

Area Digs Out From Snow, Ice



AND DOWN IT CAME -- Monday afternoon visibility was cut to less than a block as snow piled on the ground and pushed into drifts by winds blowing from the north. This scene was at the "bank corner" on Main Street about 3 p. m. In almost a few minutes the street was covered and cars began slipping and sliding.

Rural Homes Hurt By Lack Of Phones, Electricity

With temperatures tumbling from Sunday's high of 68 degrees in Friona to the low 20's Monday a cold front moved into Parmer County spreading damage to rural utility lines and leaving an estimated 1,000 persons without electricity Tuesday morning.

The front brought snow to this area which in places drifted to several feet in depth and covered the ground with an estimated fall of about four inches up until late Monday night.

Pushed by winds in excess of 50 mph the snow drifted around outbuildings and kept highways in hazardous conditions all day Monday and that night.

Businesses To Close Two Days

In a poll taken Tuesday, a total of 27 out of 30 businesses contacted indicated that they will be closed Friday (Christmas Day) and Saturday, December 25 and December 26 for the Christmas holidays.

Shoppers planning on week-end buying following Christmas are asked to keep this in mind when making your shopping plans.

Be sure to stock up on most of your home needs in order that the employees of these businesses can enjoy the holidays also.

Snowplows of the Texas Highway Department got to work in earnest about dark Monday and worked around Friona all night clearing the highways and making the streets passable.

At about 1 a. m. Tuesday the weather began to warm and the snow turned to rain and the ground turned to a quagmire.

Wires began to ice up in a hurry and then whipped by the high winds began to bring down the electric and telephone lines across most of northwest Parmer county.

Service lines to most outlying communities around Friona have been down since that time, but crews of the Deaf Smith Rural Electric Cooperative have been on the job trying to get electricity back on the farm.

The moisture-laden snow was a blessing however, to wheat farmers as fields are covered with a heavy layer of snow and Tuesday night and early Wednesday morning a slight drizzle sent more moisture to the ground.

As the storm hit Friona a flurry of accidents kept officers running.

Two accidents were reported, neither of them serious. A 1950 Ford was a total loss when it overturned south of town. Both occupants were sent to the hospital where they were treated and released. At the same time Monday afternoon two women were attempting to pass a truck by Benger Air Park and their 1954 Chevrolet skidded out of control and overturned.

However, the car was turned back upright and when a flat tire was fixed they were ready to continue their journey.

Several more one-car accidents were rumored although none were reported to police headquarters.

Monday night police and county officials, aided by crews of the Highway Department were busy until midnight pulling travelers out of snowbanks. After midnight traffic was limited to trucks and busses and no serious injuries were reported in this area.

School in the Friona district was closed Tuesday as the rural roads were impassable due to melting snow and ice. This buildup continued all day Tuesday when two inches of moisture fell in Friona.

Schools were also closed Wednesday as the busses could not run.

The front is slated to break Wednesday and as The Star goes to press skies seem trying to clear and the ground is still covered with snow and ice.

More damage was reported to television antennas in Friona during this one storm than at any one given time in the past according to officials Tuesday.

Most towers in town seemed down or drooping as the heavy buildup of ice plus high winds took their toll.

For those of y'all who read the story in last week's Star about the proposed paving project, then turned inside to find the "map which is inside the paper," we humbly apologize.

Squaws Take Tourney

Placing a guard and a forward on the all tournament team, the Friona Squaws defeated all opponents to win first place in the White Deer Invitational Tournament held Thursday, Friday and Saturday in the White Deer High School gymnasium. This is the second tournament the Squaws have won in as many attempts.

The girls began tournament play against Clarendon, coming out on top in that contest by a score of 65 to 32. High scorer for this game was Charlotte Bock, with 19 points, followed by Levada Hand who had 15 points to her credit.

Taking a 13 to six first quarter lead, the Squaws were never in trouble as they had raised the score at halftime to 33 to 18. When the third quarter ended, the Squaws held a 47 to 20 lead and the final score against Clarendon was 65 for the Squaws and 32 for Clarendon. The win gave the Squaws the right to advance to the second round of play.

In the second game, the Squaws met the Groom girls and came out on top by a score of 67 to 44. This win gave them an automatic second place and a right to compete for first place honors.

High scorer for the second game of the tournament was Tommy Lewellen who had 23 points, followed by Jacquelyn Magness who had 17 points to her credit.

