Hance Support Urged Saturday

Local politics have been considerably quiet as pertains to the primary elections, and it may be that as a result the voter turnout on Saturday may be lighter than it should be.

However, voters have a valid reason for turning out, in that fellow West Texan and neighbor Kent Hance is seeking the governor's nomination, in the Republican primary.

Voters are reminded that they can vote in the Republican primary whether or not they have ever participated in that primary. If they have always voted in the Democratic primary, they are NOT "registered as Democrats."

If they vote for no other reason, area voters are urged to turn out on Saturday and give Hance their backing. Residents of the area have been vocal in their criticism lately of Governor Mark White.

If you really mean what you've been saying, Saturday affords everyone a chance to do something about it.

Be sure to cast your vote on Saturday. Take part in the election process. Then, go back at 7:15 and attend your precinct convention. This is democracy at the grassroots level.

FHS Athletes Are In Regional Meet

Friona High School athletes are competing in the Region I track and field meet this weekend at Odessa, the reward for placing first or second in their events in the recent district meet.

The events are being held at the Ector County Independent School District's track, which is described as "an excellent facility."

Five members of the Friona Squaws' team, plus an alternate, (Sindy Preston) are making the trip, and will compete in four events.

Ronda Ratcliff was to begin the competition for the FHS delegation, in the high jump beginning at 11 a.m. Friday.

Preliminaries in the running events start at 3 p.m. Friday, with finals starting at 1 p.m. on Saturday.

Lacye Osborn, with one of the top times in this area in the 800-meter run, will have her preliminary race on Friday.

The squad's 800-meter relay and mile-relay team will also compete.

On the 800-meter team, Dara Wells has been given a leg on the relay, replacing Miss Osborn, who will compete in two other events.

at Levelland last Saturday, Mika Maddox came up sick, and the 800-meter team ran with both Miss Wells and the team's alternate, Sindy Preston, and still placed fourth in the finals, with all classes of teams competing.

Other members of the team are Miss Ratcliff and Susan Bailey.

The mile relay foursome (Misses Maddox, Ratcliff, Bailey and Osborn) will also compete at Odessa. This group came in sixth at Levelland, with Miss Osborn posting Friona's only win, in the 800-meter race.

On the boys' side of the ledger, Rodney Britting was to compete in the pole vault event starting at 1 p.m. It was revealed prior to the meet that there are six boys in the region who have cleared 15 feet in the event this spring.

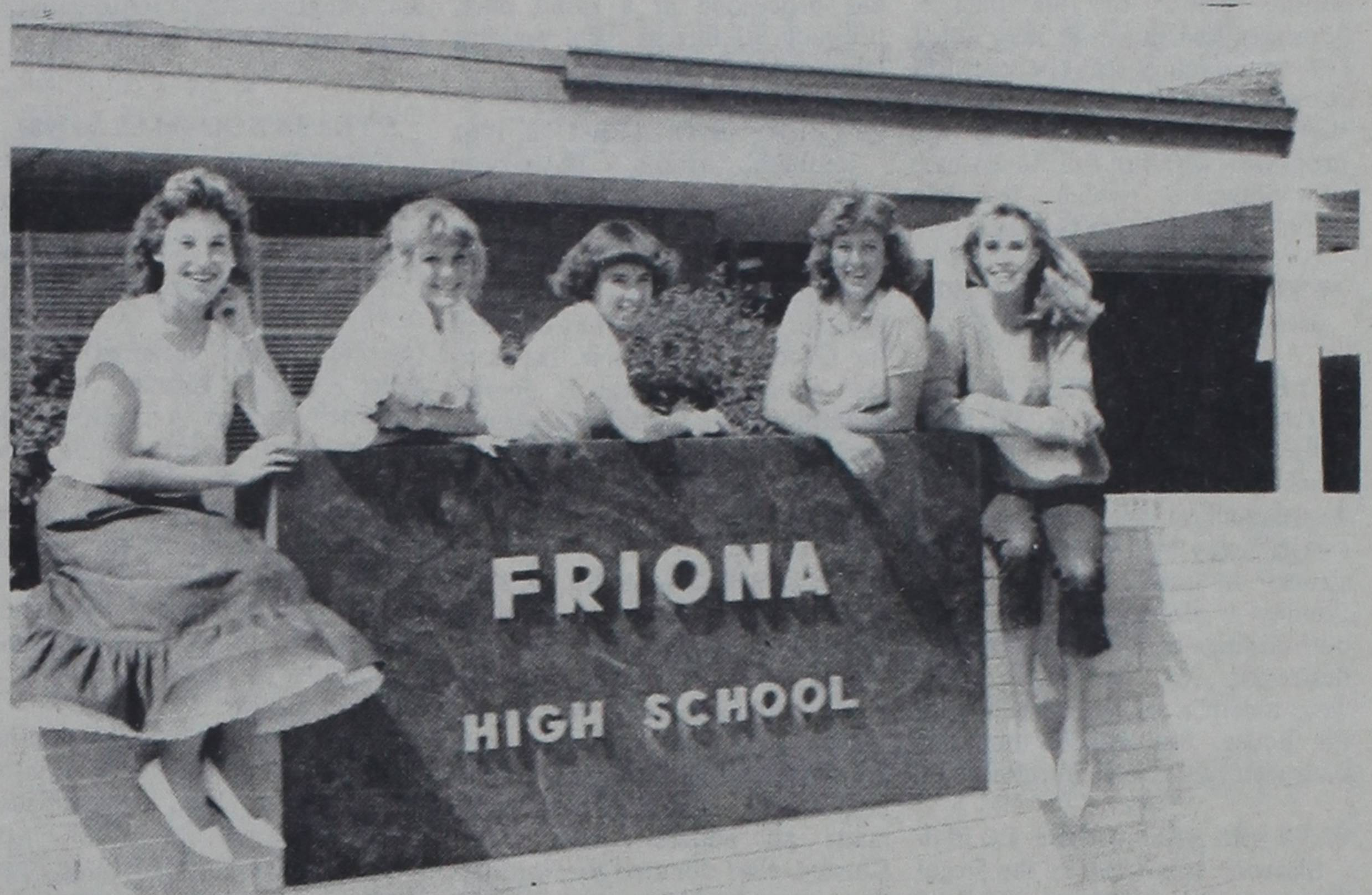
The regional record in the pole vault is 14-6, and is a virtual certainty to fall. River Road's Brooks cleared 15-6 this past weekend. Britting set a new FHS record with his best competition vault of 14 feet earlier this season.

