A large group of interested citizens gathered Sunday afternoon at Hansford Library to attend the special mortgage burning ceremony. Library Board chairman Dick Countiss openly declared the building "free of debt" as he lit a match to the \$31,000,00 note. Mrs. Frank Davis, Twentieth Century Club representative, assisted Mr. Countiss in the ceremony. This local organization, under Mrs. Davis' leadership, was very instrumental in helping pay off the note.

Countiss spoke briefly and gave recognition to the "area public in general" for paying off the note on the library building in just three years.

It was under the leadership of Library board chairman Emmett Sanders, three years ago this month, that the idea of purchasing this two-story building for Hansford Library became a reality. The idea met with much anxiety, and many doubts, but the board gave him a vote of confidence and instructed him to finalize the deal with Mr. Erlis Pittman, owner of the building.

Mr. Sanders served as library board chairman for some 12 years, resigning this position just two years ago. During the last year of his service to the board, he worked very hard toward pushing the new building project. At the end of that year, the building was more than half paid for.

Because of Sanders past efforts, and continued interest, the Hansford County Library Board submitted to him the following letter of commendation: "Upon completion of payment for the Hansford County Library building it is proper to remember those people and events that have made this happy occasion possible. Therefore, in recognition for long and diligent service, leadership, resourcefulness, vision and dedication, the Hansford County Library extends its most sincere appreciation and warmest thanks to you and commends you for your 12 years of service on the Hansford County Library Board."

A crowd numbering some 300 thronged the beautiful library building Sunday where a selection of art was on display. Some pieces were available for sale. The art sale netted about \$800 with a 20% commission going to Hansford Library.

Funeral services were conducted at 2 p. m. Wednesday from the First Methodist Church in Spearman for Mrs. Anna Lee Kirk, 56, a lifelong Spearman resident.

Mrs. Kirk suffered a major heart attack on October 8 while shoveling snow from the walk at her country home. She was hospitalized until about a week ago when she was able to come home. She died Sunday afternoon about 5 p. m. in her home.

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Let Me See  
by Sybil...

I have tried for years to plan a Thanksgiving dinner menu which I would not duplicate exactly just 4 weeks later when Christmas dinner is served. But I can't do it, try as I might, I come up with turkey & dressing, pumpkin pie, cranberry salad, and a few more side dishes which usually go untouched. So, I'll fix this for our family dinner next week, and will do so again for Christmas dinner, but it won't taste nearly so good the second time around. The kick I get out of these holidays anyway is preparing the meal. I guess this is a childhood hangover from watching my mother go to such pains making Christmas dinner. Days ahead she began baking, crumbling,

whipping, shelling nuts, making candied fruit peel. I remember she too, came up with about the same menu annually. Chicken though. Never a turkey. I remember the first turkey I ever baked for just Billy & I. I cooked that poor bird practically all day. We ate the dressing and gave the bird to the cats. Now I cook a big one in 3 1/2 hours. Takes longer than this to bake a hen.

America has not always celebrated Thanksgiving. For at least 47 years of our history a national Thanksgiving day was not even proclaimed. Thomas Jefferson did not believe in the observance and refused to call for a day of Thanksgiving. From James Madison (1809) to Abraham Lincoln (1861) there was no Thanksgiving day set aside. Nor has it always been in November. Only since the days of President Lincoln, 1861-1865 have November & Thursday been the American custom.

This week I have had the pleasure of looking over an old book called PRACTICAL HOUSEWIFERY by Marion Harland, published in 1874. It is a combination of common sense in the household, plus some delicious sounding "receipts". If I were to depend upon this book to prepare my Thanksgiving menu, I must first stalk a stately wild turkey until I have inveigled him up to a blind by imitating the call of his hen or younglings. If I can overcome the spellbinding pity of admiring his beauty, "place gun at shoulder and finger on trigger, and shoot." Draw & wash the inside with strong soda water, stuff with rich foremeat, bread

crumbs, bits of fat pork. Moisten with milk, beat in an egg and some butter. Allow a pound of butter for basting while roasting to a golden brown. Dredge with flour at last, froth with butter and serve. Lay the boiled giblets whole, one under each wing. Garnish with small fried sausages, not larger than a dollar. Send around current jelly.

BREAD: having set your sponge overnight, sift dry flour into a deep bread-tray, and strew a few spoonfuls of fine salt over it. Make a hole in the middle of the heap, pour in the risen sponge (which should be seamed in many places on top) and work down the flour into it with hands. Spend 30 minutes kneading--this kind of useful gymnastics is grand exercise for the arms and chest. Set aside to rise. Knead again for 15 minutes. Put into loaves and if your ovens are in good condition, one hour should bake the bread.

I had the good fortune last week of coming into the possession of one of these old wooden, handmade bread trays. These are very rare, and this one is a beauty. I just might try my hand at this breadmaking.

PUMPKIN PIE: 1 qt. stewed pumpkin pressed through a sieve, 9 eggs, 2 quarts milk, 1 tsp. cinnamon and the same of nutmeg, 1 1/2 cups white sugar. Beat all well together and bake in crust without cover.

PLUM PUDDING: 1 pound each of butter, suet, sugar, 2 1/2 lbs. flour, 2 lbs. raisins, 2 lbs. currants, 1/4 lb. citron, 12 eggs, 1 pt. milk, 1 cup brand, 1/2 oz. cloves, 1/2 oz. mace, 2 grated nutmegs. Mix all thoroughly; wring out your pudding cloth in hot water; flour well inside, pour in mixture and boil 5 hours.

I can confidently recommend this as the best plum pudding I have ever tasted. I have made it and if anyone is interested in learning more about it, call me and I'll give details. It keeps forever and is even better six months old.

