Safety is first priority for FISD board

The Friona Independent School District met in regular session on Monday, October 10, 2016 in the Board Meeting Room of the FISD Administration Building to discuss a seventeen item agenda highlighting teacher retention and school safety.

Vince Viaille, of Specialized Public Finance, addressed the board and discussed the impact of a bond issue while taking advantage of the taxes from the wind farms. The board took his suggestions under advisement and will determine if there will be a bond issue in their future.

Karen Barnes, Special Programs Director, spoke to the board about the program that was implemented this year for first and second year teachers for teacher retention. They meet every 4-6 weeks and visit classrooms to bolster support for the teachers.

Barnes also addressed the recent lockdown situation and stated that even with procedures in place there is still room for improvement. She stated that the district safety audit is reviewed every three years and the current audit will be addressed.

Barnes continued by stating that there is an urgent need for every teacher's door to be able to lock. Teacher's doors are normally closed and locked during class time.

Superintendent Pam Ray suggested installing auto locks that would be used during an active shooter lockdown.

Ray issued the following statement concerning the lockdown: "Friona ISD went on lockdown on Friday, October 7, 2016, from 12:20 p.m. to 1:30 p.m. to investigate a threat of a potential shooting. Friona Police Department and a canine unit worked the investigation and found no firearm. Appropriate action was taken during and after the investigation to ensure our students' safety. Because our students are our number one priority, we decided that locking down was the best way to keep them secure. We know these situations are unnerving but want to assure everyone that we make decision for student safety. All steps were made and will continue to be made to ensure our students' safety."

The superintendent added, "Friona ISD would like to thank the Friona Police Department, Parmer County Sheriff's Office and the Department of Public Safety for their support."

The school board discussed the scheduling of lockdown practice as well as fire and tornado drills at least three times a school year.

In regular business, the board discussed and approved the administration reports, school

funds report and the payment of September bills.

Jo Ann Belcher, Parmer County Special Education Director, presented for the boards consideration the implementation of a Highly Structured Self-Contained Classroom and a teaching position. The classroom would be available for students with severe disabilities that need one-on-one behavior classes. This will cut down on

disruption to the general education classrooms.

"The need is growing for this type of classroom in Friona," stated Belcher. At this time, the need is in the elementary and primary but will expand to the junior high and high school in time.

The board reviewed the substitute pay scales and will make a decision at a later date when more information is available.

They also discussed the Fair Labor Standards Act and the impact on district employees that are on an hourly basis.

The board will consider a new vision, mission and belief statement and Superintendent Goals.

The next meeting will be held on Monday, November 14, 2016 at 7 p.m. at the FISD Administration Building. The public is always welcome to attend these meetings.

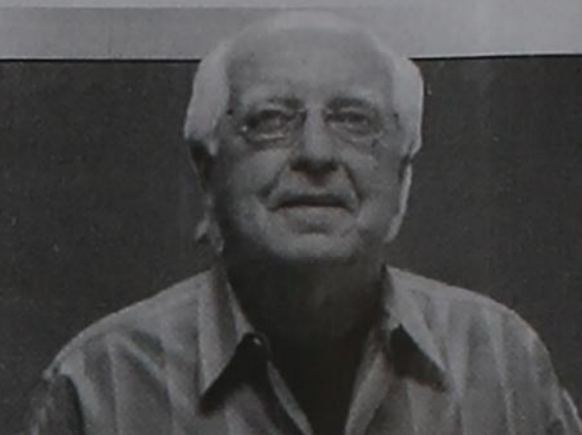

Out Here

still ticking

Once upon a time I went for an allergy shot and ended up with a pacemaker.

During the last week in August I made an appointment at the clinic to get an allergy shot. Besides allergies I felt like I was about to get the flu.

Had a 3:15 work in appointment with Dr. Jubay. When they called me back Christina weighed me in and was taking my vitals in an exam room. All seemed normal up to that point. She put that little oxygen clothes pin thing on my finger. Suddenly she saw something was not right and ran to fetch Dr. Jubay.

He listened to my heart while instructing Christina to arrange a wheelchair and notify the PMC ER folks I was on the way over. Dr. Jubay said my heart rate was 160. Normal is closer to 60. I was thinking yeah but what about my allergy shot. No, I could not tell my heart was racing.

