Of course, being an ex-manager for either the Rangers or Astros is no big deal. Combine that with coaches for the Houston Oilers, and the "exes club" would have to find a fairly large facility for their meeting.

Clark Is Winner For Second Time

Apparently, if you share a week's glory with another contestant, that entitles you to win it outright another week.

Jack Clark, who had shared the weekly honors with Ky Graham the previous week, came back with an impressive score to win the weekly contest outright in the sixth weekly tabulation of the Friona Star Football Contest.

Prior to sharing the fifth week's honors with Clark, Graham had won it outright, so each have been a weekly winner twice already in the contest's first half, something of a rarity in itself.

Clark weathered the storm of upsets to post a score of 19, to assure himself of winning outright. No other contestant picked as many winners in the week when upsets (or perhaps toss-ups) were the rule. For the second week in a row, he earned \$10 cash in the contest.

Three contestants correctly picked 18 games, and two of these won second and third in the weekly contest.

The third contestant to pick 18 games correctly was Dana Jameson, whose tie-breaker guess of 35-6 was 27 points away from the actual score of Friona 14, Floydada 0.

Only two other contestants managed scores of 17 for the week. They were Phillip Johnson and Joe Luis Santellano.

Seventeen contestants had scores of 16, much above average for the week. They were Terry Davis, Jerry Bentley, Joey Howard, Ricky White, Myrtle Melton, Raul Brailiff, Richard Dickson, Susie Howard, Rick Tullis, Joseph Tullis, Martha Herbert, Rhonda Wilkins, David Saiz, Kent Patterson, Donnie McDonald of Muleshoe, and Hal Ratcliff.

Clark's five misses were Houston-Texas A&M, Alabama-Penn State, Detroit-Washington, Kansas City-San Diego and San Francisco-Chicago.

Graham missed Kress-Lazbudie, Stanford-UCLA, Houston-Cleveland, 49ers-Bears, Giants-Bengals and Cardinals-Eagles.

Mrs. Moss missed Pampa-Lvelland, SMU-Baylor, Alabama-Penn State, Kansas City-San Diego, Giants-Bengals and Cardinals-Eagles.

Although his weekly score dropped to a 14, Ky Graham still managed to add a point to his lead over the second-place contestant in the overall standings. Graham has a score of 108, to 103 for Jon Field of Dalhart.

Clark, who gained five points on the leader, came up to third place overall, tied with Don Herbert, Joseph Tullis and Vickie Moss with scores of 102.

Laura Field, Dale Milner and Donnie McDonald have scores of 101, and rounding out the "100 or over" bunch are Tom Johnson, Tommy Moss and C.H. Veazey at an even 100.

'No Play' Losses Are Less Severe At FHS

With the "No pass, no play" rule coming into force at the end of the six-week grade period, it appears that Friona has come out of the first six-week period with a better than average number of students still eligible for extra-curricular activities.

On the varsity football level, Coach Tommy Moss said that he lost only one team member.

"We came out much better than I was afraid we might. We had been trying to watch the kids' grades, and get help for those who were needing it," Moss said.

However, on the junior varsity level, five players were lost, and five more members of the freshman team, prompting the coaching staff to decide to combine those two teams for the balance of the season.

Dates Are Given For Bird Hunt

The 1985 pheasant season will run from Saturday, December 14 through Sunday, December 29, according to Jack Patterson, spokesman for the Parmer County Game Association.

The season will once again stretch for two full weeks and three weekends. Bag limit will also be the same as in recent years: two cocks per day and four in possession. Hens are illegal game.

Hunters are reminded of the new Texas law, in which they must have a hunting permit unless they are hunting on their own land. Patterson said he felt that the new law was a good one. "Sometimes people take it for granted they can hunt on a person's land, without necessarily having the landowner's permission. This will keep everyone honest," he said.

Beginning next August, even owners must purchase a license to hunt, Patterson pointed out.

Another bird season which is about to start is the quail season, which opens November 2, and runs until sometime in February.

At the same time, the JVs gained a couple of players, plus will send John Cass to the varsity to shore up the guard position, for a net loss of four members.

Parker said he had heard reports of some bands losing as many as 30 per cent of their members, while others lost only two or three students.

The Friona band director said that although the 18 students lost to grades involved some good bandmen, that thanks to the band's good numbers, he felt he would be able to "cover" for the positions lost.

