## Support Sought For AHA

MANY OF US have made unkind remarks about the new state law which requires that we wear seat belts while travelling (either driving or riding) in an automobile.

A few weeks ago, we used a poem in this space which made some light-hearted comments about the bad points of wearing seat belts. However, the bottom line of that piece was that it's better to have a wrinkled dress, for example, than to be splattered on the hood of your automobile.

Studies show that traffic accidents are the leading cause of death for people between the ages of five and 34. In 1984, nearly 45,000 people died in automobile accidents. Relating this to airline crashes, this would be the equivalent of a fully-loaded jet plane crashing with no survivors every day of the year.

If the statistic that one out of 140 people dies in a car accident doesn't faze you, how about this one: one out of every three people, in their lifetime, is injured seriously enough to be disabled for at least a time.

Wearing seat belts would greatly reduce these statistics, or at least guarantee that you are not included in the affected percentage.

Since motorists make about 50,000 automobile trips in a lifetime, it behooves them to think in terms of a lifetime rather than a single trip. Most drivers are prone not to buckle their seat belts if they are just "going to run down town." But they need to stop and think that the bulk of their driving may be spent in short trips such as to the store, to school and back, etc.

**THE GENERAL PUBLIC** tends to gather their own conclusions as to the safety or danger associated with various products, means of transportation, etc., from the news media, rather than from scientific studies associated with the areas involved.

For example, the American public has come to believe that coal burning, to produce electricity, is safer than nuclear power. As a result, utilities are building coal plants rather than nuclear plants.

Meanwhile, one study showed that producing the coal for such plants may cost as many as 10,000 lives per year through mining, transportation and pollution. Yet, although the number of deaths directly attributable to nuclear energy is shockingly low, 80 per cent of the general public believes that coal-burning is safer than nuclear power.

Also, due to the coverage given accidents, homicides and storms such as tornadoes in the news, many people have a distorted idea as to what may be the main "killer" in America today.

Diseases such as diabetes, cancer and heart disease take about 16 times the number of lives as accidents, although one study showed that news coverage of accidental deaths were about 6-1 over those caused by diseases. Also, there were about three times as many stories about homicides in the press than those caused by diseases, when disease claims 1,000 times as many lives as homicides do.

Sometimes we need to realize that the news media most often chronicle the extraordinary than they do the ordinary, and not be as worried about being affected by certain "threats."

Heart attack, stroke and related disease are the number one killer of Americans, accounting for almost half of all deaths in this country each year.

Through research and education, funded by the American Heart Association, the risks of heart-related deaths are now on the decline.

Parmer County has an American Heart Association committee which is again active. Some things being considered are blood pressure screening and education through media releases and setting up educational programs through the larger employers in the county.

Programs to be continued are support of the CPR course being taught by Roger Fields through the Friona Fire Department personnel, and Pat Fleming at Friona High School.

## Clark Ties Graham In Football Contest

The battle for top spot in the standings continued to tighten in the Friona Star Football Contest.

After ten weeks, Jack Clark and Ky Graham are all tied up for the lead with scores of 172. Donnie McDonald of Muleshoe is just a point back with a score of 171. Next comes Clint Mears at 168. Jerry Bentley, Jon Field and Jerry Hinkle are tied at 167. Ron Cain, Leo Escalante and Vicky Moss have scores of 166.

And, with three weeks remaining in the contest and a possible 72 additional points to be earned, it's still "anybody's ball game."

Clark had a score of 18 for the tenth week, to continue his rally that started after Clark found himself trailing Graham by 11 points after four weeks of the contest.

In the past six weeks, Clark's scores have been 21, 19, 16, 17, 19 and 18--a torrid average of 18.3 points per week, in spite of several toss-up games being on the weekly slate.

In the weekly contest, five

contestants correctly picked 19 games, and fought it out for the three weekly cash prizes on the basis of their Friona-Littlefield tie-breaker scores.

Buford Hartwick emerged as the top score predictor, having chosen Littlefield, 13-7, missing each team's score by four points. Hartwick received the top weekly prize of \$10.00.

It had been a long time since Hartwick's last win. He had won the weekly contest in the fall of 1963, and has been a contestant most of the time since.