Spent about three hours hooked up in the ER cardiac room. My heart rate stayed around 150 until I coughed and it dropped to 100. The nurse said my cough reset my heart rate. That was normal they said. I went home that night kind of confused about the events of the day.

Dr. Jubay's office made me

an appointment with Dr. Joel Osborn at the Cardiology Center in Amarillo about a week later.

I spent the day there taking several tests with names like Echo Cardiogram and Nuclear Chemical Stress Test. They stuck a modern little heart monitor to my chest and told me to wear it for a week. Even gave me a prepaid postage box to mail the monitor to some lab in Indiana or somewhere. I did that, still not feeling bad or noticing if my heart was still racing.

When Dr. Osborn got the monitor results back he called me. During the week I wore the monitor he said my heart rate reached a low of around 30 and a high around 132. In addition, he said I had a pause. When I asked what that meant he said, "Your heart stopped for four seconds."

"You are going to need a pacemaker," he said. Things had moved pretty fast but pacemaker was not even on my mind. I had always figured people got a pacemaker shortly before they meet their maker.

I have been pretty active and healthy most of my 76 years. Was not ready for the pacemaker thing. He made an appointment for Monday October 3. Check in at BSA by 9:00 a.m. My youngest daughter Megan came out. She and my brother

Rick drove us to BSA. The nurse who greeted me in the preparation room was named Marta. She graduated from Friona High School in 1989. The doctor installing the gadget was Dr. Sammy Lane Cox. He is the nephew of the late Leroy Cox of Friona. Dr. Cox said he bought his first BB gun at Plains Hardware on Main St. when he was 12 years old.

They gave what they called casual sedation. In other words I was awake during the implant. He deadened around my left shoulder area. I felt that. He said if you fell any pain let me know. I felt what I assume to be

the first incision and told him so. The nurse gave me another shot of a drowsy drug and I didn't feel anything else. It took maybe 30 minutes until he sewed me up.

Because I didn't get full anesthesia and didn't have to wake up they rolled me straight upstairs to a room. Spent the night and was released the next morning. I estimate BSA nurses and technicians made at least 100 trips into my room to check vitals, order meals, ask if I was feeling okay, and did I need any pain meds. Only took a Tylenol once and Tramadol once. It was a great relief to get the 12-wire

monitor and the IV needle off.

As we were loading up to leave the next morning, Johnny Douglas was parked behind us to pick up J.B. He had a stent put in. I was back in the office Wednesday and have been active but taking it slow and easy.

Could not use my left arm for a couple of weeks but all else is near normal. Many thanks to Dana and Nathan here at the office for getting the paper together that week. And to all who have inquired about my health and wished me well. Thank you all.

And yes I did get an allergy shot finally.

