Brookfield Tabbed For Hall Of Fame

PRACTICALLY ever since ye editor has lived in Friona, we've heard about Price Brookfield, and his exploits on the basketball court.

Most current residents may not have even heard about Brookfield, because it's been 45 years since he donned a Chieftain uniform.

Yet, Brookfield should stand as a role model for any of the current Chieftains (or Squaws), or those who feel they might make the team some day.

His former teammates recall when Price was a skinny, 85-pound freshman on the F.H.S. basketball squad. Most 85-pound freshmen would likely see a lot of bench time in today's sport.

But Brookfield had a fine career at Friona High School, and went on to gain All-American fame—probably our only All-American. In addition, he starred for ten years in the National Basketball Association, playing on championship teams.

While at West Texas State Teachers' College (now West Texas State University), Brookfield sparked the Buffaloes in what may have been the college's only real shot at a national sports championship—their great 1942 team.

He was All-American two different years, led the nation in scoring in 1942, and was chosen to play in the college All-Star game in Chicago, against the pros.

Brookfield set five school records during his playing days at W.T. In the more than 40 years since he completed his college career, three of the records have been broken, but amazingly, he still holds a couple of school records: most points in a single game, and most field goals.

When you realize that in Brookie's day, a high-scoring game was 50 points in college play, the longevity of his records make them even more awesome.

Brookfield will finally have a chance to be honored by his old home town at a reception here on January 18. This also will be the eve of his induction into the Panhandle Sports Hall of Fame.

Carl Schlenker was a teammate and "best buddy" of Brookfield's, when they both were growing up west of Friona. He told us that in effect, he had something to do with Brookfield's becoming a basketball star.

"We were playing a game one time, and I evidently did something to irritate the coach. He called me over to the side, and said, 'Brookfield, go in for Schlenker.' Price went in, and later scored the winning basket. That was about the end of my days as a starter," Schlenker recalls.

Schlenker likes to tell about his association with Brookfield. It seems that in the summer, during his break from starring for the Buffaloes, Price joined the local baseball team, coached by the late Jack Anderson.

One time, the Friona nine went over to Portales for a game, and before they had played many innings, were behind by about 5-0. The team came in to take their turn at bat, and Schlenker recalls that Brookfield leaned over and said in all seriousness: "Fellows, we may have to play our VERY BEST to win THIS game."

Ye editor has thoroughly enjoyed this opportunity to research the Brookfield records, and write this and the accompanying piece. Our thanks to Amarillo sportswriter Putt Powell, to Schlenker, John Renner, Lauretta Brookfield and Pudge Kendrick for their help and contributions for this effort.

We have been able to watch a few all-state basketball players in our years of covering the Chieftains and Squaws, and that was a lot of fun. But we're looking forward to meeting our all-American.

One of the greatest athletes to have ever performed on Friona teams will be inducted into the Panhandle Sports Hall of Fame on January 19.

Price Brookfield, who starred for the Chieftains in three sports in the late 1930s, will also be honored locally with a reception on Saturday, January 18. The reception will be held from 1:30-4:30 p.m. at the Friona State Bank's Community Room. Refreshments will be served.

Brookfield is one of three men being inducted into the PSHOF this year. Also to be inducted are M.T. Johnson, a former star for the Amarillo Sandies and official in the United States Golf Assn., and Bill Ellington, who was the first head coach at Tascosa High School and was assistant athletic director at the University of Texas for 12 years.

Brookfield had the most colorful career of any athlete ever to come out of Friona High School. He first enrolled at the University of Texas after graduating from FHS. But it turned out that UT was too big a school for a "country boy" from Friona. Brookfield hitch-hiked from Austin to Canyon and enrolled at West Texas State.

Brookfield played for the W.T. Buffaloes from 1940-42. Longtime Amarillo Globe-News sportswriter Putt Powell calls the 1942 Buffs the greatest team in the history of West Texas State, and that's going

some, because W.T. has had some great teams in its history.

"I've never seen a player who just demoralized the opposing teams (like Brookfield did). He didn't seem to ever shoot the same type of shot twice in a row. He would usually connect with eight or nine shots in a row every game," Powell says.