The band will have just a week to plug its holes, since the UIL Marching Contest is scheduled for Saturday, October 26.

The students lost at the current grade report will be ineligible for the next six-week period.

Court OKs Buying New Voting Booths

In order to comply with federal regulations, the Commissioners Court voted at their meeting October 16 to purchase voting booths (privacy stalls), which will be used during elections.

"The law requires a booth for each 150 registered voters. The smaller voting precincts will have adequate spaces for two people to vote," said County Clerk Bonnie Warren, who was authorized to order the aluminum "stalls."

It is hoped that the units will arrive by the constitutional amendment election November 5.

In other business, Sheriff Bill Morgan met with the court and explained requirements for lighting and paint in the jail, for the facility to comply with the jail standards.

Boarding care bills for county foster children in the amount of \$1,299 were approved. The money will be reimbursed to the county by the state.

The court voted to contribute \$350 to the Texas Assn. of Counties to help toward the legal expenses in a case which would have a bearing on every county in the state.

Acting on another request from the Texas Assn. of Counties, the court passed a resolution urging the support of proposed constitutional amendments one and two in the special constitutional election November 5.

The proposed amendments supported by the court deal with the state water plan.

A bill for dues to the P.R.P.C. for 1985-86, in the amount of \$717.47 was approved on a split vote, with Judge Porter Roberts voting to break the tie.

Sgt. Scott, Trooper Bishop and Trooper Hunt met with the court requesting part-time help for the DPS paper work. Motion was passed to hire Amelia Taylor at

Friona and Lena Cole at Farwell on a one-year trial basis, at \$100 per month starting November 1.

A citizens group met with the court to discuss a county road on which they live at the east edge of the county. During time of bad weather, feed trucks and milk trucks going to and from the Long Corral Dairy keep the road torn up, and it cannot be used unless a vehicle is pulled by a tractor. County Attorney Charles Aycock is to contact the owner of the dairy to discuss what can be done to alleviate the problem.

Area Gets Rainfall
A total of 1.19 inches of rain had been received officially in Friona during the past week, according to weather recorder Rodney Dunnam.

The measurements showed .42 inch received last Friday, with another .51 inch on Saturday (actually received after 7 a.m. on Friday). Thursday's shower amounted to .26 inch by 7 a.m.

The temperature dipped to 35 degrees on October 15 and 16, and once again the rainfall has put off the resumption of the harvest, which has been stalled for over a week.

55 YEARS AGO--OCT. 10, 1930

The concrete foundation was poured last week and material placed on the ground for the new Wicks Hatchery. As stated, the building will be 24 by 60 feet, frame and brick veneer. Furlong and Dilger are doing the work. The building will house a 53,000-egg incubator, making it one of the largest in this territory.

50 YEARS AGO--OCT. 11, 1935

Misses Lela and Ella Staley of Springfield, Missouri, were business visitors here last Saturday for a few hours, looking after their property interest in and adjoining town. The Misses Staley own the tract of land immediately adjoining the west side of town which has been cultivated by W.H. Foster for several years.

45 YEARS AGO--OCT. 11, 1940

All the public schools in Parmer County have been ordered closed for one day on Wednesday, October 16, by County Judge Lee Thompson, as the first official action taken in this county to facilitate the registration of men within the draft-age limits. All men between the ages of 21 and 36 will be required to register on the above date. This registration is the first step in selecting able-bodied men

who are qualified for military training in the United States Army.

40 YEARS AGO--OCT. 5, 1945

The filling station building on Main Street that was owned and formerly operated by Sheets Brothers has been sold to the Friona Consumers Company.

During the severe rainy and chilling spell of weather that hit suddenly down upon the Friona territory and all of Parmer County last week, quite a number of our farmers and cattlemen suffered losses through the death of their cattle.

35 YEARS AGO--OCT. 5, 1950

Crop prospects of Parmer County are now tetering a fine balance, with distinct possibilities a record bumper crop or the other extreme--a meager one. Main factor in the outcome is unmistakably the danger of killing frost. With the cool, damp weather prevailing, all the grain is slow in maturing, necessitating a late frost for productive harvests.

