Chieftains To Face River Road Friday

The Friona Chieftain football team will kick off its 1985 season by hosting the River Road Wildcats of Amarillo next Friday at Chieftain Field. Game time is 8 p.m. Coach Tommy Moss is excited about the prospects for the 1985 team. The Chieftains are two deep in virtually every position, a luxury he has not enjoyed every year. But, while the Chiefs have a good slate of returning lettermen and starters, so do the Wildcats, and Moss expects a battle royal against the North Amarillo outfit. Friona downed River Road on their home turf last September, to knot up the all-time series between the two schools in football 4-4. Coach Moss owns a personal 3-2 record, the Chiefs having topped the Wildcats in 1982, 1983 and 1984. Moss' only losses to the 'Cats came in 1982, when they beat Friona once in regular season and again in the playoffs.

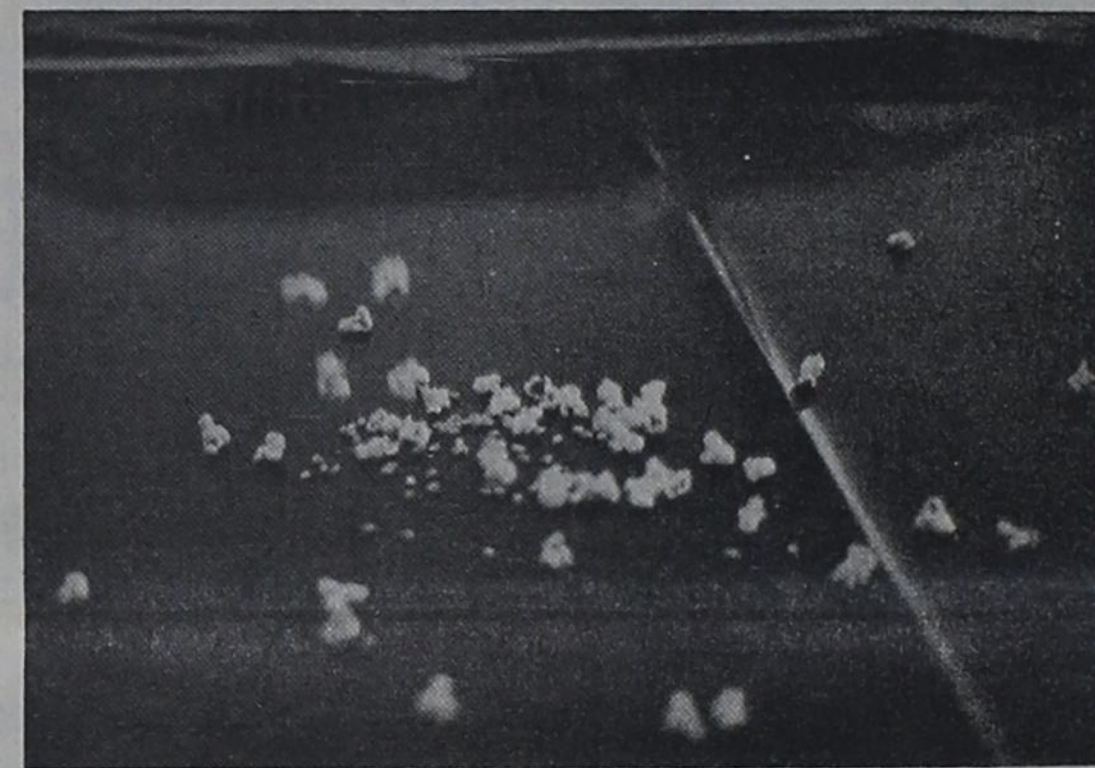
The Wildcats are led by 6-4 quarterback Jeremy Johnson, who may be one of the leading signal-callers in the Panhandle. Johnson passed for 300 yards last year against Dimmitt, and is a threat on the run-pass option. "Anytime you return as many starters (nine offensive, eight defensive) as River Road has, you're going to be tough. We expect a good game," Moss says. The Chieftain gridmaster thinks the 1985 Chieftains may be at least as good as his 1983 Friona team, which came within a dropped flag of making the playoffs. That team's heartbreaking losses to Muleshoe (13-6) and playoff veteran Littlefield (10-7) put a damper on a great season. The Chieftains have a three-way battle for starting quarterback, between senior Jeff Brown and juniors Shy Burney and Patches Fleming. Clouding the issue somewhat was a leg injury to Fleming Thursday of last week, which caused him to miss the team's first scrimmage at Springlake-Earth. Moss says the good depth enjoyed by the team should be a plus. "There isn't much difference between the players at many positions, so we'll be able to do a lot of swapping, and let the players rest," Moss says. Last year, the Chieftains were 5-4-1, competing in one of the toughest class 3A districts in the state. Moss says he is impressed by the work by the offensive linemen, which could give returners Brent Gatlin and Brad Moyer some holes to run through this fall.