The 1942 West Texas State team was the first to compete in the now-defunct Border Conference, and won all 16 of their conference games. At the time, the B.C. consisted of W.T., Texas Tech, Hardin-Simmons, Texas Mines (now Texas-El Paso), New Mexico A&M (now N.M. State), New Mexico U., Arizona, Arizona State of Tempe, and Arizona State of Flagstaff.

Most of the season, the Buffs were ranked as the number one college team in the nation. They compiled a season record of 28-3 and were the first team invited to New York's National Invitational Tournament, played at Madison Square Garden.

W.T. won the prestigious All-College Tournament during the 1942 season, and Brookfield was named the tourney's "Most Valuable Player."

Brookfield was the highest scorer, and first choice as All-Border Conference in 1942. He also made most of the All-America teams that year.

After graduating from W.T., Brookfield entered the U.S. Navy and was assigned to a Navy

program at Iowa State University. During the war years, college players were permitted to play additional time in the schools with service programs.

In the year he was stationed at Iowa State, Brookfield sparked the Cyclones to the 1944 Big Six (now Big Eight) conference co-championship and was named to the Big Six's all-conference team.

That makes Brookfield probably one of the nation's very few athletes ever to be named all-conference for two different athletic conferences, as well as being the leading scorer for both leagues.

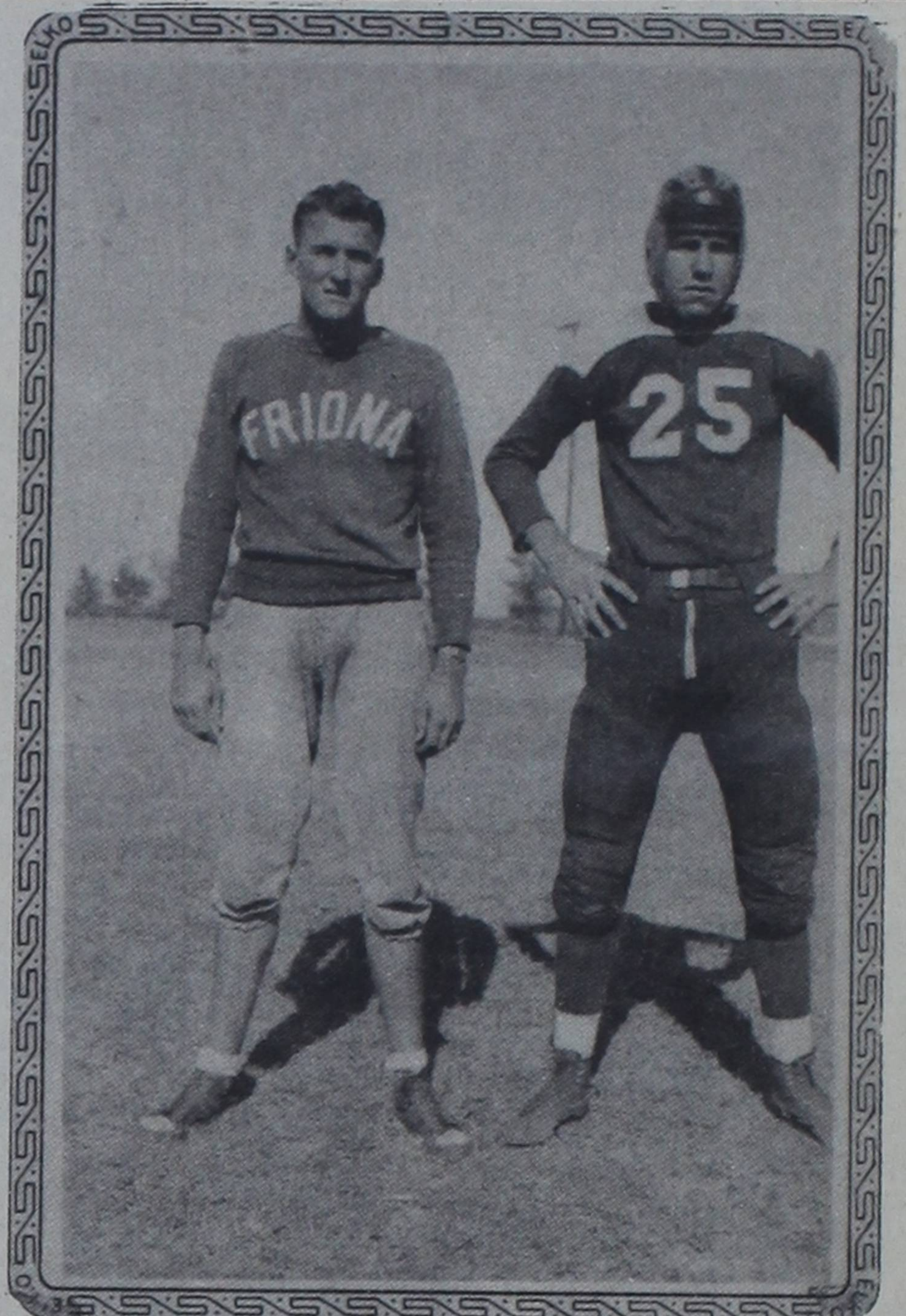
When Brookfield left West Texas State, he had established the all-time scoring record of 1,406 points. The record stood for 34 years until Reggie Ramey finished his career with 1,440 points in 1976.