30 YEARS AGO--OCT. 7, 1955

First bales of cotton have been delivered in the last week to the L&H Gin and the North Plains Gin Company, both of Friona. First area bale went to the Mills-Fleming

Gin at Hub at an earlier (September 9) date. Delivering the first bale in the city was Glynn Hughes, grown on the irrigated land of Jake Lamb northwest of Friona. Gin owner Wright Williams paid a premium price of 50 cents per pound for the bale.

25 YEARS AGO--OCT. 6, 1960

Rev. W.G. (Bill) Burton of O'Donnell is the new pastor of the First Baptist Church in Friona. The Rev. Burton and his family moved to Friona last weekend and he brought his first message in the local church last Sunday.

Carroll Bennett and Tom Gee will represent the Friona chapter of the Future Farmers of America at the national convention in Kansas City next week.

20 YEARS AGO--OCT. 6, 1965

Two members of the Friona High School Future Farmers of America chapter, along with one sponsor, David T. McVey, will attend the national FFA Convention in Kansas City next week. Attending along with McVey will be Jimmy Taylor and Roger Nelson.

15 YEARS AGO--OCT. 8, 1970

The Friona City Council gave tentative approval for the

annexation of a block and three lots of the Carson Estate property in the northern part of town.

Building permit activity in the city of Friona during September spurred to the second largest total for the calendar year, and revived possibilities of establishing an all-time record for the year's total.

10 YEARS AGO--OCT. 5, 1975

Parmer County Community Hospital has gained three needed pieces of equipment in recent weeks, thanks to gifts from the estate of Mrs. Bradley Crider Smith of Hereford, a longtime patient here, and from Progressive Study Club's Money Doll. Gifts from Mrs. Smith were a transport incubator and a ventilator for the hospital's cardiac room. The hospital also received a check from Progressive Study Club in the amount of \$307.80, the proceeds from the club's Money Doll drawing held during Maize Days. The Money Doll proceeds will go to purchase a photo therapy machine, which will be used to treat jaundiced infants born at the hospital.

5 YEARS AGO--OCT. 26, 1980

Four young ladies from Friona participated in the annual Miss Tri-County pageant at Muleshoe last Saturday. Holly Grimsley was named the winner of the Little Miss Tri-County title. Others participating in the contest were Laura Ellis, the retiring Miss Tri-County; Kipi Fleming, first runner-up this year and Poppy Grimsley, a contestant in the Miss La Petite division.

The first freeze of the season was experienced in the Friona area this week, following a strong cold front which swept through the area on Thursday. Friday morning's low temperature was 26, the lowest of the fall season, apparently low enough to put an end to the growing season.

The PAT try was stopped short, but Friona's lead had become 22-0 with 3:31 left in the half.

Glen Shirley sacked the quarterback, and on the next play, Floydada fumbled, Gary Stowers recovering. Torres immediately dashed 20 yards up the middle, and his run for points made the score 30-0, 2:19 left on the clock.

Floydada came out determined in the second half. They used up virtually the entire third quarter on a scoring drive that came with 1:03 left in the quarter. A run for points was stopped making a score of 30-6.

Friona then drove 43 yards for their final score. Torres circled left end once again, and tacked on the points for good measure.

Steven Dickson and Nathan Brockman each had pass interceptions for the Braves. Lupe Reyes and Caballero had six tackles each. Harvey Sanchez, Anthony Padilla and Shirley had five each.

the Whirlwinds after the visitors had a first and goal situation at the Friona four-yard line late in the first half, showing Floydada back to the 17, when time ran out in the half.

Friona began its fumbling ways on its very first play from scrimmage, when Brad Moyer coughed up the ball, Floydada recovering at the Friona 20.

However, three plays lost yardage for the visitors, and a field goal attempt on fourth down fell short.

Floydada's Hector Flores slipped behind the Friona defense for a 45-yard pass gain, to the Friona 21, but again Friona responded. Kevin Trimmell sacked the quarterback for a ten-yard loss, and a fourth down pass fell incomplete.

The Chieftains had one good drive in the first half. Leroy Mercado gained 14 yards on the end-around play, Brent Gatlin picked up 15 yards on a spurt up the middle, and then Jeff Brown hit Gatlin with a pass and Gatlin showed some nice moves, making a 40-yard gain down to the Floydada three.

Two plays later, Moyer crashed over for the score, and Montoya's kick gave Friona a 7-0 lead 6:55 before halftime.

