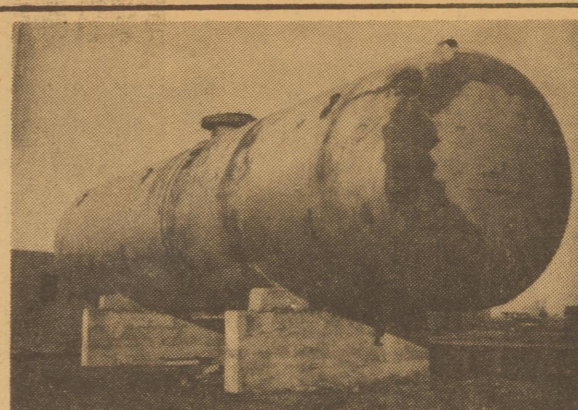
The Board then reviewed and approved the repairs and operation of the District equipment operated by A. L. Logan.

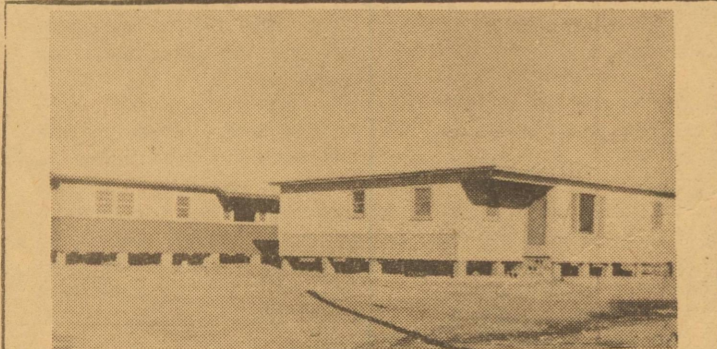