Rick Castaneda of Hereford took second place, missing the score by 14 points (21-13), and Raul Braillif took third, missing by 15 points (28-7).

The other contestants picking 19 games but missing out on a cash prize were Clint Mears (18 points away) and Donnie McDonald of Muleshoe (17 points off).

Eleven contestants had scores of 18, to miss by just a point a chance at one of the cash prizes. They were Ron Cain, Jack Clark, Bobby

Braillif missed Slaton-Seminole, Georgia-Florida, Jets-Miami and Vikings-Packers.

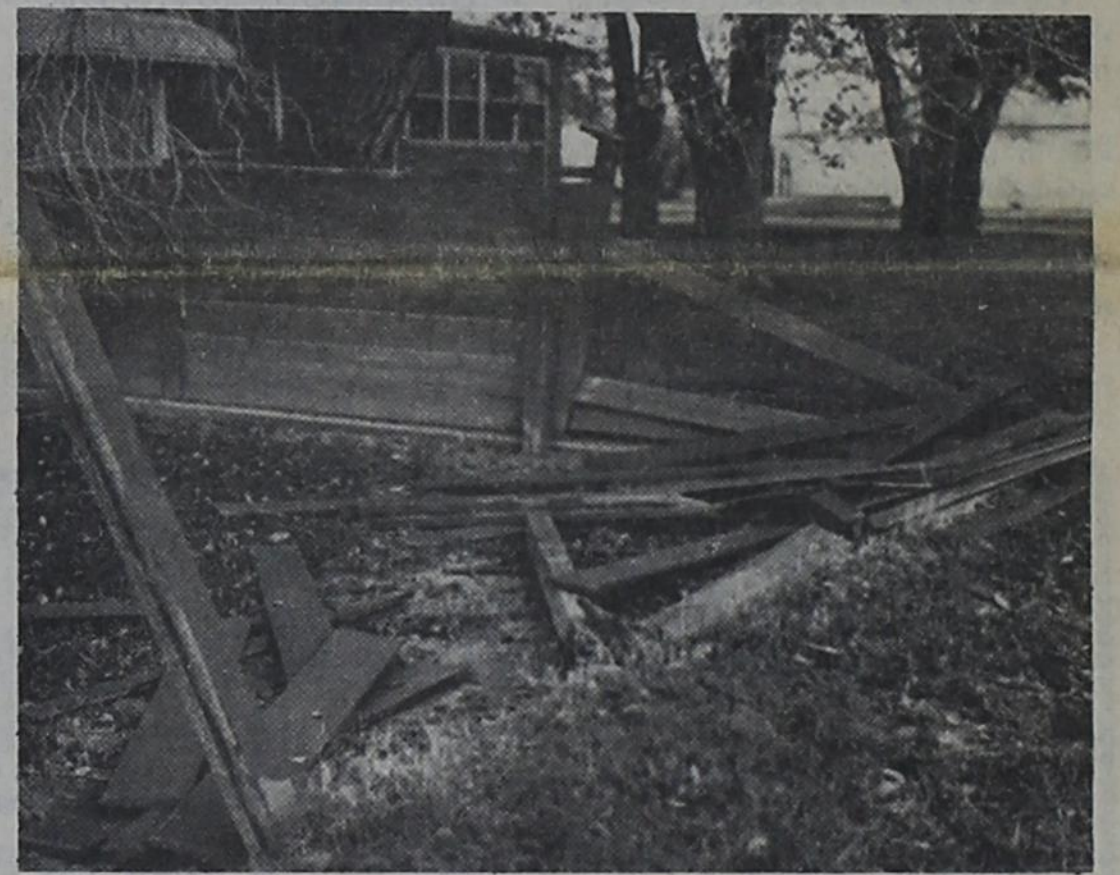

A light shower left .07 inch of rain in Friona on Thursday morning, which halted harvest operations temporarily. However, the harvest was expected to be back in full swing before Friday was over.