Shy Burney also has his work cut out in the high jump. His best mark is 6-4, and several in the regional meet have cleared 6-6.

Coach Steve Williams said that Burney has been slowed recently with an injury to the heel of the foot he plants on his jump, but that the heel was improved going into the regional meet.

At the Levelland meet, Burney cleared 6-2, and Britting went 13 feet for second place.

Also competing at regional will be Leroy Mercado in the 300-meter intermediate hurdles.

Governor's Race Is Primary Highlight

Friona area residents will go to the polls to help nominate a governor and other state and county officials, as the Democratic and Republican Primaries are held on Saturday, May 3.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m.

Some local residents (those in Precinct 2-2) will have the opportunity to vote for a county commissioner and a justice of the peace, if they take part in the Democratic Primary.

Three names are on the ballot in the commissioner's race in that voting precinct: Lawrence Widner, Don Murphy and Thomas Ware.

Four candidates are seeking the justice of the peace office. Incumbent Wayne Spears is opposed by Bonnie Clayton, Norbert Schueler and A.T. (Buster) Morgan.

In other county races, County Judge Porter Roberts is challenged by Brenda Miller. County

Treasurer Benna Felts Tarter is retiring, and her office is sought by Jerry L. Davis and Anne G. Norton.

There is no name on the ballot for County Democratic party chairman, but a movement has been started to write in the name of longtime Democratic leader Wendol Christian of Oklahoma Lane for the office.

Two names are on the ballot for the Demo nomination for U.S. Representative, 19th District. They are Gerald McCathern and Mary Nell Mathis. McCathern, a Hereford farmer, is well-known in this area for his work on behalf of farmers, particularly in the American Agriculture Movement. Mrs. Mathis is a CPA from Lubbock.

Governor Mark White has drawn five opponents on the Democratic ballot. Among these are Andrew C. Briscoe III, a cousin of former governor Dolph Briscoe, and Ron Slover of Amarillo, an advocate for the Panhandle's oil and gas industry.

Other Democratic hopefuls in the governor's race are A. Don Crowder, Bobby Locke and Sheila Bilyeu. Crowder has been the most flamboyant of the Demo hopefuls, openly attacking White.

For instance, he has called a piece of clear plastic an X-Ray of White's head. He's also called the governor "one of the first nerds in Texas," a "scumball," and "a low-life scumball." He also gets

notice by saying whoever wins will have to raise taxes or pass a state lottery.

Lieutenant Governor Bill Hobby has one opponent, David Young. Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower is opposed by Noel S. Cowling.

(For names of candidates in the other state offices, see the sample ballot printed elsewhere in this issue).

The governor's race is the main draw in the Republican primary, where three candidates have been slugging it out for the opportunity to oppose Mark White in November.

The candidates are former Congressman Kent Hance of Dimmitt, former governor Bill Clements and Congressman Tom Loeffler. Hance has always been a favorite in this area, and this is his first race since swapping parties after his close statewide race for the U.S. Senate.

Four candidates seek the nomination for lieutenant governor in the Republican primary. They are David Davidson, founder of a non-denominational Emmanuel Fellowship Church at Gonzales; District Judge Virgil Mulanax of Gilmer; Glenn Jackson of San Antonio, a self-employed instructor of applicants for real estate and insurance licensing exams; and Aaron Bullock of

According to a study in *The New England Journal of Medicine*, over 80 per cent of these people "have serious sleep disruption (insomnia at home and sleepiness at work)," which lowers their productivity as well as the quality of their lives. The study also cites a higher risk of cardiovascular and digestive tract diseases among these workers.

These problems, however, can be alleviated by applying our knowledge of the circadian rhythms. In one experiment at a Utah potash mine and processing plant, workers had been advancing from day to evening to night shifts on a weekly basis, a grueling procedure that would have affected them rather like flying eastward around the world in three hops, departing every Monday.

But when they were allowed to stay on one shift for three-week

55 YEARS AGO--APRIL 17, 1931

The Texan Theatre has installed new talking equipment which has made a wonderful difference in the sound feature of this theatre. Manager Lee says that now all of the tone values of the pictures shown are clear and distinct and that patrons are enjoying the programs without the annoyance of vibrations which formerly disturbed them in the theatre.

50 YEARS AGO--APRIL 17, 1936

Issue missing in Star files.

45 YEARS AGO--APRIL 18, 1941

The farm home of Mr. and Mrs. Wilson Wylie, some 15 miles northwest of Friona, was totally destroyed and all of its contents carried away by a severe wind that struck it about four o'clock Sunday morning. All the outbuildings except one were also destroyed. Mr. and Mrs. Wylie were blown a short distance from the house, but neither they nor their small child were hurt badly.

40 YEARS AGO--APRIL 19, 1946

Showing this week at the Regal Theatre: Jack London's "Call of the Wild," with Jack Oakie. Also, Gene Tierney, Dana Andrews and Clifton Webb in "Laura."

35 YEARS AGO--APRIL 12, 1951

Measles, mumps and throat infections have this week taken their toll in absentees from the local school system, with 88 grade school students and four high school students being absent yesterday. Though hampering classroom activity, the epidemic has not been termed of a nature severe enough to warrant any closing of school, the officials state. Parmer County Hospital has also been filled to capacity almost all week.

30 YEARS AGO--APRIL 13, 1956

One of the larger real estate transactions recorded within the Friona city limits was completed this week with the sale of all undeveloped property within the Lakeside Addition to Carl G. McCaslin of Hereford. The

Lakeside and Staley Additions were each commenced last year at a time of acute housing shortages in Friona. Building in both locations has proceeded at a rapid pace, probably as fast as local building labor could proceed.