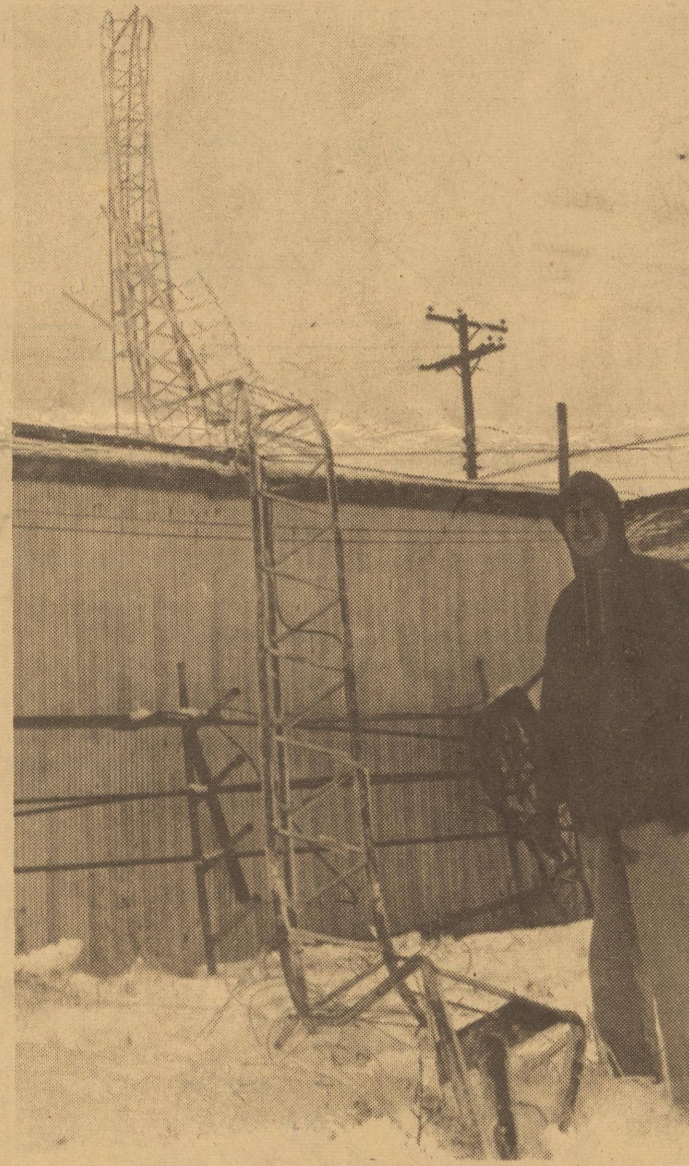

Samuel C. Folkes was charged with driving while intoxicated.

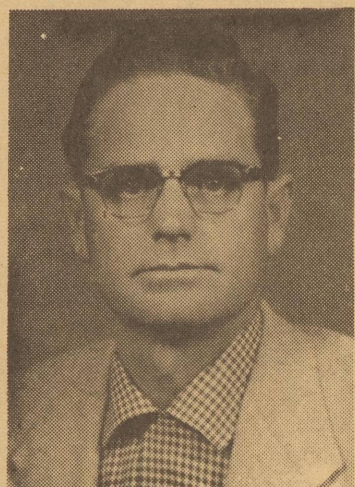
He was arrested between Farwell and Lariat Saturday night by the Highway Patrol.

