



for Watts' verse from Handel's "Messiah." With the spirited Handel melody, "Joy to the World" is not only well suited to be used as a church hymn, but is also very effective for outdoor caroling.

"O Come, All Ye Faithful" is the most universally popular of all the Christmas songs, having been translated into 119 languages and dialects. It ranks as one of the great hymns of the





### **Guinns Produce Holiday Meals For 15,000**

Turkey for Thanksgiving or Christmas dinner for about 15,-000 persons was produced this year by Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Guinn, who own and operate a 1040 acre farm in Deaf Smith County about 17 miles northwest of Friona.

Early in the spring in 1940, Mrs. J. T. Guinn stopped at the home of Mrs. F. L. Reed north of Friona and purchased two settings of turkey eggs to put under two chicken hens. Each hen was able to take care of nine eggs and the eggs cost

This was the beginning of what has grown into one of the major projects on the Guinn farm in Deaf Smith County. These first nine eggs hatched good and the young pullets grew into the foundation of breeding stock kept by Mr. and Mrs. Guinn about four years.

In the spring of 1945 the Guinns decided to enlarge their flock and get into turkey production in a big way, so ordered 300 poults from a hatchery at the hens are more reserved and do not come to the fence to greet newcomers. Plainview. Consistently since that time they have ordered between 100 and 1500 young poults each spring.

The poults are ordered for delivery about May 1 and kept in batteries three or four weeks. Guinn states that one of the most important things about growing turkeys is to give them a good start.

When the poults are big enough to take out of the batteries. they are moved to closed quarters and kept there until about six weeks old. At this age they. are put on open range. The Guinns have large open range roosting frames which are moved regularly.

The turkey ranges are from one acre plots to 25 acre plots and are fenced with woven wire. Green pasture is kept for the turkeys by drilling either sudan or wheat. When it is moving time, a tractor is hitched onto the roosting frames, the water fountains are moved and the turkeys follow the movers.

John C. White, the Texas commissioner of agriculture, isn't always considered by us to be a wise person. We have, in fact, occasionally thought of him as something more akin a noisemaker or rabble rouser.

Just the same he deserves credit for a thought-provoking piece that emanated from his office a while back, and we suppose, if he didn't author it he at least advocated what it meant. Here are some excerpts we

have gleaned: griculture's greated need today is understanding.

This means understanding among those directly engaged in farming and ranching; understanding by those who provide services and materials to the farms and ranches: understanding by those who transport, process and distribute the plant and animal products coming from farms and ranches; and above all, understanding among the great majority of our people who live in towns and cities and who are the principal consumers of the products of our agricultural industries.

Those of us engaged in agricultural endeavors have tended to take for granted that people generally and naturally under-stand their basic dependence on agriculture for food, feed and fiber. In recent years we have been rudely awakened, in cotton, for instance, by the advent of synthetics.



December Plentiful Foods Rival Santa's Bag Of Good Cheer College Station -- Santa Claus has nothing on America's food industry when it comes to providing tokens of December good cheer.

Through combined efforts of farmers, processors and distributors, Texas consumers will have an abundance of festive food items all month, to give holiday menus a hearty air.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's December list of plentiful foods gives part of the picture, points out the Texas Agricultural Extension Serv-

Pork and sweetpotatoes are feature items on the list. Food markets in Texas also have more - than - usual supplies of broiler-fryers and small family-size turkeys this December, to provide a variety of "budget" meats.

Apples, raisins, almonds, filberts, and peanuts and peanut products -- all ideal for holiday treats -- also are abundant. Potatoes, onions, lard and vegetable fats and oils complete the 13-item plentiful foods list, as outlined by USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service. A large number of other foods also will be available in about normal volume

So there'll be a bonanza of holiday eating this December. Consumers may help themselves to the abundance, and to savings, by shopping the "plentiful foods" way -- items in good supply usually are priced more reasonably.

\* \* \* \* FAMILY LIVING **PROSPECTS FOR 1960** Some slight "ups" and

'downs'' are indicated in costs of goods and services available to families this year, according to outlook reports. A modest decline in food prices should offset the possible continued rise in some of the other goods and services such as equipment and medical care.

Food supply is expected to be abundant and varied in 1960. Lower prices for meat, vegetables and fruits are expected to reduce the retail food price index slightly. New forms and types of foods will continue to appear on grocery shelves. Continued increases in the employment of married women appear likely. Many questions can be raised about the effects of the employment of women on

many. Great orchestras and great singers "discovered" the song and in the ensuing years it has become a part of our Christmas heritage. Father Mohr never lived to see the greatness the song would achieve. He died in 1848 and his parishoners had to pay for the burial of the poor, but dedicated priest. Gruber, the schoolmaster lived 15 years longer, but also died poor and obscure, perhaps-perhaps not-aware that the world would always be thankful for "Silent Night, Holy Night."

It's a long way from Texas to Michigan, but a story comes from the Canadian border that should make a few Texans shed tears. It is estimated that some 50,000 whitetail deer arefacing starvation in that state, closed in by snow, and with insufficient feed for the terrific herds that have been built up.

Fortunately Texas has had no real cold weather during the past winter months. If we had, perhaps we'd have had a heavy loss, too. When we think of the work that has been done to produce 50,000 deer in any one state, and of the hunters who will be robbed of their right to harvest such animals, it is sickening.

This is just another reason why 'we must turn to our research programs and do everything possible to bring about the proper balance of nature.

The 50,000 dying deer are in the forests of Michigan. Snow has blanketed the low browse and there is nothing for the animals to eat. The same thing can happen easily in our own east Texas, but for another reason. In much of our forestry program in East Texas we have ignored the hardwoods, which furnish most of the food for the deer. They practically live on the acorns and browse. When we cut out the hardwood entirely, we are robbing posterity of the wildlife to which it is entitled.

Too few of us pay enough attention to the necessity of producing feed for the wildlife we expect to harvest. We had a typical example in several areas of Texas during the past winter. Thousands of quail literally starved to death. Not all of this can be blamed on the lack of feed. There was a tremendous increase in rat population, along with an increase in quail. The rats got to the food first and the quail perished.

All of which is a very good reminder that right now we should begin on our program of providing more feed and cover for this year's quail crop. Fortunately many landowners have found that wildlife is a crop and can be harvested for profit. As a result they are putting in more habitat all the time to take up some of the loss we are getting in other areas.

Unfortunately in the process of civilization it is necessary to eliminate many natural resources. A bulldozer knocking es to provide for cit streets can destroy more wildlife habitat in a day than we are likely to build up in a year. Destroyed also are water holes, leaving no water for birds or animals to drink.

While on the subject of birds, let us remind you that right now is a good time to kill off a lot of crows. During the past few weeks they've really been taking over. There isn't too. much food for them right now, so they are destroying everything they can set their dirty beaks to.

Crow shooting is a real sport. You can pot them off with a rifle, or call them in shooting range for your shotgun.

Most land owners will be glad to give you permission to kill crows on their places. They may specify whether you can shoot a rifle on the place or not.

So many landowners now have valuable live stock they don't want killed that they will not permit rifle shooting. However, you can have as much fun shooting them with a shotgun. If you don't believe it, get an imitation owl and a crow call. Put that owl on a fence post and hide back in the brush and give a few calls. The crows will come in. That's a fine place to burn up a few of the shotgun shells you had left from last

season. Another interesting way to


