Beet Growers Set Annual Meeting

Congressional debates on the 1990 Farm Bill and the controversial General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT) negotiations will be hot topics when the Texas Sugar Beet Growers Association holds its silver anniversary meeting and banquet Jan. 19-20 in Hereford.

The meeting will be at 9:30 a.m. January 19 at the Hereford Community Center. The banquet will be at 7 p.m. January 20 at the Bull Barn expo center. Scheduled speakers include the incoming and outgoing presidents of the American Sugarbeet Growers Association, which represents growers in 13 states.

Bill Cleavinger, a Wildorado farmer-rancher who is president of both the Texas and national associations, will discuss state and national issues facing beet and corn growers in the Panhandle and cane farmers in South Texas.

"The congressional debate on the new farm bill is beginning to heat up and the sugar program will receive much attention," says Cleavinger. "The program has enabled many producers to remain in business and given them an opportunity to earn a reasonable profit. At the same time, it has guaranteed consumers a stable sugar supply at a stable price below that of most other sugar producing countries. We're working to maintain a strong sugar program in the farm bill."

Pat Mahar, a grower in Cavalier, N.D. and currently ASGA first vice president, will speak on the national association's campaign to educate the public on how the sugar program benefits consumers as well as producers. Mahar is chairman of the ASGA public relations committee.

Discussing GATT negotiations will be Kraig Gallimore of the Texas Department of Agriculture Farmer's Assistance program. "GATT is an extremely complex

issue which will have a major impact on beets, cane, corn and other U.S. farm commodities," says Cleavinger. "Mr. Gallimore's presentation should help answer many questions farmers and others have on the controversial international trade talks."

Various beet research efforts by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station will be reviewed at the meeting. Dr. Charlie Rush and Dr. Steve Winter, two key TAES beet researchers, will discuss their new research results. Dr. G.B. Thompson, director of the Texas A&M University Research Center in Amarillo, is also scheduled to discuss the TAES beet research program which is partially funded by the state beet association.

Steve Reynolds, sales manager for the Holly Sugar Seed Division, will discuss Holly's seed breeding research program, including a new breeding materials Holly has obtained from European sugar beet entries.

Dennis Prinz, Imperial Holly's agricultural department manager in Hereford, will speak on the expansion of the regional beet industry. This expansion has included the establishment of two new beet receiving stations near Kress and Nazareth, as well as the addition of 70 new beet growers in 1989. Growers will top beet yields and quality will receive awards from the department's staff.

The banquet will honor the 25-year partnership between Holly Sugar and area beet farmers. Roger Hill, Holly president, will speak at the banquet.

"The partnership between Holly and beet growers has been highly successful," says Cleavinger. "And it's continuing on the right track with the recent merger between Holly and Imperial Sugar."

The banquet will also honor TSBGA's past directors and officers and recognize others who have been instrumental in the success of the beet industry in the Panhandle area.

