Dates Set For 30th Maize Days

The dates have been set for Maize Days, 1986, according to the Friona Chamber of Commerce.

This year's celebration will be the 30th annual observance of Maize Days. Back on the schedule after an absence of a couple of years will be a carnival, as one has been booked for September 16-20.

The official dates for the 1986 celebration are September 13-20.

First event on the schedule will be Saturday, September 13, with the 30th Maize Queen pageant.

The carnival opens on Tuesday, September 16. That evening also marks the Little Miss Friona pageant.

Saturday, September 20 will see the annual parade, barbecue, and all of the concluding events.

Art shows, a pet show, country store, food booths and lots more are in store for the Sesquicentennial Maize Days celebration, says Kathy Beard, chamber manager.

All Local Teachers Prevail

Friona Independent School District's teachers were among a group of elite schools in the Panhandle area in which 100 per cent had passing grades on the "TECAT" tests, which were a new requirement for teachers this year.

In the immediate area, only Muleshoe joined Friona as a AAA-sized school to have 100 per cent of their instructors to pass on the first try.

Dimmitt showed 97.6 per cent passing, and Hereford 97.4 per cent. Other percentages were: Littlefield, 98.4; Tulia, 99.1 and Floydada, 98.9.

Bovina also had 100 per cent of its teachers pass the test. Other school districts scoring 100 per cent included Lazbuddie, Abernathy, Amherst, Idalou, Nazareth, Olton, Sudan and Three Way.

OUR AREA RECEIVED some disturbing news last week with the selection of the Deaf Smith County site as one of the three finalists for the nation's first nuclear waste repository.

The other two site finalists are located in Washington state and Nevada.

The Department of Energy says it will spend \$850 million during the next six years studying the Deaf Smith County site.

It behooves all residents in this area to put pressure on the Department of Energy to prove beyond the shadow of a doubt that our underground water supply can be protected from nuclear waste stored beneath the aquifers.

It has been mind-boggling to many people from the very first mention of Deaf Smith County as a waste repository, that the DOE would consider a site which is right in the middle of one of the most productive agricultural areas in the world.

There have been some reservations about the possible salt contamination of the underground water which could be caused during the test drilling work that the DOE will do in the coming years.

But that his nothing compared to the fears of nuclear contamination of our water, plus the general hazards of having such a repository located in such a viable area—just 35 miles from a metropolitan city, Amarillo.

Do the possible economic benefits of a nuclear waste dump overshadow the disadvantages, particularly if you consider the potential loss of productive agricultural land and businesses?

These are questions which the DOE's study will tackle.

Personally, we already have our own conclusions as to the soundness of constructing such a waste repository in this area. It would take a lot of proof on the part of the DOE to change our thinking.

Unfortunately, you also get the idea that the DOE officials also have their minds made up on the subject, and that the time-table set up for testing, etc., is merely going through the motions prior to making the final site selection.

If the DOE's studies are not convincing enough, the residents of our area will have one last recourse. Should the Deaf Smith County site be selected, our state governor could still veto the selection.

The only way the veto could be overturned would be by a two-thirds approval by both houses of congress, something our legislators have said in the past would be a hard vote to muster.

A large organizational meeting of the Pinto Bean Growers Association for the Plains of Texas will be held Monday, June 9, at 8 p.m. in the Olton Community Ag Barn, located one block south of U.S. 70 on Avenue B, Olton.