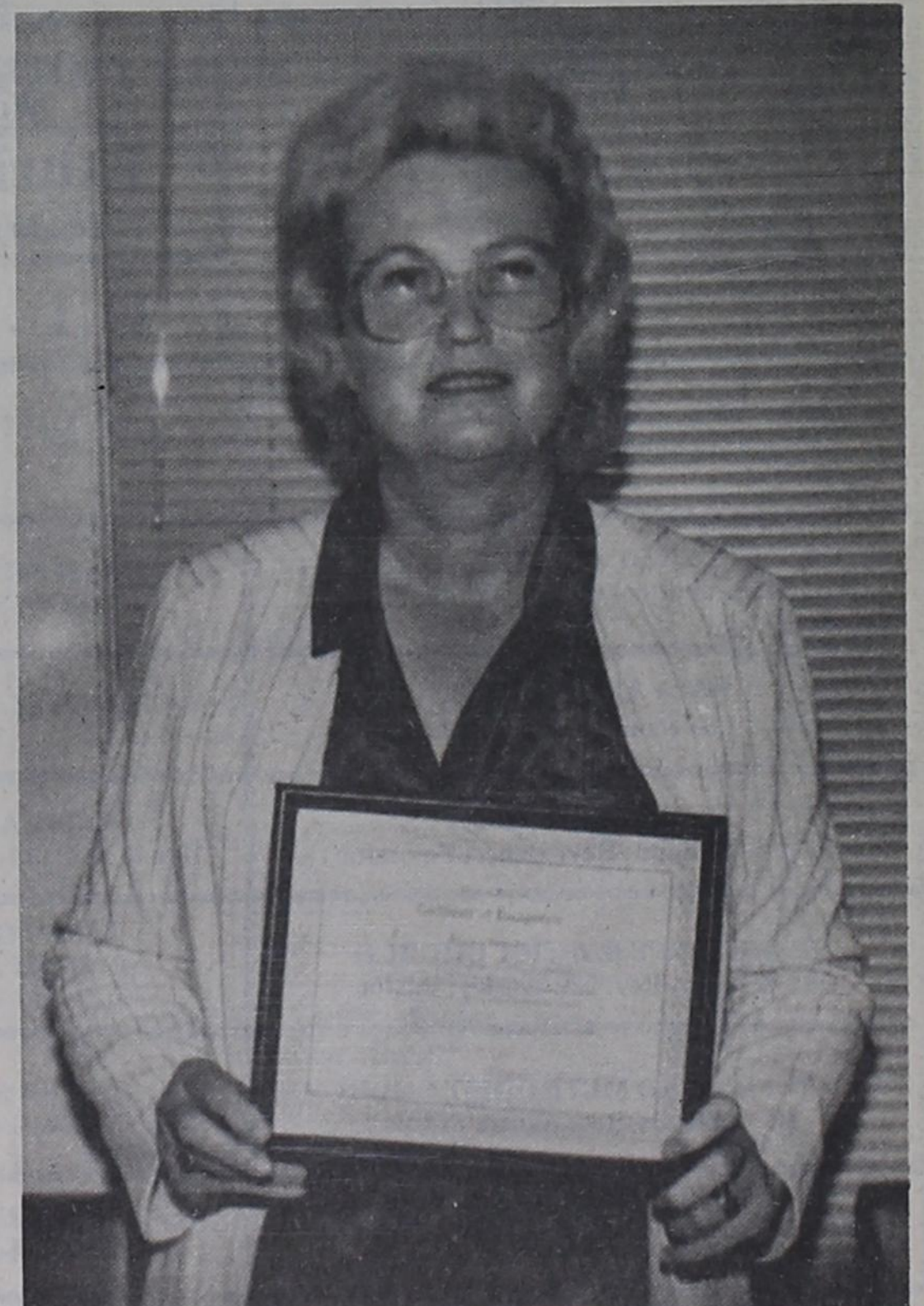
Even the stripping of cotton was expected to be resumed by Friday afternoon.

Friona ginner D.L. Carmichael said the early cotton was looking good, with good turnout and grade and an excellent "mike" which also is important. The only drawback to the cotton situation is the price. Both cotton and cottonseed prices are very low. All of the cotton is expected to go into the government loan.

Friday morning dawned with clear skies, and farmers are hoping for several more days of this kind, so they can finish their harvest.

