Auditions Set Here Sunday

Sunday will be the day for auditions for Friona's Summer Drama Workshop.

Fees will also be due on Sunday for the workshop. They are \$25 for one student or \$40 for two or more in one family. Individuals who are interested in supporting the Fine Arts Council may do so by making donations to the organization, which sponsors the Summer Drama Workshop.

The older kids will begin their auditions at 2 p.m. Sunday at the Friona High School Auditorium. There are two age groups in the SDW--10-13 and 14 and older.

During the week, the younger group will meet from 9 a.m. to 12 noon, while the older ones will have both afternoon and evening sessions.

Phillip Duggins and Lou-Ida Marsh are returning to direct the Summer Drama Workshop this summer.

Lou-Ida will direct "Shenandoah" with the older group of students. The name of the production for the younger group was not known at this writing.

Even if you have not pre-registered, you are urged to come Sunday afternoon and become a part of the 1985 production.

The workshop will run for a two-week period, July 22 through August 3.

City Receives Its Sales Tax Payment

The City of Friona received its monthly sales tax check from State Comptroller Bob Bullock this week. The check was in the amount of \$6,429.15, which was 3.8 per cent below its check of \$6,687.08 for the same period a year ago.

For the calendar year, the city has now received a total of \$64,405.27, which is 12.83 per cent ahead of the pace of calendar year 1984 to the same point. At this time in 1984, Friona had received \$57,082.56 in sales taxes.

July checks represent taxes collected on sales made in May and reported to the state comptroller by June 20.

Otherwise in Parmer County, Bovina showed a nice gain in its check, from \$1,199.72 in 1984 to \$1,608.13 for the current month, and Farwell's check was up slightly, from \$1,762.28 in 1984 to \$1,805.37 this month.

The three Parmer County municipalities have received checks totalling \$93,038.62 for the calendar year. This is up by 10.8 per cent over the total of \$83,964.57 for the same period a year ago.

As usual, Houston received the largest check from the state comptroller, \$9.5 million, bringing Houston's total 1985 payments to \$86.2 million, up four per cent over last year.

Dallas' check for \$7.2 million pushed its total to \$63.7 million this year, a 15 per cent increase over 1984.

San Antonio's payment of \$3.5 million increased its 1985 total to \$30.9 million, up 14 per cent. Austin received \$2.9 million for a total \$24.7 million, a 25 per cent increase over 1984 payments.

Fort Worth's check for \$2.2 million brought total payments to \$18.7 million.

Stars Win Tourney

With a ten-run rally in the last inning Thursday, the Friona Mustang League All-Stars won the district tournament they were hosting this week.

Their Thursday rally allowed Friona to beat Texico-Farwell, 15-14. On Monday, Friona beat the Bovina all-stars, 15-7, and on Wednesday they downed the Muleshoe all-stars, 9-5.

Trailing 14-5 going into their last at-bat, the Friona team paraded 13 men to the plate. They took advantage of wildness on the part

of the Farwell-Texico pitcher, and also had timely hits from Adam Raymond, Tony Cuevas and Harvey Martinez.

Martinez had the game-winning RBI. Frieda Lafuente scored the tying run as a pinch runner, and Martinez' hit scored Michael Gomez. Kyle Potts and Adam Raymond were Friona's pitchers.

The Friona team will now enter an area tournament at Amarillo starting Tuesday.

Randy Baize is coach of the all-stars.

Routine Business Is Handled By Court

Mostly routine matters were discussed by the Parmer County Commissioners at their regular meeting on Monday, July 8.

The boarding care bills for foster children in Parmer County were approved in the amount of \$1,470. This amount will be reimbursed to the county by the state.

Also approved was the county's annual sponsorship payment to Central Plains Mental Health/Mental Retardation Center, in the amount of \$3,050. Central Plains MH/MR Center maintains a branch office in Parmer County, located at Friona.

Notation was made of a notice received from General Telephone Company of their intent to install underground telephone lines in Precinct 1.

A request from Friona State Bank was approved. The bank had requested substitution of securities pledged to the county.