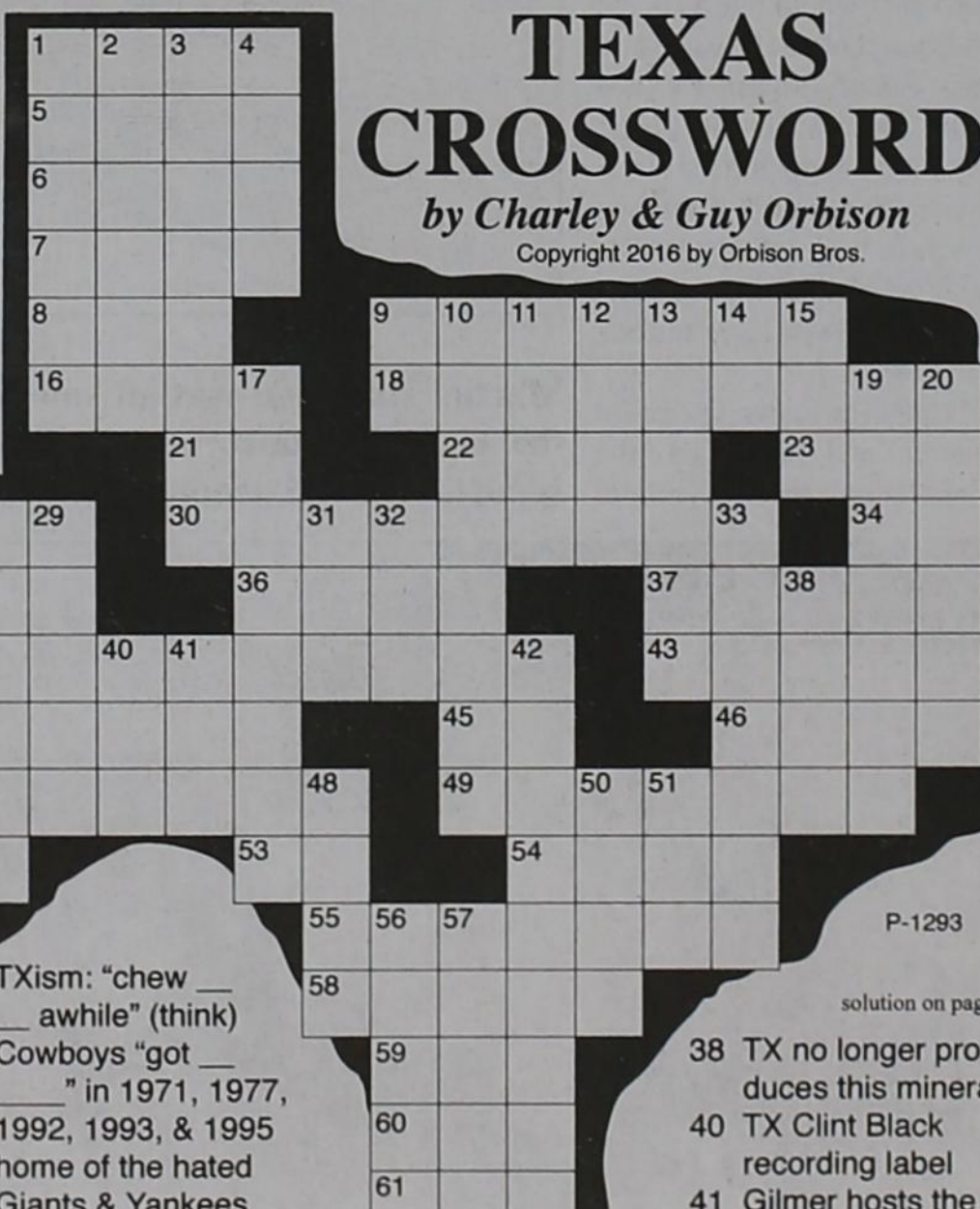

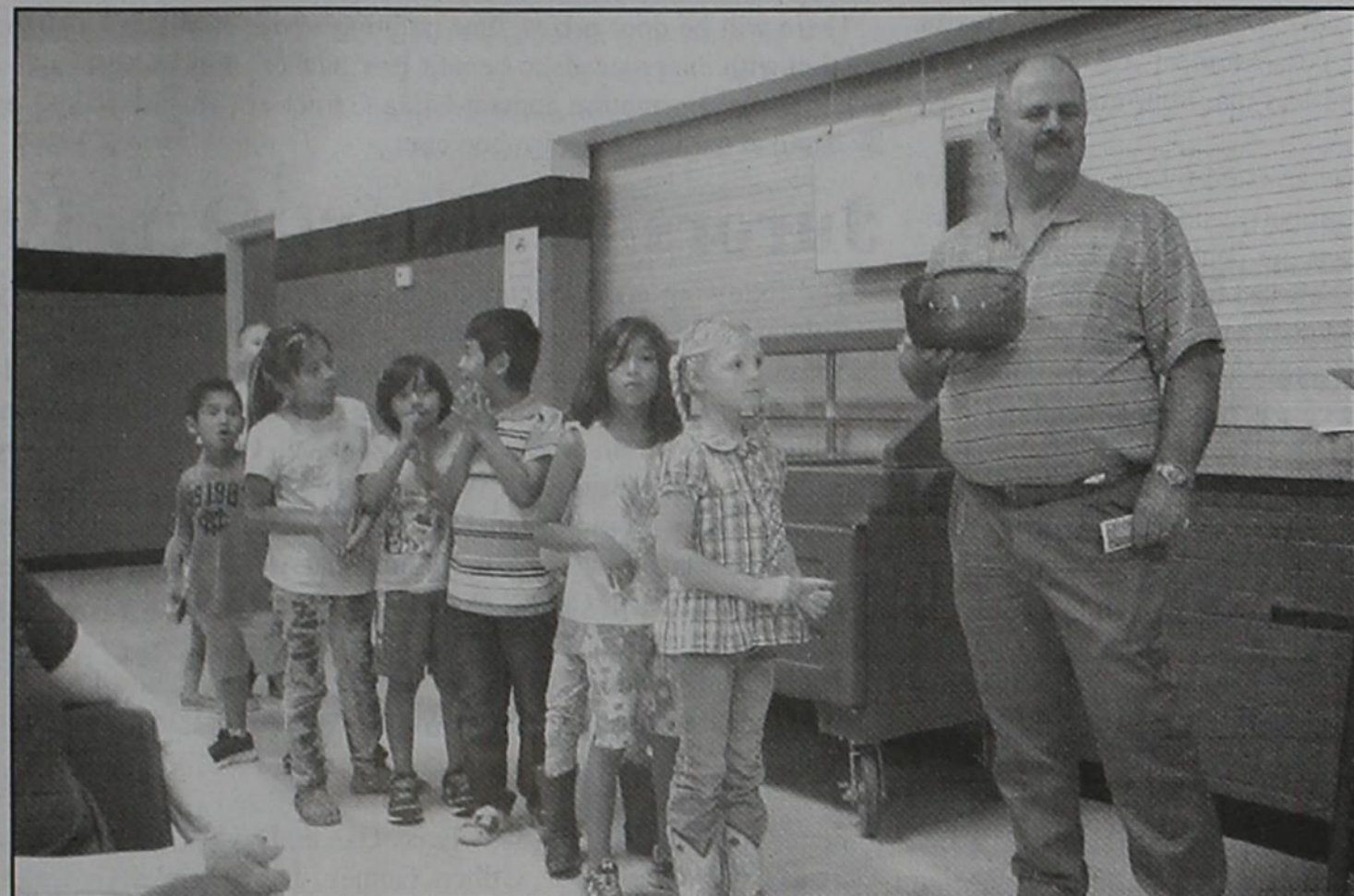

DeWit named to Regional Water Planning Group

Dr. Chris Grotegut of Hereford, a Dawn area producer involved in agriculture systems, agricultural investments and veterinary medicine, and Harry DeWit of Friona/Parmer County are among four new members named to the Region O (Llano Estacado) Regional Water Planning Group during a regular meeting held October 5 at the offices of the South Plains Association of Governments in Lubbock.

Both Grotegut and DeWit will serve as agriculture representatives on the Region O board.

Dr. Grotegut already serves on the High Plains Water District Advisory Committee, and has studied the Dockum Aquifer through West Texas A&M University. He farms several thousand irrigated acres in the Dawn area and is well aware of water issues facing High Plains agriculture and citizens of the region.

"I have significant experience at both Ogallala and Dockum well development and operation. I desire to work quickly toward a long-term balance between recharge and usage," Grotegut explained.

Dr. Grotegut received his Doctor of Veterinary Medicine degree from Texas A&M University in 1995. He operates GO Foods and GO Farming in the Dawn area with his wife, Judith, and twin sons Joseph and Johann. He is credited with his knowledge and forward thinking on water matters.

Harry DeWit started dairying in Stephenville in 1992 and after ten years decided to build a dairy at Friona. Today he operates an umbrella company—Blue Sky Farms—that includes two dairies at Friona, one at Dublin, Texas, and one at London, Ohio, encompassing 12,000 dairy cows, as well as a 13,000 head central heifer raising operation at Hart. He is involved in farming 14,000 acres and has been a board member with Select Milk

Producers for 12 years.

Others named to the Region O board include Andrew Freeman, assistant city manager at Plainview, and Shane Jones of Post, Manager of the White River Municipal Water District that supplies water to Post, Spur, Crosbyton, and Ralls. Both will serve as municipal representatives.

Also serving on the Region O board from Hereford are Mayor Tom Simons, who was named a municipal representative in 2015 following the retirement from the board of Bob Jossierand, and Jim Steiert, an environmental representative, who has served since he was appointed by the state legislature with the inception of Region O through Senate Bill 1 in 1997.

The Llano Estacado Regional Water Planning Area (Region O) includes 21 counties in the Southern High Plains of Texas. Major cities in the region include Brownfield, Hereford, Lamesa, Leveland, Lubbock, and Plainview.