25 YEARS AGO--APRIL 13, 1961

Kenneth Miller, 28-year-old head coach at Groom High School, was selected from 15 applications Monday night to become Friona High School's head football coach. Miller has coached the Groom High School Tigers to two consecutive Class B district championships. Miller replaces Earl Smith, who resigned recently after two years as the Friona head coach.

20 YEARS AGO--APRIL 14, 1966

A large crowd attended dedication services for the new Friona Masonic Lodge Monday. H.W. Fullingim, Most Worshipful Master of Masons in Texas, made the dedication address. Jack Hightower, grand orator, also made an address. Mrs. Pearl Kinsley, who donated the land for the new building and \$5,000 toward its construction, attended the cornerstone laying.

15 YEARS AGO--APRIL 15, 1971

Parmer County Commissioners voted Monday to join the cities of Friona and Bovina in paying a monthly subsidy to Claborn Ambulance Service, thus assuring that Parmer County would continue to have a qualified ambulance service. Commissioners, after an hour of heated debate, passed a motion by a 3-1 vote to make a monthly payment of \$420 to defray losses Claborn said he was incurring. The City of Friona had earlier agreed to pay \$200 monthly, and Bovina had indicated it would pay \$100.

10 YEARS AGO--APRIL 11, 1976

In one of the best voter turnouts in recent years, Floyd Reeve, George Frye and Teddy Fangman were elected to the Friona School Board last Saturday. A total of 560 voters marked their ballot, an

increase of 139 from the voter turnout in 1975. Reeve, the only incumbent running, led the voting with 403. Frye received 233 votes and Fangman 226 votes to gain the other two seats up for election.

5 YEARS AGO--MAY 3, 1981

Appointment of Charles Aycock, Farwell attorney, as County Attorney, highlighted the regular session of the Parmer County Commissioners meeting April 27 in Farwell. A letter of resignation was accepted by the court from former County Attorney Johnny Atkinson, due to his appointment as the new District Attorney.

Construction is underway on the new school cafeteria for Friona Junior High and Elementary School, and workmen have sandblasted the adjacent auditorium-gymnasium to give the bricks a new appearance.

Five students will compete in the state UIL meet following wins in the regional UIL events last weekend. Competing at state will be Janette Reed, newswriting; Pam Perez, regional shorthand champion; Mark Zachary and Mark Blankenship, regional debate champs (defending state champions); and Sherry O'Brian, who qualified in the 400-meter dash in track.

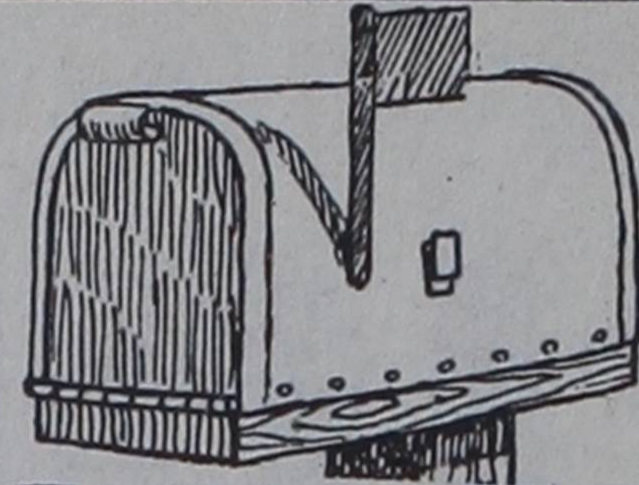

Farmers Reminded Of Spray Rules

The Texas Department of Agriculture would like to remind those persons who wish to apply hormone-type herbicides in Parmer County, that the herbicide regulations adopted by the commissioners of Parmer County, became effective April 1, 1986.

The special provisions of the herbicide regulations state, "No permit or permit fee is required in Parmer County for spraying hormone-type herbicides between November 1 and March 31 each year. However, the use of all ester formulations of 2,4-D are prohibited between the dates of April 15 and October 1 of each year."

Hormone-type herbicides that are regulated by the Texas Herbicide Law include, but is not limited to 2,4-D, dicamba (Banvel) and derivatives and formulations containing these substances.

A permit must be obtained from the Texas Department of Agriculture prior to the application of any hormone-type herbicide in Parmer County, beginning April 1, 1986. A permit fee of ten cents per acre will be charged for each permit. Permits expire when the acreage for which

the permit was granted has been sprayed, or after 180 days.

Commercial applicators should remember that equipment used to apply hormone-type herbicides must be inspected by the Texas Department of Agriculture before the equipment is to be used. Ground equipment used commercially must be inspected once each year. Aerial equipment must be inspected every 30 days while the equipment is being used for application of regulated herbicides. An inspection fee of \$20.00 will be charged for each piece of equipment inspected.

