## Capacity Homecoming Crowd Sees Lynx Down Greyhounds

The Spearman Lynx made their homecoming debut at Lynx Stadium Friday night, as they came from behind to win the county championship in football, defeating a fine Cruver team, 29-6.

The game was played before a capacity crowd of about 1,000 on a beautiful evening. The temperature was in the 60's and the humidity was just what the homecoming crowd needed.

The game started with a fine play from the Cruver team, but the Lynx won the toss and chose to receive the ball, defending the North end. Cruver kicked to the 39 yard line by Smith. Bobby has had the ball from scrimmage 11 times, for 408 yards per carry this year.

In the first play from the Cruver team, Cruver was offside, penalized 5 yards. On the second play from scrimmage, Smith picked up 8 yards, but the Lynx were penalized for illegal procedure, 5 yards. On 2nd down, Smith carried the ball for a five yard gain, and on 3rd down, Davis passed to Smith, incomplete, bringing a fourth down. Smith kicked for the Lynx, and the Cruver returned to the 29 yard line.

From their 29 yard line, the Cruver team cranked up the ball for a one yard gain, second down they also had one yard, and the Lynx held like they were going to hold the Hounds. But, on 3rd down, the Cruver team got around end for a first down.

The Lynx held the Hounds to three yards on three plays. On the first play from scrimmage, a pass to Cluck was blocked for 30 yards. The Cruver team picked up 3 yards through the middle, and then

swept their right end for a touchdown with 4:47 left in the first quarter. The P. A. T. was blocked, leaving the score 6-0.

Cruver kicked to the Lynx, and Cochran returned the ball to the 45 yard line, behind fine blocking. He almost broke clear for a touchdown. The Hounds held, and forced the Lynx to punt once again. As the first quarter ended, the Hounds had the ball on the 37 yard line.

From this point, the Hounds drove to the Lynx 30 yard line and attempted one of the most perfect field goals in the schools history. In fact, the Cruver kicker kicked against the wind, and the ball hit the top of one of the up-rights, bounced down and hit the cross-bar, and did not count.

At this point in the game the Hounds had so badly outplayed the Lynx, local fans were in minor shock. But, after the missed field goal, the Lynx took over and drove to the 36 yard line, only to have the Hounds hold them. On fourth down, Davis dropped back to kick, faked the kick, and smashed to the 29 yard line for a first down. From here, the fired-up Lynx played like a new football team. Davis hit Hutchison on a 26 yard pass play from this point, and Smith ran the remaining 10 yards untouched for the touchdown with 1:15 left in the first half. The try for extra point was kicked by Davis, making the half-time score 7-6, Spearman.