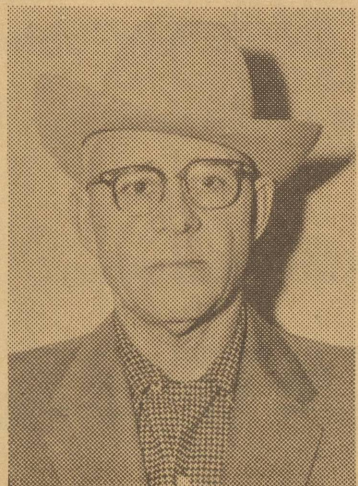

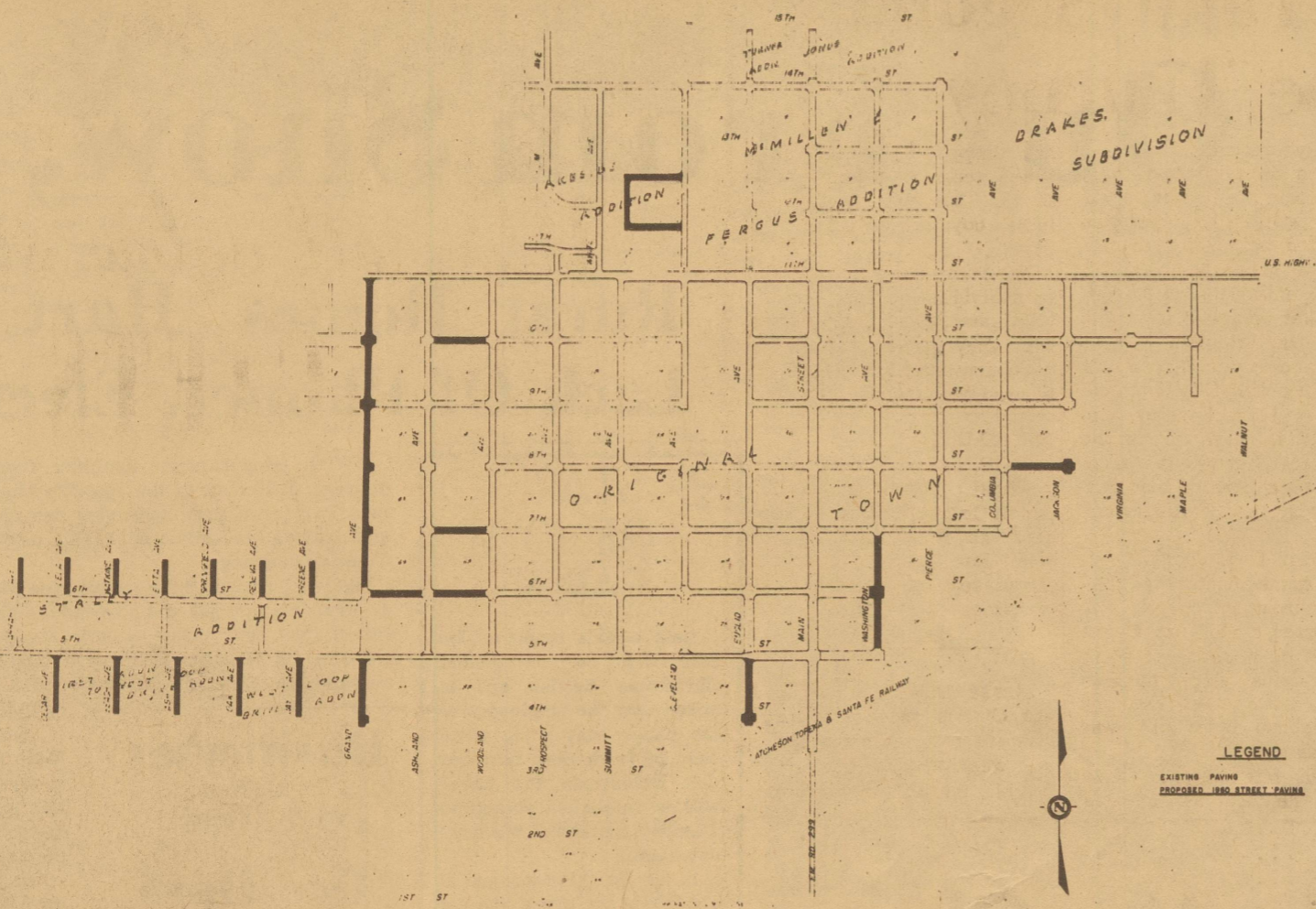

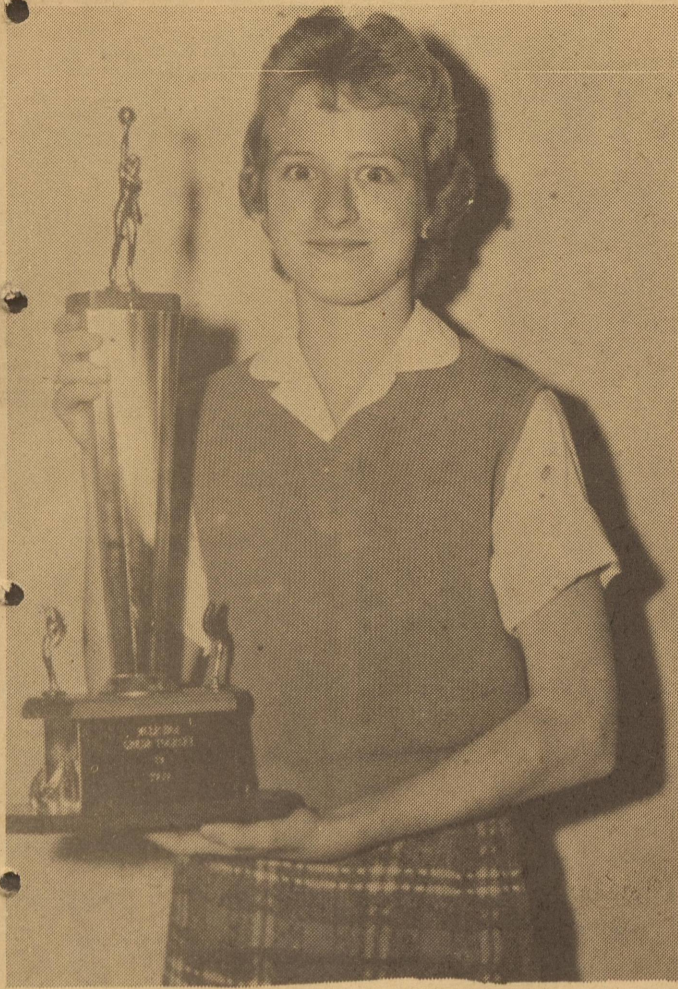


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Fish Girls Take Second At Muleshoe Tourney

High scorer in this game was Janet Buckley with 24 points followed by Carol Ray who had 15 points.