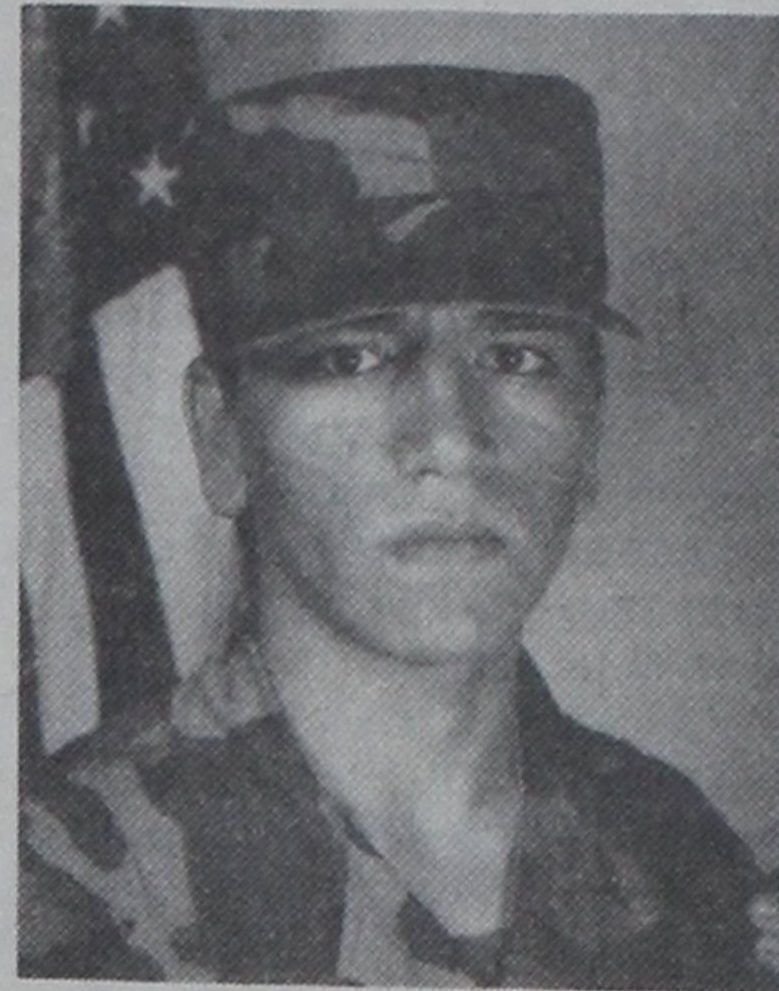

A Friona boy, Daniel Ramirez, who is a 1986 graduate of Friona High School, has taken part in the Panamanian invasion with the U.S. Army.

Ramirez left the states December 16 for Panama. He had been stationed in Fort Hood previously.

Ramirez, who went all the way through Friona schools, is the son

of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Ramirez of 910 Green St. in Friona.

Thomas Ramirez indicated that in conversations with his son, he indicated that there had been no casualties or serious injuries in his division. "But he has seen a lot of dead people," Ramirez said.

Since Daniel speaks fluent

Spanish, he has been helping as an interpreter for the Army.

Thomas Ramirez said that his son called home on December 16 to let them know he was about to leave for Panama, and asked him "Do you want me to bring you a souvenir from Panama?" Ramirez said he jokingly told him "Yes, bring me one of Noriega's ears."

Thomas Ramirez and his family have lived in Friona since 1970. He is employed at Friona's Excel plant.

In a letter his parents received this week, Daniel said:

"Well, it's me again. How is the weather up there? How is everybody? O.K., I hope. How were the Christmas holidays? I spent most of Christmas Day digging a foxhole. New Year was just as bad. All I did was sit in my room and read a book.

"Everything here is back to normal, except we cannot go off post, which is really bad. It's like living at Black without a car or a T.V.

"I find it hard to believe that I was in a 'war' in a part of history. Even though my name will never appear in any history books. But my kids might study it sometime in the future and I'll be able to tell them that I was there.

"I want ya'll to save any newspaper or magazines that have something on the 'war,' so I can start a little scrapbook.

"I'd better go. I just wanted to let ya'll know that I'm O.K."

