH.

Many defenses have been advanced in behalf of the younger and allegedly "flaming" generation. Here is an explanation of its bumptiousness which seems to have been suggested by the recent statistics showing that the proportion of elderly people in the population is increasing while the proportion of young people is decreasing. According to Dr. Ira S. Wile, this situation creates a less respectful attitude toward old age because the attainment of ripe years has ceased to be a remarkable achievement. Also, the smaller proportion of young people in the total population have relatively more opportunity to express themselves and assert their individuality. This sounds plausible enough. But it does leave a few loopholes in its reasoning. Are the elders of this day less wise and less worthy of respect simply because there are more of them? And if this tendency continues into the time when the normal span of human life is around 100 years, will the youth of that day be absolutely out of hand?

### AN EGYPTIAN PANTHEON.

A great many people will sympathize with the Egyptian nationalist movement of protest against the opening of ancient tombs and the distribution of the mummies and material treasures among the museums of the world. "Let the dead rest! The ancient dead have the same right to respect and rest that the dead of today have." The Egyptians do not see why the interests of archeology and human knowledge cannot be served without making public exhibitions of the royal dead. They do not go so far in their protests as to propose complete abandonment of the excavation work. But they would have this research conducted under government control. They suggest the erection of a "palace of the Pharaohs," a sort of Egyptian pantheon, to house the mummies of ancient Egyptian royalty which are now in the museum at Cairo. The dead deserve respect. The living must continue their pursuit of knowledge. Archeological researches of recent years have accomplished much in filling in some of the blank pages in human history. This work should not be stopped, but, wherever possible, it should be conducted with more deference to the awakening self-respect and national consciousness of the Egyptian people.

### NEW ALPHABET FOR TURKEY.

Mustapha Kemal keeps right on stuffing modernism down the throats of Turkish fundamentalists. It was had enough to make them wear hats, sit on chairs, let their women go unveiled and keep their shoes on in church. Now he abolishes the characters so long used for the Turkish language, and adopts the Latin alphabet instead. As usual, Kemal sets the example himself, writing his name in the quaint characters our children are born to, and showing he knows the alphabet. This may be the most fruitful of Kemal's many radical innovations. For a form of writing suggesting our shorthand, he substitutes a system whose value has been proved by 2,000 years of experience among nearly all the western nations. It is probably easier to learn than the old Turkish system. Its adoption accompanies a general effort to spread education among the Turks, now mostly illiterate. It will open to them the literature of Europe and America and help destroy the sense of separateness which has so long retarded Turkish progress.

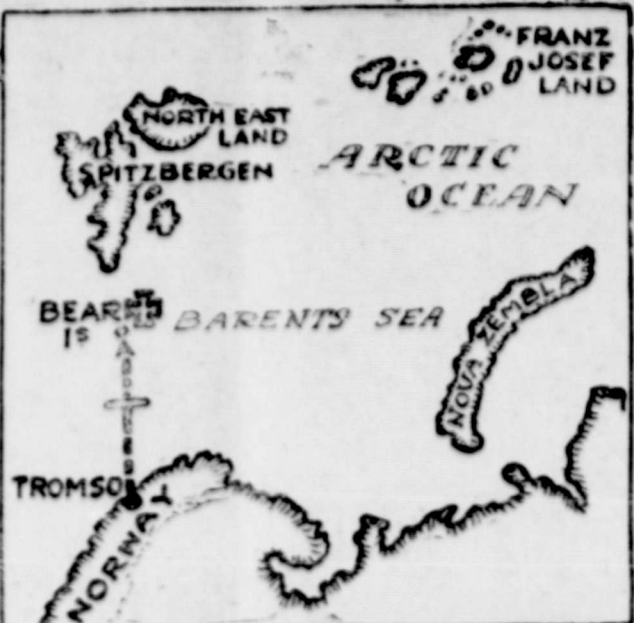

#### His Inconsistency at Dallas