Friona got the ball back in good field shape, but could not gain, and when they had to re-kick on a punt, a high snap was claimed by Floydada at the Friona 45.

The Whirlwinds worked another pass play for 30 yards, to the Friona 14, and then the quarterback ran for a first down at the Chieftain four.

But the Chieftain defense charged on the next three plays, causing losses of four, two and seven yards, and time expired with the ball at the Friona 17.

The Chieftains added a fumbled punt to their woes in the third quarter, letting Floydada off the hook after the defense had forced a kick from deep in Whirlwind territory. Another 'Wind punt a few minutes later went to the Friona 20, giving an example of the yardage cost by the turnover.

Trying to get going, Moyer raced out to the Floydada 34, but fumbled as he was tackled. Floydada returned the fumble, as their quarterback was sacked and lost the ball. Friona kept up the swap-out, however, when Brown's pass was intercepted a few plays later.

It wasn't over, as Peter Malouf picked off a Floydada pass at midfield and ran it down to the Whirlwind 15. The ball had changed hands five times in the period on turnovers.

Going along with the tenor of the game, Friona squandered their scoring chance after Malouf's pass theft and run. Three plays failed to gain, and kicker Montoya, being used as flanker much of the game, developed a charley horse and was unable to kick on fourth down. A pass from Moyer, intended for Leroy Mercado, fell incomplete.

Friona finally got on the scoreboard again when the team again got the ball. Jimmy Williams ran 20 yards for a first down, and Moyer added a ten-yard gain. Gatlin ran 18 yards to the Floydada seven.

The drive stalled when Brown fumbled the snap from center, Floydada recovering. But Malouf hit the Floydada quarterback and Friona got the ball back.

On first down, Williams ran 17 yards up the middle for the score. Montoya, over his leg cramp, added the kick for a 14-0 lead. There was 9:45 left to play in the game.

Mercado came up with two pass interceptions for Friona in the last quarter. But before the quarter was over, Friona had fumbled one more time, completing a rather frustrating night in that department.

Williams was the leading ground-gainer with 60 yards. But Gatlin was the offensive leader, with 49 yards rushing and 40 passing for 89 yards. Usual leader Moyer was held to 40 yards total.

Although burned by the two long passes, the Friona defense still held Floydada to only 24 yards rushing, and 109 total yards for the game.

The Chieftain defense remains the number-one ranked defensive unit in the Plains area as ranked by the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal, giving up only 72 yards per game.