# Friona Flashbacks

....from the files of The Friona Star

## 55 YEARS AGO--NOV. 14, 1930

Friona is going to have a Boy Scout Troop and in short time we will see these lads walking along our streets in uniform. E.L. Price is responsible for the movement. He has had three years experience as scoutmaster in Lockney, and he will likely make a success of it here. The boys meet Monday evening at the barber shop for an organization meeting and are showing much interest.

## 50 YEARS AGO--NOV. 8, 1935

Dr. E.B. Wills, dentist, who has been in Friona for the past few years closed his dentist office here and moved with his family to some place near Waco, where he intends to open an office.

The Friona Chiefs are to make their first trip for a football game this Friday. They are to play Claude in the afternoon. This will also be the first game they have played in the afternoon as they have been taking advantage of the floodlights.

## 45 YEARS AGO--NOV. 8, 1940

A move is now on foot to secure an early date, several more miles of paved highways for Parmer County. The new paving as now outlined will include the paving of State Highway 86, which traverses the county east and west from Dimmitt in Castro County, to Bovina, where it intersects Highway 33-60. The other

highway, which the new move proposes to pave, is the new State Highway, which connects Muleshoe, in Bailey County, with Friona, traversing the county from south to north.

## 35 YEARS AGO--NOV. 2, 1950

C.W. Dixon is reported still in serious condition in the hospital in Roswell, undergoing an operation Tuesday and facing another one in the near future. Mr. Dixon, father of Mrs. Ray Landrum, was injured three weeks ago when working cattle on his ranch near Roswell. Though not thrown, he was severely injured internally as the horse pitched with him.

## 30 YEARS AGO--NOV. 4, 1955

The newly-built Sixth Street Church of Christ structure is one of the latest contributions to the Friona building scene, providing another modern church in a town of outstanding churches. Completed this month, the building is beautifully designed and constructed, inside and out.

Next election, in 1956, will find Parmer County residents voting for a new county elective office, that of County Tax Assessor and Collector. In a special election this Tuesday, the new office was authorized by one of the narrowest margins in local voting records, 97 affirmative and 81 against. Friona sanctioned the division by a slim 21-19 vote, with Farwell polling the heaviest ballot 54 for, 23 against the measure. The new office calls for a four year term, same as that of the sheriff. Mr. Lovelace will hold both positions until the 1957 term begins.

## 25 YEARS AGO--NOV. 3, 1960

Two men were injured Monday afternoon in an explosion and fire at the Plains Farmer Gin on the Bovina Highway. Jack Dickerson was treated at Parmer County Community Hospital for burns and lacerations. His father Allan Dickerson was treated and released from the hospital. The younger man required hospitalization for his injuries, which included second

and third degree burns on the arm and lacerations on the face and ear. Firemen were called to the gin following the blast, which apparently started from a butane leak in a pilot on one of the gin's cotton dryers. Damage to the gin was not believed extensive.

Friona High School's Band will take part in Homecoming activities Saturday at Eastern New Mexico University in Portales. ENMU will take on Southwestern Oklahoma in the football contest that will highlight activities of the day. Friona's band will take part in the downtown parade at 11 a.m. and then perform at halftime.

## 20 YEARS AGO--NOV. 4, 1965

Friona's district alignment for 1966 and 1967 has been announced. Hale Center and Memphis, both of which are moving up to class AA from A will be in Friona's district, competing along with the six teams which were already in the district. Bovina and Morton, neither met during the last two seasons, will be played as non-conference games. Muleshoe, Dalhart and Plains, played this year, will not appear on the 1966 slate.

## 15 YEARS AGO--NOV. 5, 1970

Friona voters gave a wide margin to Governor Preston Smith in his re-election bid, gave Lloyd Bentsen an eye-lash margin, and went overwhelmingly against liquor-by-the-drink in Tuesday's

election. Smith had the majority in Friona, with 523 votes to 314 for Republican Paul Eggers. Bentsen edged out Bush in the Friona box, 421-415.