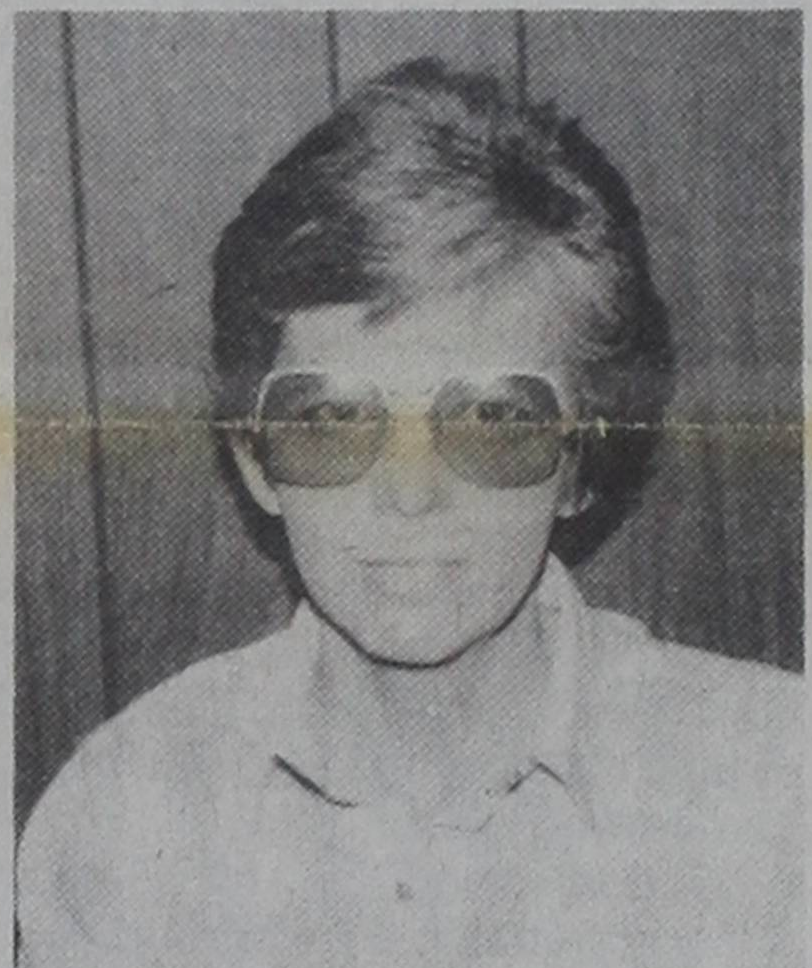
\$4888 Is Raised For Hospital

Thriving On Change

As we move into the next decade, we are confronted with unbelievable storms of change. Manufacturing miniaturization allows factories of all sizes to produce a huge variety of products with greatly reduced set-up times; computer-aided engineering slashes the length of design-to-manufacture cycles; electronics and telecommunications accelerate communication opportunities. The permanent reality of women in the work force produces new needs for convenience goods and services. Minorities are outpacing whites in U.S. population growth. Age at first marriage is increasing rapidly (26 for men, 24 for women). Our country is graying fast (by 2030, one-third of all U.S. citizens will be 65 or older).

Change can be good for us. Permutations can enhance creativity, stimulate personal growth and vitality, increase opportunities for self-expression and self-actualization and reduce the potential for stagnation and boredom. But change, managed poorly, can lead to burnout, anxiety or depression.

Those individuals who thrive on change—who allow change to enable them to perform at their peak—have seven characteristics: 1) a purpose for living and working; 2) goals that match purpose; 3) organizational skills; 4) self-understanding; 5) knowledge of human nature; 6) a balanced lifestyle; 7) proper character development.

A PURPOSE FOR LIVING AND WORKING. What is your purpose in life? For whom or what do you live and work? To better define your purpose, analyze your motives by evaluating what gives you the most joy in life. How would you describe yourself? How would you like to be remembered?

GOALS THAT MATCH PURPOSE. Without well-defined goals it's easy to drift and be buffeted by change. This new decade is time for you to reassess your personal goals, career goals and self-improvement goals. Write them down. Be specific. Make your goals measurable. Read your goals every day. Ask yourself the behavioral question: "Will my activity help me attain my goals?"

ORGANIZATIONAL SKILLS. To have a well-organized life, start the day positively with scriptural reading and activity planning. Always do first things first. Take time every day to rest. At the end of each day ask yourself, "What good did I do today?"

SELF-UNDERSTANDING. What are your strengths? Your

weaknesses? Your talents? List them. Work on developing your talents, and improving on your weaknesses.

KNOWLEDGE OF OTHERS. I've written about the four basic communication styles in the past. Here's a review: **Drivers** want to be in charge. **Analyticals** want to be in control. **Expressives** want to talk about their accomplishments. **Amiables** want to enjoy life and others. If you understand these four types you can listen better to their objectives. Listen by asking questions. (The smartest people ask the dumbest questions.)

A BALANCED LIFESTYLE. Those who thrive on change are supported by strong marriages and a healthy family life. They spend time with their families and family members have a say in making the rules and know the punishment for breaking the rules. Balance demands attention to spiritual growth, physical well-being and emotional health.

PROPER CHARACTER DEVELOPMENT. Those individuals who thrive on change are altruistic—they earn their neighbor's love by inspiring good will, gratitude, respect and happiness; they sublimate their anger and frustration into productive work and recreation; they solve problems rather than ruminating over them; and they plan for the future. They do not take themselves too seriously and they appreciate the paradoxes of life.

Those who deal most effectively with change have a permanence in their lives, assuring no matter how acute the stress, all will work out in the end. Those with a good moral character—good habits of choice—will lead a life that will thrive on change. This new decade, vow to cultivate those good habits of choice.

Module XI; Planning for the Future--Prepare for Crises

One of the most difficult things we face is the complexity of the modern world. As we grow older, the past, as we remember it, seems so much simpler than the present.

"Why can't things be like they were?" is a question often asked. Of course, nothing stays the same. Things change, and how we handle change determines, in large, our success or failure.

This was brought to my attention in a very poignant way. A woman, recently widowed, asked my help in some financial affairs. Ordinary finances had become unbearably complex for her. "Why must things be so confusing?" she asked. "Why can't they be simple like they used to be?"

The empathy I felt could not alter the fact that things were more confusing, and things would never be as they had been. It was now a matter of accepting this change.

What does this have to do with investments? It illustrates two important facts we all should consider before crises.

First, pay as close attention to future financial planning as you do to everyday financial survival. As age and life status change, so, too, do financial needs, both present and future.

This woman was left with a sizeable portfolio of aggressive common stocks. Most paid no current income because they were bought years before for capital

appreciation. In most cases, the stocks did appreciate, but rather than repositioning those gains into more secure investments, they were left unattended at risk of losing profits already made. They now offered little or no income at a time when safety and current income were of paramount importance. Although circumstances had changed over the years, the financial plan had remained the same.

