IT'S A LONG TIME until the elections of 1986, especially in light of the fact that it's a non-presidential election year, but already the politicians are making noises.

In particular, the candidates are lining up to run against Governor Mark White in 1986.

Former Congressman Kent Hance announced his switch from the Democratic to the Republican party, with the stated purpose being to oppose White in 1986.

In the meantime, Republican congressman Tom Loeffler has stated that he plans to seek the Republican nomination in the governor's race.

Then, adding fuel to the fire this past weekend was the announcement by former Governor Bill Clements that he would once again seek the office. Clements is also a Republican.

The possibility of this many candidates seeking the Republican nomination in the governor's race creates somewhat of a dilemma for the party.

One thing that has hurt Democrats in recent years is division within the party--conservatives vs liberals, etc. In Texas, the Republican party has hardly ever been large enough to have such divisions, but with additional candidates, such problems may come up.

The GOP candidates are beginning to formulate their attack on Governor White, for the increase in taxes and turning what had been a surplus state budget into a deficit. They also are quick to recall that White lent his support to "people like Walter Mondale, Geraldine Ferraro and Lloyd Doggett."

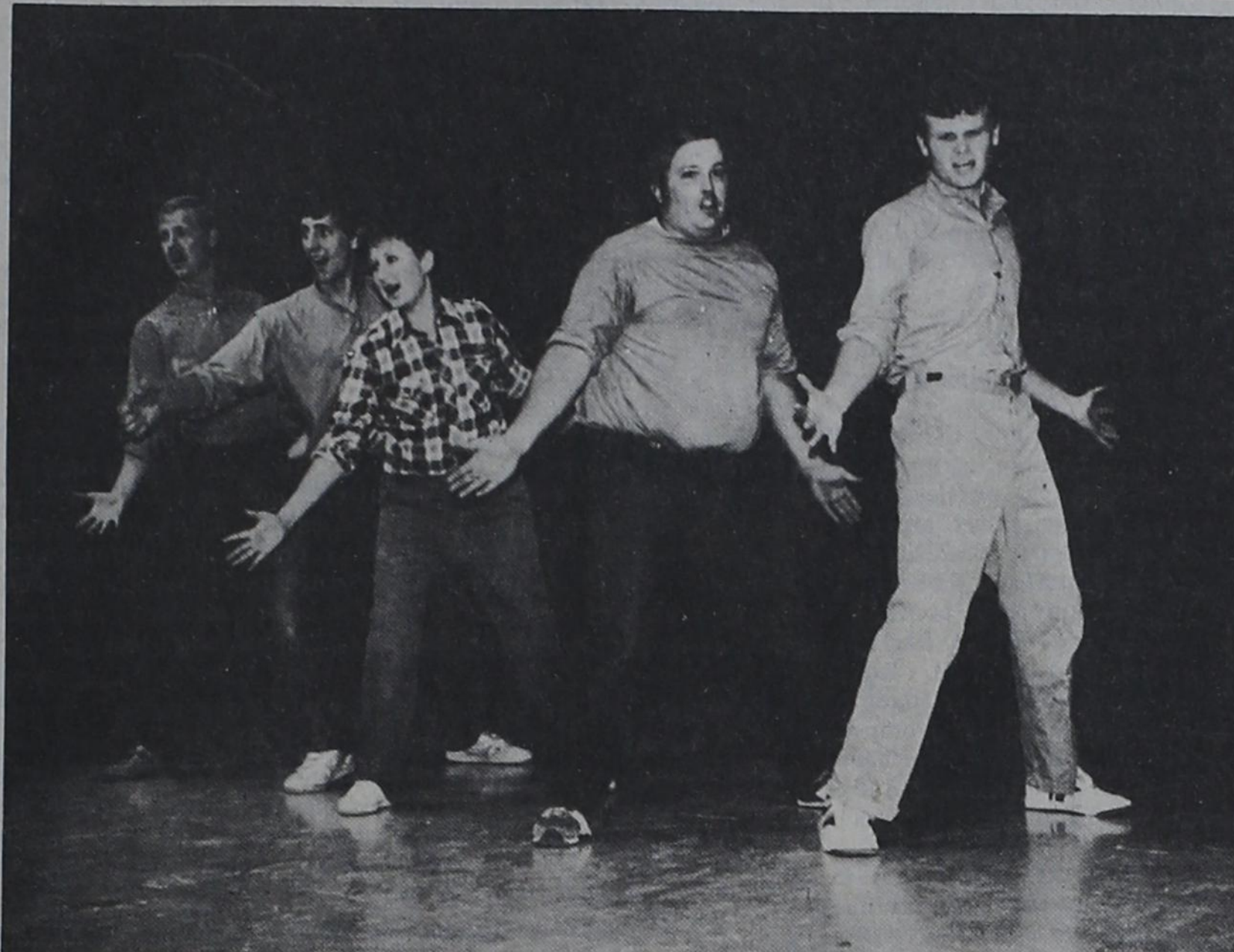

Hance said this week, "I think the good thing about this is that this may well prove to be the first time that the most exciting primary in the governor's race is in the Republican primary."

Hance is counting heavily on the vote from conservative Democrats, a segment which undoubtedly helped put Clements in office as the first Texas Republican governor since reconstruction days.

## Spotted Rains Noted In Area

The Friona area has been teased by thunderstorms again during the past week, with some parts being lucky enough to get a good rain, if they happened to be under one of the clouds.

In Friona proper, the measurements have been on the light side, with .12 inch recorded early Thursday morning, August 2 being the largest amount. But it appeared that some parts of the area got a pretty fair rain Tuesday afternoon. This rain for the most part went north of town.