The final game of the tournament saw the Friona girls contesting the Muleshoe Mullettes for the first place trophy Saturday night in the Muleshoe High

School Gymnasium.

Taking an eight to nothing lead before the Friona girls could tally, the Mullettes maintained their lead to go on to win by a score of 25 to 20. It was a tight game all the way and neither team was the victor until the final whistle.

Indictments Read, Cases Heard Friday

Friday was a busy day at the Parmer County courthouse. The fall term of the Parmer County grand jury was called back to investigate a number of cases, and they returned six indictments.

Also, District Judge E. A. Bills was on the bench in district court to hear non-jury criminal cases, and his trip to Farwell was not wasted. Bill Rollings, 37-year-old man from Dallas, was indicted on a charge of fraud by the grand jury. He is alleged to have swindled J. D. Kirkland of Kirkland Pump Company in Farwell in a business transaction.

The dispute occurred about a year ago. Rollings is out on a \$2000 bond and the date of his trial has not been set definitely, although it is likely that it will come up in March.

Juan B. Chavez, 30, Amarillo, was indicted on two counts of burglary. He is the man who several months ago broke into the courthouse at night and made off with a sizeable cache. He was indicted for burglarizing the offices of Mabel Reynolds, treasurer; and Sheriff Chas. Lovelace.

He pled guilty before Judge Bills and was assessed a term of eight years in the penitentiary on each count. He can serve both terms concurrently, however.

Billy D. Carter, the 29-year-old Canyon man who ran into trouble when he tried to steal a car in Bovina two weeks ago was indicted for that offense. The jury recommended that he be given a probated sentence. He is out on \$1500 bond and his trial has not been put on the docket.

An indictment was returned against Charles Strickland, the 19-year-old Alabama Negro who shot a companion twice two weeks ago in Bovina. He was formally charged with assault with intent to murder. However, the grand jury did

not choose the words "with malice" in their indictment, and as a consequence the maximum penalty in this case was three years. He drew the maximum assessment when he pled guilty before Judge Bills in district court.

Leroy Blaylock, 25, Friona, was indicted for theft of tools from Pruitt Elevator at Black. This case was opened last week when the man was arrested Wednesday in Friona in connection with the disappearance of tools from the northeast Parmer County business.

He admitted this act and others, according to Sheriff Lovelace. The grand jury, in making the indictment, requested that a deferred sentence be given in the event he should be found guilty. He is not eligible for probation, having once before been convicted of a felony.

Blaylock's bond was set at \$1500 and he was in jail Monday, although it was expected that he would soon post the bond and be out until his trial. The trial date is not set.

Thus, the grand jury investigated and returned indictments in two felony cases which came to a head only last week. This timeliness is unusual inasmuch as the grand jury is in session only infrequently.

Sheriff Lovelace left the county Tuesday to take Strickland, Chavez, and Herbert Hopkins to Huntsville. The latter pled guilty Friday before Judge Bills in connection with the burglary epidemic in Farwell this summer.

In that series of crimes, eight Farwell businesses were burglarized. Hopkins was indicted for two of the burglaries (Midget Cafe and Buck's Superette) in the September session of the fall grand jury, but until this week he had not pled guilty. He changed his mind this week, and was sentenced to two years on the two counts.

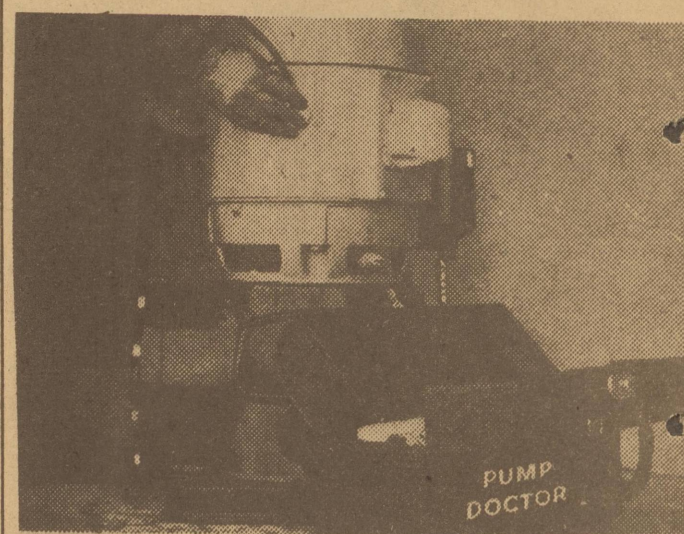

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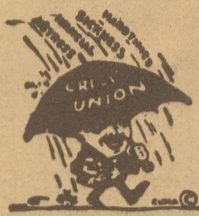