## 10 YEARS AGO--NOV. 2, 1975

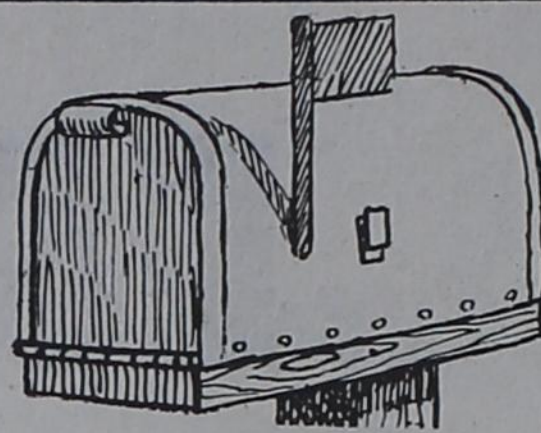
Ernest Osborn delivered the first bale of cotton in Friona for 1975. He brought the bale to Friona Farmers Co-op Gin on Thursday, October 30.

An official ground-breaking ceremony was held at the Friona Nursing Home site Tuesday morning. Lewellen Construction has estimated the job to take nine months to complete, and says he might beat that estimate if the weather is favorable.

## 5 YEARS AGO--NOV. 23, 1980

A record November snowstorm surprised the area Saturday night and Sunday, with from six to eight inches of snow falling in the local area.

An open house is set Sunday, November 23 at the Parmer County Tax Appraisal Office in Bovina. The new office is located at 305 Third Street in Bovina. The new facility was completed November 1.

In the meantime, he expects all of his ten-man squad to see a lot of action. "This includes the senior who didn't play last year as well as the sophomores. I expect every member of the squad to make a contribution," Laywell said.

The coaches have 15 boys, an impressive squad, out for the junior varsity. They include juniors Ray Arias, Rick Hutcheson, Slade Clark, Lance Venhaus, Patches Fleming and Jeff Chaney. Sophomores out for the team are John Cass, Rusty Rainey, Brent Riethmayer, Matt Brogden, Kent Chesher, Reese Hand, Albert Trevino and Stephen Thornton. Cody Burney, a freshman, also will play on the team.

Late in the week, the freshman team was having numbers problems. Only five players were out for the team, and one of those may be moving. The team's first game was cancelled, and coaches will monitor the situation for the next ten days to see if the team can be salvaged for the season.

Friona's varsity and junior varsity visits River Road on Tuesday for their season opener, and then visits Bovina next Friday. The team's first home game is November 26 against Happy.

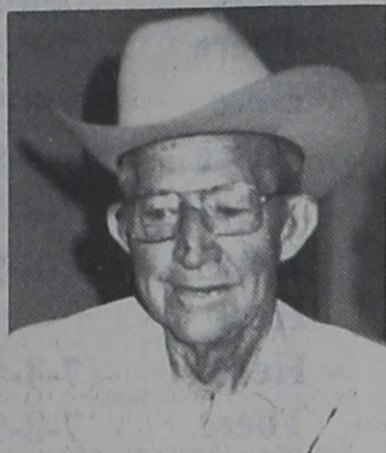

Littlefield controlled the ball for most of a quarter, and trimmed Friona's lead to 22-14.

But the Braves responded, going 48 yards in 12 plays. Caballero got the touchdown with 1:26 left to play, and that clinched the game and the district title, 28-14.

Caballero gained 122 yards on 16 carries. Torres had 118 yards on 18 tries, and Harvey Sanchez had 27 yards on three plays.

Anthony Padilla and Sanchez had seven tackles each. Torres and Caballero contributed six. Glen Shirley and Lupe Reyes each had four tackles and Wes Drake and Gary Stowers, one apiece.

The win gave the Braves a 6-2 season record, and 5-1 in district. They won their last six games in a row.







# Wildcats Rally To Down Chiefs, 17-3

For quite a while last Friday, it looked as though the Friona Chieftains might score a rare win over district rival Littlefield.

The Chieftains clearly dominated play in the first half, and went to the intermission with a 3-0 lead.

But things fell apart for the Chieftains beginning with a fumble on their first possession of the second half, and the Wildcats took over the game's momentum and went on for a 17-3 district win, to edge the Chiefs for third place in the district standings.

Once again the Chieftains had the problem of not being able to convert their scoring chances early in the game. The team put together a sustained drive from their own 45 to the Littlefield 18, only to have a pass intercepted to end what looked like a good scoring opportunity.