The Rhea community, which often misses out on rains which come in from the southwest, has really had a good summer in the rainfall department. They received another good rain this past week.

Jim Dixon, who had predicted last Friday that it would "probably rain another inch and a half" didn't get it all that day, but did get another two inches of rain during the past week, with most of it coming in that Tuesday afternoon thunderstorm.

They got another good shower Wednesday evening, when it appeared that the city would surely get a shower, but it never got the job done until after midnight when a booming thunderstorm left the .12 inch measured by weather recorder Rodney Dunnam.

The storm knocked out the electric power in a section of town for a time early Thursday morning, and several residents reported being without telephones that morning.

Ernest Anthony, who farms north of town, said he had received over an inch of rain during the past week, with most of it, .8 inch, coming on Sunday afternoon.

Friona's official total rainfall for the month of July came to 2.55 inches. That hiked the total for the calendar year to 13.55 inches.

The year's total is somewhat above average to this point, but the main improvement in this year's rainfall is the fact that the rains have been timely, and very beneficial for most farmers.

## Wreck Injures Five Youth Near Bovina

Five young Bovina residents were injured Wednesday afternoon when their vehicles hit almost head-on, on FM 1731 three and one-half miles out of Bovina.

Four youngsters, all 18 and under, were occupants of a pickup driven by Jimmie Heard, 18. Manuel Ortiz, Jr., also 18, was driving a 1976 model automobile.

Department of Public Safety trooper Craig Hunt said the Heard vehicle was traveling south and Ortiz was headed north. Heard appeared to be on the wrong side of the road, and the vehicles hit "right fender to right fender."

A passenger in the pickup,

Stephen Heard, appeared to be hurt the worst, with the report being that both of his legs were broken below the knee.

Hunt said Heard apparently had not applied his brakes, and there was no apparent mechanical failure. A reason for the crash, which happened about 5:30 p.m., was undetermined.

All of the youngsters were taken to Clovis High Plains Hospital for treatment. All sustained cuts and/or bruises.

The younger Heard boy had been the driver of a motorbike which was involved in a fatal crash south of Bovina earlier this year.