Council Rejects Bids On Dump

In a short special meeting Monday night members of the city council of Friona rejected all bids for digging two new pits at the city dump and voted to redraw the bids and ask for another round of prices on the job.

Commissioner E. G. Phipps of this county precinct met with the council and told them that the county would aid the city where possible in the project and would have a maintainer on hand for the low bidder's use in digging the new pits.

The county participation is due to the fact that the county uses the dump quite a bit in their cleaning up throughout the year.

The council voted to ask for

bids from those who bid on the original job. Bids were opened Monday night. They will ask for two prices, a turn-key and by the yard price on two, 250x25x20 pits plus roads at the dump ground.

This meeting was attended by Aldermen Danny Bainum, Deon Awtrey, Bill Nichols, Glenn Reeve Sr. and Eddie Meil and Mayor R. L. Fleming and Albert Field, city manager.

In other business the council voted to turn down the request of Herschel Johnson to tie his new house, now under construction, onto a deeper sewer line unless he wants to stand the cost of the tie-in himself. The council felt that as the sewer line at the house is 36 inches deep this would be enough to give adequate service.

Soldiers Aid Demonstration

Two soldiers from Friona, Sergeants Harold B. Taylor and Charles B. Beaton, recently participated in an artillery weapons firing demonstration near Nurnberg, Germany, for more than 60 members of the German Army.

During the demonstration, a light-armored artillery battery occupied a firing position and delivered five minutes of continuous firepower support for a combat command in a simulated attack.

The men entered the Army in June 1957 and were stationed at Fort Hood, Texas, before their arrival overseas in December 1957. They are assigned to Battery A of the 4th Armored Division's 78th Artillery in Crailsheim.

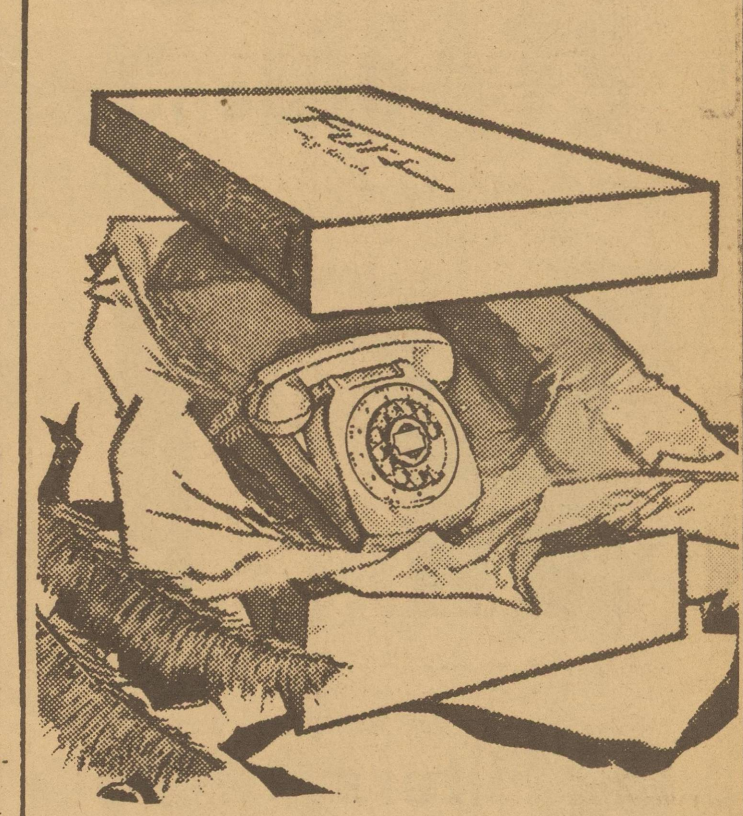

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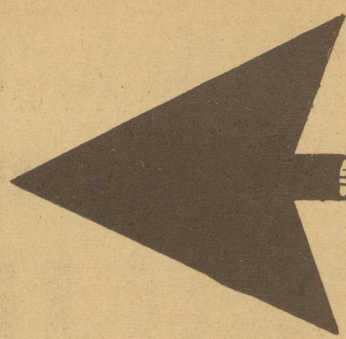

Vegetable Harvest Still In Progress

Vegetable harvesting, processing and shipping is still in progress in Parmer County, but Kenneth Neill of Friona Growers and Shippers says harvesting will be over in about two weeks.