DPS Gives Holiday Warning

The Department of Public Safety estimates that as many as 45 persons may lose their lives in traffic accidents in Texas during the 78-hour Labor Day holiday period. "This number is an estimate, not a prediction," said DPS Director Jim Adams. "We hope this number will prove to be far too high."

In 1984, 41 persons were killed in collisions during the holiday period, with five others dying later of injuries suffered on the Labor Day weekend. In an effort to hold down the number of deaths, the DPS again this year will conduct Operation Motorcicle, in which the deaths during the period beginning at 6 p.m. Friday, August 30 and ending

at midnight Monday, September 2 will be counted with periodic reports being made to the news media. "Our philosophy is that public awareness of the number of people who are dying on our streets and highways will make drivers more cautious and help reduce accidents," Adams said.

On September 1, Texas' new mandatory safety belt law goes into effect. The law provides a 90-day grace period before fines can be assessed. "We're hoping Texans will start getting in the habit of using safety belts," Adams said. "If the vast majority of motorists make a conscious effort to buckle up during this Labor Day holiday period, we will see a dramatic decrease in the number of deaths."

Last year, 28 of the 46 persons who died were killed in accidents where speed or drinking were factors, Adams said. "That amounts to 61 per cent of the fatalities for the period," the director continued. "The message to Texas motorists is obvious: speeding and drunk driving kill."


Son Added To Mingus Family

Electricity Prices To Remain Stable

Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) expects to file a request Friday to restructure rates within 35 days for retail electric service in Texas, leaving prices essentially unchanged.

Residential electric bills will neither increase nor decrease under the plan.

SPS chief executive officer Bert Ballengee said the utility will petition SPS-served communities in Texas, and the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT), to increase base rates by \$40,842,255, but to decrease the boiler-fuel charge in bills by \$40,933,368. The difference is a \$91,113 decrease.

"Some costs to us have increased, and some costs to us have decreased," Ballengee said. "So, we must restructure our rates to reflect those changes. But prices to almost all of our Texas retail customers will remain the same."

The utility is petitioning the PUCT to decrease fuel charges,

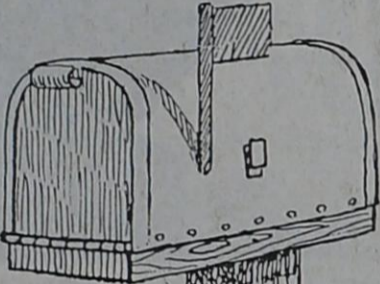
and is asking for a one-time fuel-charge credit to customers. Details on the fuel-charge credit will be available later, Ballengee said, after the PUCT has issued an applicable order.

SPS previewed the rate-restructuring request on July 31, in preliminary informational packets distributed to the Texas communities the utility serves.

The last increase in base rates for retail service from SPS in Texas was in mid-1982.

Ballengee said SPS has decreased costs primarily by improving operating efficiencies, by increasing generation at coal-fueled power plant units, and by renegotiating fuel and fuel-transportation contracts. Higher base-rate costs to the utility include costs of constructing a new coal-fueled unit near Muleshoe, Texas. The unit was brought into commercial service in June 1985.

I am a farmer and rancher from Guymon, Oklahoma. I am sending this letter to several newspapers in response to some information I have received concerning the 1985 Farm Bill. I would like to request that you publish it as a letter to the editor.

As you may know, A Conservation Reserve has been requested by Agricultural Secretary, John Block, to retire at least 20 million acres from production. It has come to my attention that the proposed Conservation Reserve could be dropped, drastically reduced, or vetoed in a budget-cut.

Conservation of our nation's resources through long term Land Retirement, coupled with a reduction in production, is a cost effective program whose time has come.

All who agree should call or write your Congressman and the President immediately to insist that this program not be dropped

or reduced. The House and Senate bill numbers listed below should be used when making contact. The addresses for Senators and Representatives, and a clip-out to mail to the President are also below.

I urge you to contact your Senator, Representative, and President Reagan NOW as time is of the essence.
