Yet he will treat his trade as though they should thank their lucky stars that he condescends to them at all and as though they were poor relations seeking favors. He will go on in that independent, indifferent, big-handed way until he causes competition to spring man will tell him he's dead wrong. up, and he has to put forth the best in him to hold a part of the trade of which he might have had all.

#### ROAD WIDTH.

- In theory a twenty-foot pavement on a highway should be wide enough to accommodate three lines of Iraffic, or at least to enable three cars to pass each other at the same point at one time. That was the intent when twenty-foot road-building started. But in practice, as every driver knows, it is a two track road, Wherefore nearly everywhere there are road jams, caused mostly by "road hogs." "On a twenty-foot road," an observer explains, "with one line of traffic in each direction, a car traveling 20 miles an hour can hold up a long line until a gap in the opposite line affords an opportunity to pass the slow-moving vehicle. Every year these blockades are becoming more frequent and more nerve-racking to the driver who wants to get somewhere. In many parts of the country the three-track road is being recognized as a necessitythe middle track being used for passing slow-moving vehicles." In some states an earnest effort is being made to speed up the laggards on rural highways. Cities are recognizing that to keep the volume of traffic moving, there must be either greater speed or wider pavements. Usually the wider pavement is the solution adopted, or emphasized. On rural highways it takes very little more than the common 20 feet to provide the passing-space needed.

#### HUGHES IN WORLD COURT.

There is a vacant place in the World Court which, very likely, will be filled this fall by Charles Evans Hughes, formerly secretary of state. Twenty-six of the members of the League of Nations have nominated Mr. Hughes. It is expected that he will be elected by the assembly of the league when it convenes next month. This is an interesting tribute both to this country and to Hughes, but particularly to the man. This country has refused to join the League of Nations and still holds off from the World Court, although both were brought into being with American help and good will. The countries already participating in the activities of the league and court may resent or regret our official aloofness, but they appear to believe in the integrity and good intent of our individual citizens. In choosing Mr. Hughes they express admiration and confidence in him.

#### SOUNDER CRITICISM.

Something new in dramatic criticism has been inaugurated by the New York World. Instead of

publishing reviews of new plays on the morning folowing their first production, it runs them on the second morning thereafter. The reason for this innovation is that it promotes more leisure and accurate judgments of a new play and its performers. The judgments pronounced will be fairer to everybody concerned from playwright, producer, actors and critic to readers. It consists of a tiny single-cylinder gas engine of one-tenth horsepower, which connects with a pair of skis fitted to the feet in the usual way, and propells them at normal walking pace. The advantage of this contraption for ski-traveling is obvious; also for shoving the ski sportsman lazily up hill again after he has coasted down. Maybe it could be fitted to a sled or toboggan.