CAKE: Use none but the best materials for making cake. If you cannot afford to get good flour, dry white sugar, and the best family butter, make up your mind to go without your cake and eat plain bread with a clear conscience. Always beat egg yolks &

whites separately. Stir butter & sugar to a cream. Do not use fresh & stale milk in the same cake. It acts disastrously. Don't delude yourself, and maltreat those who are to eat your cake, by trying to make soda do the whole or most of the duty of eggs. There is no disgrace in not having time to mix and bake a cake. You may well be ashamed of yourself if you are too lazy, or careless, or hurried to beat your eggs, cream your butter and sugar or measure your ingredients. Yet, if failure is your portion, what then? If the cake be uneatable, throw it away upon the first beggar-boy who comes for broken meat, and say nothing about it. If streaky or burned, cut out the best parts, make them presentable as possible and give them to John and the children as a "second best" treat. Then keep up a brave heart and try again.

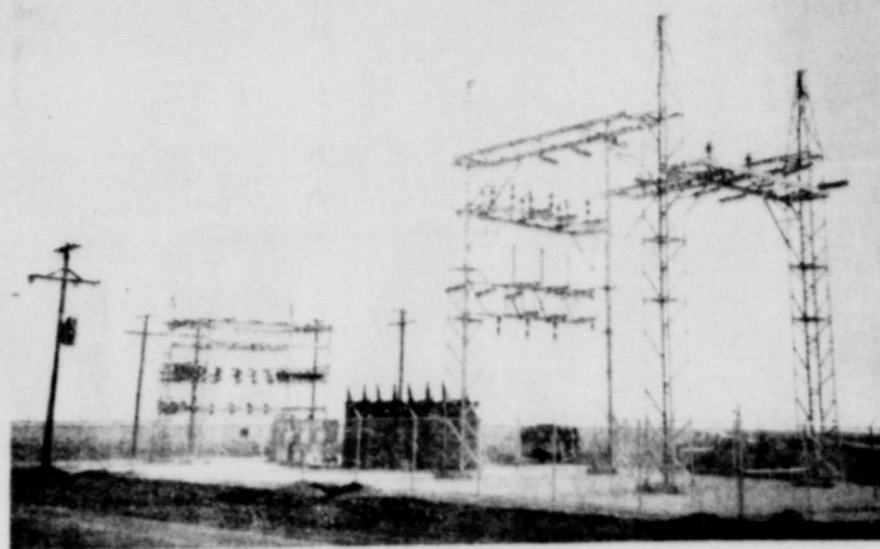
For a real treat, you could serve with the menu, Nasturium-seed, pickled. They are an excellent substitute for capers. Take the green seed after the flower has dried off. Lay in salt and water 2 days, in cold water one day; pack in bottles and cover with scalding vinegar, seasoned with mace and white pepper-corns, and sweetened slightly with white sugar. Cork and set away four weeks before you use them. Happy cooking.

Substation No. 8 for the North Plains Electric Cooperative is located approximately eight miles southwest of Spearman on the Borger highway and has been named "Harbour Station". It will serve the south part of Hansford County and the north part of Hutchinson and is named for President of the Board of Directors, Ira A. Harbour.

**New Transmission Line Energized  
After Delay Because of Materials**

The new 69,000 volt transmission line extending from the Southwestern Public Service Company interchange at Old Hansford to a point approximately eight miles southwest of Spearman on the Borger highway, and the new Harbour Station at that point, was energized recently. This was about 75 days later than the target date set for completion and the delay was caused by failure of the suppliers to deliver the material.

This line and station will serve North Plains Electric Co-op members in the south part of Hansford County and the north part of Hutchinson County. This area was experiencing voltage problems and it had been planned to complete the addition by the time the peak load hit last summer. But due to the delay of material delivery it was impossible to do so.

The addition of this section of transmission line and the new substation will provide adequate and dependable service for this area for several years. If unexpected loads develop all that will be needed will be to increase the size of the transformers in the substation.

The work on this project was contracted to E. G. Ericson Construction Company, and total cost was approximately \$135,000.00.

**County's Petroleum  
Industry Valued  
Annually, 14,244,060**

Hansford County's petroleum industry produces 1,110,788 barrels of crude oil valued at \$3,564,791 and 77,950,888 thousand cubic feet of natural gas valued at \$10,679,269 for an annual economic value of \$14,244,060.

These figures, just released by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association, show the county ranked 77th among state counties in oil and gas production during 1969.

Texas production which has registered an increase over each previous year during the past decade hit another all-time high in 1969 with 1,151,775,000 barrels, according to U. S. Bureau of Mines statistics. This is a production increase of 24.2% since 1960.

"Production from Hansford County helped meet this record demand," says Kenneth E. Montague, Association President. "We are now calling on it and the rest of Texas to meet an even greater demand as events in the Middle East have again forced us to dip into our declining reserves. Unfortunately, the price for Texas oil is inadequate to stimulate enough exploratory drilling to replace reserves."

Hansford County landowners and others with mineral interests received \$1,780,507 in royalty payments last year. Texas received \$163,980 from crude oil production taxes and \$758,228 from natural gas production taxes.

Estimated drilling expenditures totaled \$3,447,532 with \$1,742,594 of that amount spent on dry holes yielding nothing for the driller. Ira Rnehart's Yearbook showed drillers completed 1 oil well, 13 gas wells and 14 dry holes. Six wildcats were drilled with 3 of them dry.

The county's oil and gas

processing plants also added to the economy. The Oil and Gas Journal listed 2 natural gasoline plants with a capacity of 510,0 million cubic feet daily.

Reports from the Texas Employment Commission show some 315 persons were directly employed by the oil and gas industry in the county with an annual payroll of \$3,325,636.
