Translations from Spanish and French to English, promptly attended to.

THE CROPS--

We have conversed with a gentleman recently from Red River above the Raft, who gives cheering intelligence respecting the cotton and other crops in those sections of the country, both in Texas and Arkansas, where there have been no late rains or storms, and a more favorable season has never been known. The crops in eastern Texas are uninjured and the hopes of the planters most gladdening.

We wish we could say the same about the cotton crop of this Parish, we fear it is much injured by the rot.

Texas cotton begins slowly to arrive, and our merchants are on the qui vive for a large and profitable business this season. Natchitoches after this will be a 'place.'

WARTS--

These troublesome and often painful excrecences, covering the hands sometimes to the number of a hundred or two, may be destroyed by a simple, safe, and certain application. The writer discovered it accidentally, while performing some chemical experiments with soda. The matter is merely to dissolve as much common washing soda as the water will take up,--then wash the hands or warts with this for a minute or two, and allow them to dry with out being wiped. This repeated two or three days, will gradually destroy the most irritable wart. Its theory appears to be that of warts having a lower power of vitality than the skin, so that the alkali is sufficient to produce the disorganization of the former with out affecting the later. The warts never return.

The monument is formed entirely out of the Alamo Stone, and is ornamented with

Jack Hamil: improperly-kept moustache.

Beelee Goodwin: being AWOL July 4th.

Leroy Cox: selling software without a license in the city limits.

Charles Caudill: limited liability--commit limited liability--repeated offense.

Dale Houlette: causing huge oil slick on Reeve Lake in Friona, Texas, thus causing National Finals Bass Tournament to be cancelled.

John Mars: harrasing customers on a daily basis in local coffee shops--even to extreme of buying their coffee.

July 4th Events Well-Attended

Several records were established at Friona's annual July 4th celebration Thursday. The most notable may have been that the celebration was conducted on one of the hottest July 4ths in recent years, with the temperature reaching 95, but seeming higher due to lack of wind.

The Friona Noon Lions Club indicated that they had a record number of customers for their barbecue lunch. An exact count was not readily available, but Boss Lion John Blackwell said the club fed "between 700 and 800 people."

"It was by far the most people we have had. We had prepared more food than last year, and it was a good thing. Our club members have gotten pretty good at getting folks through the serving line--I appreciate those who worked," Blackwell said.

Most of the people coming for barbecue also stayed for the Gospel Singing competition, which turned out to be a good drawing card.

