SO THERE!!! In this very column, over a month ago (Dec. 8 to be exact), I told you that all that hype about oat bran and cholesterol was a bunch of hooley. (Hooley: Texas slang term for "Buddy, you've been had!") And then, just last week, the so-called "experts" came out with an announcement which said practically the same thing, but without the colorful local colloquialism.

Stick with me, folks, and we'll get everything all figured out, way ahead of the rest of them.

I ran across this neat little poem by Mr. Anonymous which expresses my opinion precisely:

Methuselah ate what he found on his plate, and never, as people do now.

Did he note the amount of the cholesterol count. He ate it because it was chow.

He wasn't disturbed as at dinner he sat, devouring a roast or a pie.

To think it was doused in saturated fat or a couple of vitamins shy.

He cheerfully chewed each species of food, unmindful of troubles or fears,

Lest his health might be hurt by some fancy dessert; and he lived over 900 years.

Remember, old Ben Franklin said, "An apple a day keeps the doctor away." Well, that doesn't work anymore either, because of course the doctor wasn't planning on coming out to your place anyway. HOWEVER, a recent three-year study at the U. of Michigan revealed that students who ate two apples each day had fewer headaches and colds than those who ate no apples at all.

So perhaps some of the oldtime rural remedies would hold up to modern times better than the oat bran theory. Since we're now in the middle of the colds and flu season, I will list some of the old folk cures here, but you are on your own if you want to try any of the stuff.

First, you are all familiar with the well-known "jewish grandmother's" cure for just about everything that ails you...good old chicken soup. Be sure to throw in lots of garlic, because it is also supposed to be the cure-all of all times.

Keep your feet warm in cold weather by sprinkling a little cayenne pepper in your socks.

Stop a runny nose by drinking a glass of water with a few drops of Tabasco Sauce in it.

For a headache, inhale the fumes of boiling vinegar.

For tummy cramps, mix ginger and pepper in hot water and drink.

To bring down a fever, beat an egg white with four tablespoons of water and drink it.

Two oldtime cough syrups are: 1) a mixture of honey, lemon juice and a little grated horseradish; or 2) wild cherry bark mixed with honey. But before your cough gets started, brew and steep a tea made with dill, flavored with honey. Drink three times a day.

For chills, burn some chicken feathers. Take the ashes and boil them in water, strain through a clean cloth and drink the water. This is an old Missouri "cure" for chills from malaria. This will, of course, give you an upset stomach and for that, you drink a tea made from red raspberry leaf.

Swollen glands: peel several limes and simmer the peel in milk for ten minutes. Use liquid for a gargle, after it has cooled.

Chest congestion: make a mustard plaster. Smear chest with mustard, lay a hot flannel rag over the chest. Change rag daily.

Cold sores: apply a paste of cocoa butter and ground walnuts. Powdered sage and garlic is good for those painful little canker sores inside the mouth.

A general all-purpose cold remedy: mix cinnamon, sage and bay leaf in water with a little lemon juice. Boil this for a few minutes and drink it. You will get over your cold just so you won't have to drink anymore of it.

Police Investigating Rash Of Break-Ins

Friona Police Department is investigating a rash of break-ins in the city which happened during the last week.

Included in the robberies were break-ins at Friona High School and at the United Pentecostal Church.

Robbers broke into Friona High School's athletic department on Sunday evening, January 21, and took items valued at around \$2500.00.

Superintendent Hal Ratcliff has offered a \$100 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of those responsible for the school break-in.

Thieves took a set of wireless telephones, 20 pairs of football shoes, three dozen each shorts, shirts and game socks, five footballs and five game jerseys.

At the Pentecostal Church, thieves broke in on Saturday, January 20, and took electronic equipment and musical instruments valued at approximately \$1500.00.

Three homes have also been burglarized during the past week, all in the western portion of town.

In virtually every instance, the thieves took television sets, VCRs, video tapes, and some jewelry.

Friona Chief of Police Loyd Niece said that the homes which were broken into had their doors locked, but that the thieves pried a door open or broke a window to gain entrance to the house.

"We're finding similar evidence at all of the robberies, and have secured some prints. We have some suspects in mind, and we definitely want to put a stop to this," Niece said.

Niece said he had been in contact with other cities that had experienced similar crimes.

"We have some extra people out watching, and we need the residents to contact us about anything they see that looks suspicious: unusual cars or people in their neighborhood," the Chief of Police said.

Niece added that if a person has a break-in, they should be cautious not to touch things around the area in which the thieves worked, so they could get more fingerprints and evidence. "Don't clean up or touch things until we get there," he asked.

"We're as concerned as the residents are, and we're doing our best to get this stopped," Niece concluded.

'Phone Calls May Be Thieves

A number of Friona residents may have had several occasions where their telephone rings, and when they answer, there is no one on the line.

It may be that this is a method being used by those breaking into homes, to find out if the residents are at home.

One of the residents whose homes was broken into this week said they had such a call the night before their home was burglarized.

60 YEARS AGO—JAN. 24, 1930

55 YEARS AGO—JAN. 25, 1935

Did you ever have the pleasure of having known while he was a boy someone who became famous as a man? Well, that has been one of my experiences. His name is Elza C. Segar, who became the creator of "Popeye." Milady, the youngsters and I lived one summer and winter in a little house in Chester, Illinois, that was built and owned by Elza's father. In that house, on old tablets and even on the walls of his room, we saw abundant evidence of Elza's talent as an artist—from "Coagitations & Aphorisms of Jodok," J.W. White's column.

Drought Loans Are Available

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by drought are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Farwell, Lance Smith, FmHA acting county supervisor, said today.

Parmer County is one of twelve in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Clayton Yeutter as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the drought.

Lance Smith said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80% of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 4.5%.

Squaws Score 2nd District Victory

Although the Littlefield Wildcats denied the Chieftains a rare varsity sport win over the Wildcats Tuesday at Littlefield, the Squaws came home with their second district win, 58-40.

Cindy Ureste and Jenny Procter had good first quarters for the Squaws. Miss Ureste connected on three baskets and Miss Procter

scored one free throw, one two-pointer and one three, to pace Friona to a 16-10 first quarter lead.

Lisa Weatherly began to connect at the post position in the second quarter, getting four baskets and two for two at the line, as the Squaws went to intermission with a 33-15 advantage, as the Wildcats were able to score only five points.

Both teams had cold third quarters, scoring eight each, and Friona held a 41-28 lead entering the final stanza.

Kendra Gordon took up the scoring in the final period, with three field goals and a pair from the line as the Squaws won their 12th game of the season against 11 losses.

Miss Weatherly took scoring honors with 16 points, and Misses Ureste and Gordon each scored 14.

In the boys' game, Littlefield was sporting only a 2-15 season record, having beaten Tulia a week ago for their first district win. The Chieftains (14-7, 2-2) were hoping to crack a long varsity losing streak against the Lamb County team.

But the Wildcats came to play. Shannon Cochran scored six points, including a three-pointer, and Michael Reyes got a pair of baskets, as the Chieftains trailed, 12-10 at the end of quarter number one.

Bret Bronniman and Steven Dickson each had a three-pointer as Friona scored 19 points, but Littlefield countered with 22 to take a 34-29 halftime lead.

The third quarter was Friona's downfall, as the Chiefs managed only seven points and fell behind, 49-36.

Cochran paced a late rally with seven last-quarter points, but the team could not overcome Littlefield's lead.

Cochran scored 15 and Reyes 14 points.