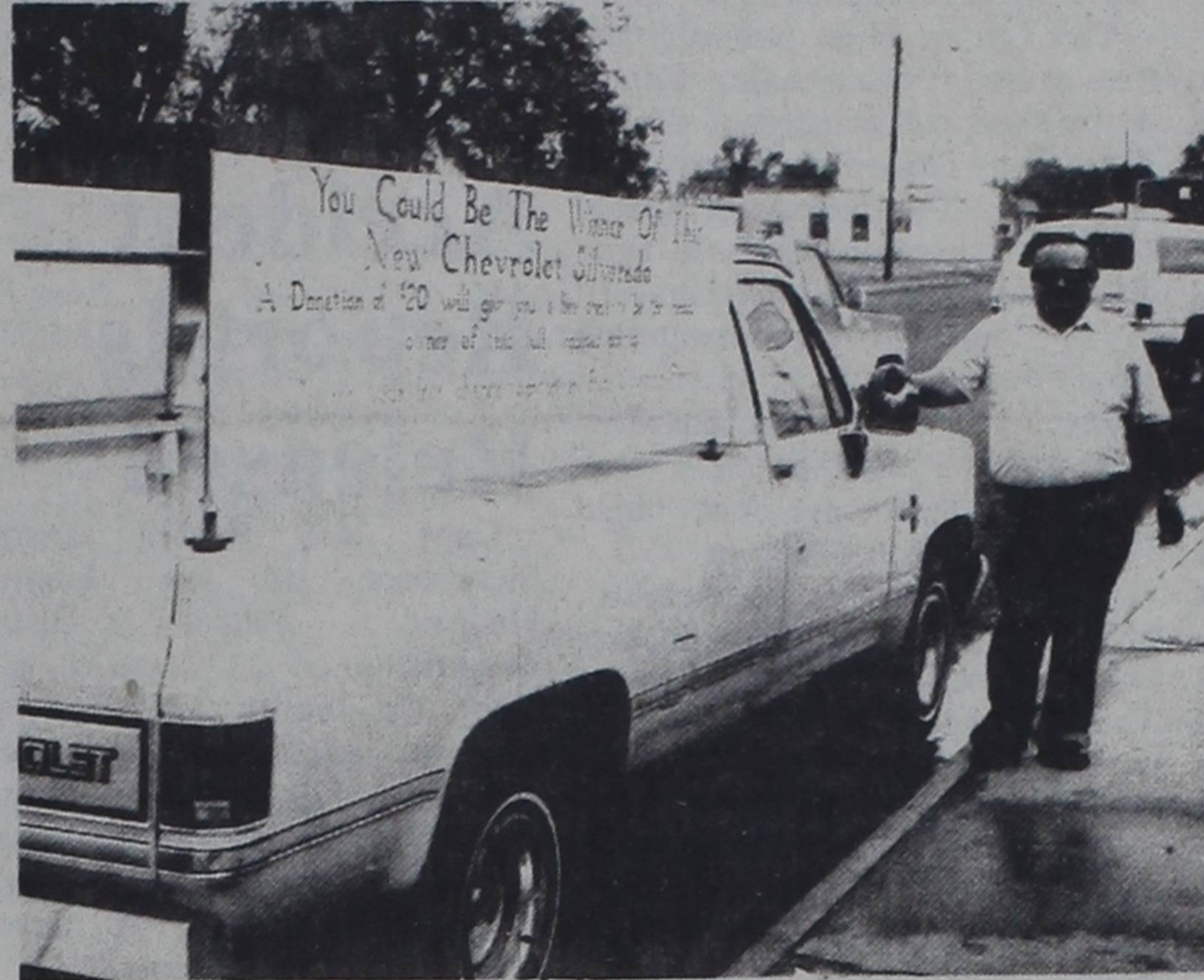
All farmers interested in participating in this new cash crop are invited to attend.

Court Approves Payment For Work

The county commissioners approved the final payment on the renovation of the District Courtroom, amounting to \$1,000, plus installation of a hood and repairing a window, in order to keep out blowing moisture, for an additional \$190.85, to Sherrill Lumber Co. of Bovina.

The county approved payment of registration fees for the county's Justices of the Peace to attend a training seminar in Abilene June 19-21.

Judge Porter Roberts noted a letter he had received pointing out that monetary compensation paid to veterans living in the county amounted to \$393,940 in 1985. Items covered are pensions, vocational rehabilitation, insurance and indemnities.

At the suggestion of the County Treasurer, the court voted to

reinvest \$100,000 of Farm to Market funds from a certificate of deposit maturing May 30 into a new certificate maturing December 1, 1986. Also, a \$100,000 CD representing General Fund money, also maturing May 30, was reinvested to mature July 31, 1986. Another \$100,000 CD of General Fund money was re-invested in a certificate maturing December 1, 1986.

Bonds were approved for Colleen Stover and Sharla Landry, employees in the County Clerk's office.

Janette Pierce, County Extension Agent for Home Economics, reported that the Extension Department's defensive driving course had 23 participants. Mrs. Pierce also reported on the time management programs she has presented on her "Lunch and Learn" meetings.

Mrs. Pierce is to be in Levelland as a counselor for a 4-H camp. She also will have a pilot program on child care for Home Day Care providers.

Gary Patterson, County Extension Agent for Agriculture, reported that he has all of his cotton demonstration plots planted.

Soil work was approved for three farms in Precinct 2 and eight in Precinct 3.

July 4th Plans Made

Those who voted in May must vote in the same party's runoff. Those who did not vote may vote in either runoff on Saturday. It is unlawful to "cross over."

Friona Flashbacks

....from the files of The Friona Star

55 YEARS AGO--MAY 29, 1931

In a reply to the city's request for additional crossing, the Santa Fe Railway stated that it was their option that the city did not need the additional crossing, and that the state law forbids crossings where there were three lines of track. Santa Fe was written in an effort to relieve some of the congestion that develops at harvest time, with lines of trucks.

50 YEARS AGO--MAY 19, 1936

During the past nine days, beginning on Monday, May 18, it has rained at Friona and some part of the surrounding territory each day with the exception of Tuesday, when it rained sometime during the night. At this writing, an estimated ten and one-half inches have fallen at Friona during this period, most of which has fallen in gentle showers, allowing practically all of it to be absorbed by the soil.