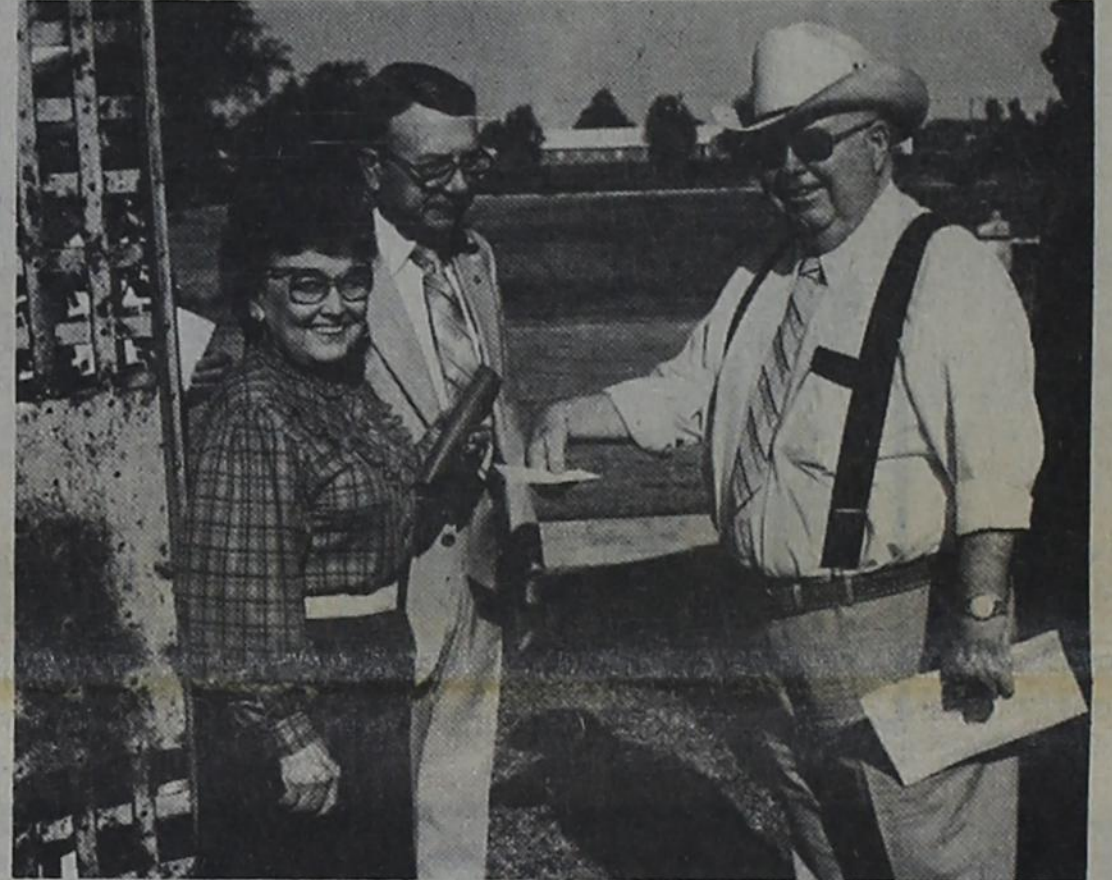
A record number of turtles--41-- were brought to the "World's Championship Turtle Race," and the event was divided into four races, according to turtle size.

The "City Splash" event at Friona Municipal Swimming Pool drew 47 entries in seven divisions.

Other events were equally well-attended with good participation.

Area Receives 'Spotted' Rain

The area received some nice rain this past Monday night, although not as general as most of the year's rains have been. Some isolated reports of hail damage also were noted.

The Hub area and to the south must have received the most rain. It was reported that over three inches fell at Hub Grain, and that the blowing wind that accompanied the thunderstorm also caused the company's scales to catch water.

Eddie Joe Hall, who farms near Hub, said he received 3.5 inches of rain, and also some hail damage to his crops. A second-hand report was that Clyde Woodard got some bad hail, along with the big rain on his place at Hub.

Ben Rejino, who farms west of Hub, said he received 2.67 inches with no hail evident, and William Gromowsky, who farms in the same area, received 1.5 inches.

Burke Hand, who farms southeast of town, was reported to have received 4.5 inches of rain, with no mention of hail. The lake on George Frye's place was said to be full and running over its spillway for the first time in years.

The Rhea community missed out

on the latest rain, according to Raymond Schueler.

The official measurement in the city of Friona was 1.12 inches, according to Rodney Dunnam, official recorder. Bovina's report from Monday night was a half inch. Dimmitt measured 1.28 inches, and Hereford only .11 inch, giving an indication of how spotted the rainfall was.

Blood Bank Sets Visit

The Coffee Blood Bank will be in Friona on Friday, July 12, at the Community Room of Friona State Bank from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Several local residents have used blood recently and this needs to be replaced. Some of the people needing credits are Myrl Buske and Clara Renner. Others have used blood, but their names were not available at press time.

If you wish to designate that the blood you give be credited as credit for someone you may do so.

The blood bank will accept blood from anyone who has been taking antibiotics, if the infection is gone. Also high blood pressure medicine is acceptable if it is not related to a heart condition.

Donors need to know the name of the medication they are taking so that the officials from the blood bank can determine if they can be donors.

Persons who have had surgery in the past six months, or have had malaria, cancer or hepatitis cannot donate blood.