Littlefield took the opening kickoff, couldn't move the ball and punted.

Jeff Brown hit Leroy Mercado with a 19-yard pass on third down, then passed to Brent Gatlin for seven yards and a first down on a big fourth down play from the Littlefield 30.

The team drew its second offsides penalty, which hurt their drive, and after Gatlin gained to the 18, Brown's pass was intercepted by Littlefield at about their five and returned out to the

30-yard line.

Littlefield drove the ball to the Friona 22, where the Chieftain defense stiffened and took over on downs.

Jimmy Williams ran nine yards, and Brad Moyer five to give Friona a first down. Then Lonnie Phillips moved the ball to midfield with a nice nine-yard run early in the second quarter.

Brown hit Mercado again, for an 18-yard gain to the Littlefield 39. Williams crashed for eight yards, and Moyer gained six, for a first down to the Littlefield 25.

But three more plays gained just eight yards, and Friona faced fourth and two from the Littlefield 17. The team was going for the yardage when they were hit with a delay of game penalty which moved the ball back to the 22.

This brought on Sam Montoya for a field goal attempt. The junior kicker had been on a bad run of luck, having his previous three field goal kicks blocked, but this one went just right.

Montoya booted a perfect kick, good from 40 yards out, giving Friona a 3-0 lead with 5:50 left in the half.

Neither team could move the ball the rest of the period, and that's how the half ended, with Friona enjoying a lead.

In fact, the Chieftains had fairly dominated play, leading in total yardage, 120-91, and in first downs, 6-4.

Friona received the kickoff to start the second half, knowing that if they could go down and possibly score a touchdown, they might have the Wildcats on the ropes.

Instead, on the fifth play of the drive, the Chieftains faced a third down at their 45, and were in a passing situation. The Wildcats blitzed Jeff Brown, and knocked the ball out of his hands, recovering at the Friona 38.

Fired-up Littlefield turned the break into a touchdown in five plays, Steve Lair going in from 13

yards. The visitors took a 7-3 lead, 4:09 into the quarter.

Friona advanced the ball to near midfield, and again could not convert a third down and were forced to punt. Montoya backed the 'Cats up to their own 15, but they then set sail on an 85-yard drive.

Lair was the big gun in the drive, which Friona stalled at their own 11, and forced the Wildcats to settle for a field goal. This made the score 10-3 with 9:30 left in the game.

For all practical purposes, this should have been the final score in the game, as Littlefield was about to run out the clock. But the 'Cats got a second TD with just 45 seconds left to play, to account for the final margin. A pass from quarterback Mark Ellis to Ronnie Willard for 19 yards was the scoring play.

In the final seconds, Brown hit Mercado for a 20-yard passing gain, after Mercado had made a good kickoff return, and Brown connected with Moyer to the Littlefield 30, but time expired before Friona could dent the scoreboard.

Leroy Mercado was the offensive leader for the Chieftains. The flanker caught four passes for 57 yards, and returned three kickoffs for 68 yards. He also gained six yards on an end-around play.

"The kids played a hard game. Littlefield just wore us down in the second half. But I was proud of the effort by the kids. They bounced back from the loss at Tulia and made a game out of it," said Chieftain Coach Tommy Moss.

Moss pointed out that the loss of Kevin Trimmell, who had a foot injury against Tulia, hurt considerably, as Trimmell has been a mainstay in the Chieftains' tough defense.

"The kids played hard all year. They had to, in order to stay in some of the games," Moss said.