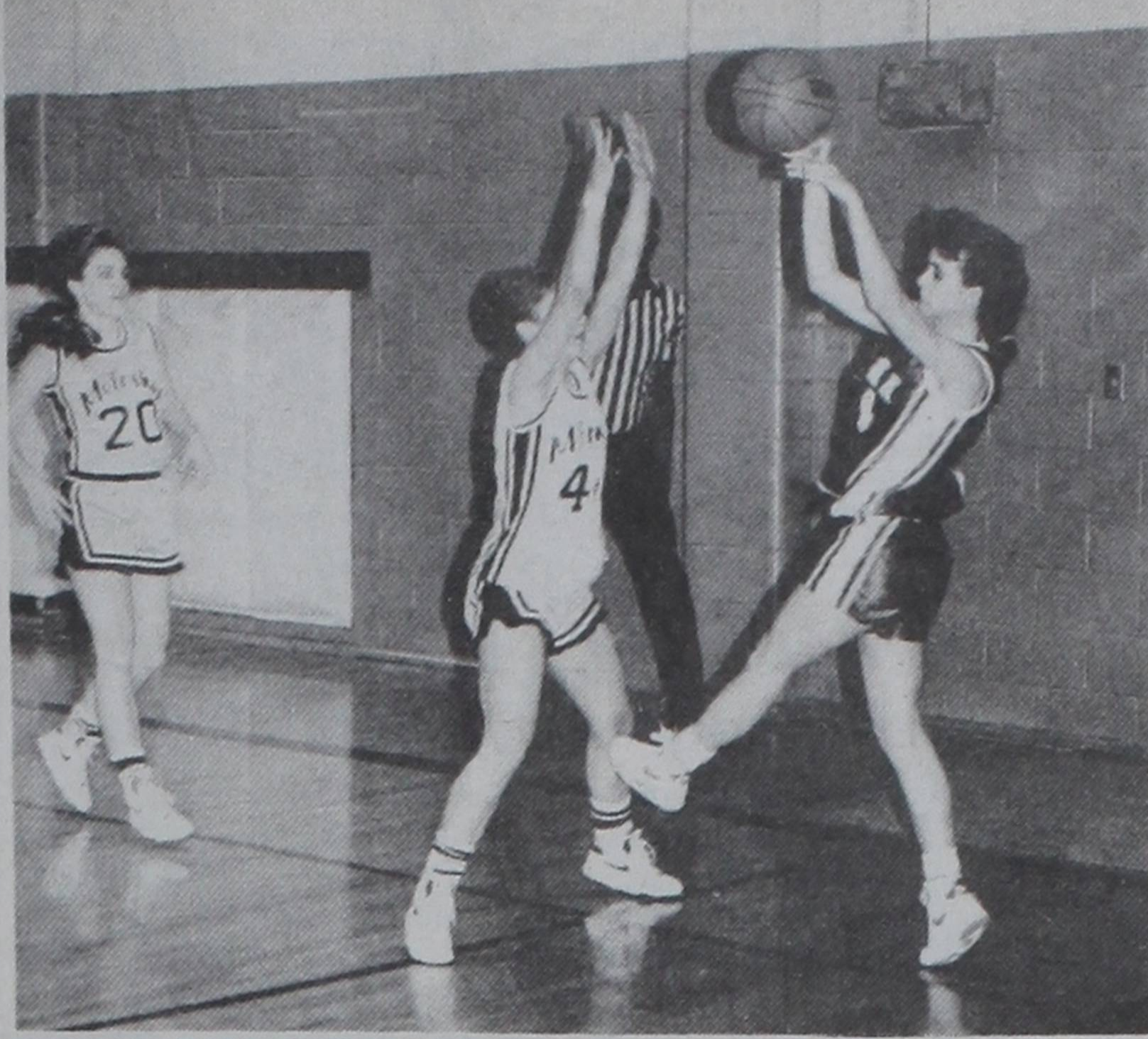



Former Resident Saves Daughter

NAIROBI, Kenya--Former Friona teacher Vaughn Ross saved his daughter's life with the aid of cardiovascular pulmonary resuscitation--and a parking place.

Ross, now a Southern Baptist missionary, was a high school chemistry and physics teacher in the Friona Independent School District from 1972 until he and his wife, Johnene, were appointed as Southern Baptist missionaries in 1975. Mrs. Ross was a fifth grade teacher in the school system. They were members of First Baptist Church, Friona.

Ross planned to wait with the car while his wife and 17-year-old daughter, Renae, visited a dentist in a downtown Nairobi medical building. Renae had several wisdom teeth removed that morning and was returning to the dentist to receive a pain relief injection.

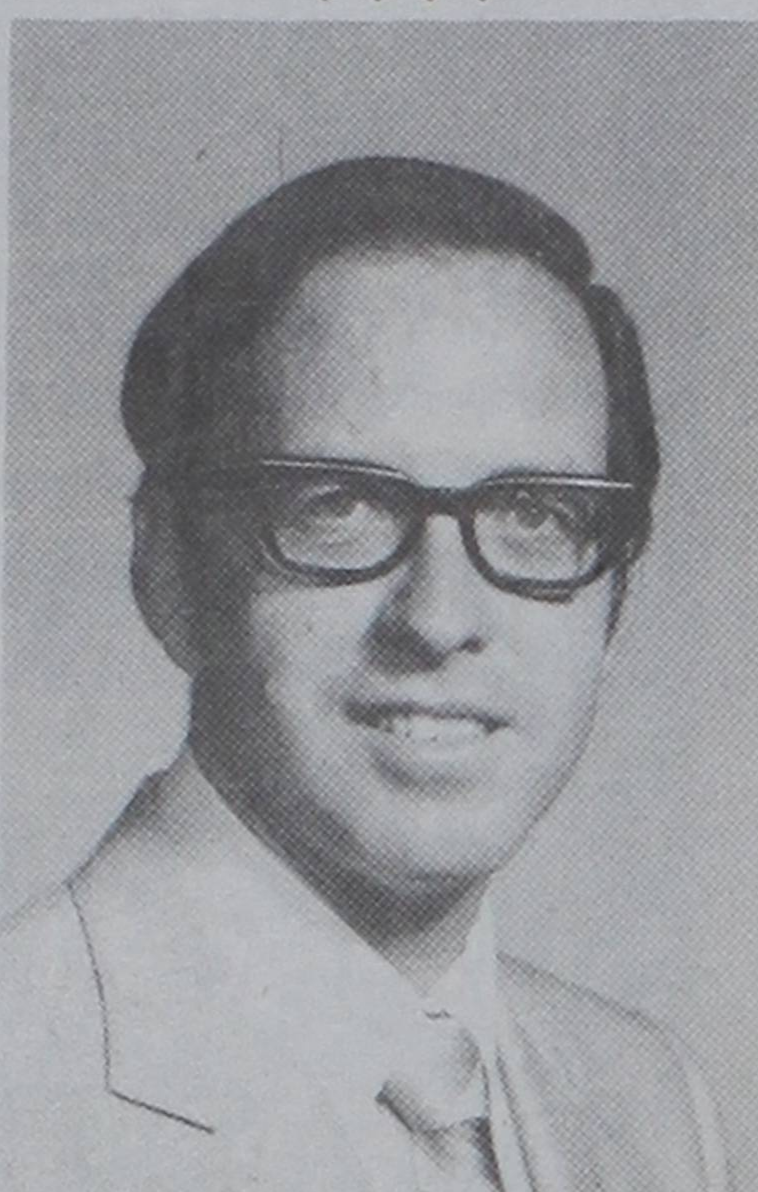
In Nairobi, the capital of Kenya, traffic during business hours has long outstripped the city's roads and parking areas. A parking spot, even an illegal one, is rare. Ross decided to wait by circling the block a few times, since the office visit would last only a few minutes.

However, after dropping off his wife and daughter, a parking space opened near the dentist office. Ross darted into the space and walked into the building to join his family.

Not long after Ross sat down in the waiting room, Mrs. Ross called out for help from the dentist's examining room. Ross hurried to the back room. He found his daughter conscious, but unable to breathe or control her limbs. Her respiratory system had shut down. Moments after receiving the pain relief injection, she had remarked, "I can see two of you, Mom." Then her body twitched and she stopped breathing.

