"Two Steps, One Sticker" Program Begins March 1

Get ready for a new Texas Two Step. Today the Texas Department of Motor Vehicles (TxDMV), the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) and the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) joined State Senator Royce West and county tax assessor-collectors for "Two Steps, One Sticker Day" at the state Capitol in Austin. The event highlighted the state's transition to having just one sticker for vehicle inspection and registration.

Beginning March 1, 2015, the state of Texas will stop issuing vehicle inspection stickers and change to a "Two Steps, One Sticker" inspection and registration program. Under the new system, Texas vehicle owners will need to pass inspection prior to renewing their registration.

The familiar blue-bordered registration sticker will serve as proof of both inspection and registration.

The first year of the program is a transition period to allow vehicles' inspection and registration expiration dates to align. Here is what drivers will need to do:

March 1, 2015 - February 29, 2016: You will be able to renew your registration the same way as always as long as your vehicle has a current, passing inspection. However, if your inspection and registration stickers already expire in the same month, your vehicle will need to pass inspection prior to registration renewal. When you renew your annual registration online, by mail, or in-person at your county tax office, your inspection status will be verified electronically. Remem-

ber that a current, passing sticker with one expiration date.

March 1, 2016, and beyond: Your inspection and registration will expire at the end of the month indicated on your registration sticker. You will have a convenient 90-day window prior to your expiration date to complete two simple steps: pass vehicle inspection and renew your registration. Registration renewal will still be available online, by mail or in person at your county tax office.

Texans can look forward to the many benefits of a "Two Steps, One Sticker" program:

- One sticker, one date: Are you one of the millions of Texans whose inspection sticker and registration sticker expire in different months? With "Two Steps, One Sticker" you will just have one

sticker with one expiration date.

- Less clutter, better view: Who wants multiple stickers in their view while behind the wheel? With "Two Steps, One Sticker" you will just have the registration sticker in the corner of your windshield.

- Safer streets, cleaner air: Because a passing vehicle inspection will be a requirement to renew your registration, more Texans will comply with the safety and emissions testing laws. So with "Two Steps, One Sticker" there will be safer and more environmentally-sound cars on the road.

- Fraud prevention: With inspection stickers no longer needed under "Two Steps, One Sticker," this change will eliminate the risk of inspection sticker fraud and theft.

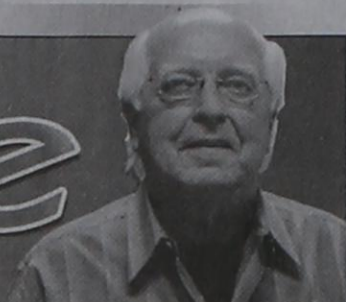

CORRECTION:

The Friona Christian School (FCS) tuition rates were misquoted in the February 19, 2015 edition of the Friona Star.

Tuition for Pre-K through 5th grade is \$3,000 a year with a registration fee of \$150. The registration fee is non-refundable. The tuition rates are as follows: Families with more than one student receive the following tuition discounts: 1st child (oldest) will pay full tuition; 2nd child will receive a 10% discount; 3rd child will receive a 20% discount; and 4th or 5th child will receive a 50% discount.

Families paying tuitions in full by August 15 will receive a \$100 discount. Tuitions paid per semester: 1st by August 15, 2nd by January 15, families will receive a \$50 discount.

Monthly payments plans are available for a 10-month period beginning in August and ending in May.

The discounts are per family and not per student.

All families who wish to apply for financial aid at FCS must complete a financial aid application by April 15, 2015. Contact FCS Director Lindsey Hoyle at 806-250-3000 for applications.