Amazingly, with all the emphasis on scoring in recent years, compared to the low-scoring contests in the 1940s, Brookfield still holds two W.T. scoring records.

"Brookie" holds the single-game scoring mark of 44 points, which came against New Mexico State in 1942. In that game, he hit 21 of 41 shots from the field, and two for two at the free throw line. His 21 field goals are also a school record. Both marks have now stood for 43 years, and eluded a number of great players.

After the war, and his discharge

W.P. Hunt Is Buried Dec. 30

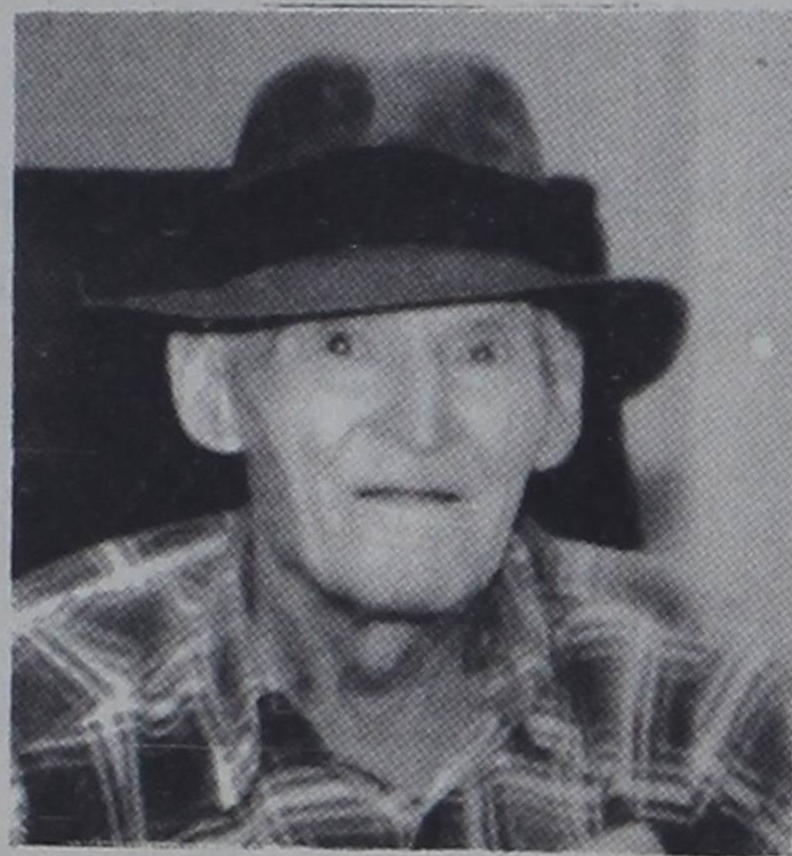

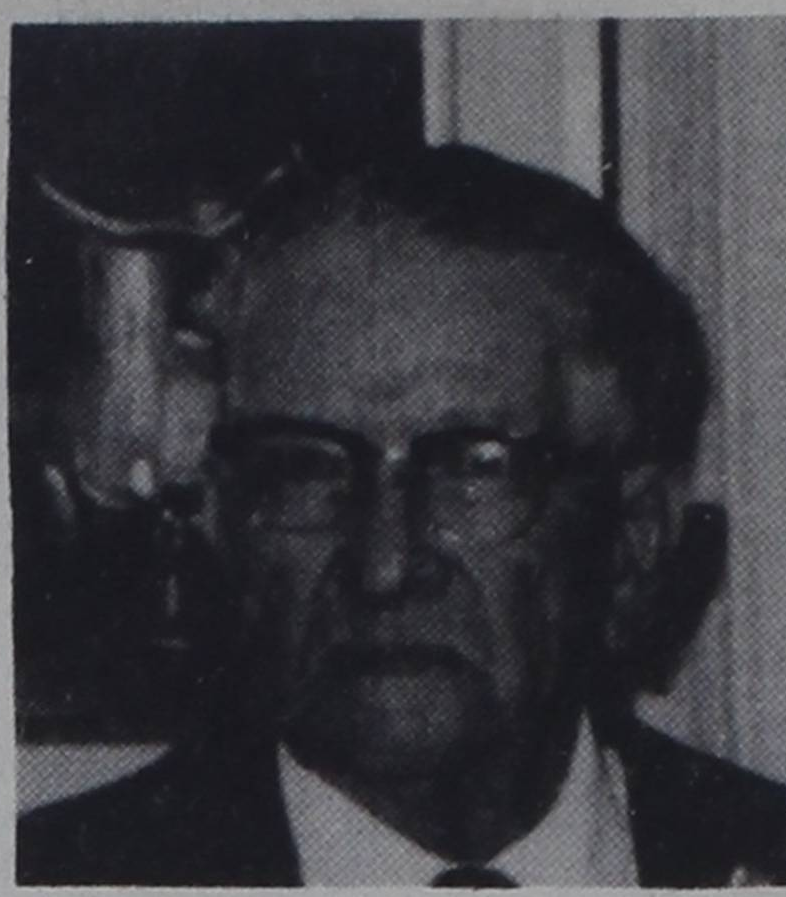
Burial was in Bovina Cemetery, under the direction of Ellis-Blackwell Funeral Home.

from the U.S. Navy, Brookfield signed as a pro basketball player, with the Chicago Bears. The 1946 Chicago team won the N.B.A. championship. Brookfield's teammates included N.B.A. great George Mikan, and Ray Meyer, who recently retired after a long career as coach at DePaul University.

Brookfield played in the N.B.A. for ten years, 1946-56, also playing for Indianapolis. He was featured on what has become collector's items—the bubble gum cards which featured a picture and short write-up of professional stars. In 1948, as a star for the Indianapolis Jets, Price was featured on a card insert with a reference to "his sweet one-handed push shot."

After ending his playing career in the N.B.A., Brookfield coached basketball and golf on the high school level in Indiana, retiring in 1979. He and his wife have lived at Pinehurst, N.C. since that time.

Brookfield married Mary Lou Ellis in Amarillo, in 1946.

The Brookfields are parents of three children: Bill, John, and Barbara.

Price was the youngest of six children born to Lura Kate (Assiter) and Francis Paul Brookfield. The children were born while the family lived near Floydada. The Brookfields moved to near Friona during the winter of 1925.

The Brookfield children were Wilbur (now deceased), Mary (Mrs. Earl) Richards, now of Bovina; Edith Fleming of Lynwood, California; twins Floyd and Lloyd, and Price. Lloyd lived less than a year. Floyd remained in Friona, operating Brookfield Drilling Co. He passed away in July of 1984.

The Brookfield farm was west of Friona, across from where the Ralph Wilsons now live.

Brookfield was one of the younger members of the basketball team at Friona High School in 1936. Others on the team were O.D. McLellan, Eugene (Buck) Dixon, Cecil Cummings, Harry Gower, Kenneth Houlette, Noel Bengier, Rayford Brannon and Carl Schlenker.