When the dentist's attempts to revive Renae were ineffective, Ross sent his wife out of the office to find a doctor and began working through the steps of CPR he had learned years ago.

"I hadn't even thought about my CPR training for years but when I saw Renae lying there, God gave all the knowledge back to me," he said.

Mrs. Ross soon returned with a doctor, who had stayed late in the building. He gave the girl a shot to counteract an allergic reaction to the pain medication and commended Ross for doing the right thing. The doctor said Ross probably saved his daughter's life.

A portable oxygen tank in the dentist office was found--an item almost as rare in Nairobi as a parking space--and the oxygen mask was placed on the girl. She soon began to breathe better.

She was later hospitalized for observation and released the next day.

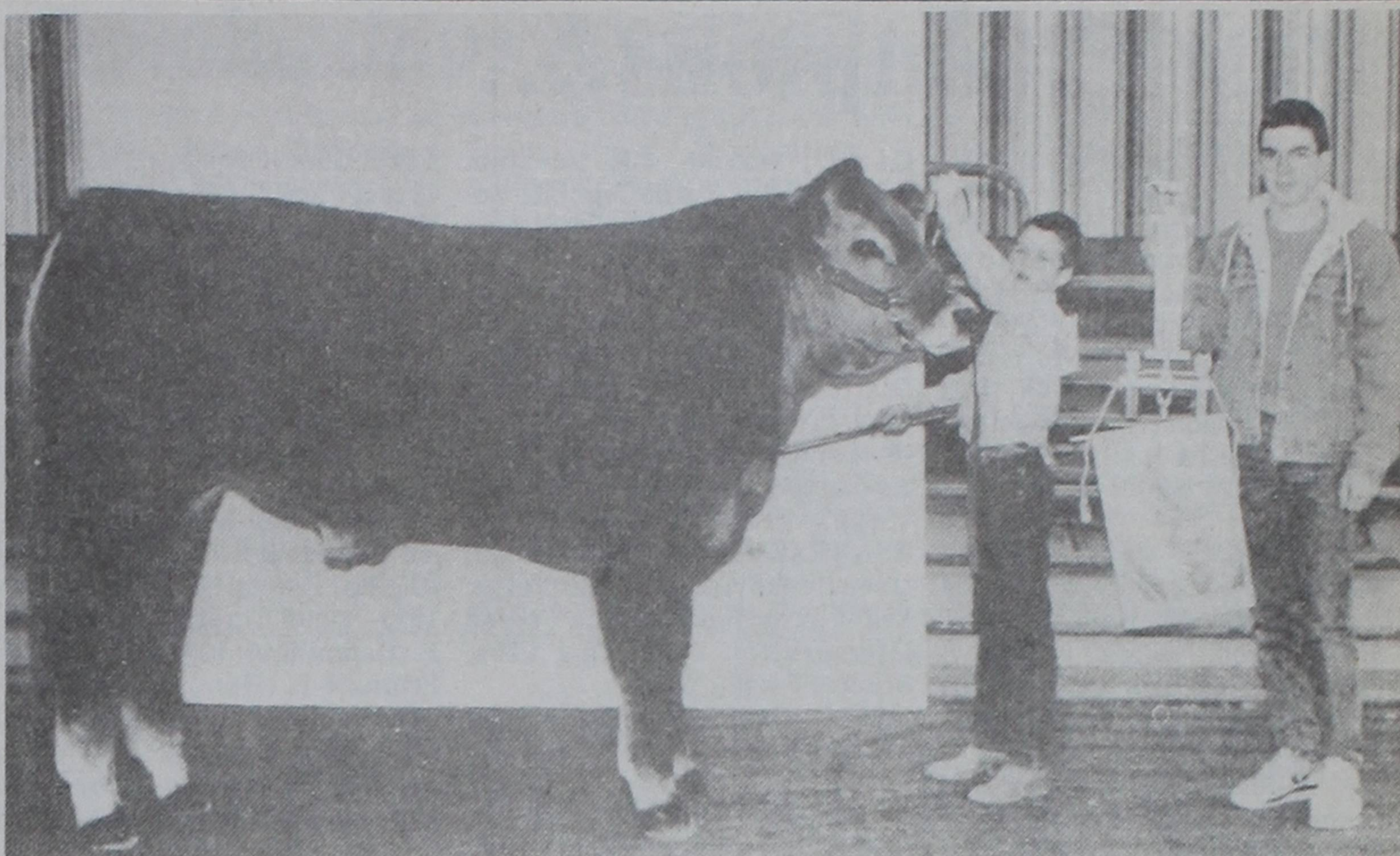

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SPS To Decrease Rates

Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) has agreed to an average 10.2% or \$6.4 million a year, reduction in electric rates for several of its wholesale customers. The decrease will be effective back to January 1.

Reaching final or tentative agreement with SPS on new, lower rates were Central Valley Electric Cooperative of Artesia, N.M.; Farmers' Electric Cooperative of Clovis, N.M.; Lea County Electric Cooperative of Lovington, N.M.; Roosevelt County Electric Cooperative of Portales, N.M.; Lyntegar Electric Cooperative of Tahoka, Texas; the municipal electric systems of Lubbock, Tulia, Floydada and Brownfield, Texas; and Texas-New Mexico Power Company, which serves several communities in the Texas Panhandle and southern New Mexico.

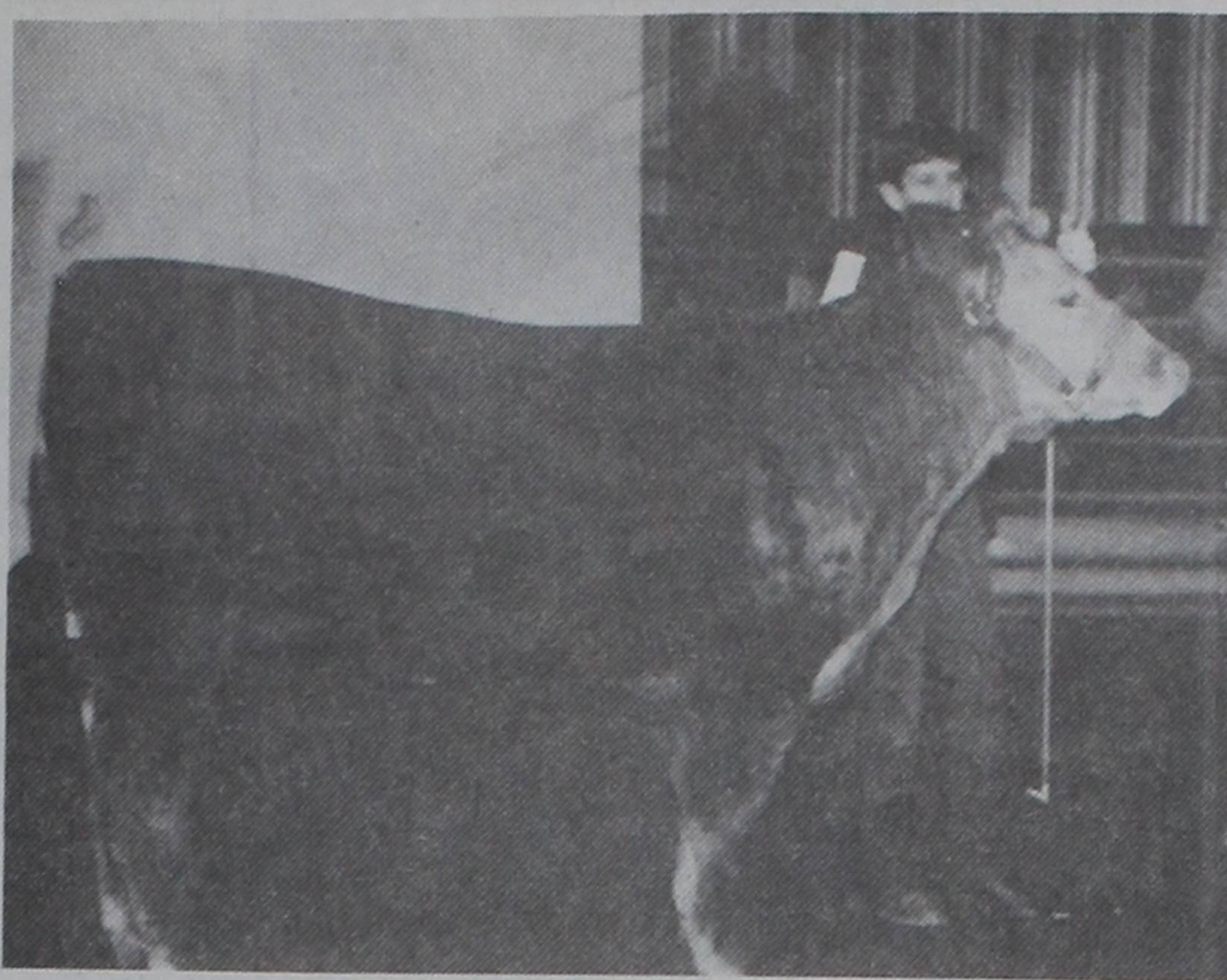
The rate decrease was made possible by a reduction in SPS's purchased-power expenses, lower capital costs and lower federal income taxes, said Gary Gibson, SPS vice president of marketing. The same savings are being passed on to SPS's residential, commercial, industrial and other retail customers.