Funeral services for Greta Bell Paul, 83, of Amarillo, were held Monday, July 1, at 11 a.m. in the First United Methodist Church of Canyon with Rev. Bob Ford, pastor, and Rev. Baldwin Stribling, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Canyon, officiating.

Graveside services and burial were held at 2 p.m. in the Friona Cemetery under the direction of Schooler-Gordon-Herring Funeral Directors of Canyon.

Born June 25, 1902 in Hamilton, Illinois, she moved with her parents to the Texas Panhandle in 1906. Her parents helped to pioneer the Lazbuddie Community.

Miss Paul was a math teacher and taught school in several Panhandle communities for 40 years, retiring from the Bovina School system in 1971. She helped start the Girl Scouts in Lazbuddie, received her Master's Degree from West Texas State University, was a member of the First United Methodist Church of Canyon, and was a member of the Murray Sunday School class.

She had lived in Amarillo for the past 12 years, moving there from Lazbuddie. She died Thursday, June 27, in St. Anthony's Hospital in Amarillo.

Friona Flashbacks

50 YEARS AGO--JULY 5, 1935

The contracts of two rural telephone lines out of Friona to the Rhea and Lakeview communities was let last week to R.B. Fairly of Lubbock. The two lines are already under construction and about 12 new subscribers will be connected as soon as the lines are completed and there will be a few other patrons connected soon after they are completed. The Hub community has been offered the same contract, provided they can get the required number of subscribers.

45 YEARS AGO--JULY 5, 1940

The Parmer County Old Settlers Association held its first picnic and program at the high school building at Bovina on Friday of last week. A goodly number of people were present for the program and a basket dinner. Following the program in the afternoon a business session of the Association was held for the purpose of electing new officers and designating the time and place of the next meeting.

40 YEARS AGO--JULY 6, 1945

Beginning July 1, the Friona Post Office is advanced from a third class to a second class post office, according to information received from the Post Office Department by Postmaster Sloan Osborn. The promotion allows Friona to have regular clerks if needed, along with an increase in salaries.

35 YEARS AGO--JUNE 30, 1950

The demolition of the vault at the old Friona State Bank location, Fifth and Main this week, brought back memories to many pioneers of one of the most colorful banking histories ever recorded in any era, or any locality. The bank has moved into its new location at Sixth and Main. Having survived through the threat of fire, depressions and bank robberies, the vault this week even defied contractors as they began its destruction last Saturday.

30 YEARS AGO--JUNE 30, 1955

O.B. Moyer suffered severe bruises on his right leg early Monday morning when his tractor over-balanced and the front of the implement rose from the ground, pinning him beneath the steering wheel. He was digging a ditch on his farm six miles north and six miles west of Friona. L.D. Chiles, a farmer in a neighboring field, was servicing a combine when he heard the cries for help. Chiles' son, Jerry, took a truck, backed it up to the tractor, and Chiles pulled the injured man free.

25 YEARS AGO--JUNE 30, 1960

Mary Lynne Stephens, seven-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Stephens of Friona, was killed Wednesday morning when her bicycle was struck by a car driven by Mrs. Clyde Sherrieb. The Stephens girl was riding east on Fifth Street and as Mrs. Sherrieb approached, the small girl rode across the street in front of the car. Mary Lynne would have been in the second grade in Friona schools this fall.

Friona Lanes, Friona's 12-lane bowling center, will hold its official grand opening Monday, July 4th, with two championship bowlers as the highlight of the day's activities. These two bowlers, Norm Nichols and Helen Duval, will give personal instructions during the morning, then will give a match bowling contest during the evening with local bowlers.

20 YEARS AGO--JULY 1, 1965

The Friona City Council passed an ordinance calling for the paving of 15 city blocks in newly-annexed areas, primarily in Welch Acres and Western Addition. Added to the six blocks which had already been approved by the Friona Independent School District for paving adjacent to the new high school complex, the action brings to 21 the number of blocks to be paved this summer, and more may be added.