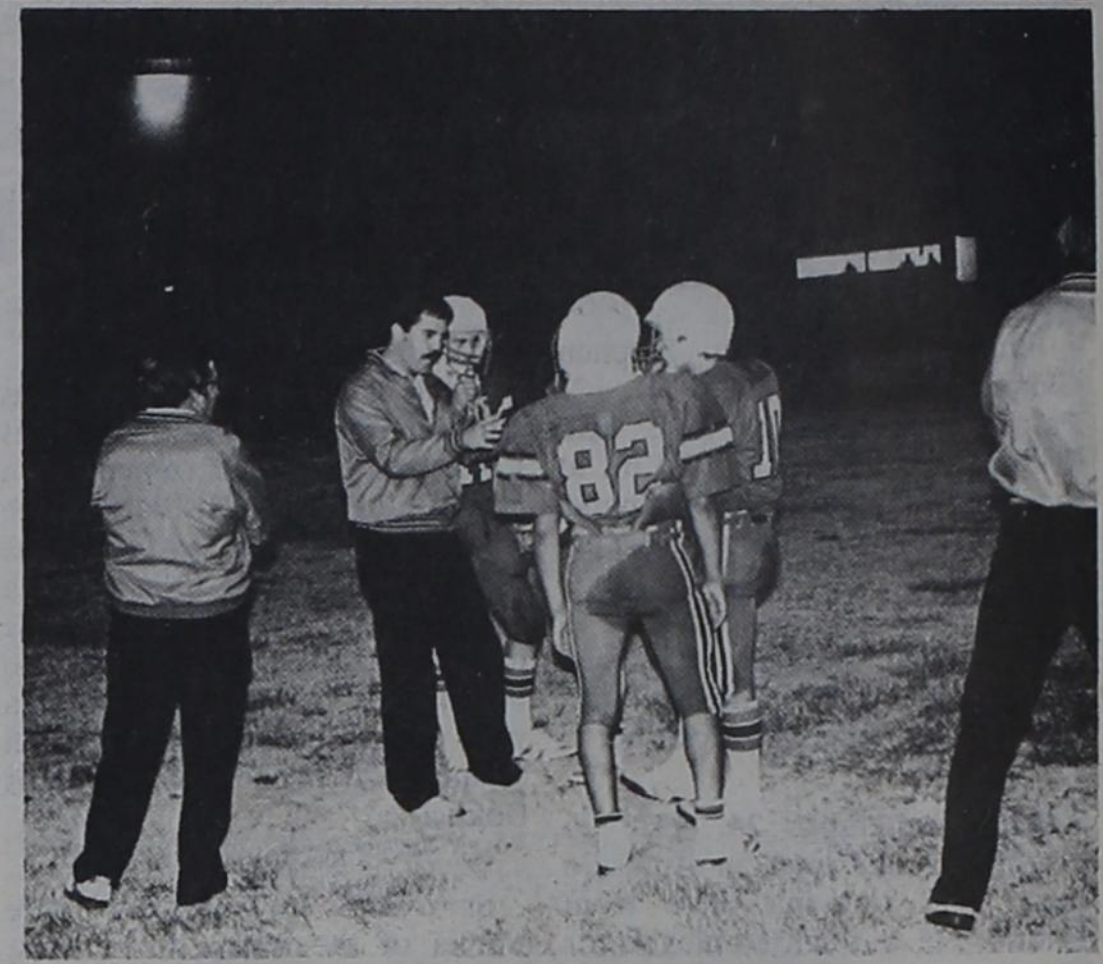

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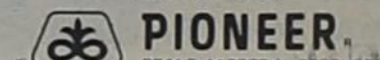

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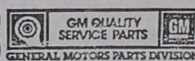

Roots & Branches

By CAROL ELLIS

"What's in a name? A rose by any other name would smell as sweet." With these famous lines, William Shakespeare tells us that each of us is his own person, regardless of what his name might be.

Nevertheless, when you look back to only eight generations in your family, you have 254 ancestors. Each of those 254 people contributed some of their genes, traits, abilities, infirmities, characteristics, to make you what you are today. Wouldn't it be nice to at least know the names of some of those folks?

If your name is Smith and you are interested in genealogy, bless your heart, you've got a problem. Persistence must be your partner. Say you've found that your great-grandfather had a nice ordinary name like Bill Smith or John Jones and you don't know where to turn next. Make every effort to find out the names of his siblings, as great clues are often located through the "sidelines." He may have had a brother Hardwick or a sister Jessamine. Such unusual given names were often bestowed in honor of a favored ancestor from the previous generation. By watching for those unusual given names in your research on Smith or Jones (or whatever) you may locate your people with ease despite the popularity of their surname.

This is what I called "playing the name game" and it is not a method of research which is favored by professional genealogists. But actually locating the person who MIGHT be your ancestor should be the first concern, then working to establish proof of the relationship can come later.

Nicknames can pose a problem in family research. A person's given name may be used in one record and their nickname used in another. Become aware of some of the nicknames which were in common usage years ago. Girls, in particular, were given some pretty standard nicknames. Mary was "Polly," Martha was "Patsy," Eleanor was "Nellie," Sarah was "Sally," Virginia was "Jane" or "Jinsey," Nancy was "Ann," Susannah was "Sukey," and Elizabeth was "Eliza" or "Betty."

We had an Aunt Victoria whose nickname was "Toady" for the simple reason that some younger member of the family couldn't pronounce her name, so that's the way it came out.

Nicknames for men were most often given in an effort to distinguish one generation from another. So you find "Early Will," "Little James," "Elder" Jones, etc. The first son was usually given the name of his father's father. The second son got the name of his mother's father. This was common practice particularly for people of English, Welsh and Dutch descent.

People have also been naming little sons after their heroes for many years. When you run across the initials G.W. with your surname, you've got George Washington Jones (or whatever). A.J. is almost sure to be Andrew Jackson, B.F. (Benjamin Franklin), T.J. (Thomas Jefferson), F.M. (Francis Marion), A.G. (Albert Gallatin), I.N. (Isaac Newton), C.C. (Christopher Columbus), N.G. (Nathaniel Greene) etc.