The wholesale rate agreements establish a long-term irrigation rate that allows the cooperatives to exceed targeted peak power demands without increasing their cost of electricity per kilowatt hour or having to interrupt service to irrigation customers except when specifically requested by SPS.

The agreements also specify that SPS will provide power to the wholesale customers for at least ten years.

SPS has offered a rate decrease under similar terms and conditions to Golden Spread Electric Cooperative of Amarillo, which represents eleven cooperatives.

Golden Spread has elected to pursue before the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) its request for a 9.6% rate decrease that would not include a long-term agreement with SPS.

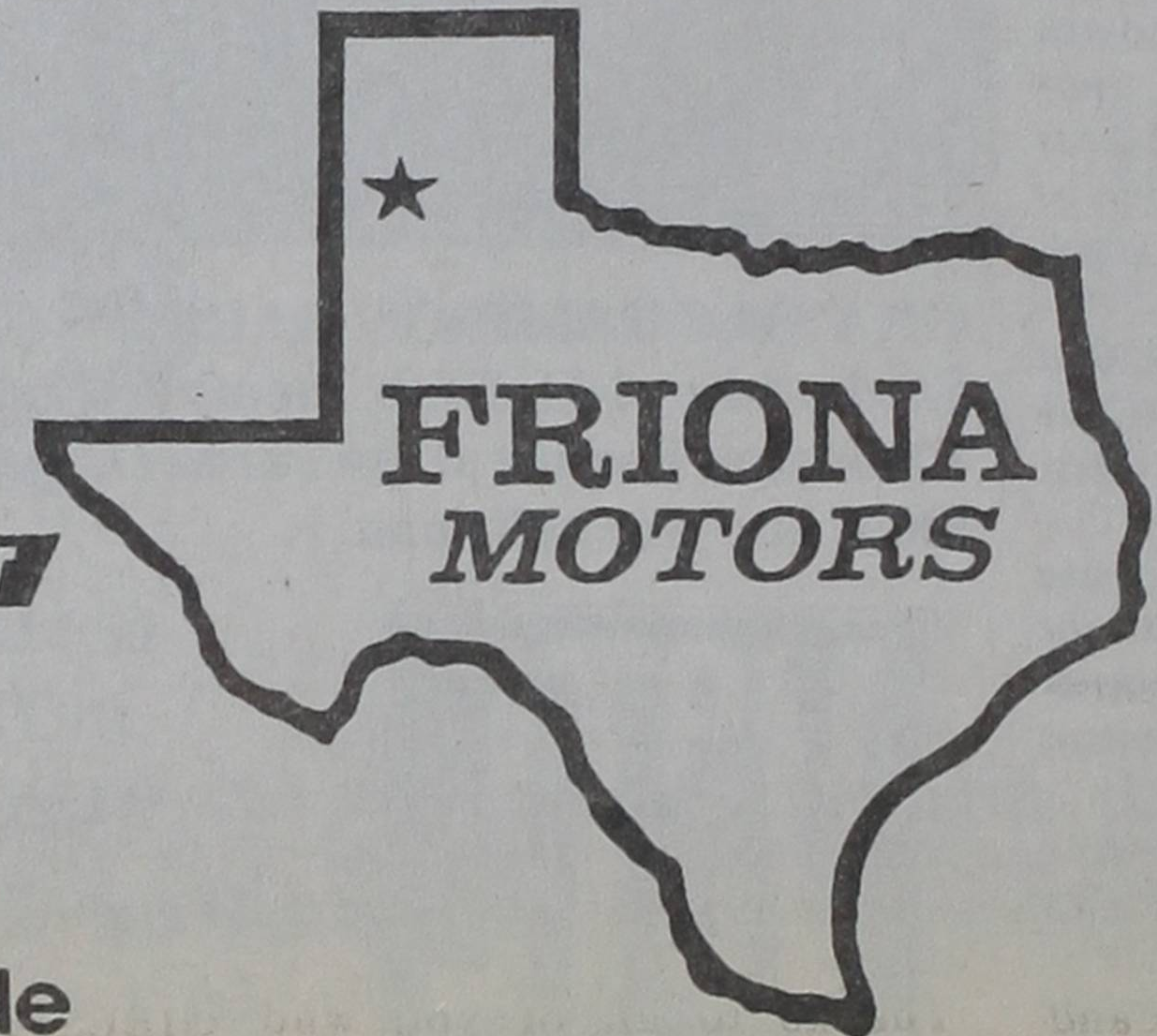

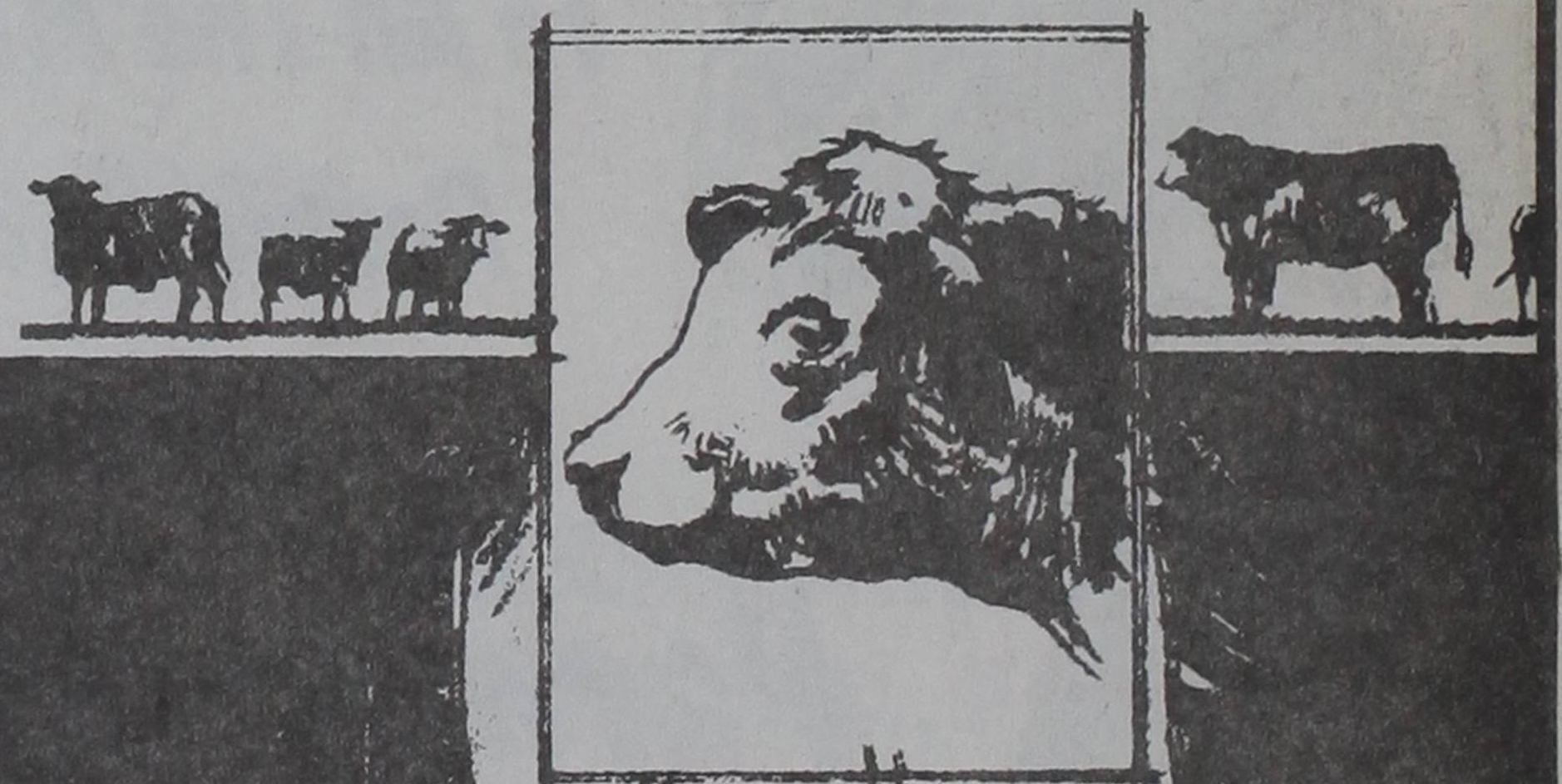

Illiterate or Aliterate? Since 1990 has been designated as the "Year of Literacy" and while illiteracy has been a much publicized topic, another matter which is probably a worse disgrace than illiteracy or aliteracy--knowing how to read, but choosing not to.

Up to 40% of teenagers and young adults fail to read one book a year while 44% of adults and 70% of adults over 65 are in the same category. Illiteracy PREVENTS more than 20% of American adults from reading, but over 40% of us are just not using our ability to read.