15 YEARS AGO--JULY 2, 1970

Recognizing the need for a baseball park for the older boys in Friona, the Friona Noon Lions Club adopted a project this summer of building a new park, and the project is making exceptional progress. The Lions have been instrumental in securing a full city block of land at Third and Prospect Streets for the purpose of building a baseball park, and are now proceeding full speed ahead.

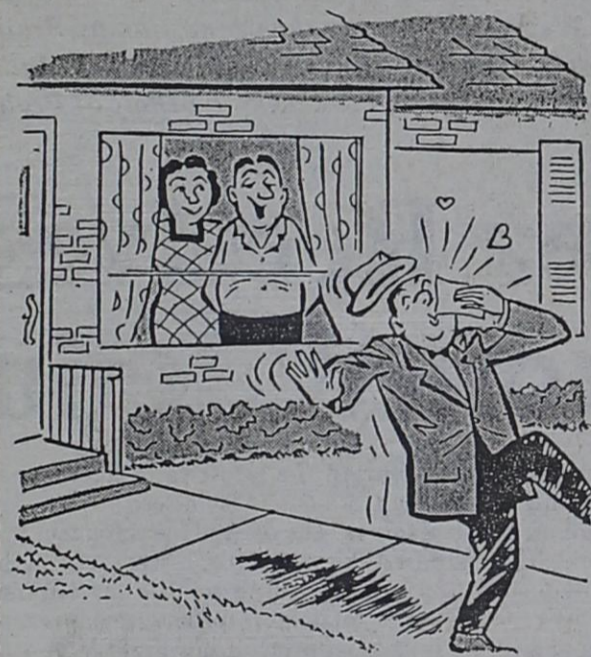

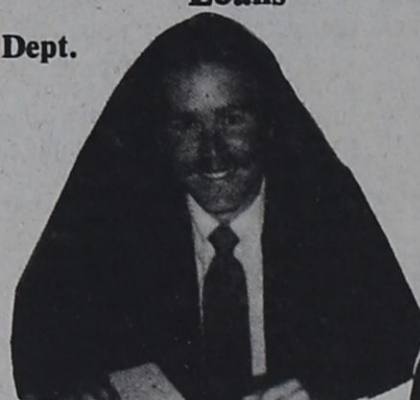

F. Springs Attend Reunion Overseas

Ethel Ruth and Frank Spring of Friona, along with Mary Spring of Amarillo were among five Texans and 14 Americans who attended a convocation of the Spryng family in Lavenham, England.

Also attending were Martha and

Frank L. Spring of Albuquerque, N.M.

More than 190 members of the Spryng family travelled to Lavenham from all over the world, for the week-long convocation, interested in retracing their family history. Family members were present from New Zealand, Australia, Ireland, Canada and the United States.

The trip was organized by Ray Spryng of New Zealand, who sent out over 3,500 letters to Spryngs throughout the world.

"I just looked up the addresses in the 'phone books and wrote to them," Spryng said.

A main attraction of the family members at Lavenham was the Lavenham Parish Church, as a Spryng ancestor, Thomas Spryng, a wealthy wool merchant, was mainly responsible for building the church's great tower 500 years ago. The meeting was the first of its kind, and those attending agreed to have another in five years. Ray Spryng says he doesn't know whether he is directly descended from the original Spryngs at Lavenham, but his interest in the family history has taken him around the world, along with his brothers Irvine of Canada and William of Saudi Arabia.

The local delegation of Springs also visited Cambridge, and the "Constable country" of famed artist John Constable while there.

B-J Bees Split Final Two Games

Raymond's three hits led B-J's hitting, and Terron Talley added two. Potts' three hits led Hi-Pro.

In a game Monday, July 2, Hi-Pro scored five runs in the third, four in the fifth and five more in the sixth, to take a 19-14 win over the B-J Bees.