The Company manager reports a poor year for vegetable crops. He says both price and yields are below average.

"Carrots have been below average in both price and yield.

"I imagine six tons per acre," he says of the average carrot yield. About 300 acres of carrots were raised in the Friona area this year.

"It's about \$25 on the ton," Neill says about the present market price. He sees no prospect for a more favorable market.

Neill says there was not much lettuce grown and that it was a very poor year for that crop.

Potatoes is the largest crop handled by the company with about 600 acres grown in the area.

"It would be somewhat below average," he says of the yield and price of potatoes.

Neill reports that cabbage was the only crop to have had a good year, but there was less than 100 acres raised, he says.

Income Tax Time

It's that time of year again and many Parmer County area farmers are about to dive headlong into filing their income tax return.

For the benefit of the bewildered, Farmers Income Tax Guides are now available for the asking. Joe Jones, Parmer county agent, says anyone who would like one of the guides may pick it up in his office or write and he will send them one.

"They are good and they give examples and discuss in detail any income tax problems farmers have."

He says farmers need one to understand the fundamentals of income tax procedure that applies to them.

Income Remains Stable for Many

"For farmers who didn't receive excess hail and didn't lose wheat and cotton, gross income is running about the same as last year," reports Bill Nichols, agriculturalist for the Friona State Bank.

He says farmers made enough yield on milo to offset the low

price of the crop, but many farmers were hailed out on cotton and wheat.

"Most farmers don't expect anything better, so they have to make a good crop at lower production costs.

"This was a good year for production and a poor one for prices."

Although many farmers have lost, Nichols indicated that the average gross income remains about the same as last year.

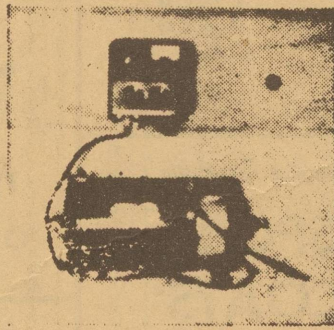

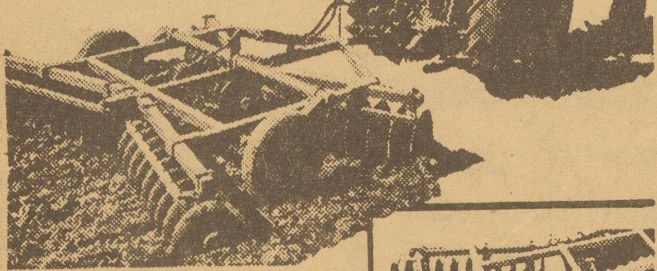

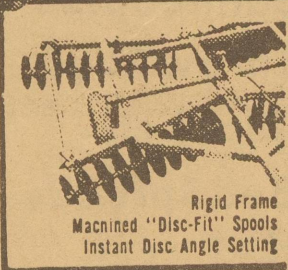

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H. D. AGENT'S CORNER

Candy thermometers are the best guides for testing a candy mixture, according to Extension foods and nutrition specialists.

Before you begin make sure your thermometer is accurate. You can check it quickly by placing it in boiling water. To get a correct reading make sure the thermometer does not touch any part of the pan, and that the bulb is completely covered with the candy mixture. Read the temperature at eye-level -- not from above or below.

You can use the cold water test as a cross-check. Drop a small portion of the candy mixture into a bowl of cold water and note the kind of ball formed. Fondants, when done, should form a small soft ball which flattens out when held on the tip of the thumb. A firm ball -- the test for caramels -- will hold its shape when lifted on the fingertip. For divinity and popcorn balls the syrup should form a hard ball which can be manipulated with the fingers. The soft crack stage for butterscotch or taffy means that threads are hard but not brittle. Hard crack threads will snap when tapped against the side of the bowl. Use a fresh bowl of cold water each time you make a test.

For best results with candy making, read your recipe carefully before you begin, have all supplies ready and follow the directions given.

Toys are more than just playthings -- they teach, too. Mrs. Eloise Johnson, extension fam-

ily life specialist, says they contribute to a child's development and should be selected to fit that development at any stage.

For example, push-and-pull toys, wheel toys, balls, sports and gym equipment are typical playthings which aid PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT . . . Blocks, construction toys, drawing and painting equipment and hobby kits are aids to CREATIVE play . . . Dolls, housekeeping equipment, train systems and dress-up costumes are typical of the kind of equipment which stimulates IMITATIVE and DRAMATIC play.

How much you spend is not important . . . IT IS important to consider the child's play interests and his stage of development.