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


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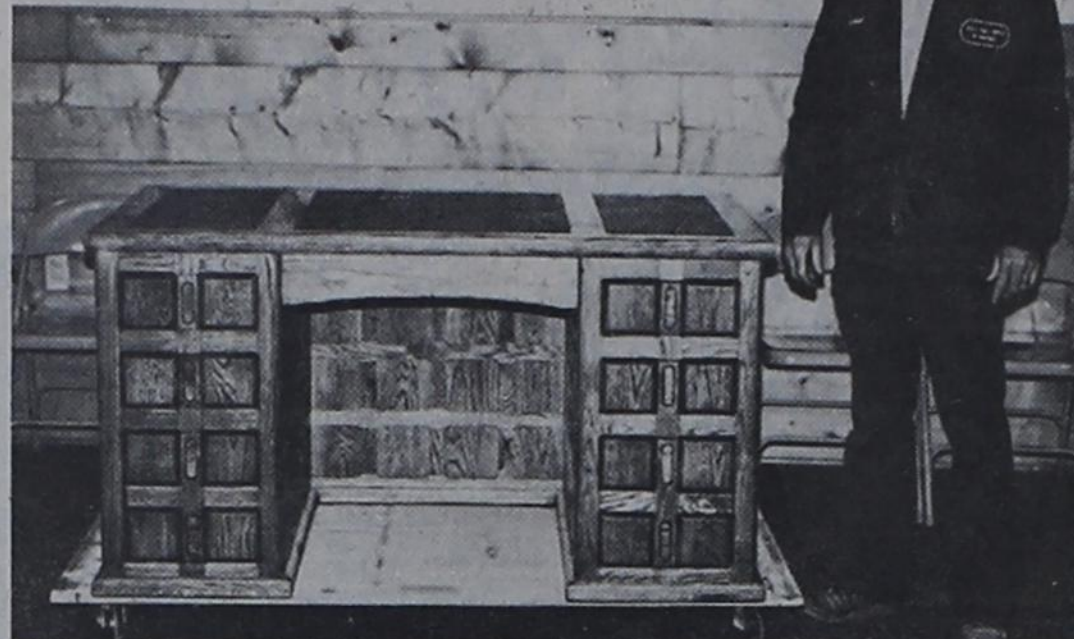


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### Dinner Party Set Dec. 27 In Hereford

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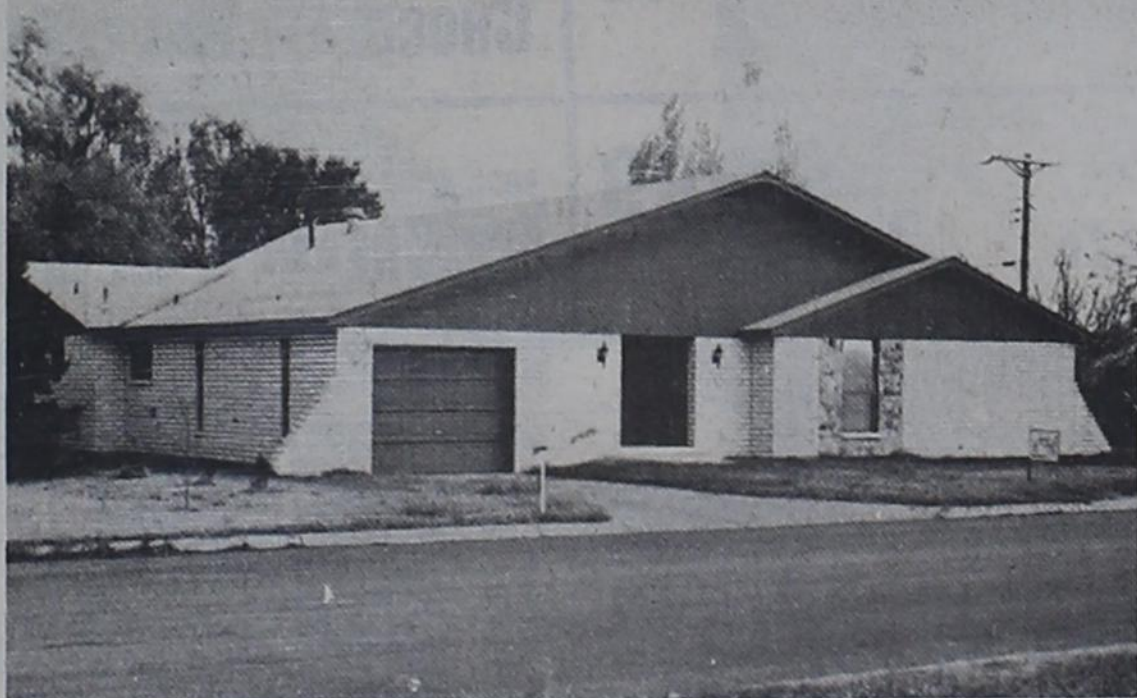