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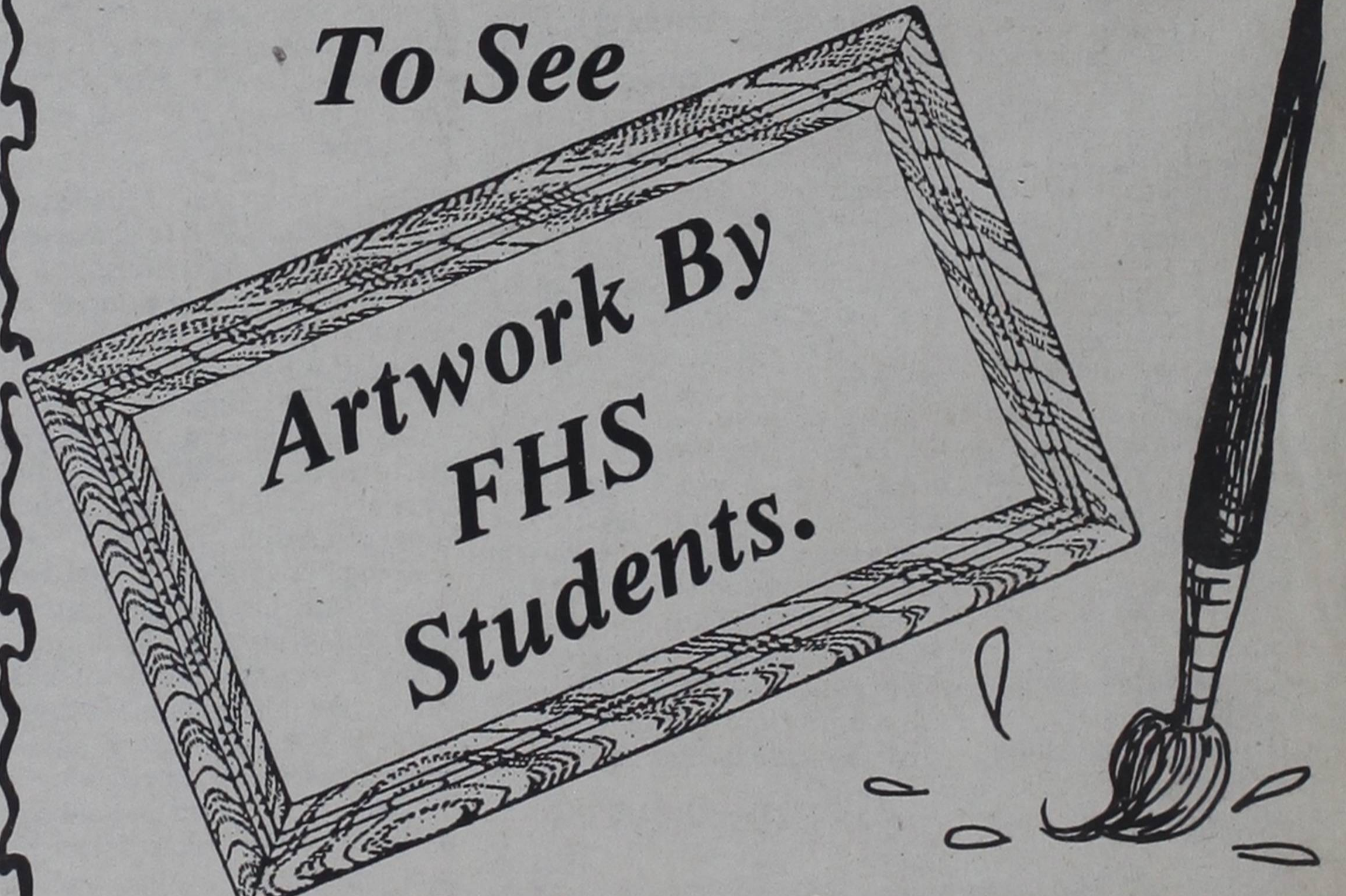

