Clement, is in the intensive care unit at St. Anthony Hospital in Amarillo this week following a one-car turnover early Sunday morning. Physicians term his condition as "critical" but family members state he is some improved since the accident.

The accident occurred south of Spearman near the Steve Mathews ranch. The car apparently went out of control just as it crossed a cattle guard about 1:30 a.m. The vehicle turned over five times, throwing the passengers out. Investigating officers said the car rolled over Clements' body. Three other passengers were less seriously injured.

They were Terry Childers, 24 of Dumas; Miss Bobbie Henderson, 18, of Kirkland, Texas and Miss Branda Timmons, 19 of Cee Vee, Texas. These are in Hansford Hospital. Childers suffered scalp lacerations. Miss Henderson is in the intensive care ward at the Spearman hospital with possible internal injuries, the extent still undetermined according to a local physician. Miss Timmons suffered a fractured pelvis.

The wreck victims were brought to Hansford Hospital about 2 a.m. Sunday. Clement was then transferred to the Amarillo hospital suffering from severe internal injuries.







IS BUSY ONE!

All city officials and aldermen were present, plus the mayor at the regular city meeting held Monday evening in Spearman.

The ambulance had 8 runs in April. Five of the runs were local, 2 to Amarillo, and 1 county run.

The Municipal Court report ed 64 cases filed in April. Fines assessed amounted to \$752.00. Themes, 216.50. Suspended fines were \$35.50. Worked out fines, \$185.00. Total paid, \$515.00.

The police report included 65 traffic tickets issued, 10 accidents, and 3 arrests for the city.

The animal control reported that 9 animals were held over from March into April. A total of 39 animals were picked up in April: 12 were paid out, 2 escaped, 32 de-stroyed, and 2 held over into May.

The Fire Department reported 2 regular drills held in April, 2 county fires, and 3 city fires.

The council approved letting bids on repairing the roof at the community building. They also agreed to work with the City concerning hard surfacing the area around the Community building, to the North and West.

The council agreed to table the appointment of a representative to the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission. The swimming pool opera-

tion for the summer will be handled by Coach Allen Simpson, as in the past.

The council received word from Judge Lee, that the state Highway 51 commission was real pleased with the efforts that the city officials have made concerning Hiway 51. This will be the new route to the Tulsa canal system, and will be South of Spearman, about 8 miles.





AUSTIN, Texas--Colonel Melvin N. Glantz, the State Director of Selective Service for Texas, is instructing Texas Draft Boards to issue Induction Orders to all 1972 First Priority Selection Group men with Lottery numbers of 35 or below.

Under the Uniform National Call procedure, the "Induction Cut-Off Number" was announced by Acting Director of Selective Service Byron V. Pepitone. Induction Orders will be issued to all fully acceptable registrants in the United States with Lottery Numbers of 35 or below who are members of the 1972 First Priority Group. This Priority Group is made up basically of men born in Calendar Year 1952.

The Defense Department ask ed Selective Service to induct 15,000 men in April, May and June. The National Director previously established a Lottery Cut-Off Number of 15 for April and May, and has raised the Lottery Number to 35 for the