Payment of a bill to Richard Collard, acting as attorney ad item for juvenile hearings, was approved, in the amount of \$340.00.

A citizen had requested travel assistance to get to a hospital to undergo surgery. In that the cost of the operation was to be basically covered by Medicare, the court voted to help this indigent citizen with his request.

A discussion was held concerning hospitalization insurance plans which had been presented to the court. A motion was passed to renew the county employees' coverage with Blue Cross/Blue Shield of Texas under their new proposal.

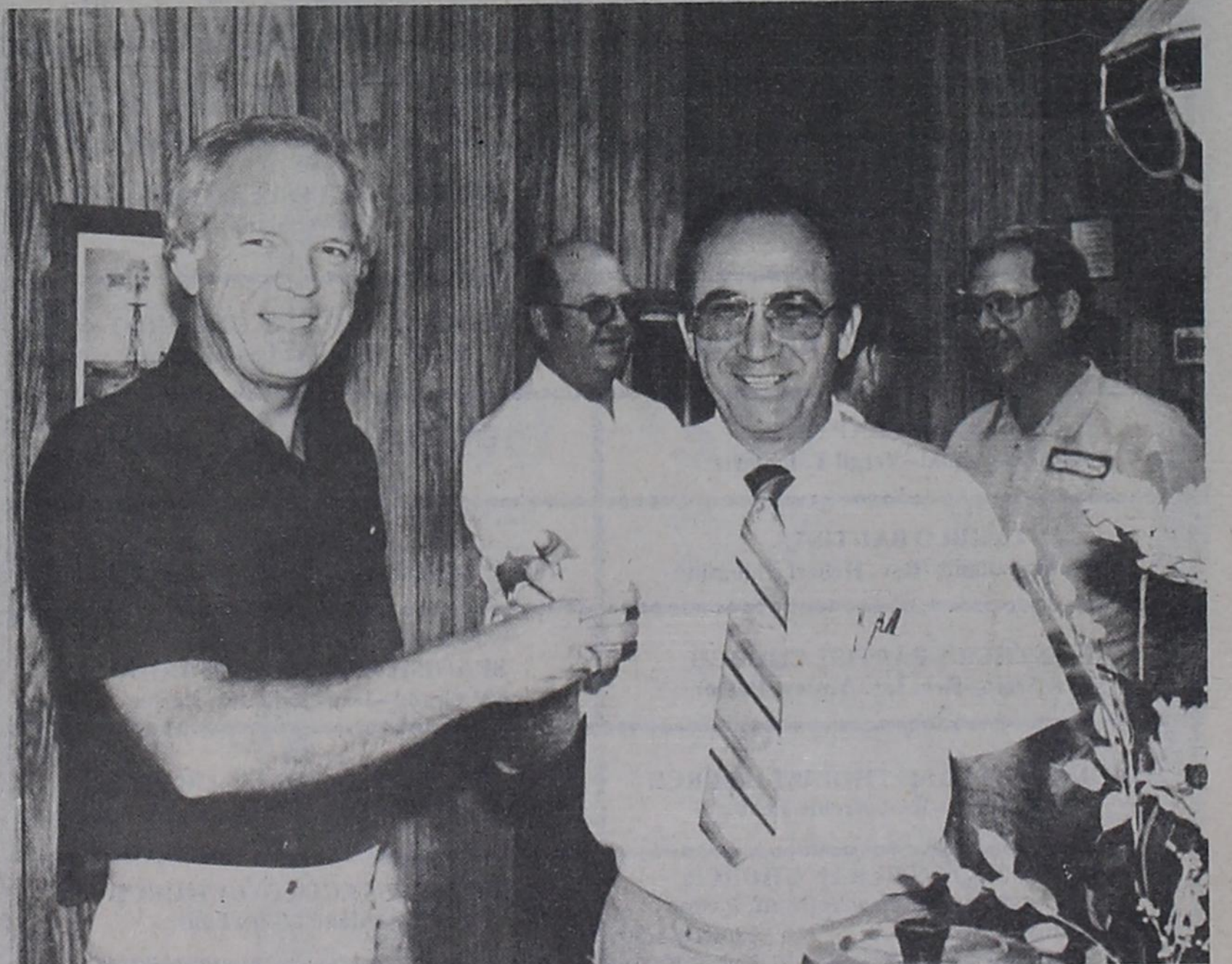
The County Treasurer presented her quarterly report. After some discussion, the report was approved, with the notation that it be published in the county's three newspapers.