The surname you are working

on may have been spelled differently from time to time. Remember, court clerks and census takers wrote things down the way they heard them. I have seen a name spelled two different ways in one document (will). For this reason, I get extremely upset with people who say "Oh, that can't be my Shumaker. Ours is spelled S-c-h." or "That can't be my Langston. Ours is spelled d-o-n on the end. (Or d-e-n, or t-y-n). Just don't get hung up on one spelling of your surname, because when the many variant spellings are traced back, they will invariably all stem from one immigrant family. In Friona, we have the example of two brothers who spell their name Lundy and Lunday. So remember to keep an open mind when you are playing "the name game" and you will be surprised at how much fun genealogy can be.

Making Money On Hunters Is Topic

Is it possible to charge a pheasant hunter from \$1500.00 to \$3000.00 to lease one section of land with a 30-acre playa lake on it and a 40-acre corn or sorghum patch adjacent to the lake?

According to recent research done by the Department of Range and Wildlife Management at Texas Tech University, it is possible for farmers living in prime pheasant range to demand these prices.

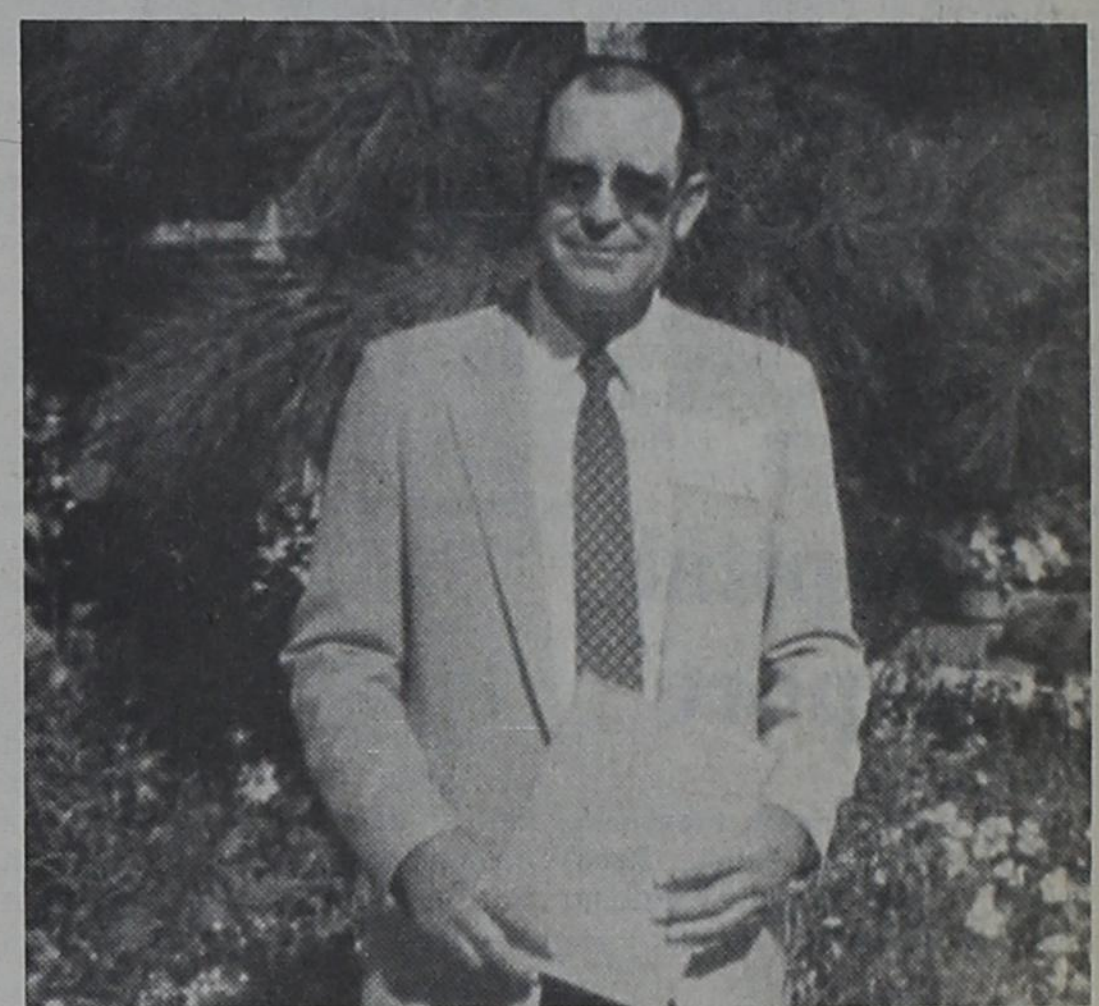
For several years now, Chamber of Commerce offices representing various communities on the Southern High Plains of Texas have been receiving inquiries from many large companies, corporations, and private individuals interested in leasing farmland for pheasant and waterfowl hunting.