Speaking of reading or not reading, the results of the "Reader's Poll" we conducted during 1989 are not as broad-based as I would have liked, but they are interesting and do hopefully represent a sampling of our community's reading tastes/habits.

Categories were: best book you have ever read, book which most influenced your life, favorite type of reading material, favorite part of the newspaper, and favorite magazine.

Results were: adults, best book--"Gone With the Wind" (great variety; very few alike); most influential--Bible (90%); favorite type--fiction and by far historical fiction; newspaper part--front page/editorial.

High School, best book--"Princess Bride" (good variety, but about 20% named "Princess Bride"); most influential--undecided/Bible; favorite type--fiction/adventure; newspaper part--comics/sports; magazine--"Sports Illustrated"/"Seventeen."

Junior High, best book--"Charlie Brown"/"Snoopy"; most influential--undecided/Bible; a distant second; favorite type--fiction/romance; favorite newspaper part--comics/sports; favorite magazine--"Sports Illustrated"/"Teen."

Thanks to all of you who participated in the survey and

especially to the schools and English teachers for their help with the project.

During the month of December, we loaned 1494 items to 668 patrons and welcomed 11 new patrons; 34 children attended two sessions of Story Hour with volunteers, Becky Perkins and Susan Gonzales, helping with the December programs. Our Library loaned 6 books interlibrary and borrowed 46. Adult Basic Education tutors and students met ten hours in the Library.