Counties in the region include: Bailey, Briscoe, Castro, Cochran, Crosby, Dawson, Deaf Smith, Dickens, Floyd, Gaines, Garza, Hale, Hockley, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Motley, Parmer, Swisher, Terry, and Yoakum.

The Llano Estacado Regional Water Planning Group (LERWPG) is tasked with developing and adopting a regional water plan in accordance with Senate Bill 1 and Senate Bill 2 as passed by the Texas Legislature.

The group's mission statement is to "develop, promote, and implement water conservation, augmentation, and management strategies to provide adequate water supplies for the Llano Estacado Regional Water Planning Area and to stabilize or improve the economic and social viability and longevity of the region through these activities."

Psalm 17 Desperation

"Desperate times call for desperate measures," or so the saying goes, but in scripture desperate times call for desperate prayers, and complete trust in the Lord. Psalm 17 is written by David, out of an intensely desperate time in his life. The bottom had fallen out and enemies were closing in, so he cries out to the Lord in three very specific ways.

First, he cries out to the Lord for justice. Wickedness, foolishness and sin has flooded our land as well, but do you cry out for the Lord's justice? Crying out to the Lord for justice, goes beyond an impassioned plea, but leads one to examine their own life as well (v3-5). Next, David cries out to the Lord in assurance, that God hears and answers his prayers. Aren't you thankful for this promise that God hears us? Further, this assurance in the Lord helps one see their situation for what it is and not sugar coat its gravity. Following the Lord ensures trials will come, but are you walking with Him through those trials in assurance that He hears your cries and knows every challenge you face?

Finally, David pleads with the Lord for deliverance (v13-15). He asks the Lord to be rescued from the wicked, but as you examine his plea, it becomes abundantly clear that David's trust is in the Lord and not in an outcome he has to have. In other words, David allowed the Lord to be enough, no matter the outcome or ending. A grave danger in the church today is to put our faith in the answer to our prayer, instead of the Answerer of our prayers. There is a huge difference, because God is not going to always answer your prayers the way you want, and if your trust is in an answer, then you will be let down in massive proportions. On the other hand, when your faith is in the Lord and His wisdom and sovereign plan in answering your prayers, then you are in a position to love Him as He leads you in any direction and through every trial.