A motion was approved to approve soil work in Precinct 2, on the requests from Lee Marquez, Billy Lynn Marshall, Dickie Clayton and Rick Mayfield. The work will be performed by county machinery when it is not needed otherwise, and cost of such work is paid by the individuals to the county.

55 YEARS AGO--JULY 18, 1930

Parmer County now has a population of 5,868, according to the Bureau of the Census, compared to a total of 1,699 on January 1, 1920. The population of Justice Precinct No. 2 as shown by the preliminary figures, is 2,765, which lacks just 338 being one-half of the county's total. The Friona precinct numbered just 408 in 1920, so the precinct has quintupled its population in ten years, while the city has quadrupled its total.

50 YEARS AGO--JULY 20, 1935

At a mass meeting of panhandle citizens in Amarillo last Saturday, for the purpose of arousing enthusiasm for the completion of Panhandle highway projects, considerable progress was reported. Parmer County was represented by Mayor F.W. Reeve and Hadley Reeve of Friona and Judge J.D. Hamlin and Hamlin Overstreet, both of Farwell. At the meeting, Judge Hamlin expressed himself as being fully in accord with the project of completing Highway 60 across Parmer County, including the placing of the highway on the north side of the Santa Fe Railroad, as recommended by the highway engineers.

Oliver Baker was fighting with the Army. He did not get to see them, but does have hopes of soon seeing two other brothers, still in this country. They are Captain Elmer Baker, who is in Omaha, and 1st Sgt. Raymond Baker, who is at Ford Leonard Wood. S. Sgt. Arthur B. and Captain George Baker are serving in Europe. They are the sons of Mr. and Mrs. George Baker.

35 YEARS AGO--JULY 14, 1950

With the Korean War situation becoming more and more serious, Friona citizens, like others all over the United States, are talking and thinking of global war possibilities. When several people were asked the question, "What do you think of the United States taking part in Korean fighting?" the answers were unanimously in favor of the step taken by the U.S. Those quoted were Mrs. Henry Lewis, Wesley Hardesty, P.L. London, Charles Allen, Bill Stewart, Weldon Dickson, Leo McLellan, Guy Latta, Ernest Osborn, W.H. Jobe and Rev. B.T. Allen.

30 YEARS AGO--JULY 15, 1955

Formal opening of the Rockway-Hurst Department Store has been set for Tuesday, July 19, according to an announcement this

week by Andy Hurst. Hurst stated that the store would carry nationally advertised merchandise and complete lines of men's, women's, and children's shoes and clothing, household goods and piece goods.

25 YEARS AGO--JULY 14, 1960

Near-record rains last week succeeded in flooding a goodly portion of the north section of Parmer County this past weekend, as waters from the swollen Frio Draw came out of the banks and came across croplands from the Rhea Community across Parmer County and into Castro County. In Friona, the official rain gauge at Friona Consumers totalled 7.61 inches for the week, with the heaviest recording being 2.43 inches on July 7.

20 YEARS AGO--JULY 15, 1965

Wade Wright, who has served as office manager for Friona's branch of Plainview Production Credit Association, since October of 1963, has left Friona for a promotion within the company, and has been replaced by Robert Neelley. Neelley formerly lived in Friona, and attended public school here.

15 YEARS AGO--JULY 17, 1970

According to Postmaster Wright Williams, Friona is due to join the trend already underway in other parts of the area, whereby all mail to be sent out of town will be shipped to a sectional center, in this case Amarillo, where they will be given the postmark of the sectional center, rather than their originating office.