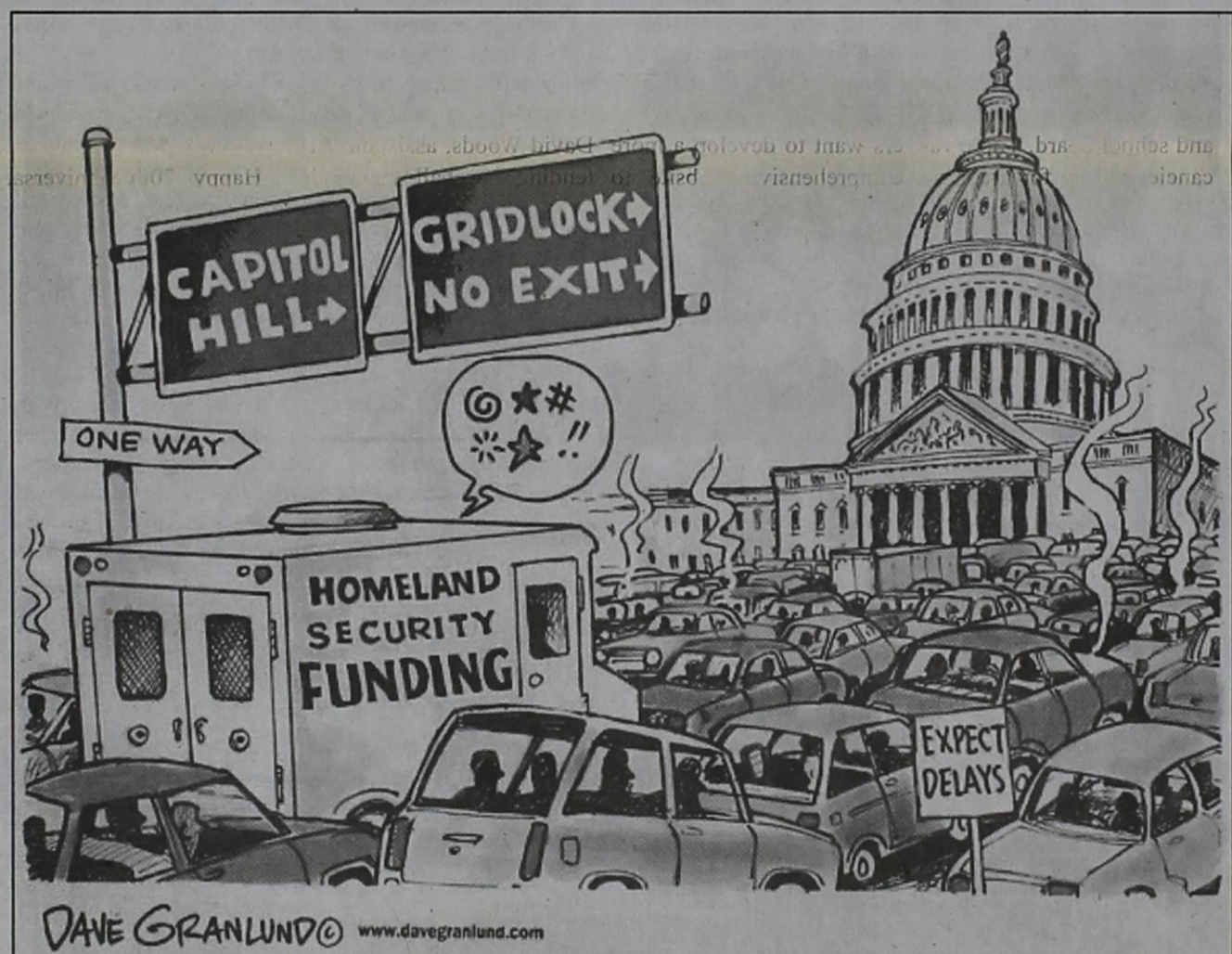

Scammers calling: hang up

Watch out for phone calls from the (516) area code in Jamaica. They could well be scammers looking to make off with your money. The scammers particularly target the elderly.

Shannon Redwine, WTRT operations center supervisor and billing clerk, worked with the Hereford Long Distance carrier to protect a long-time WTRT customer from an insidious telephone scam recently. Scammers told the elderly customer that she had won a lottery, but in order to collect her money she would have to send "transfer fees" to Jamaica via money order.