Other teammates of Brookfield during the 1937-39 period included Laverne Frost, Jack Williams, Martin Todd, Roy Hughes, Ted Houlette, Stanley Massey, Vernon Weis, Gilbert Baker, Dallas Coldiron, J.T. Green, Doug Short and John Renner.

Other boys playing basketball at that time include Maurice McFarland, Eugene Coffman, Bruce Parr, Ira Bengier, Ralph Baxter and others.

The coach was Jack Davis. The 1936 Chieftains won the county tournament, which was the preliminary for the district tournament, held in Amarillo.

All schools competed in one classification. In the district tournament, the Chiefs downed Dalhart, 33-21, Stratford, 38-11, and Amarillo High, 29-21 for the title.

In the regional meet, the team lost to Pampa, but beat Abernathy to stay in contention. However, in the semi-finals they again lost to Pampa, 33-32 to be eliminated.

(We regret that more of the basketball records are not available from this time period at F.H.S. Most of the records were destroyed when the school burned.)

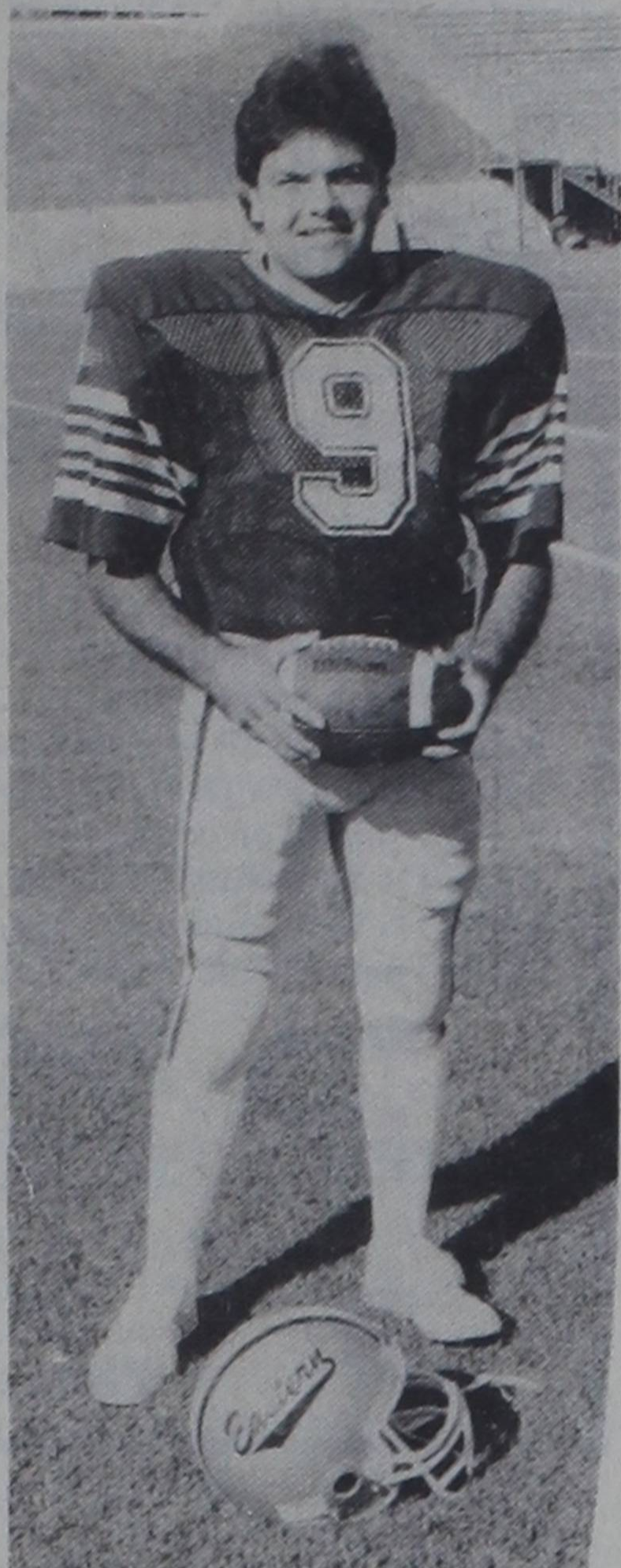
JP Logged Busy Year

Frances Euler, Justice of the Peace, Precinct 2, Parmer County, reports a busy year in 1985, with 2,223 traffic cases being filed. The cases were broken down as follows: 2,055 paid fines; 102 taking defensive driving for dismissal of ticket; 5 inquests; 36 death certificates recorded; 2 birth certificates recorded.