Each year, your assets and financial plan should be reviewed to determine whether they're still doing what you want them to do. Satisfy yourself that these are the best investments available to meet your needs. Keep a financial plan that will, at your death, present your spouse or heirs with a minimum of investment changes.

Since this woman's spouse had taken little time for prior planning, she was faced with the necessity of making changes. Here was a problem that would not go away.

"But this is so confusing," she protested as we reviewed several investments that would meet her need for safety and income. To benefit, however, she first had to recognize the need for change and then make those changes.

This incident is not meant to minimize the difficulty of change. It is simply to point out the necessity of change and the need to plan for the future. The more preparation taken before a crisis, the better your chances of making a proper decision when one arises.

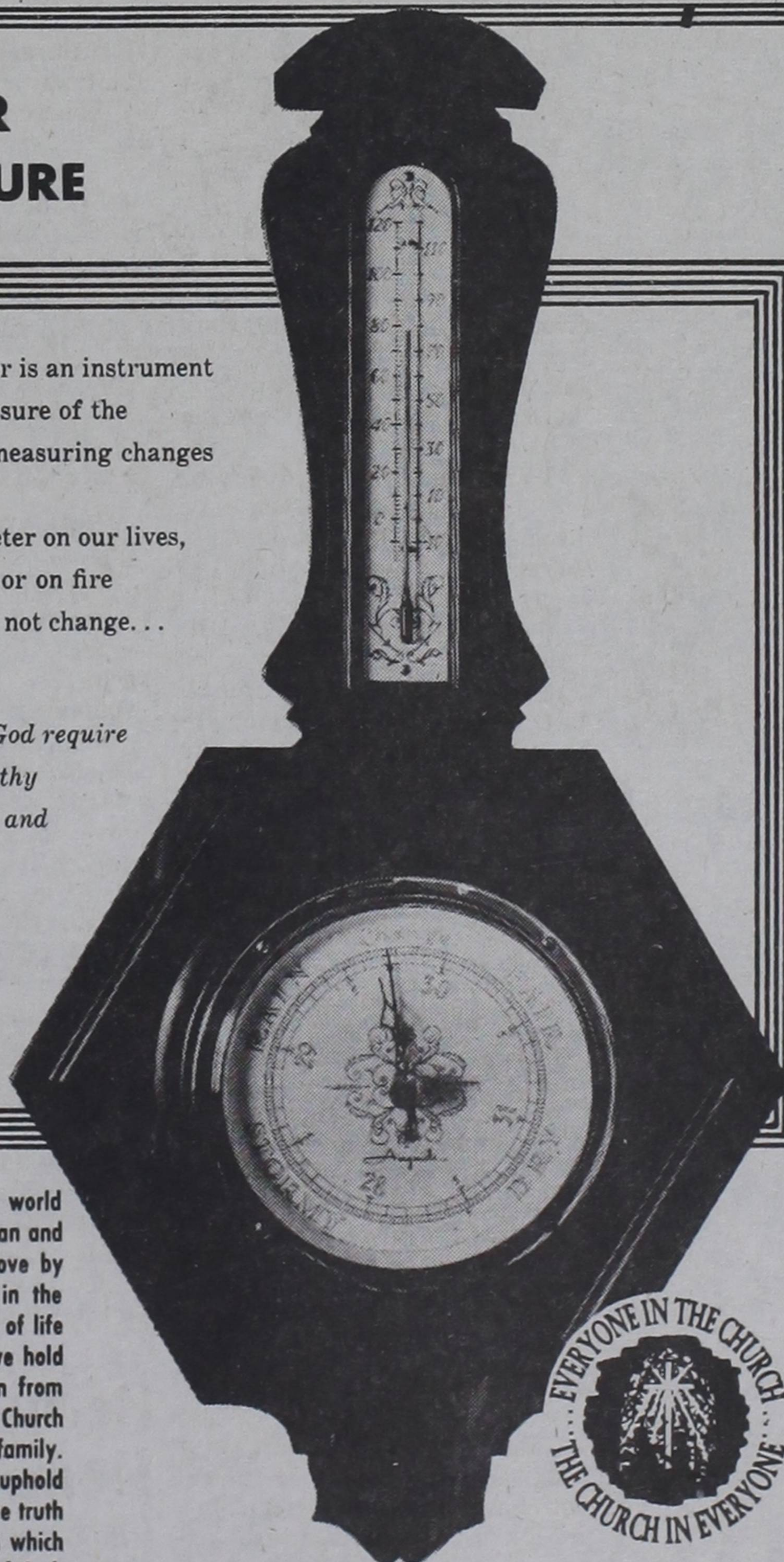
BAROMETER for the FUTURE