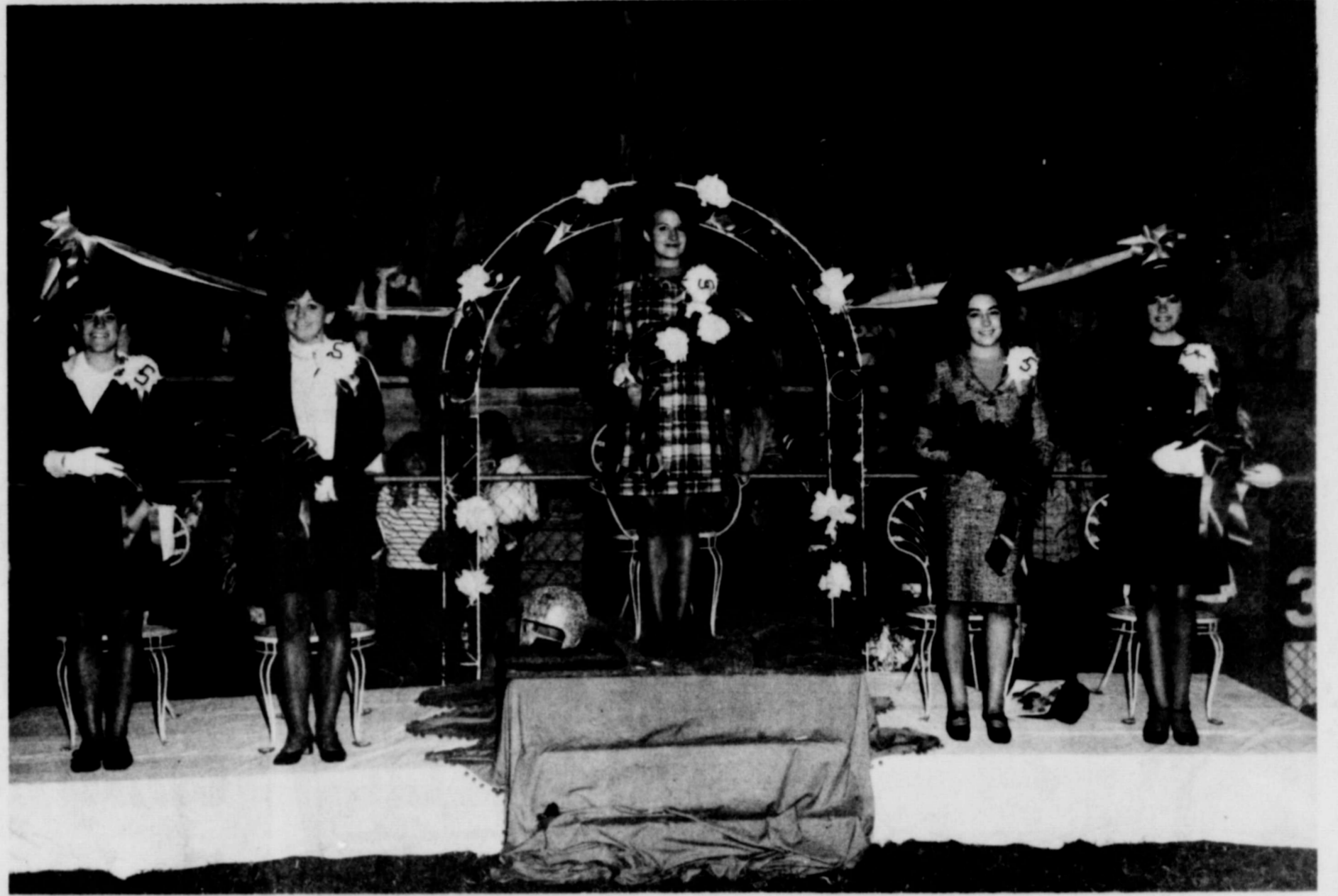
The Lynx kicked to Cruver starting the second half, but the Hounds were stopped by the fired-up Lynx defense, and Wesley Jenkins picked off one of the Hounds passes to give the Lynx possession early in the quarter, at mid-field. Once again, the Hounds held, and forced the Lynx to kick on 4th down. Cruver was unable to move the ball after the Lynx kicked, and had to kick on 4th down. With time running out in the third quarter, the

Lynx owned the ball on the 44 yard line. The first play of the 4th quarter saw quarterback Davis blast his way to a touchdown. Smith ran over the extra 2 points, to make the score 15-6 with only 3 seconds gone in the 4th quarter.

Spearman kicked off to Cruver in the 4th, and the Hounds returned to the 34 yard line. Lemons made the tackle, and in the ensuing fumble, the Lynx recovered for good field position. Combining a good running attack with outstanding down-field blocking the Lynx were quick to score another touchdown with Davis going over. Smith ran over the two points, making it 23-6 with 7:43 left in the game.

Spearman kicked to the Hounds and Loveday made a jarring tackle on the Cruver ball carrier at the 23. Cruver attempted a pass, which fell incomplete. On 2nd down, they also passed, and Lusby blocked the pass. On fourth down, Cruver kicked a 53 yard kick, with the ball dying on the Lynx 13 yard line. On a series of outstanding offensive plays, behind good blocking, the Lynx managed to "ice" the game down, with Cochran smashing over for a touchdown with only 1:24 left in the game. The P. A. T. failed, with the score 29-6, and 1:24 left in the game, the Hounds came back and playing like a bunch of professionals, nailed down a touchdown with 17 seconds left in the game. The final touchdown play, was a pass to Cluck for 30 yards. The P. A. T. failed, leaving the final score 29-12.