Harvey Martinez had four hits and scored four times, as did Shane Clark. Terron Talley, Cody Simmons and Adam Raymond each had three hits for the B-J Bees, who scored in every inning.

BE COOL

Many people think that there is but one optimum temperature for each type of wine. It is, however, really not that critical. Just remember that the simpler the white is, the colder it should be served. Light reds only need light chilling. Do not overchill fine whites or champagnes. It numbs the flavor. Another point of note is that it takes but one to two hours to chill wine in a refrigerator. Do not store unopened fine wines in a refrigerator for more than a few days. It can adversely affect the flavor. The quickest way to cool wine is in ice and water.

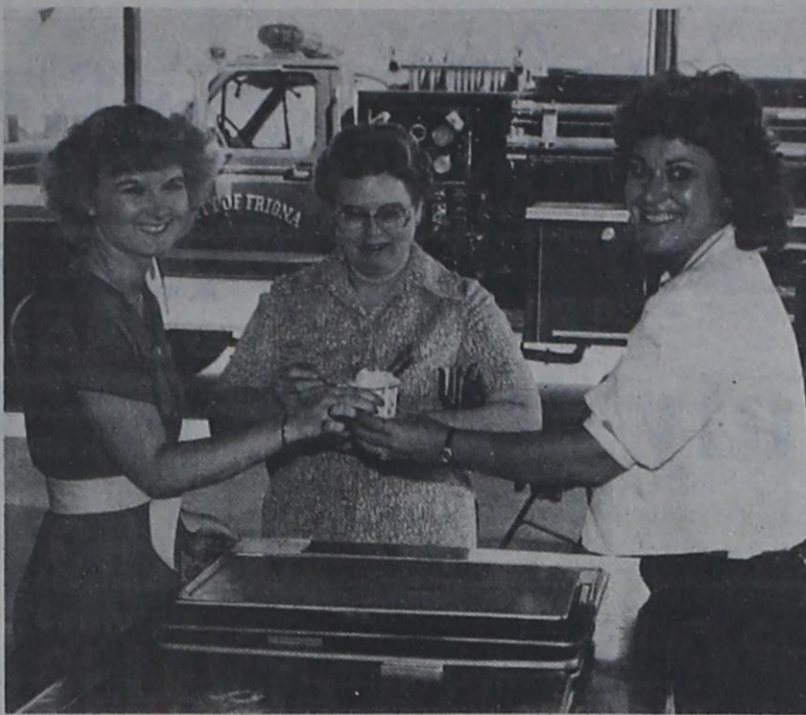

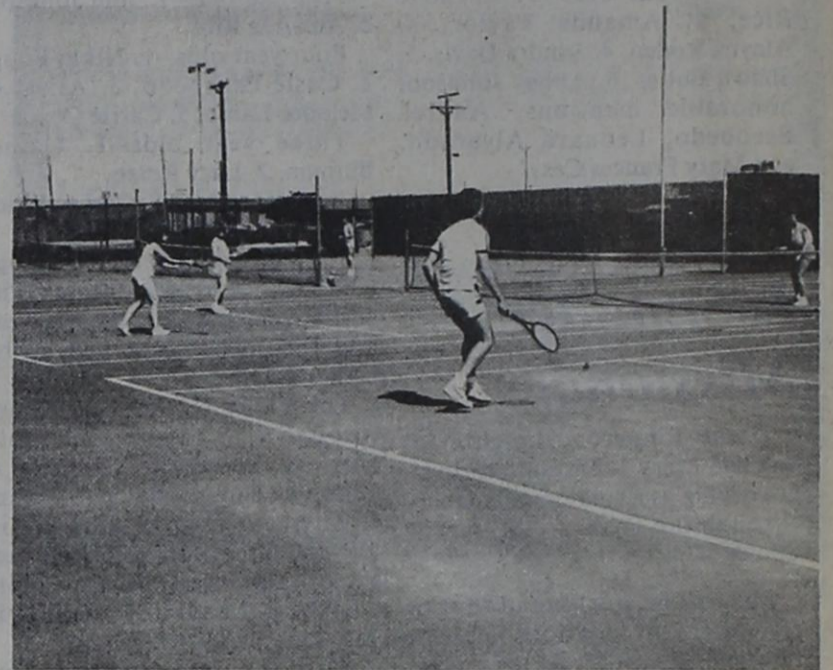

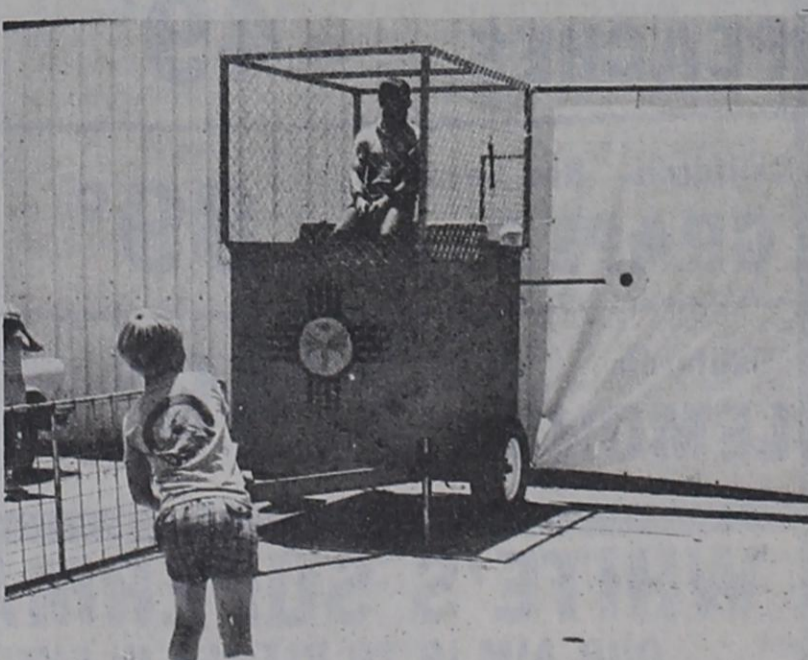

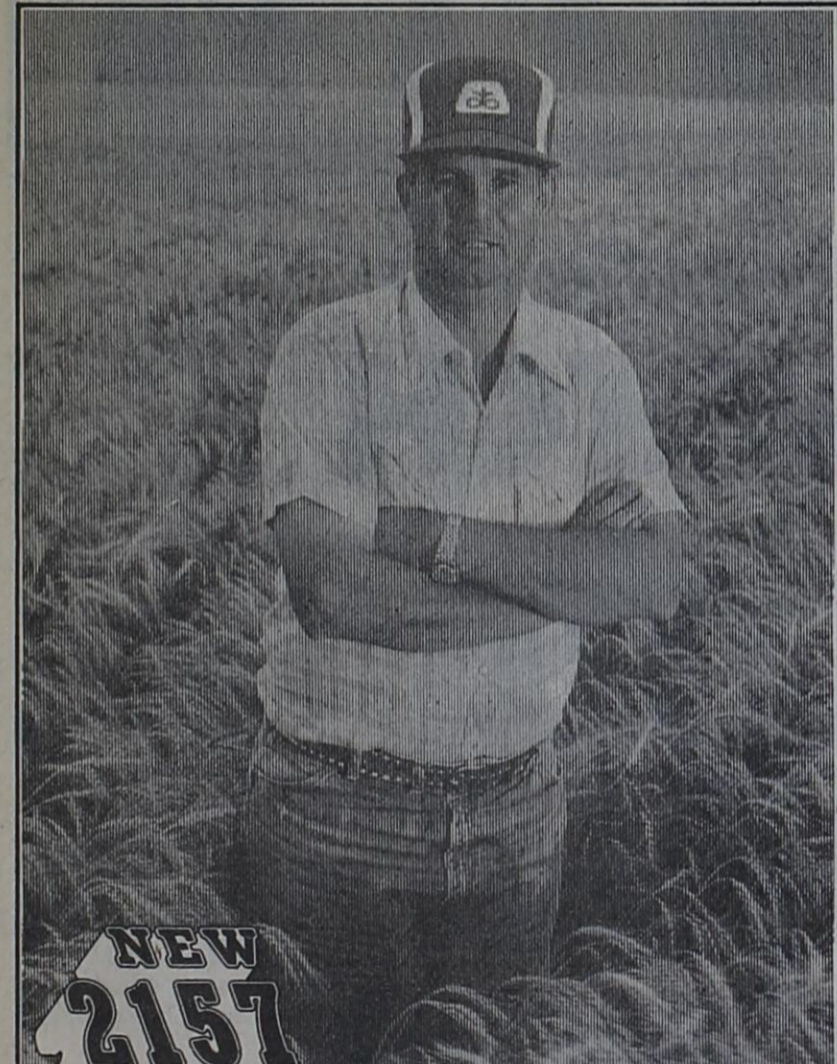

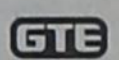
As this is a new service offering, we are unable to determine the number of customers who may be affected. Currently, there are no known prospective customers. Until any customer utilizes this new offering, there will be no effect on the revenues of the telephone company, and in any event, the telephone company does not expect revenues to be affected by more than 2 1/2 percent. These proposed rates, where applicable, will provide tariffed local exchange access to customers who then will provide shared or resale services to tenants.