# Friona Flashbacks

....from the files of The Friona Star

### 55 YEARS AGO--AUG. 1, 1930

John H. Aldridge, Jr. was the winner in the county judge race in the Democratic primary last Saturday, with 759 votes to 529 for Clyde V. Goodwine. J.M.W. Alexander will succeed Judge D.H. Meade as commissioner in the Friona-Black precinct, winning by 250-214. There will be a runoff for county sheriff between W.D. (Bill) Kirk and W.D. (Bill) Hall. Lee Thompson was elected commissioner in the Farwell precinct. W.S. Menefee was re-elected in the Lazbuddie precinct.

### 45 YEARS AGO--AUG. 2, 1940

In the Democratic primary last Saturday, David Moseley won the race for commissioner, precinct 1, over L.F. Lillard, 305-272. Charlie Lovelace and D.K. Roberts will meet in a runoff for county and district clerk. Roy B. Ezell won over two opponents, Robert Maddux and W.M. Lloyd, for county treasurer. Lee Thompson, Earl Booth and A.D. Smith were unopposed for county judge, sheriff and attorney, respectively.

### 40 YEARS AGO--AUG. 3, 1945

In view of the long continued drought from which this territory has been suffering since last September, a serious feed shortage is one of the most apparent conditions with which our farmers are now confronted. There will apparently be no cotton grown this year. Farmers had their soil in fine condition in the spring for planting row crops, but realizing the futility of planting before rain came, they simply waited for that rain, and are still waiting.

### 35 YEARS AGO--JULY 29, 1950

Over 1600 Parmer County voters went to the polls last Saturday in the Democratic primary. In county races, A.D. Smith held his office with 1015 votes to W.L. Edelman's 545. Henry Ivy unseated present Precinct 4, commissioner W.S. Menefee, with a 178-vote total to Menefee's 81. County voters followed the general pattern of

other Panhandle counties, swinging to Mrs. Altawene Clark for Congress, Harold LaFont for state representative and E.A. Bills for district judge.

### 30 YEARS AGO--JULY 29, 1955

J.B. McFarland, a well-known promoter of Parmer County Community Hospital, recently donated a new oxygen tent, not only for the benefit of the patients, but the nurses. Old style oxygen tents had to be cooled with ice, which was carried to the tent every few hours. The new model tent gives the hospital three tents, to adequately serve the hospital's needs, states manager Jimmy Baxter.

### 25 YEARS AGO--JULY 28, 1960

Martell Leveque and Porter Roberts are co-chairmen of Friona's annual Maize Days celebration, which is September 5-10 this year.

Members of the Friona City Council okayed plans and specifications for the modernization and improvement of the city's water and sewer system to bring the systems up to

serve a town double the present population.

### 15 YEARS AGO--JULY 30, 1970

A new business is opening on Main Street in Friona on Friday, to be known as Nellie Jane's Shoes. Owners of the new shop are Nellie Pearl Shelton and Jane Garth. Mrs. Garth will be manager. The store will feature several new lines that have not been shown anywhere else in this area. It will feature the newest in ladies' handbags at inexpensive prices.

### 10 YEARS AGO--JULY 27, 1965

Farmland in the area has received one of the best general rains for this season of recent years. The rain measured from two inches up to four and three-fourths inches, and practically without exception the reports have been that the rain fell perfectly and virtually every drop was useful.

A total of 99,000 head of cattle reported on feed in Parmer County January 1 made it the number two county for cattle on feed in the state, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White has announced.

### 5 YEARS AGO--AUG. 17, 1980

The Friona School Board has voted to call a bond issue later this year for renovation of the junior high school building, the primary school, as well as improvements at the junior high auditorium and gymnasium.

The Friona Independent School District will increase its tax ratio roughly 29 per cent for the 1980-81 fiscal year, it was announced this week.