Also, 14 weddings performed; 41 driver's license hearings; 25 small claims suits filed; 6 forcible detainer suits filed; and 7 civil suits filed.

A total of \$69,418.00 was collected in fines and fees during the year. December was the busiest month, with 302 cases being filed, 282 payments of fine and \$9,671.00 in fines and fees.

The local J.P. office handles complaints filed by the four DPS troopers stationed in Parmer County, some filed by troopers stationed in Deaf Smith and Castro counties and the License and Weight trooper in Muleshoe.

City Hosts Jr. Meet

With the start of the new year, all new forms of eligibility will need to be filled out and signed for each family receiving the commodities.

Those coming for the food items are asked to bring their own bags.

The food items will also be distributed at the Community Center in Farwell; the County Barn in Lazbuddie and the Community Action Center in Bovina on January 16.

The sixth annual Irrigation and Agricultural Conference will be held Monday, January 13 at the Bailey County Coliseum in Muleshoe, from 8:30 a.m. to 2:15 p.m.

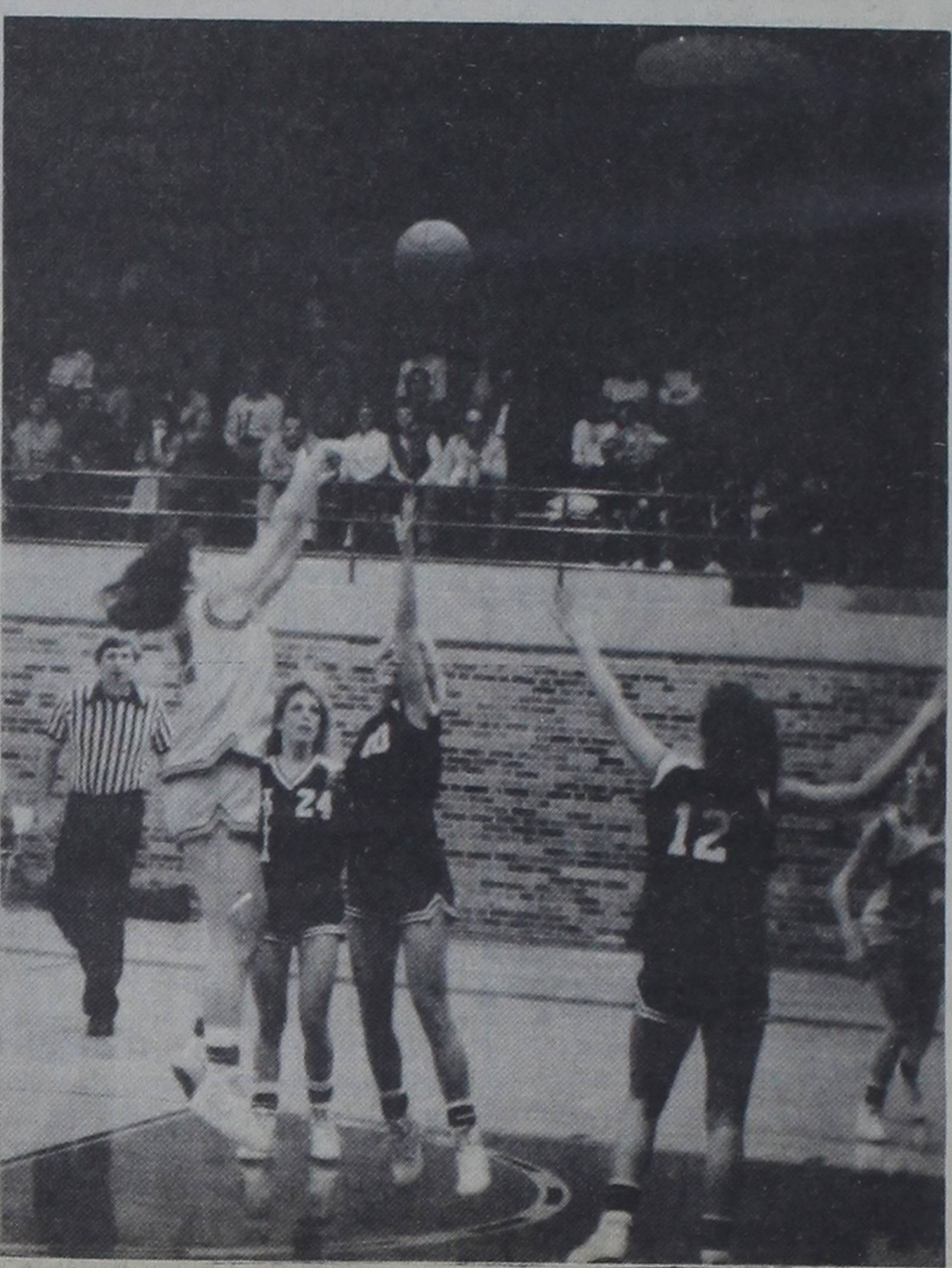



Consumer alert: A warning is being issued to all consumers who own earth stations for TV reception, or are considering installing one in the near future. You can save yourself time and aggravation by being wary of misleading info in the earth station industry.