The entire town of Spearman has nothing but praise for both of these fine teams, and their coaches; the boys playing under pressure, exhibited the finest sportsmanship in the history of the game of football. The fans were orderly, and were a good example to the students. Both bands performed well, to the delight of the Hansford County people.

## SPEARMAN RECEIVES 4.90 INCHES OF RAIN



FLOODED CITY STREETS --- This picture snapped early Wednesday morning as heavy clouds threatened still more rainfall, was made just east of the high school building. Water was pouring over the FM road south and east of Spearman with a mile and a half area completely under water.

The entire Panhandle area was deluged Tuesday night with rain as large black clouds dumped moisture in varying amounts throughout the county. Spearman's official measurement was 4.90.

By 10 p. m., Tuesday the city had recorded 1.55 inches of moisture with the rain starting about 6:30. Some of the rural gauges measured as much as 7 inches.

Storms hit the area at intervals between 6 o'clock and 9 p. m., again at 1:55 a. m., and another at 3 a. m. Each of these three storms were accompanied by marble sized hail and high winds.

A house was struck by lightning up near the Guymon border and the city of Perryton was swimming in an even 6 inches.

Although all the highways are open leading in and out of Spearman, drivers are faced with water running over the pavement in many places.

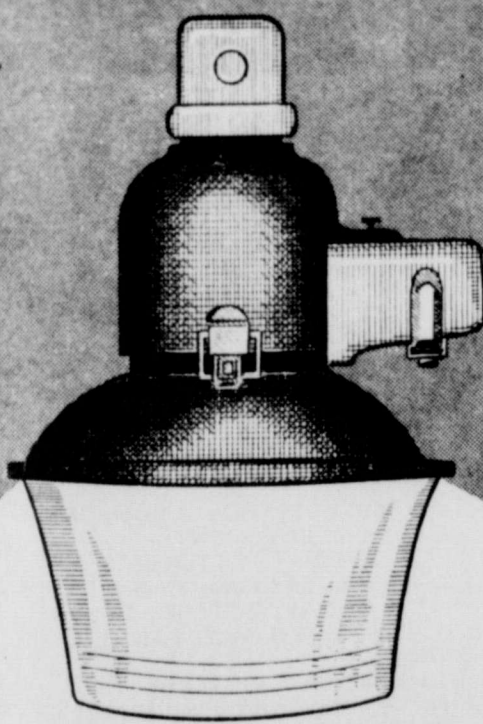

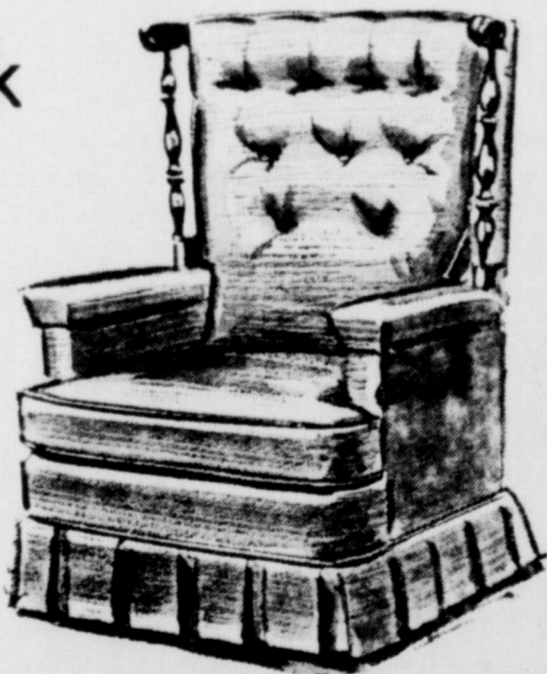

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