These proposed rates have been suspended by the Public Utility Commission of Texas and will become effective as proposed or modified by order of the Commission on a date to be determined by the commission.

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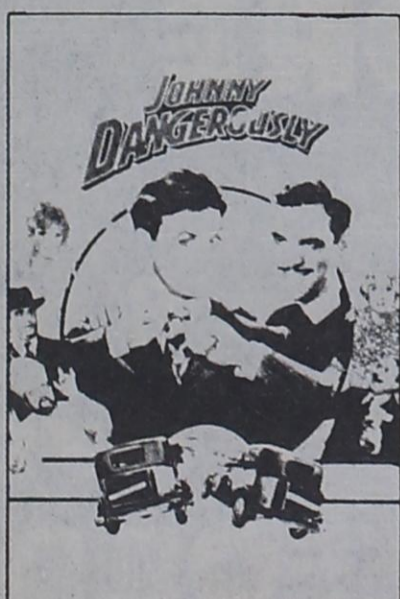
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Eight FFA Members Attend Convention

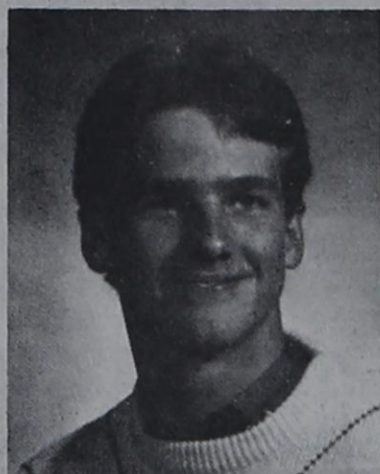

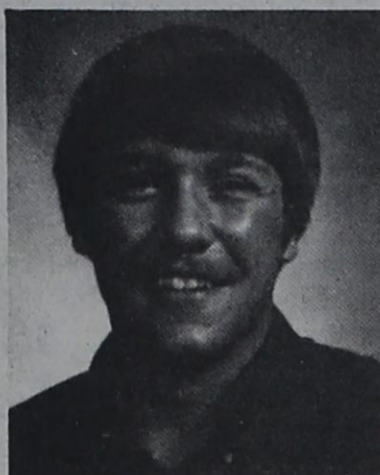

Grandparents are Mr. and Mrs. Cap Lanier of the Hub Community.

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

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