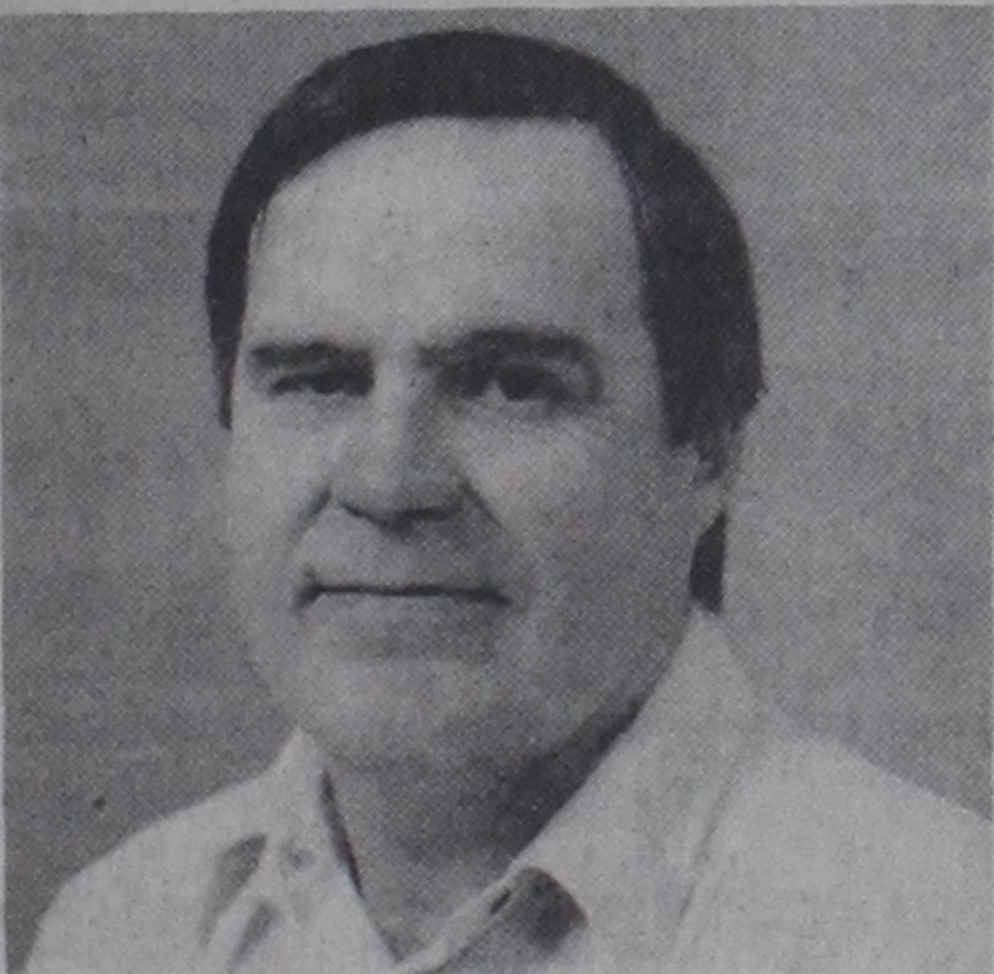

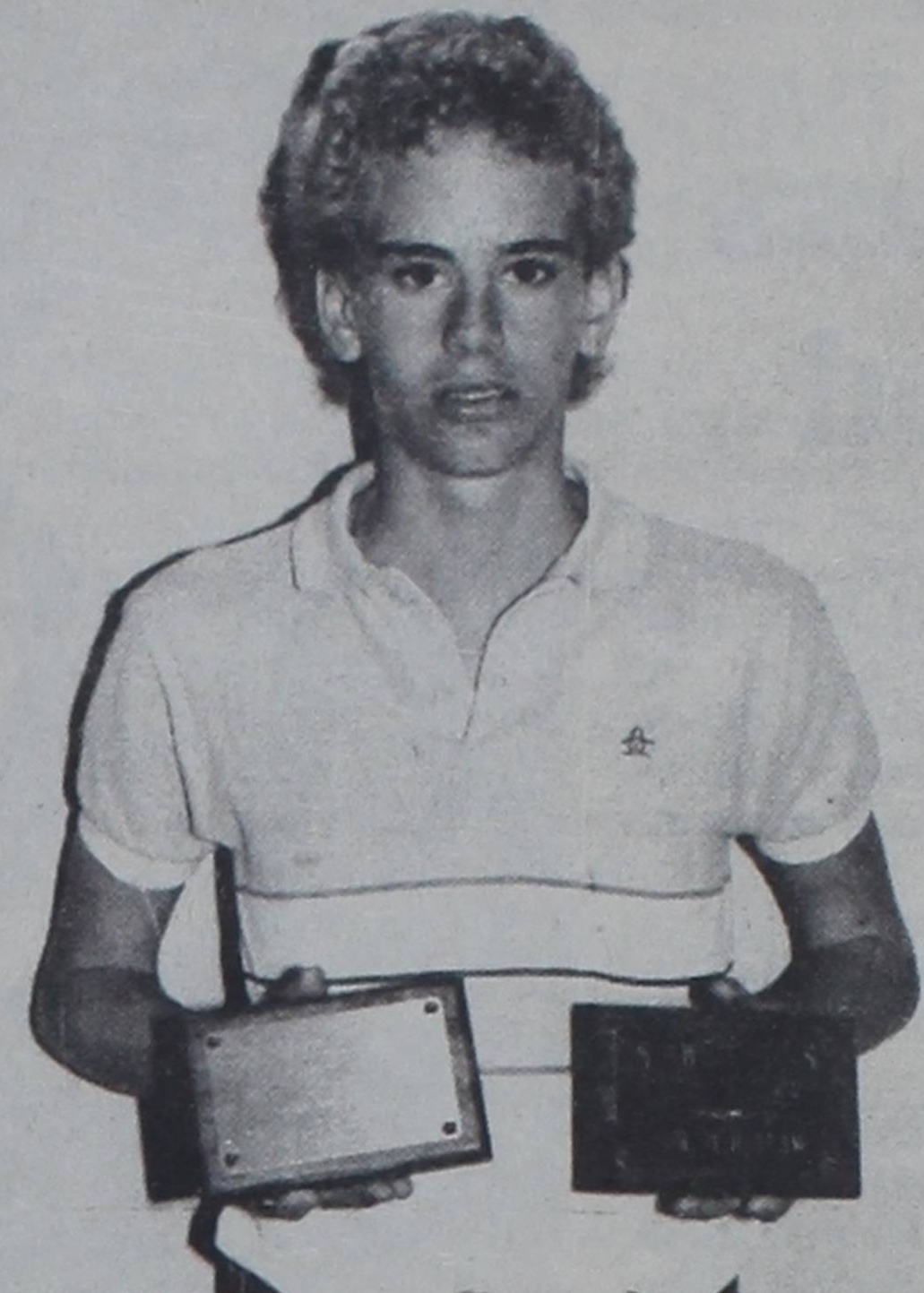

Letter To The Editor

Dear Bill Ellis,

In your issue of April 27, 1986, you stated that one of your insurance friends warned you of term insurance. I wonder how much research you did on the A.L. 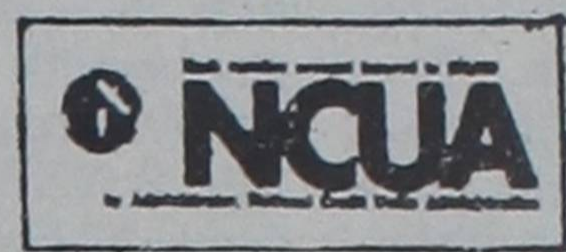