Hunting seasons are in full swing and reports indicate good hunter success in most areas of Texas. There are many who enjoy hunting but do not enjoy eating game meats -- and there is usually good reason. Improperly cooked duck, or deer meat, for example, is less palatable than good grade leather.

Properly prepared game, however, can be even more delicious than domestic meats. Mimeographed leaflets on cooking game meat are available from the specialist in wildlife conservation.

Following are some tips in handling a deer that has just been killed. These practices will improve the quality of the meat (and thus provide you a good argument for hunting again next year).

1. If the deer does not bleed thoroughly as a result of the bullet wound, bleed the deer immediately after the kill (Be sure he is dead before you try this! Avoid his antlers and hooves). Place the deer on the

ground with its head downhill, insert a knife blade just in front of the breast bone and sever the large blood vessels of the neck. This type of cut will not ruin the head if it is to be mounted.

2. Dress the deer as soon as possible to insure rapid loss of body heat. Avoid cutting the internal organs. Care should be taken to prevent hair from coming into contact with the meat. Trim away meat that has become blood-shot by the bullet.

3. Rapid cooling is the next important step. This is accomplished by hanging the carcass in a shady, cool spot. Wipe the body cavity dry with a clean cloth and spread the body cavity with a stick for better cooling. Black pepper, if available, sprinkled on the raw edges will help keep flies off the meat. Leave the carcass hanging overnight, if possible.

4. Even though you may want to exhibit your deer, it is best to transport the animal in the trunk of the car. If draped over the front fender of the car, engine heat will start meat spoilage.

5. Before cutting-up the carcass, be sure it has been aged properly. One week or longer at 40 degrees F is considered proper. This "ripening period" should be allowed even if the deer meat is to be frozen.

6. Butchering a deer is very similar to butchering a beef. If the hunter is unfamiliar with the butchering process, it is best to let a butcher do the job.

A sweater and skirt can become a related costume if you use your creative skill. Col-

lars, skillfully applied bands or appliques are not only decorative on a sweater but they can also tie together two unrelated garments to give an ensemble look.

Another way to get a coordinated ensemble in your wardrobe is to plan a sweater addition to harmonize with the next dress you make. It's very easy to line a classic cardigan sweater with the dress fabric, and it can be very smart and expensive looking.

To do this, buy enough extra fabric to line your cardigan sweater. Using the sweater as a pattern, line the front and back in the contrasting material. Sleeves do not need to be lined.

The right kind and amount of trimming adds interest and individuality to a costume . . . Too much can be distracting and confusing, according to Rhea Merle Boyles, extension clothing specialist of Texas A&M College.

The secret of effectiveness in trimming lies in discriminating use. Self-covered buttons and belts, or those that blend with the garment, can be used without danger of a spotty or overdecorated effect. Self trim of this type becomes part of the design of the garment and gives more leeway in choosing other accessories.

If you plan for contrasting trim, study your figure carefully to determine where to place the emphasis. In other words, "accentuate the positive." Make certain the trim is appropriate to the garment and the occasion for which it will be worn.

Shop for ideas that are different. Study garments displayed in exclusive dress shops and adapt ideas to your own purse and personality.

A final word . . . When in doubt, leave that extra trim off . . . It's better to use too little than too much.

Also received this recipe for Louisiana Cream Pralines that were good and thought you might like to try it for Christmas.

LOUISIANA CREAM PRALINES

1 pound light brown sugar
few grains salt
3/4 cup evaporated milk
1 tablespoon butter
2 cups (1/2 pound) pecan halves
Cover a large baking sheet with aluminum foil, or butter baking sheet lightly. Mix sugar, salt, evaporated milk and butter in medium size sauce pan. Stir

over low heat until sugar is dissolved. Add pecans and cook over medium heat to soft ball stage (234 degrees F.), stirring constantly.

Remove from heat and let cool 5 minutes. Stir rapidly until mixture begins to thicken and coat pecans lightly.

Drop rapidly from a teaspoon onto baking sheet to form patties. (If candy becomes too stiff at the last to handle easily, stir in a few drops of hot water.) Let pralines stand until cool and set. Makes about 44 small pralines.

Note: To make large pralines, drop from a tablespoon. Recipe makes about 20 large pralines.

TO MAKE ORANGE CREAM PRALINES: Add 1 teaspoon grated orange rind to sugar mixture before cooking, then proceed as above.

TO MAKE COFFEE CREAM PRALINES: Add 1 1/2 teaspoons instant coffee to sugar mixture before cooking, then proceed as above.

TO MAKE GINGER CREAM PRALINES: Add 2 to 3 tablespoons finely cut crystallized ginger root or 3/4 to 1 teaspoon ginger during last few minutes of cooking to soft ball stage, then proceed as above.