10 YEARS AGO--JULY 13, 1975

Bobby Wied entered the design chosen for Parmer County's official Bicentennial Medallion. Friona City Council met in special session Wednesday night to discuss the city's sanitary landfill situation with Tom Grimshaw of the Texas Department of Health Resources. Grimshaw pointed out that while the city is making efforts

to establish a new landfill site, that it was still in violation of state law by burning its trash at the old dump site, and that according to law, the old site could be closed. The city was offered opportunity to apply for a permit to continue to use the present site until obtaining a new landfill.

5 YEARS AGO--JULY 27, 1980

Friona's Little League all-stars won the area tournament at Canyon last week, and was runnerup in the Panhandle region this week at Pampa. Team members were Sammy Ancira, Basilio Ancira, Shy Burney, Jeff Dickson, Lonnie Phillips, Victor Granado, Leroy Mercado, Gilbert Davila, Andy Sandoval, Brent Gatlin, Brad Moyer, Frankie Perez, Lupe DeLaRosa, Danny Perez and Peter Malouf. Coaches were Ron Cain, Randy Dickson and Fred Flores.

A group of forty people from Friona's First Baptist Church was to return late Friday, after spending a week at Banderas, Mexico in a special mission project. During the week, the group built a new church building, and dug a water well.

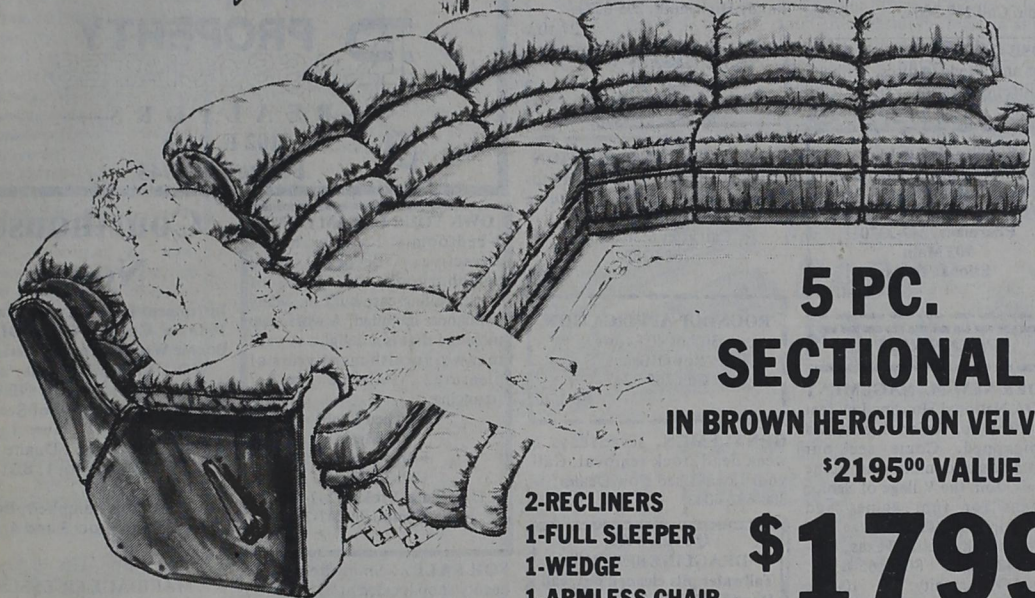

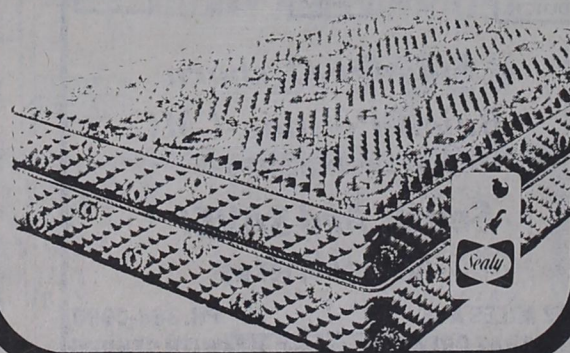

These proposed rates, where applicable, will provide tariffed local exchange access to customers who then will provide shared or resale services to tenants.