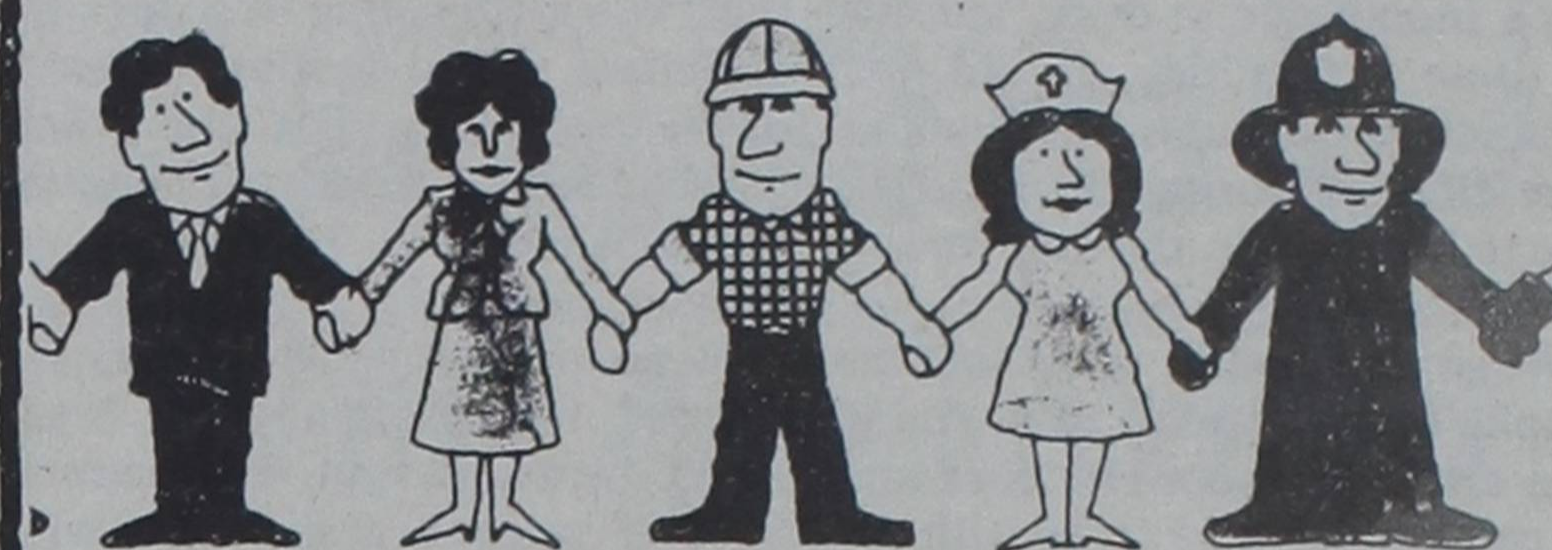

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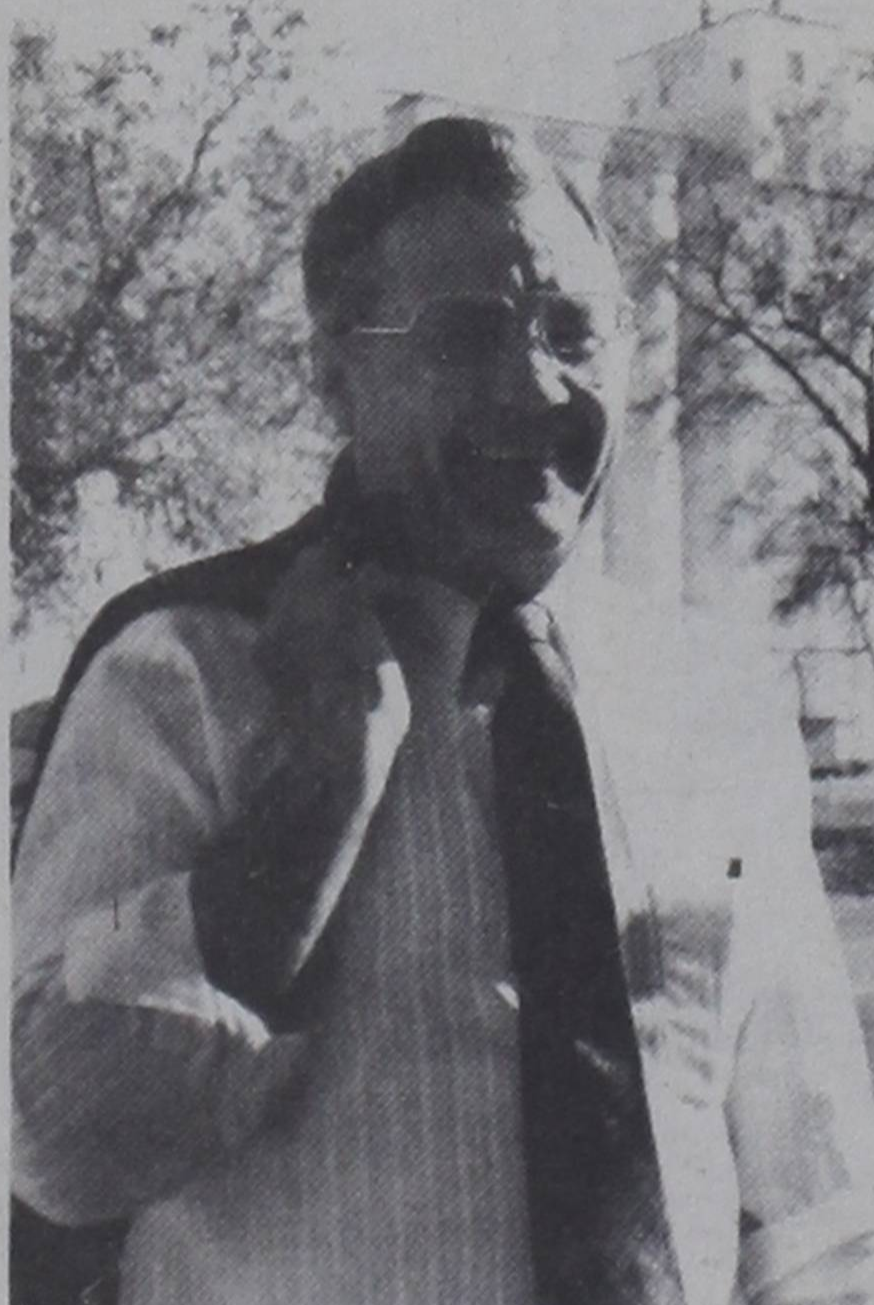

Couple In Visit To Texas Wagon Train

Texas' one hundred fiftieth celebration is taking many faces. Different areas of the state are celebrating in various ways, but the most publicized is the Sesquicentennial Wagon Train.

We found the wagon train camped at the Junction, Texas fairgrounds just below a high bluff called 'Lover's Leap.' The Texas Flag waved proudly at the peak of the bluff. The wagons were circled around a huge pile of logs as though they were expecting an Indian raid.

In fact, there was to have been a mock Indian raid at dusk, but due to some difficulties, it did not materialize. (I guess the Indians were tired of losing the battles.) Due to high winds, the bonfire was not lighted.

We visited with some of the people of the train. One young man originally from Hereford and his companion were to be with the train two to three weeks. Some have made only one leg of the trip, some a specified time and others will make the complete trip. Many had back-up units consisting of motor homes or campers and an extra team. Others lived in their wagons the complete trip.