The number of inquiries has been increasing each year, and it appears obvious that there are many sportsmen from around the state willing to pay to hunt on local farms. Therefore, fee hunting has the potential to significantly enhance annual farm income.

In an effort to help area farmers realize the benefits derived from managing their land for wildlife and leasing it to hunters, the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District and Friona Chamber of Commerce are co-sponsoring a Pheasant and Waterfowl Management Seminar November 8.

Speakers will include Dr. Loren Smith of the Department of Range and Wildlife Management, Texas Tech University; Chuck Cosper, Game Warden, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department; James Higgins, Texas Waterfowlers Association; and Bob Welch, President, Friona Chamber of Commerce.

This meeting will be held at the Friona Community Center and will begin at 9 a.m. Anyone interested in wildlife management and fee hunting is encouraged to attend. For more information you may contact the Friona Chamber of Commerce or the U.S.D.A. Soil Conservation Service in Friona.

This course is presented by the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association, and is designed to help electric cooperative directors better understand their role as electric cooperative directors.

Horrors Of Bulimia Noted In Speech

History books describe the feasting habits of the decadent, how they would use feathers to tickle their throats and empty their stomachs so they could return to the banquet tables to gorge themselves again. An ugly practice, to be sure, but hardly an adequate concept in understanding the problems of young women suffering with bulimia, the eating disorder that involves cycles of overeating and purging.

Cynthia Rowland, a writer and television journalist who suffered with bulimia twelve years and nearly died from it, described the horrors of bulimia for students at West Texas State University last week. She said it's not just a food problem, though the word itself literally means "ox hunger." The emptiness inside is a psychological and spiritual emptiness, as well.

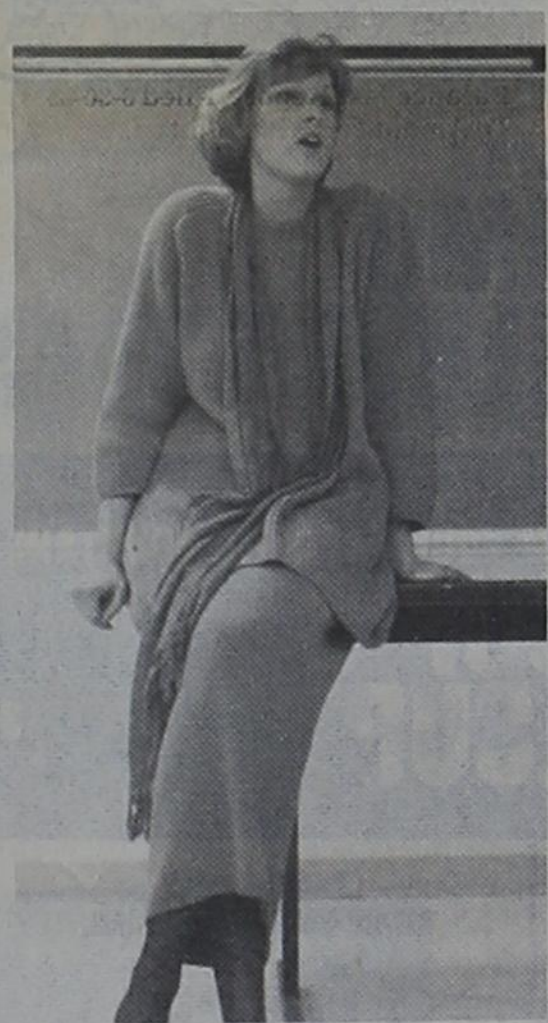
Rowland described her typical days as a TV news reporter and her "closest behavior" as a bulimic. She would regularly stuff herself with food, then vomit or take laxatives. By the time she checked into a Dallas clinic, at the age of 28, she was taking over 100 laxatives a day. Her life, she said, consisted entirely of her news career and bulimia--nothing else.