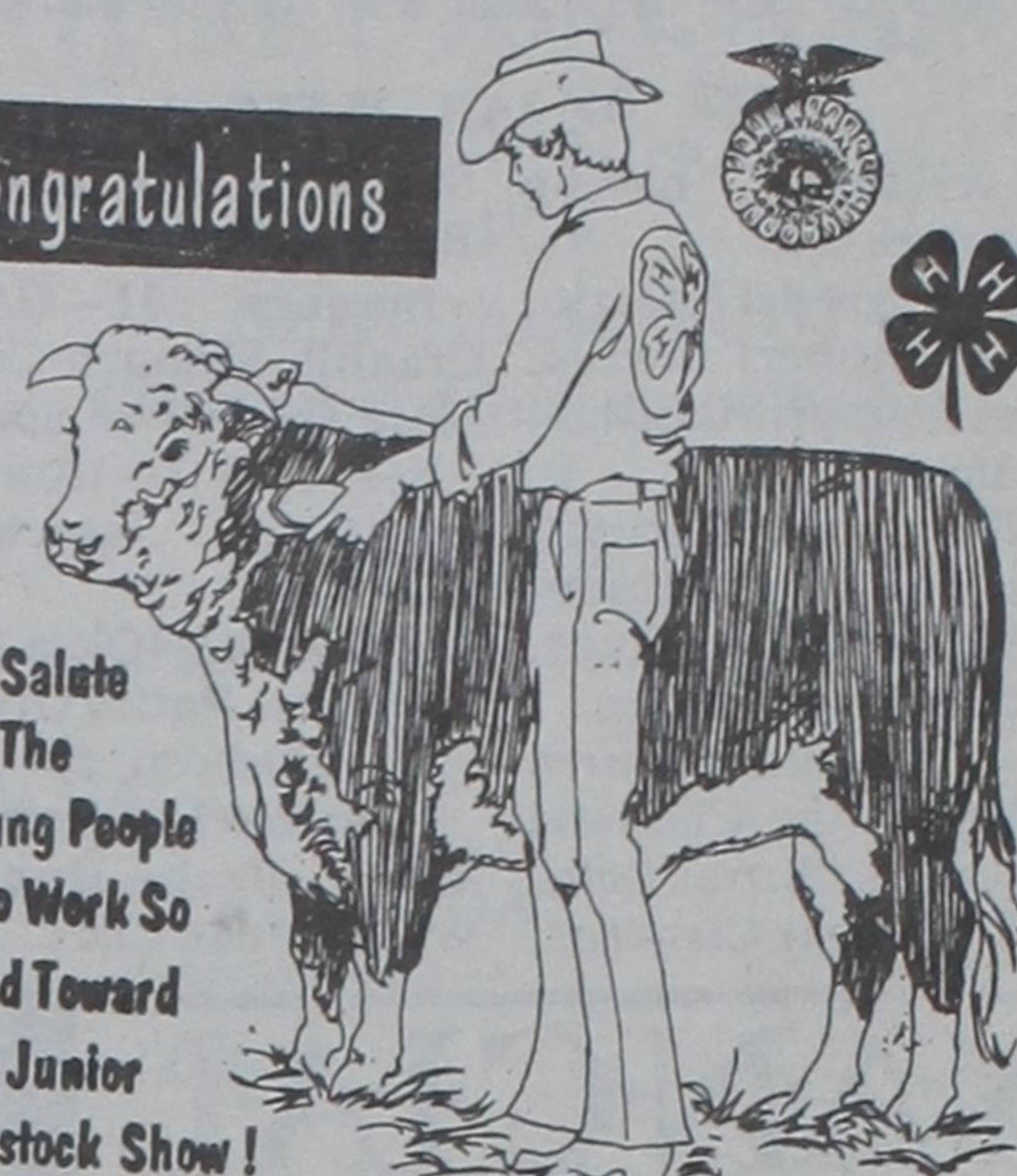

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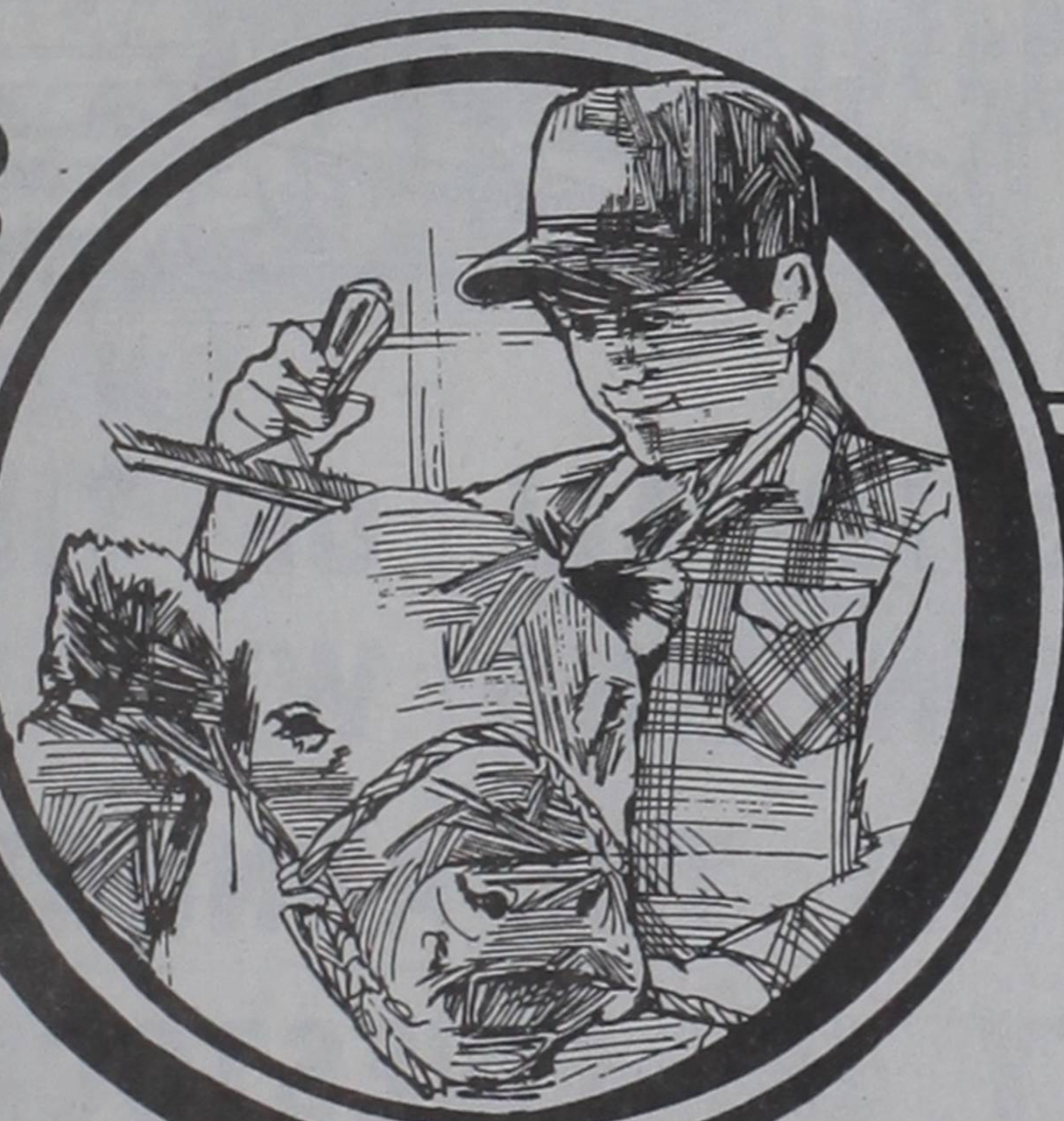

It's estimated that estate taxes affect roughly 10 percent of our population. As income and personal wealth increase in this nation, that percentage could rise.

If the joint estate of you and your spouse is approaching \$1 million, you need to begin some serious financial planning.

Although that number may appear high, you could be closer than you think. Many fail to realize an estate consists of everything one owns. That includes home, property, securities, savings, business interests and a long list of items you may never consider. Often, property, securities or a business has appreciated beyond expectations. When valued as part of an estate, they could present serious tax consequences to your heirs.

The problem could be compounded by the fact that many assets have a limited market. For example, a prospering family business without the leadership of its owner/manager could not only lose a portion of its value but also limit the number of prospective buyers. Unfortunately, the IRS does not always consider these problems when assets are appraised for estate purposes. The only time these potential problems can be effectively resolved is prior to the estate owner's death.

The first rule of any serious estate planning is to select a competent tax attorney. This does not mean letting your fingers do the walking through the telephone directory. Make certain the attorney you select is knowledgeable and current in tax law. A good starting point is to ask your respected friends and associates for recommendations. Then, after doing your homework and armed with the proper questions, arrange an interview. You may wish to interview several attorneys before making your selection.

Once that decision has been made, there are several key estate-

planning questions you should explore. These vary depending on your state of residence and your wishes as to the distribution of your estate.

For example, if you plan on leaving a portion of your estate to a favorite charity or institution, charitable lead trusts and charitable remainder trusts are two options.

With a lead trust, the income is designated to a charity for a specified time and then reverts to a named beneficiary. With the remainder trust, the income first goes to a named beneficiary and is then remaindered to the charity. Both can benefit your estate, but neither should be attempted without your full understanding and the counsel of an attorney.

If you're more family oriented and wish your estate to pass to your descendants, this can be accomplished through insurance trusts.

With an unfunded trust, the life insurance policy is irrevocably transferred and the premiums paid by the trustee. With a funded trust, there's a transfer of the policy and enough money or income-producing assets to pay the premiums.

Restrictions apply to both of these plans, so ask your attorney to explain them in detail.