That night after a chili supper, a young group of cloggers performed.

After dark, the Texas Flag was lit with spot lights, standing high on the bluff, waving in the wind—a very moving sight. As the crowd stood in silence, someone started singing "The Eyes of Texas Are Upon You," and gradually the whole group joined in.

The Wagon Train had about 75 wagons at this point. Several were sponsored by or entered by businesses, however, the most impressive were individually built and owned.

The group had traveled about 18 miles that day after 'open camp' on the Y.O. Ranch. Before reaching the ranch, they had traveled through the hill country.

Although a bulldozer had cut one swath through the hills for a trail, the wagons found that there were still many obstacles in their way, and it was a rough trail.

Rocks, ravines and hills gave them a small insight of the hardships our ancestors had to overcome. Not many miles were made that day!

One vehicle is a truck driven replica of a school room of that time. It is made of natural wood planks with a belfry, a chimney and shadow box windows.

It is furnished with old style desks, McGuffey readers, about 200 school books to Apple Computers. The 25 students ranging from six to eighteen years old keep a daily log of the trip and continue their education while experiencing the thrill of participating in a once-in-a-lifetime, most exciting semester of their schooling. The school year will conclude June 25 with special commencement exercises in Ponder, Texas.

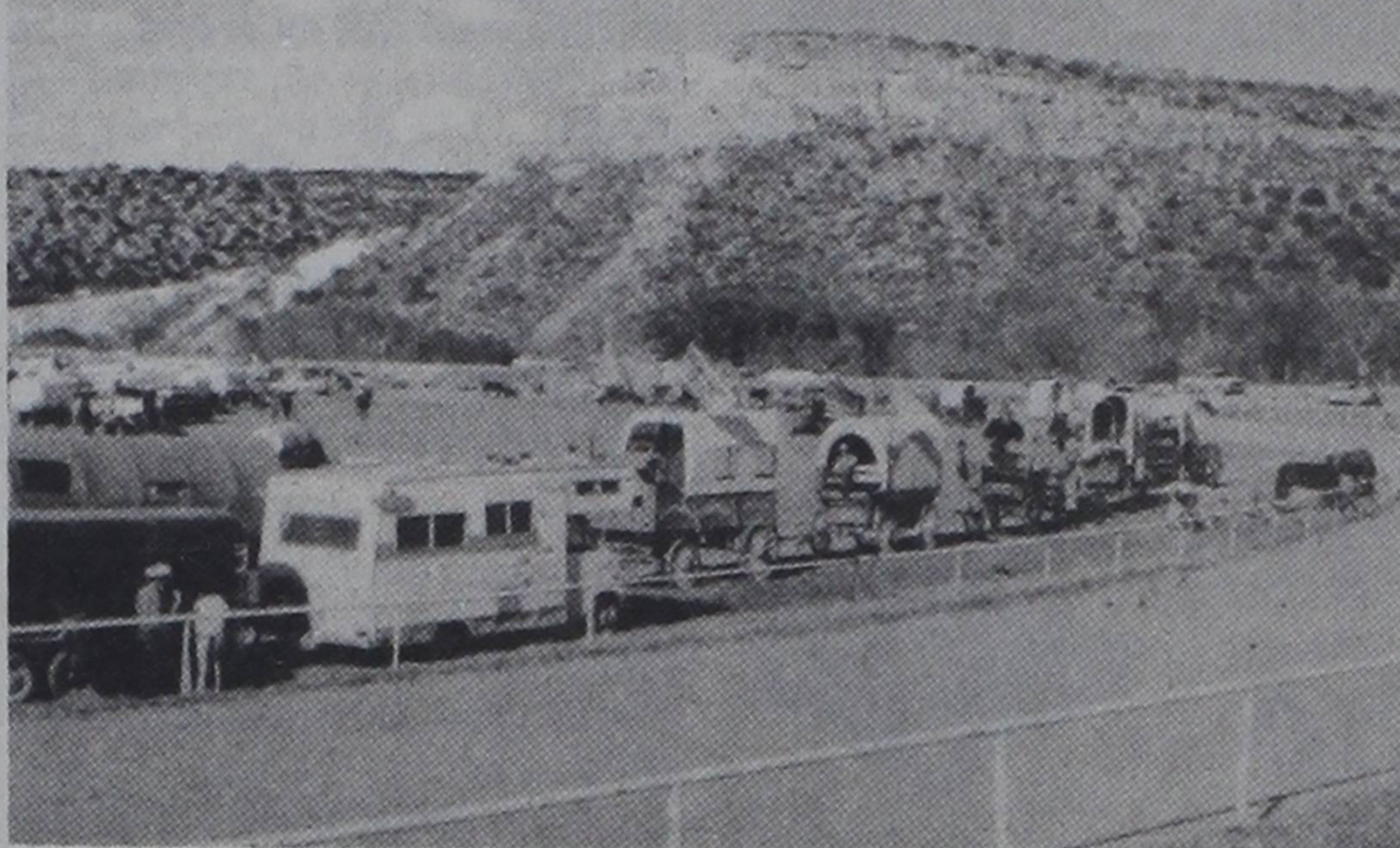
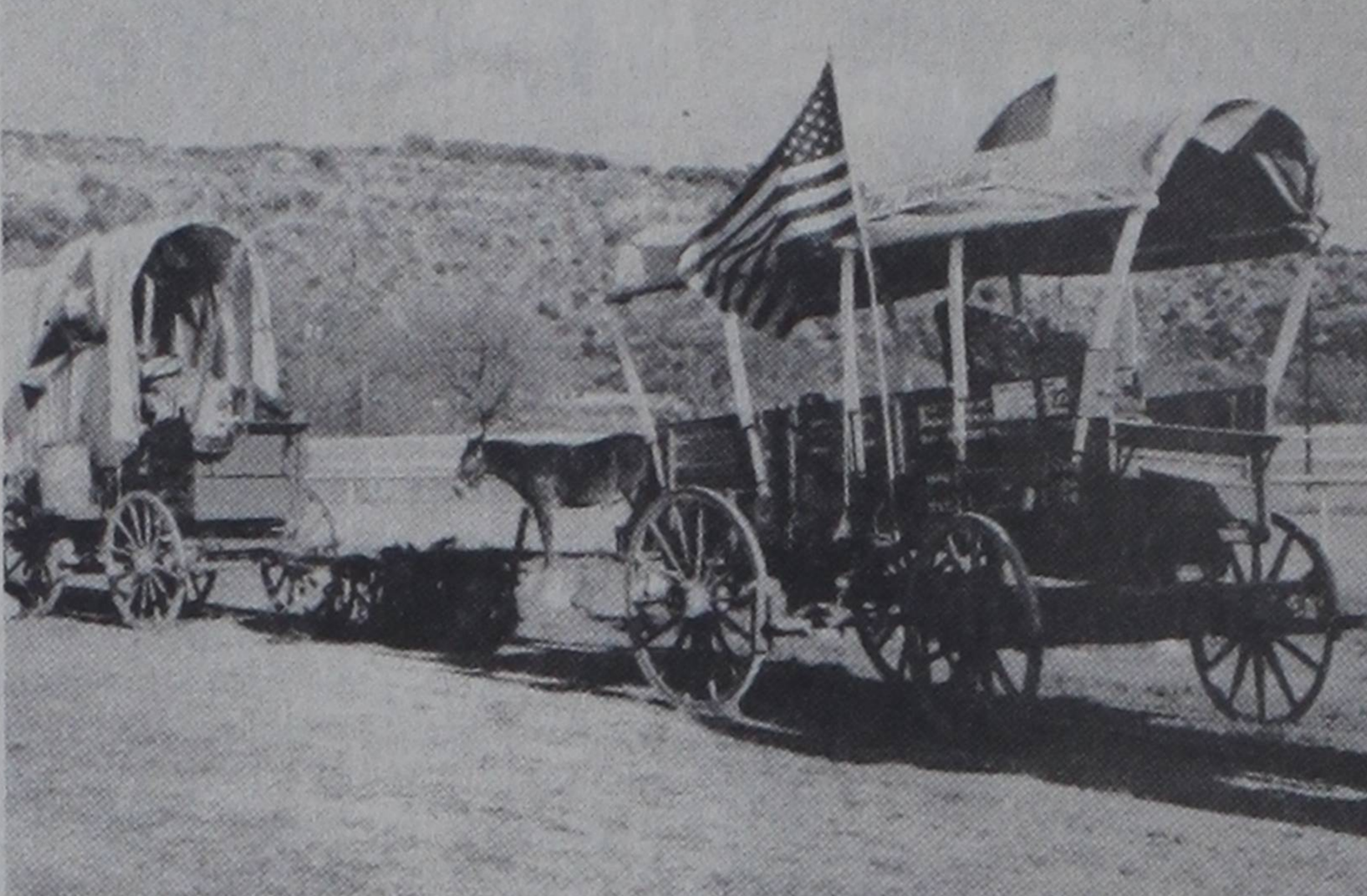
None of the support vehicles are allowed to accompany the train along the actual trail. There are to be 100 wagons and teams with outriders, three hundred horseback riders at the rear from 23 states, and one hundred campsites along the trail.