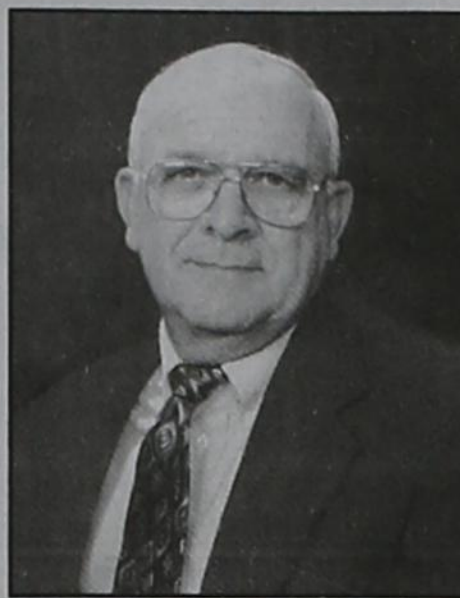

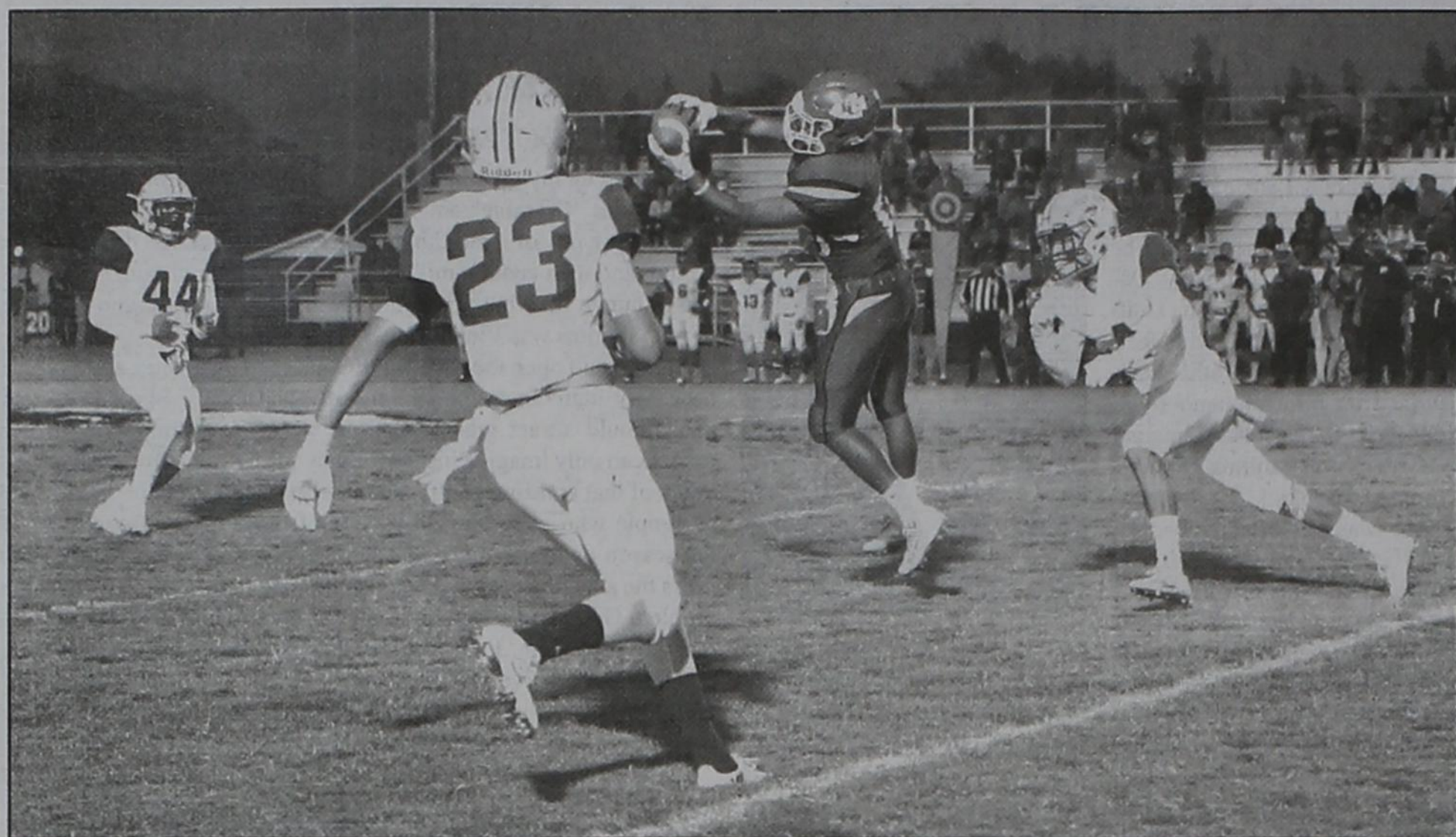

Chiefs lose to River Road 21-14

The Chieftains lost the district opener to the River Road Wildcats last Friday. In spite of 257 rushing yards, the Chiefs scores came on passes.

The leading rusher was Luis Trejo with 19 carries for 120 yards. Marco Monreal carried 24 times for 114 yards. Quarterback Monreal completed 5 of 12 passes for 47 yards and a TD to receiver Jonathan Hernandez. Sergio Flores completed a halfback pass to Johnny Ojeda for the other touchdown.

Hernandez gathered two passes for 37 yards. Salvador Santiago caught three passes for 19 yards.

The Chiefs had 324 yards of total offense and 20 first downs on 62 plays. J. Hernandez punted twice for 80 yards.

Leading rusher for the season is Trejo with 527 yards on 82 carries. Monreal has 462 yards on 91 carries. Jonathan Hernandez is leading pass receivers with 31 receptions for 389 yards. Monreal has completed 55 of 96 passes for 608 yards. Alvaro Gardea is 18 of 18 extra points.

The Chiefs host Littlefield here Friday October 14. Littlefield beat Shallowater 37-13 last Friday. The remainder of the schedule is at Muleshoe Oct 21, Shallowater here Oct 28, and Slaton there Nov 4.

WTA&MU to break ground on Agricultural Sciences Complex

West Texas A&M University officials and other dignitaries will add another chapter to the history of agriculture education at WTAMU when they break ground for a new Agricultural Sciences Complex at 10:30 a.m. Friday, Oct. 14. The public event will take place at the construction site at the corner of Russell Long Boulevard and Hospital Drive.