Rowland credits the clinic with saving her life. She spent three months in a psychiatric ward learning to deal with her problems honestly, rather than purging herself of emotion through the symbolic act of purging her body of food.

Her audiences sat in rapt attention, wide-eyed at times, as she described the strength of the addiction and the physical dangers of the disease. When it was question and answer time, it became obvious that a number of the students are too well acquainted with bulimia, either through personal addiction or the addiction of close friends. By one estimate, one in four college coeds suffers with bulimia.

Bulimia differs from anorexia in that anorexics don't eat at all. Many anorexics, Rowland said, become bulimic when they reach college age.

"Bulimia can kill you," Rowland said as she listed the dangers. Heart attacks may be brought on by the loss of fluids; the stomach could rupture during binges; the teeth and esophagus may be ruined by constant vomiting; and there are the dangers of over-the-counter drug abuse. Rowland even attributes her current bout with breast cancer (at

the age of 30) to her bulimic habits.

But the physical symptoms are only indicators of deeper problems.

Part of the blame for bulimia can rest with our culture, which glorifies thin women. But more often than not, Rowland claimed, bulimia is a family problem.

One-fourth of all bulimics were sexually abused as children. Many of the others have felt abandoned by their families, whether through divorce, death of a family member or attitudes of non-acceptance. Often the child's perception of abandonment carries over into adulthood, becoming "the monster within."

Therapy for bulimia, according to Rowland, is more a matter of dealing with that monster than dealing with food. She believes families need to go through the therapy together, to find the means for dealing with their emotions.

Rowland spends much of her time on the lecture circuit and in establishing support groups for bulimics. One such group will begin at WTSU this fall. Rowland has also written a book on the subject, "The Monster Within: Overcoming Bulimia."

The economic cost of cardiovascular disease will amount to an estimated \$72.1 billion in 1985, including physician and nursing charges, hospital and nursing home costs, medications and the lost occupational output as a result of disability, according to American Heart Association estimates.

Serving Size Is Termed Diet Key

What's a "standard" serving? Many dieters don't know, even though they're following meal plans based on serving sizes, says nutrition expert Mary K. Sweeten.

"People tend to over-estimate the serving size of some foods and under-estimate others," says Sweeten, a specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service.

"They also seem to be influenced by the size of food containers, especially those that are supposed to contain single servings, and the serving size printed on the food label."

According to Sweeten, recent research reported by the American Dietetic Association shows just how far off the mark our estimates of serving sizes can be.

A standard serving of fruit and vegetables is one piece of fresh fruit, 1/2 cantaloupe or grapefruit, 1/2 cup juice, one medium-size potato or 1/2 cup cooked or raw vegetables.

Most people consider a single piece of fresh fruit, as a single serving. But when it comes to fruit juices they consume 3/4 cup or more as one serving.

With dairy products, people under age 34 typically consume the recommended one cup per serving, but older adults consume 1/2 to 3/4 cup servings. The serving size for cheese and other dairy products was typically correct.

The standard recommended serving size for meat, poultry and fish is 2-3 ounces. Men generally exceed this amount per serving. There was also some variation in serving size according to the product, with the average serving size for beef at about 4 ounces, and 2 ounces for pork.

For breads and cereals, one slice of bread, one ounce of cereal or 1/2 cup of pasta or rice equals one standard serving. Yet people typically eat two slices of bread and one cup of rice or pasta per serving. They also tend to eat one-cup servings of cereals, when the recommended serving size of one

ounce may be more or less than a cup, depending on the density of the cereal.

"Unless you're willing to weigh and measure your food, it can be difficult to follow food guidance programs based on standard servings," Sweeten says.

"To make it work, you may need to consider the total recommended amount of foods from any one group for the day and then keep track of what you eat in terms of the serving sizes you ordinarily use," she advises.

For example, you might eat one ounce of bacon at breakfast and a 4-5 ounce serving of beef at dinner. That would be less than the standard serving at breakfast and more at dinner, but the total would add up to 5-6 ounces, which is the same as the two recommended 2-3 ounce standard servings of protein foods for the day.