Industry experts report many cable programmers are going to be scrambling their signals in the future and you'll have to pay for TV programming that you thought you'd get for free. Many disreputable earth station salesman, it seems, tell customers they can get everything they were once getting on cable television for "free" once they buy the earth station terminal. They tell their customers scrambling will never really happen, or that Congress will prohibit it, or that they will be able to buy a cheap little "black box" to descramble the signals and continue to get the programming for "free."



Installing a big back yard dish for "free" TV reception may not be as inexpensive as many think.

All such claims are false. The fact is, scrambling of satellite signals is shortly going to be a reality. You'll still be able to get some of the TV signals you want — but you'll have to pay for them. A reputable earth station salesperson will tell you that.

By the way, it is illegal to intercept ABC, NBC and CBS now. When they scramble, it is unlikely home terminal owners will be able to buy those satellite signals.

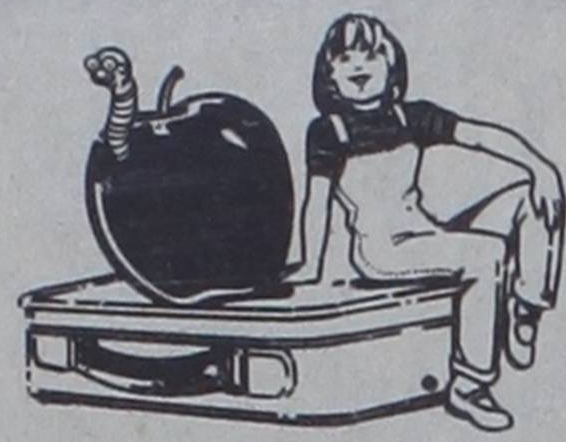

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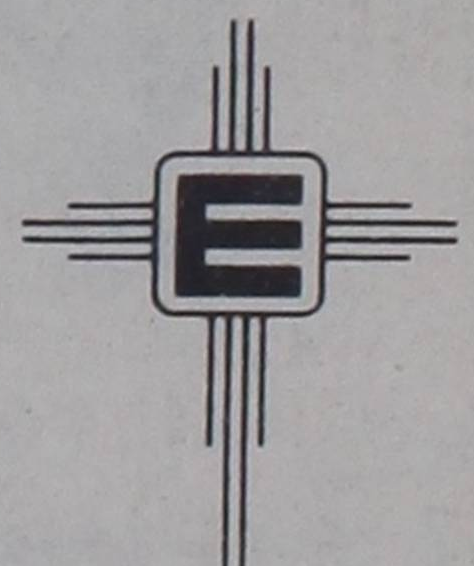