Food is dished out from a 40-foot stainless steel kitchen accompanied by a refrigerated truck, and four large trailers carrying a very necessary item—Port-O-Potties.

The train had its horse-shoeing trailer, and it was very busy each evening. They also had first aid for the pioneers and a veterinarian for the animals. The trip will take six months to complete, covering 3000 miles at an average of four miles per hour.

The wagons consist of everything from rubber tires to the old wooden wheels that have to be checked constantly and hand-packed with grease regularly. The most authentic wagon was the old "Prairie Schooner" that a couple had found a few months before the train embarked.

The most unique couple is Elmo and Helen Lun from Galesville, Wisconsin. They had driven their team and wagon 1500 miles to Ft. Worth, making the complete trip and then driving home. They are at least in their 70s, and have no support unit or extra team.

When asked why they are making the long grueling trip, Elmo replied, "We like doing things the old way. It's fun being out on the road together. We don't mind being shut up in the wagon all day."

As there is with any celebration, there are souvenirs available at the campsites. One may purchase anything from wagon train hat tacks at \$1.00 each to the Texas Wagon Train Bowie knife at \$389.95, a Wagon Master bronze sculpture for \$2,400.00, or an official commemorative hand-carved "Texas Wagon" for a very pittance—\$3,500.00. Or if these don't interest you, a solid gold Texas Historical Sesquicentennial Commemorative numbered belt buckle—no price given—may be ordered. But call only if you are serious!

The Wagon Train is scheduled

to be in Dimmitt May 14; Hereford, May 15 and make camp in Amarillo May 17, 18 and 19. It is very interesting to visit with these modern pioneers, ask about their experiences and attend their performances. Seeing the schoolroom and the wagons is certainly worth the trip, not to mention living a bit of our history through these people. It is an enriching experience for the kids-1 to 100.

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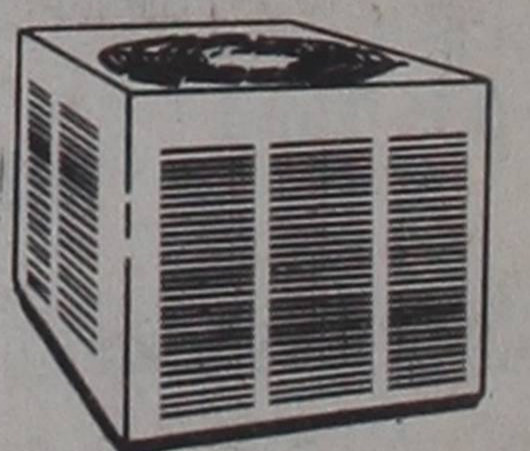

Police Report