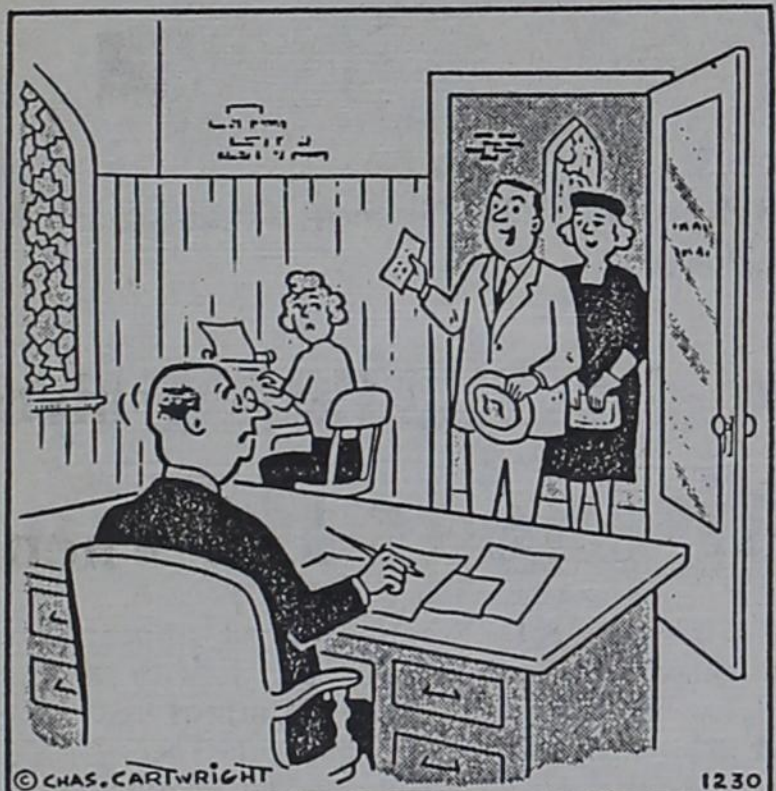

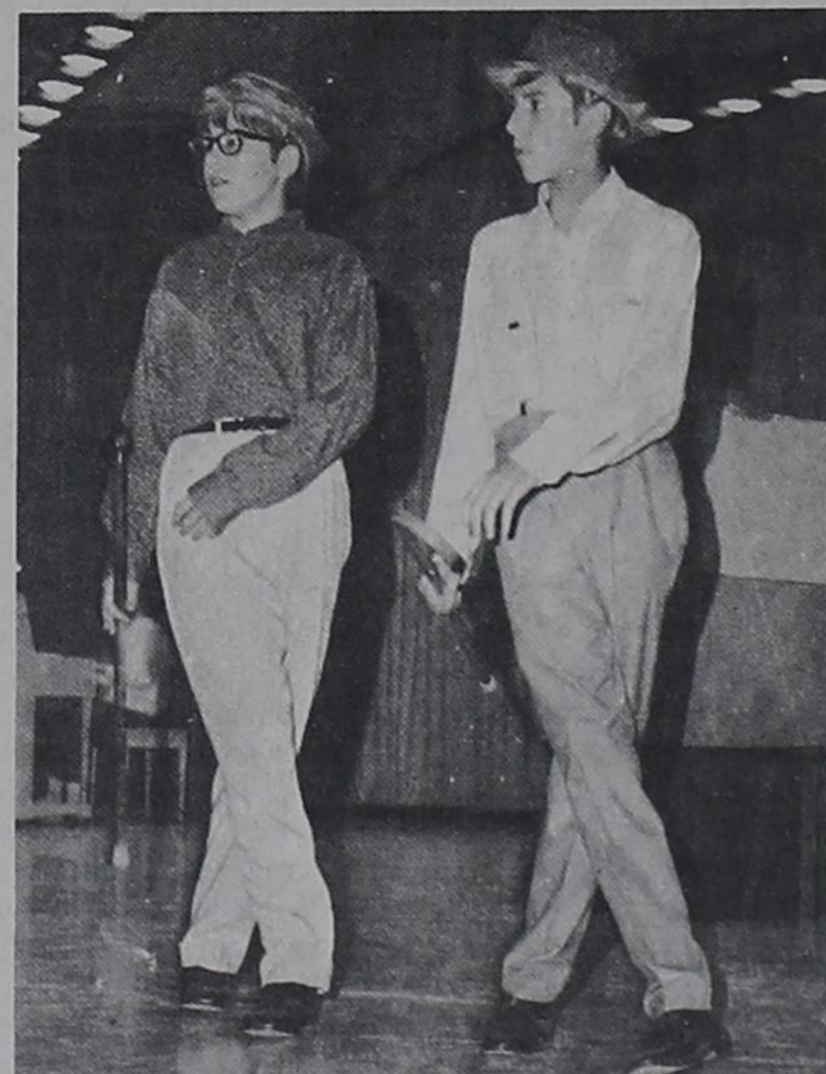

Malouf received recognition for scholarship for biology majors from the department of biology. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Hanna Malouf of Friona.

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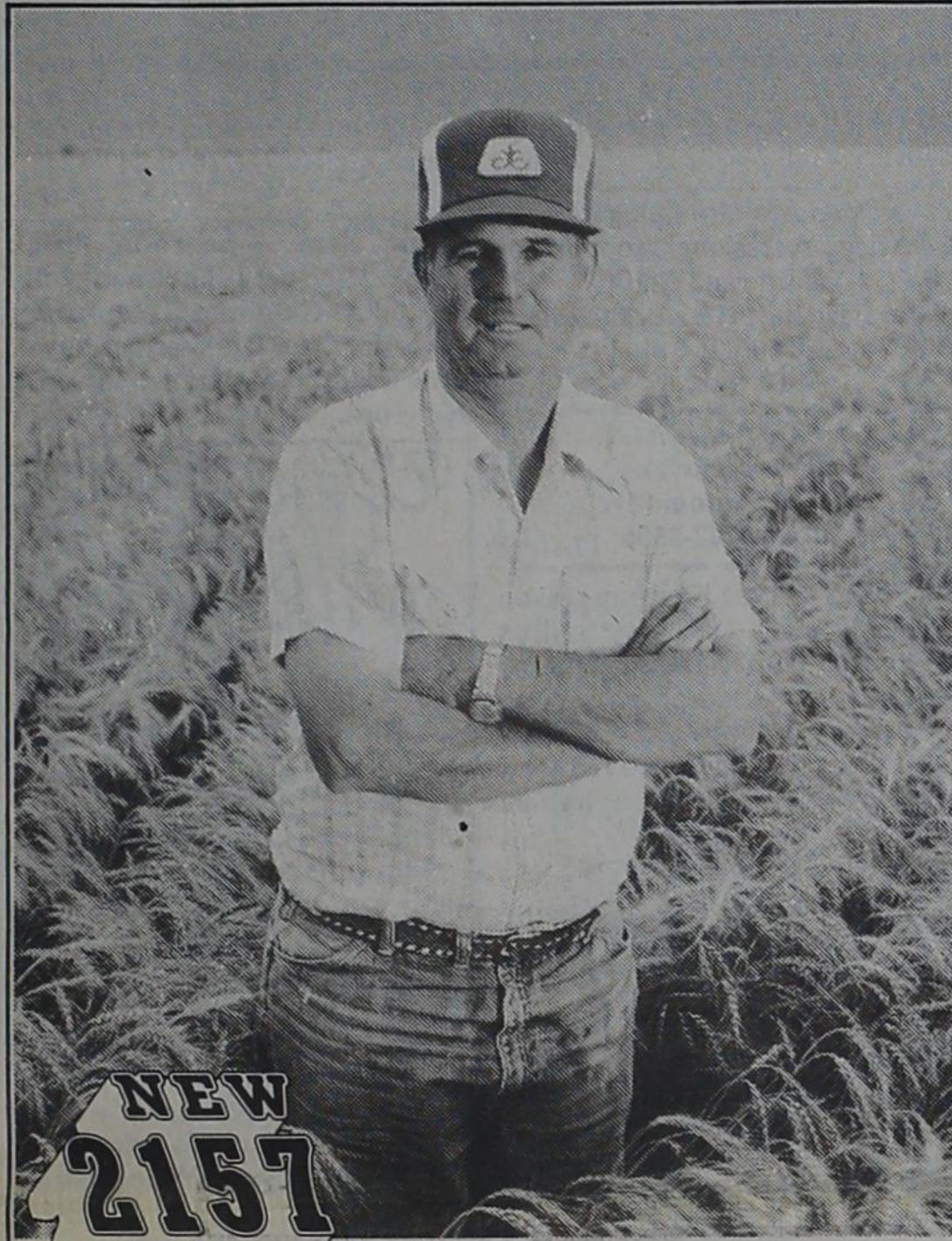