"This facility will be transformational for agricultural education at this university and complements our ongoing efforts to expand veterinary education in the region," said Texas A&M University System Chancellor John Sharp. "We are extremely grateful to everyone who helped make this dream a reality, especially the members of the Texas Legislature for their crucial support."

The new Agricultural Sciences Complex will provide more than 140,000 square feet of space to provide the best in educational opportunities for WTAMU students and the community. The facility will house classrooms, labs and offices as well as a state-of-the arts meat lab, a multi-purpose arena with spectator seating for up to 500 people and a pavilion for the showing, handling and evaluation of animals.

"We are excited the addition of the new Agricultural Sciences Complex to our campus and so grateful to The Texas A&M University System, the Texas Legislature and the many industry leaders who have supported this project," Dr. Walter Wendler, University president, said. "We look forward to the many opportunities it will offer our students as well as the many collaborations for research and real-world experiences with industry professionals."

The facility's new meats laboratory will include a retail store for the purchase of quality meats by the public. The multi-purpose arena will offer the perfect space for everything from 4-H and FFA contests to horse and livestock judging events. The enclosed pavilion will accommodate courses involving live animals as well as special events for alumni and community partners. These facilities also will allow the department to offer new training and certification programs designed for industry professionals that aren't offered at any other university in the state.

The new complex is scheduled to be completed by the fall of 2018.

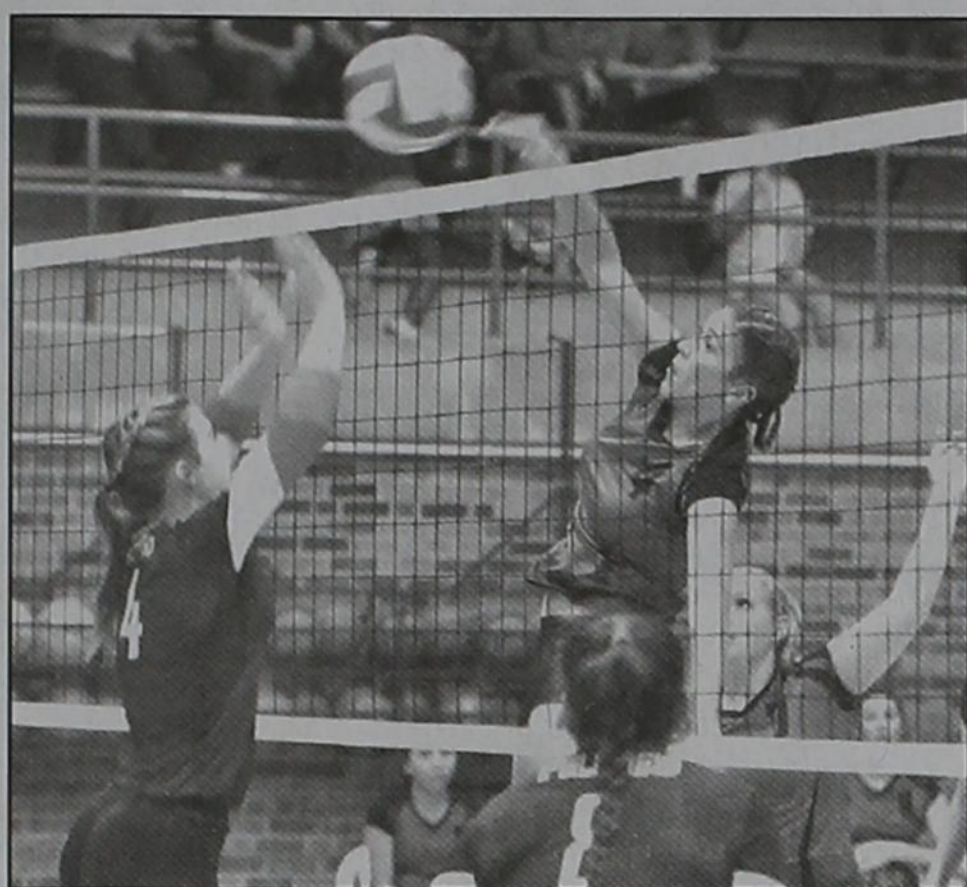