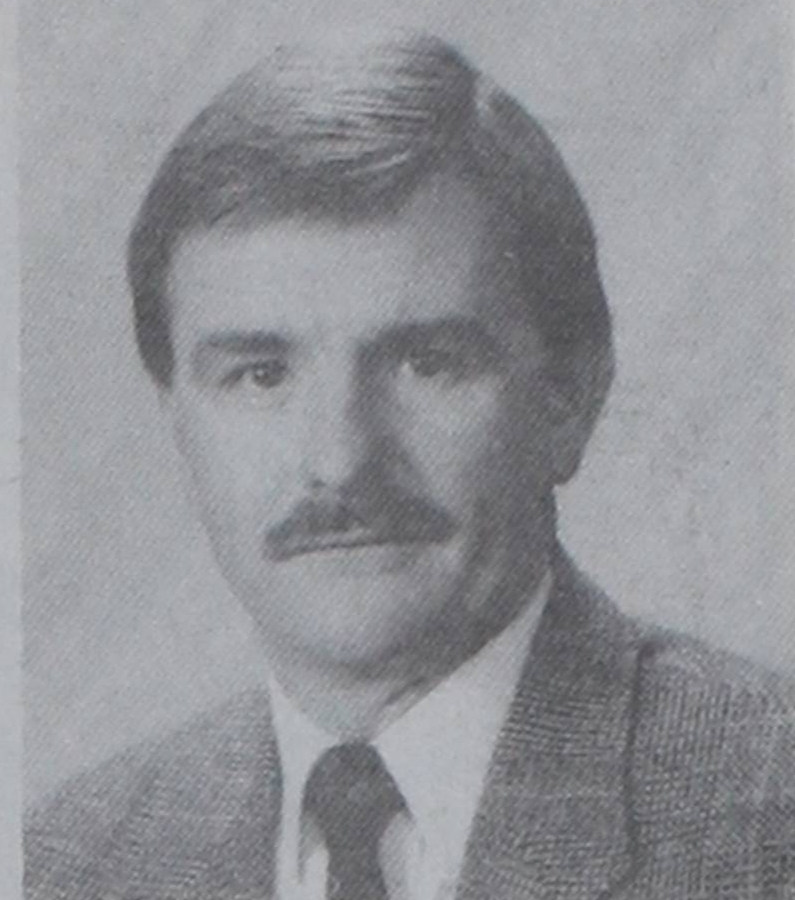
Ex-Resident Gets Degree

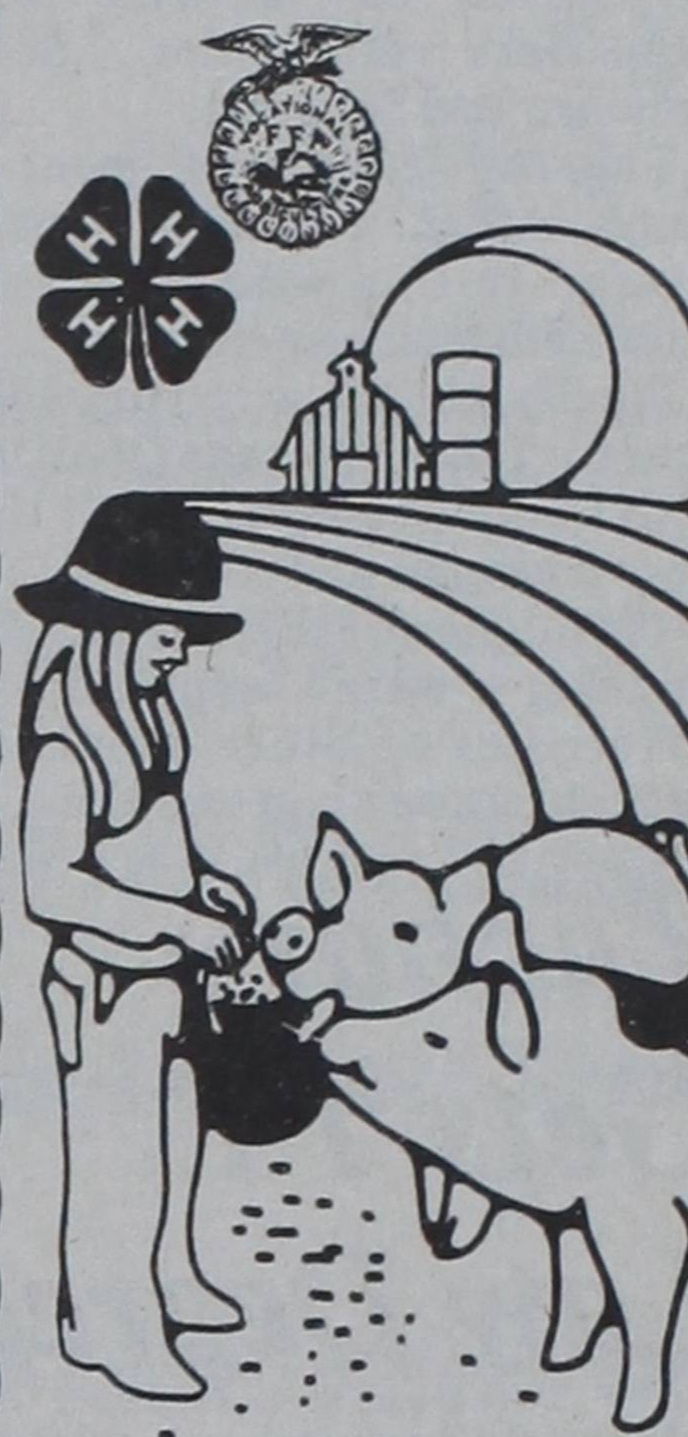

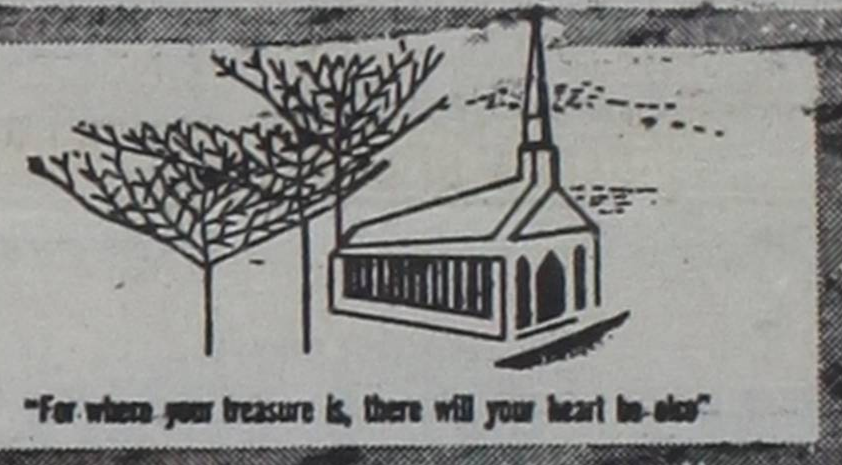

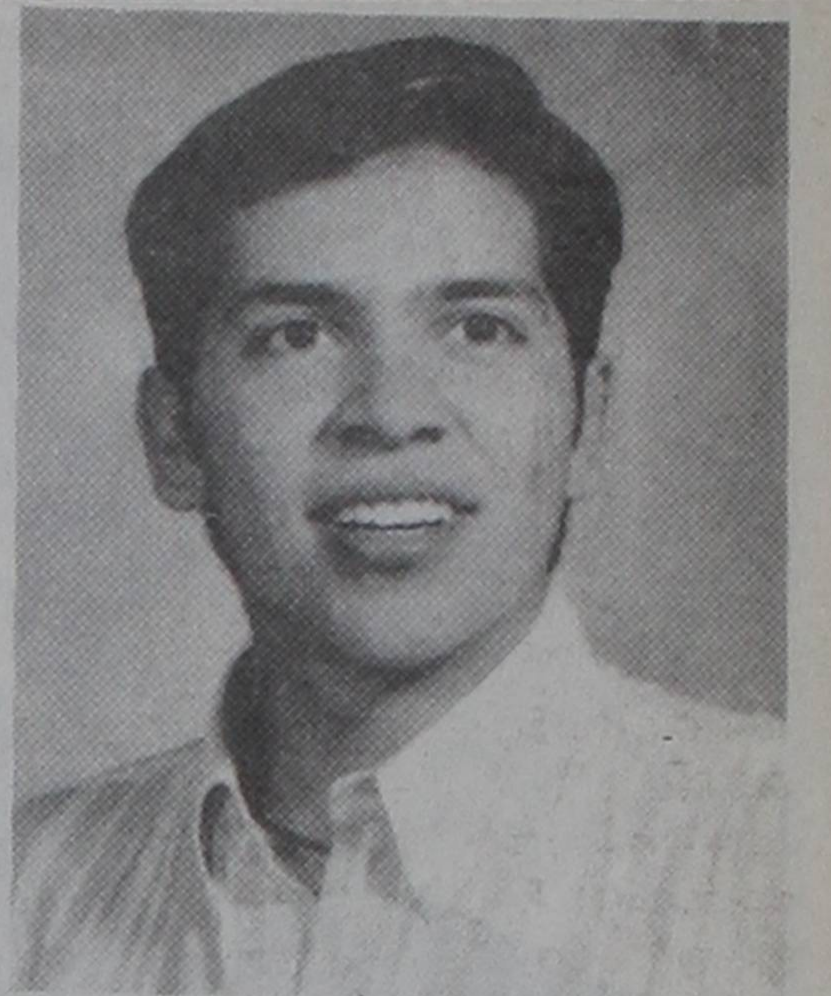
He was named Most Likely to Succeed his junior year; and also was Student of the Month in March, 1989. He has made the 90 or above list three years in high school.