This is why they are called "fortified." This process brings the alcoholic content to a range of 17 to 20 percent. Thus, dessert wines are almost always blended products.

## SPS To Seek Rate Adjustment

Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) has filed informational packets giving advance notice of a request to restructure rates for retail electric service in the Texas communities the utility serves.

The company emphasized the restructuring will barely change prices customers pay for electricity.

"Prices to our customers will hardly increase or decrease under our rate proposal," said SPS president and chief executive officer Bert Ballengee. "We have had some costs to the company go up, and some costs come down," Ballengee said. "Now we must restructure our rates to reflect those changes. But the prices customers pay for Texas retail electric service will continue to be stable."

SPS last sought, and was granted an increase in base rates

for retail electric service in Texas in mid-1982, Ballengee noted.

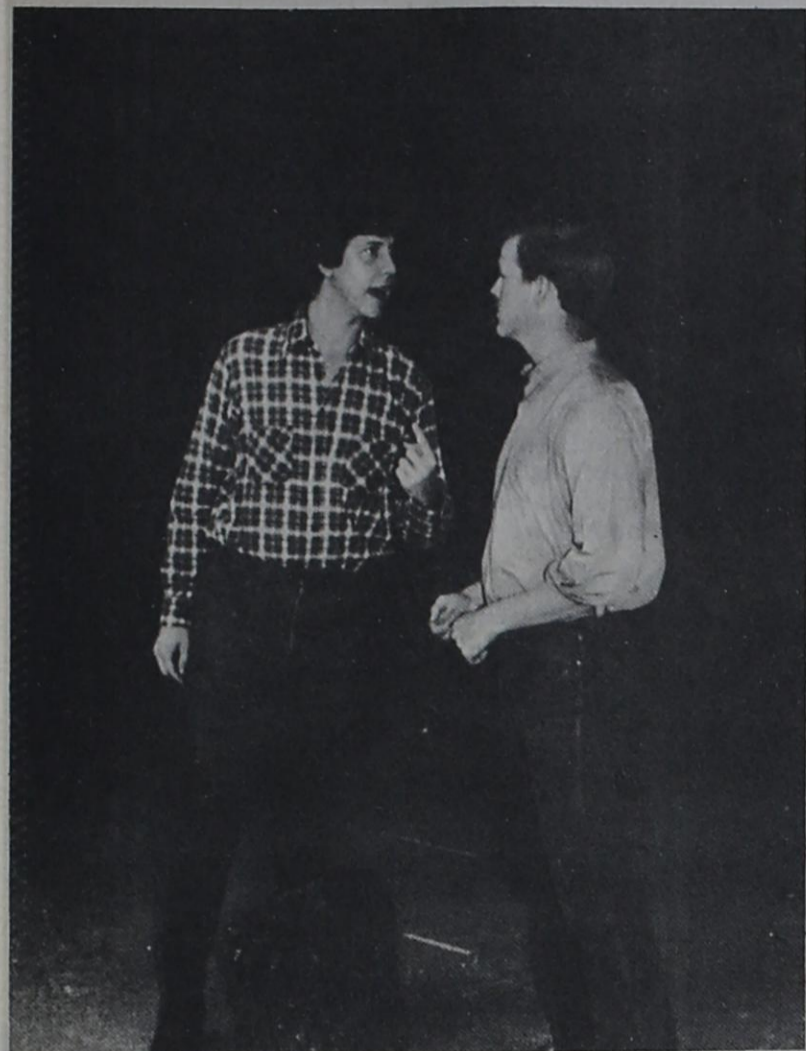
The proposal to restructure rates in rural areas of Texas served by SPS will be filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas, probably in early September.