Evaporated milk is ideal for candy-making, for it assures a creamy flavor and superbly smooth texture. If you would like additional evaporated milk candy recipes, we shall be happy to send them at your request.

A sweet bread that would be welcomed by family or friends at meal time or as an in-between snack is

PRUNE AND SPICE BREAD

3 cups sifted all-purpose flour
1 tablespoon sugar
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
1/4 teaspoon allspice
1/8 teaspoon cloves
2 tablespoons soft shortening
1/2 cup sweetened, drained, cooked prunes
3/4 cup warm water
1 package active dry yeast
1 egg, room temperature

Blend the first seven ingredients in a bowl. Pour the warm water into another bowl, sprinkle yeast on top. Let stand a few minutes, then stir to dissolve. Blend in the egg.

Add about 2/3 of the flour mixture and the prunes to the yeast mixture. Beat about 2 minutes, until smooth. Beating replaces kneading in this recipe.

Pour in all the rest of the ingredients and beat again with a spoon until smooth, 1 to 1 1/2 minutes. Scrape batter down from sides of bowl. Cover and let rise in warm place until double in bulk, about 45 minutes.

Grease 9x5x3 inch pan. Beat raised batter hard 50 strokes. Pour into the pan, spread into corners of pan with a spoon. Rap pan on table to settle batter.

Let rise in warm place until doubled, about 30 minutes. Bake in 375 degree oven 40 to 50 minutes or until well browned on sides and top. Remove from pan and cool on rack.

Have Soil Tested For Best Results

Farmers who plan to have soil tested for the next season should send off their test now so they will have it in time to plant in the spring, according to Joe Jones, Parmer county agent.

"If a farmer is going to fertilize, soil testing tells him what type fertilizer and how much to use.

"Soil testing is only a guide to go by in a fertilizing program."

Since farmers need to cut production costs, a fertilizing program based on what soil needs can be a good way to cut expenses.

"If you feel you don't know what to do, soil testing will serve as a guide," he says to farmers who are not sure about fertilizing.

The agricultural agent has available in his office, cartons, questionnaires, and everything needed to send in a soil test.

The material will be given to anyone who goes by the office.

"I think it could be recommended that a farmer do some sampling on his farm every year, but it may not be neces-

sary every year."

Jones says farmers who want to can send their samples to the Agricultural Extension Service, Soil Testing Station, College Station, Texas. Cost is

\$1 and a sample is about a pint.

Additional information may be obtained in the county agent's office.

Time To Water Wheat, Says Agricultural Agent

Now is the time to start watering winter wheat, says Joe Jones, Parmer county agricultural agent.

"Most of our wheat is off to a good start, but it is dry. Freezes and wind have taken out the surface moisture. It is time every wheat grower water, if they haven't already started."

Even though the plants are not growing much, there is a great need to keep the roots of the wheat healthy.

Jones points out that although watering is important, overwatering can be serious as failure to water. The danger of overwatering is especially

present in sandy areas.

"If farmers go ahead and water now, they will be ready to top dress in February and follow that with another watering."

"I think too many times we don't water in winter, but if we would roots will be in better shape and we will wind up with better crops next year."

When watering, about three to four inches is enough water to prevent overwatering. Jones emphasized the need for winter irrigation of wheat and other small grains and also the need for top and side dressing as the crops are coming up.

Grain Sorghum Yield Reported at Halfway

The average yield of fifty-five varieties of grain sorghum was 4,563 pounds per acre in one of the 1959 grain sorghum tests at the High Plains Research Foundation, Dr. T. C. Longnecker, director, announced today.

The hybrids and varieties were planted June 18 and had a total of 12 inches of water in three irrigations of 4 inches each on August 5, August 24 and September 8.

The top twelve in this test were close in their yields. Each hybrid or variety was planted in 100-foot plots in four different locations throughout the test area. The two center rows of each four row plot were harvested to determine the grain yield. The average yield of the four plots for each variety is the basis of the yield report.

The yields of the top 12 were: Redlan Kaffir, 5,706 lbs.;

Texas 601, 5,485 lbs.; Pfister 665S, 5,314 lbs.; Pfister 625S, 5,256 lbs.; Steckley's R103, 5,248 lbs.; DeKalb E56A, 5,248 lbs.; DeKalb C44A, 5,207 lbs.; Plainsman, 5,101 lbs.; Texas 608, 5,052 lbs.; DeKalb C44A, 5,207 lbs.; Plainsman, 5,101 lbs.; Texas 608, 5,052 lbs.; DeKalb F63, 5,052 lbs.; Pfister 605S, 5,044 lbs. and R. S. 610, 5,036 lbs.