Following graduation he plans to attend the University of Texas at Austin, majoring in broadcast journalism.

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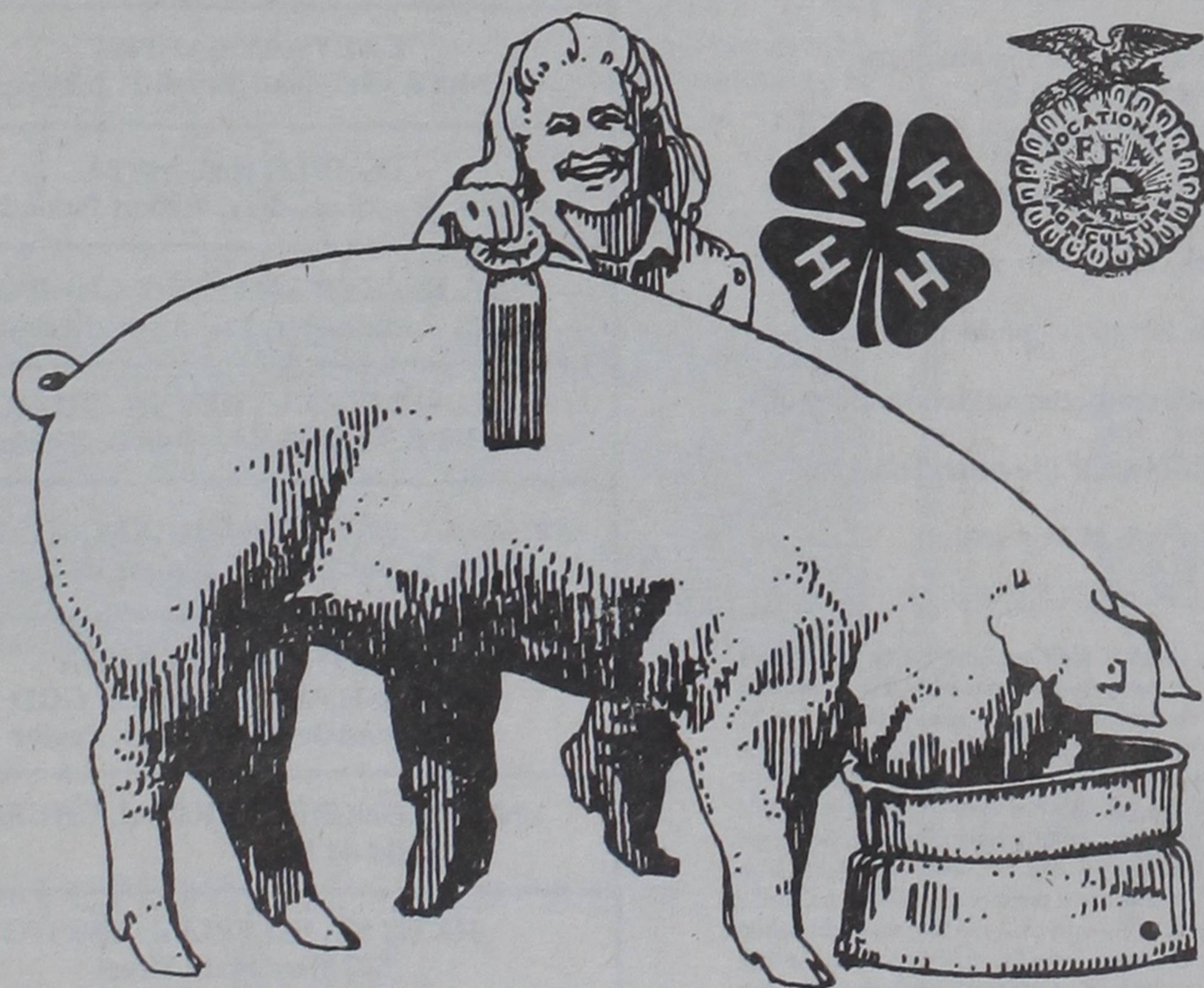
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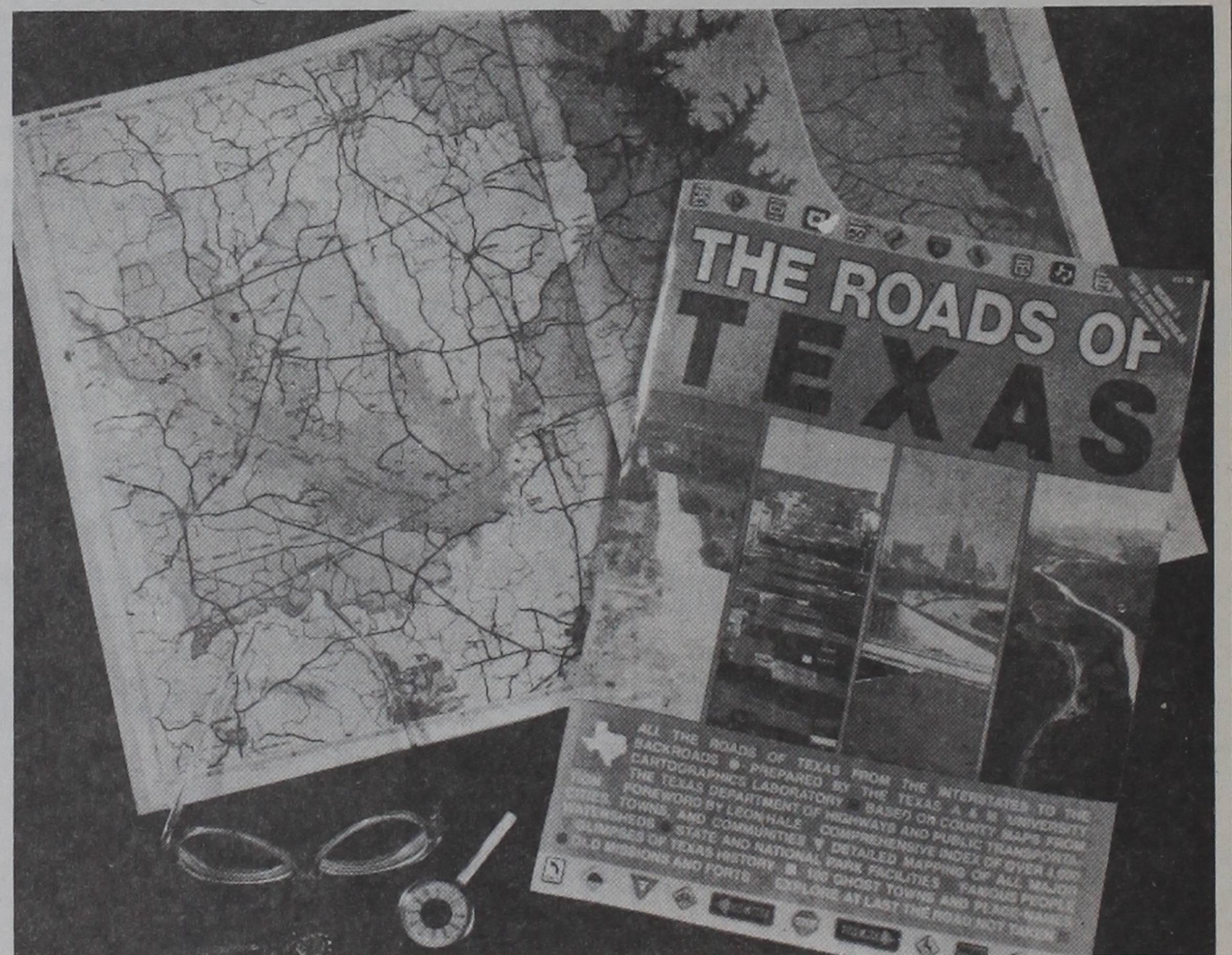


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Town Talk