The proposed restructuring, Ballengee said, "On the one hand, would increase the base-rate portion of the electric bill, and, on the other hand, would generally offset that increase by lowering the boiler fuel-cost portion of the bill. The net effect should be only slight changes in prices."

Ballengee credited decreasing costs of some SPS operations primarily to the utility's coal-fueled power plants, a softened natural gas market in the United States, and to lower interest costs. Increased costs to the utility included construction of coal-fueled power plant units and of new transmission and distribution



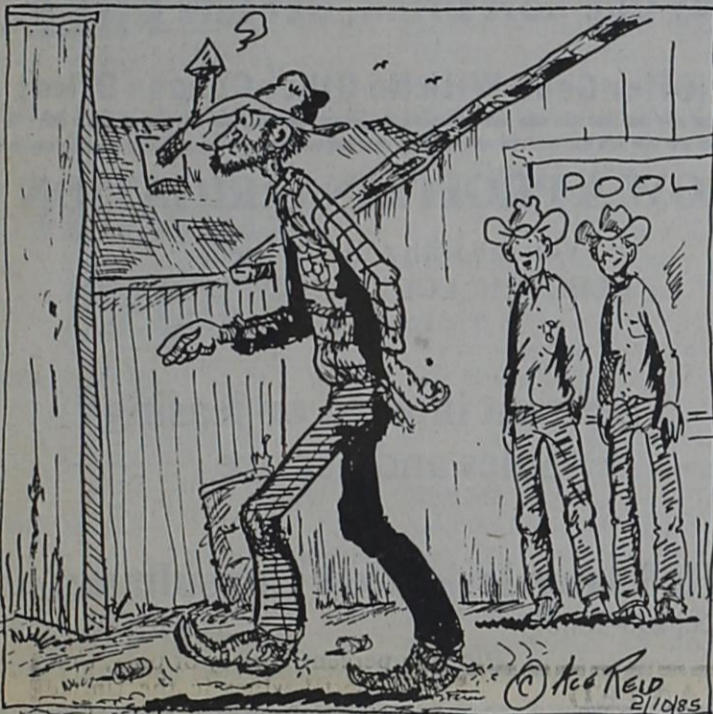

# Rick Romo Pioneering New Business Concept

(Editor's note: Rick Romo, president of American Staff Leasing, Inc., based in Dallas, is a brother of Lee Romo of Friona. His unique business was featured last October in an article in the business section of the *Muse Air Monthly*. Most of the article is being re-printed here.)

Last night a million or so struggling entrepreneurs and small business owners, frustrated by government bureaucracy, personnel problems and a lack of management expertise, muttered the modern-day mantra: "There oughta be a law!"

Well, there is. Relief is spelled T-E-F-R-A.

The Tax Equity & Fiscal Responsibility Act of 1982, which became effective January 1, 1984, has triggered the explosive growth of employee leasing firms and created an amazing array of benefits for small business managements, as well as their employees.