The HLD carrier detected seven calls to the 516 Jamaica area code and subsequently contacted Mrs. Redwine and blocked those calls and stopped any long-distance calls until determining what was happening. The scammers continued to call the WTRT member and even attempted to change her phone number and her Customer Proprietary Network Information 'safety phrase.' Mrs. Redwine worked with the victim's son, who intervened just in time to prevent money orders from being sent to the Jamaican scammers. The son finally added call screening and call blocking for his mother's protection.

"Scammers target these tactics at a generation that is willing to talk on the phone and is hesitant to hang up on anyone out of courtesy," says Mrs. Redwine.

No big payout from the "Jamaican lottery" yet, but the WTRT customer definitely won in having the HLD carrier and Mrs. Redwine looking out for her best interests.

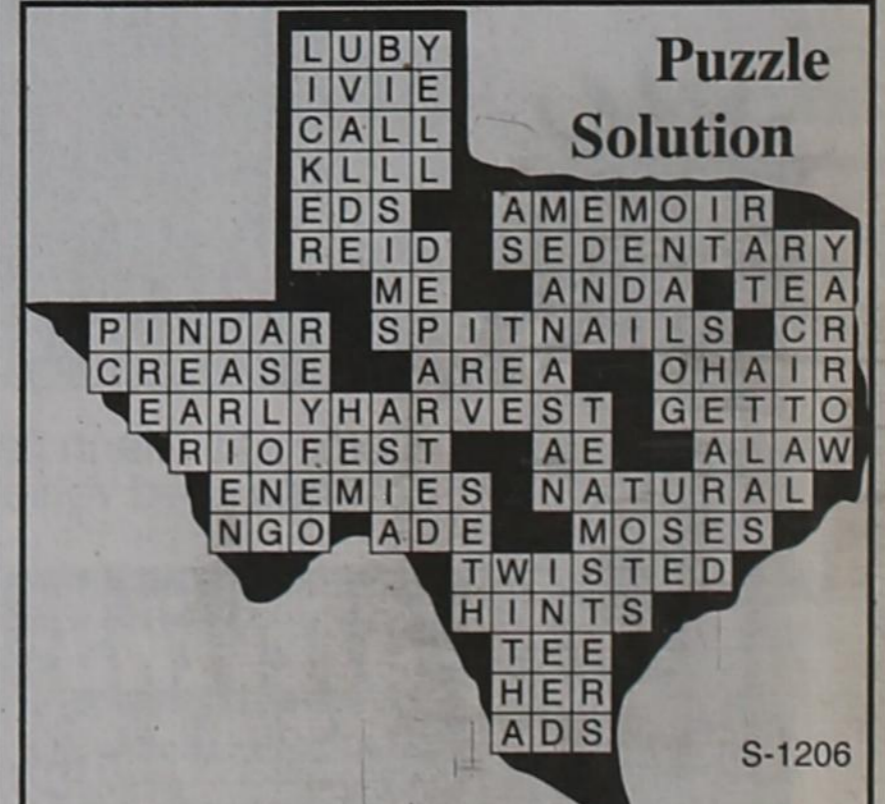

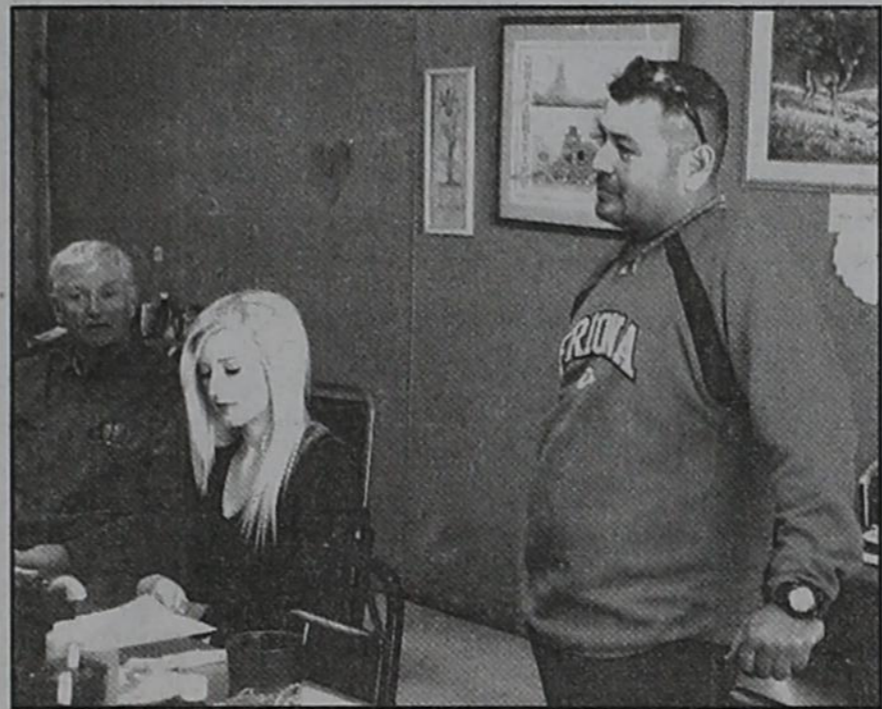
Coach Quiroz gave the program and talked about the Chiefs' upcoming baseball season. This is his first year to coach Chieftain baseball.

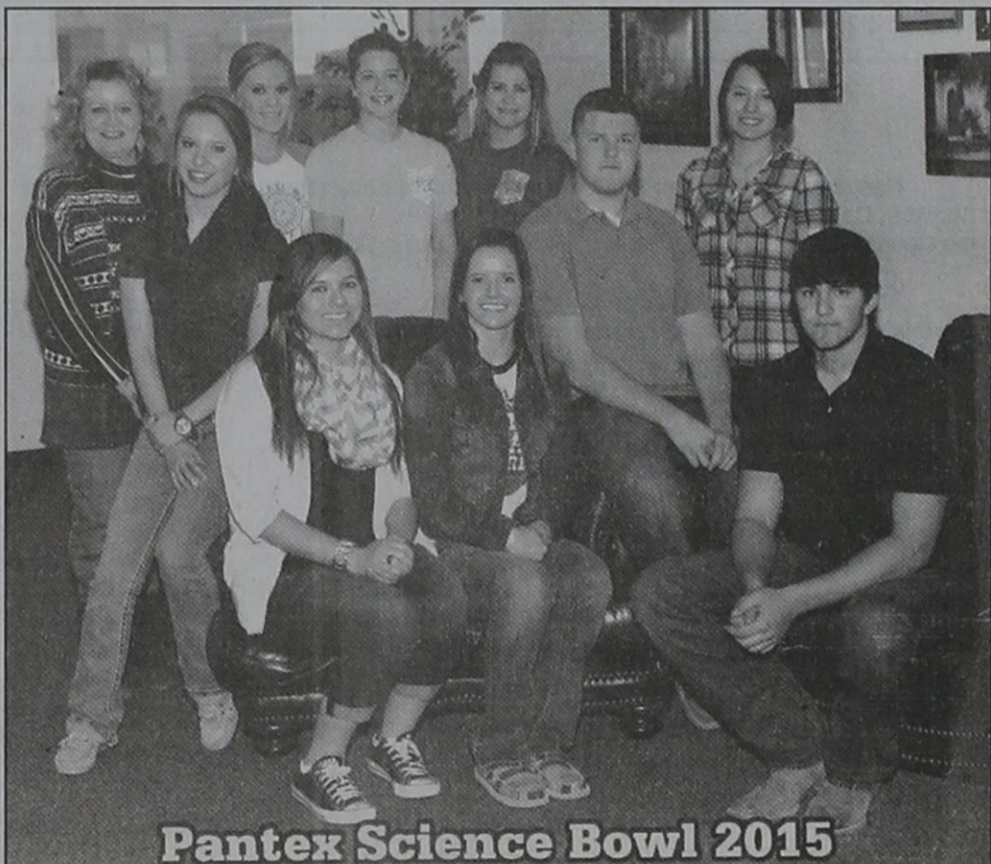