TEFRA, for the first time, defined "top-heavy" pension plans. If more than 60 per cent of the plan benefitted management, accelerated vesting was required for the employees. (Vesting is the amount of control or ownership the employee has of the company-

contributed retirement funds should he or she terminate, resign or retire. Ten to 20 per cent a year is usually granted in an effort to improve employee retention.)

Employers wanting to set up their own pension plan and not include employees, particularly where personal tax shelters are desired or rewards should be more comparable to risk, can now do so under Section 414(n) of the Internal Revenue Service Code.

In effect, the code permits employers to hire a third party to provide benefits to the employees. The third party, an employee leasing firm, must establish a fully vested pension plan with a retirement benefit equal to 7.5 per cent of gross salary.

The company using leased employees can then make pension contributions equal to as much as 200 per cent of the manager's gross salary, depending on age, without having to include rank and file employees.

Where such tax shelters are not of concern, TEFRA provides a "safe harbor" to the leased employees, permitting pension plans of less than 7.5 per cent. This provision is of particular interest to not-for-profit organizations and firms.

"Most of the companies we are

working with don't even have a pension plan," says Rick Romo, president of American Staff Leasing, Inc. of Rockwall, Texas, a Dallas area city. "Tax advantages are only a small part of our business. The real reason is that a company with 10 employees realizes it can join a leasing firm and get a benefit package for its employees comparable to a company with several thousand employees."

American Staffing, which began in January, 1984, already services about 100 companies "in every kind of business you can imagine—wholesale, retail, financial consulting, insurance, suburban newspaper, auto dealers, day care centers, CPAs, travel agencies, doctors and dentists.

"We are trying to reach companies that are bogged down in federal paperwork or seeking employee benefit packages they cannot secure themselves because they are not available or reasonably priced to a company their size," Romo said.

The marketing strategy appears to be well founded, according to a recent survey of 400 independent business owners by Comprehensive Business Services. The owners of businesses with less than \$300,000 in annual sales cited bad management as the primary reason for business failure.

Fifty-seven per cent of the

respondents named government regulation and red tape as the greatest hurdle in running their own business, followed by the task of finding and keeping good employees. Only 21 per cent of the respondents blamed inadequate capitalization for failure.

Romo said he had witnessed such frustration for 20 years while packaging employee benefits for companies all over the nation. "There is even fear of firing an employee, because he or she may file a lawsuit that would devastate cash flow, interrupt normal operations and tie up management.

"As employees of American Staff Leasing, they get a health package with low deductibles, dental insurance, disability insurance, prescription card service insurance. Another prerequisite is buying discounts, from autos to groceries. We are even in the process of setting up a credit union so we can finance their autos," Romo explained.

Romo's staff, which includes a former personnel director for an 18,000-employee jewelry company, also classifies jobs, pay and employees, sets up payroll and federal requirements, and advises on cash flow management and corporate direction.

"We find that many companies are either underpaying or overpaying employees," he said.

"We give them a rule of thumb for the market place."

The immediate upshot of the employee benefits is a reduction in employee turnover. The employee, enjoying higher job satisfaction and security, is less likely to jump ship for a few dollars more, or to join a huge corporation and sacrifice small business camaraderie and importance for office politics and intense co-worker competition.

The employer, no longer bogged down with time-consuming

personnel responsibilities and attendant paperwork, can turn attention to building the business, improving management techniques or restoring a better balance between his or her personal life and business involvement.

Clients of American Staff Leasing, which specializes in serving firms with 10 to 50 employees, report reductions in employee turnover of 30 to 70 per cent, and management productivity increases of 10 to 25 per cent.

## Court Buys Radar Units For County



Purchase of two new radar units for the Department of Public Safety patrolmen's use was a main item of business on a short agenda faced by the Commissioner's Court on July 22. After a discussion of other items of interest in the county, and there being no further business, the court was adjourned. Attending were commissioners Ernest Anthony, Tommy Williams, Robert White and Raymond McGehee, and Judge Porter Roberts.