45 YEARS AGO--MAY 23, 1941

The Friona High School annual, "The Totem Pole," arrived Friday of last week. It was a very attractive volume, and meets the approval of the student body. It was sponsored by Superintendent W.L. Edelman and Mrs. Toone. The book was dedicated to the late Prof. Woodrow Toone, who was for several terms a member of the high school faculty.

40 YEARS AGO--MAY 31, 1946

In connection with our proposed sewer system, the City Commission has approved a plan whereby we will be able to finance the cost of this system without having to raise the tax rate more than 30 cents on the \$100 valuation, Mayor Glenn E. Reeve said this week. A bond issue of \$82,000 will be voted on: this being the engineer's estimate of the cost of the system.

35 YEARS AGO--MAY 24, 1951

Is there any truth to the claims made by those who say they can increase rainfall, temper hail and electrical storms, and even withhold precipitation and still

keep skies cloudy?

30 YEARS AGO--MAY 24, 1956

The Black Community of north-eastern Parmer County, in its first attempt to win the annual community improvement contest sponsored by Farmer-Stockman Magazine in cooperation with the Extension Service, this week placed second in the state. McMahan in Caldwell County, was named state winner. There were 185 rural communities in Texas which competed for the prizes given by the farm magazine.

25 YEARS AGO--MAY 24, 1961

A burglar broke into the office of Friona Consumers sometime during the night Saturday and made off with \$200 in cash. Entrance to the building was made by breaking the glass to a south door and unlocking the night latch.

20 YEARS AGO--MAY 19, 1966

Continuation of the service of the High Plains Bookmobile was assured in recent weeks, when the four counties involved gave their official okay to the program. Commissioners and judges from Parmer, Bailey, Lamb and Cochran counties met at Muleshoe and agreed to underwrite the \$14,000 annual budget for the mobile library. The cost is to be prorated according to population in each county.

15 YEARS AGO--MAY 27, 1971

Arriving in Farwell on August 1 to begin duties as Parmer County Home Demonstration Agent will be Miss Jana Pronger who was in Farwell Monday of this week to meet with the Commissioners Court concerning the position. Miss Pronger was accompanied to Farwell by Sue Farris, District

Home Demonstration Agent from Amarillo.

10 YEARS AGO--MAY 23, 1976

The Friona High School band was named "Outstanding Band" in the class AA division of the Six Flags Over Texas Band Festival on May 14. The band competed against nine other bands in their class and scored a "Division I" rating along with the outstanding band honors.

Kipi Fleming, Friona High School senior, was honored with the John Phillip Sousa band award as a highlight of the annual Friona Band Concert Thursday night.

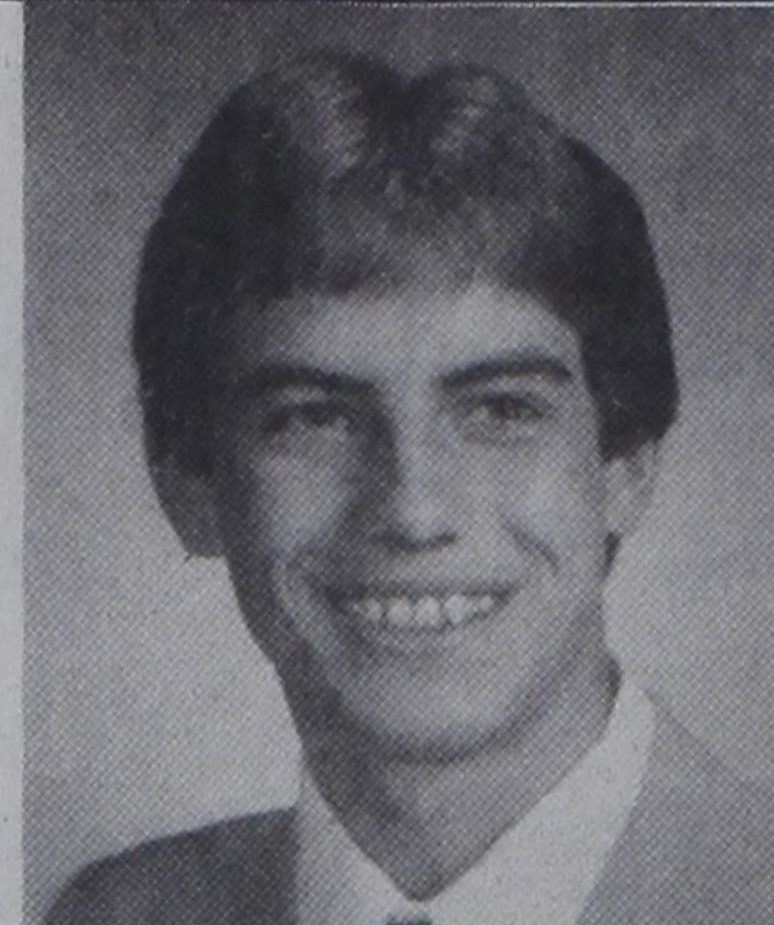

Amphitheatre Sets Opening June 13

New Mexico has recently been listed as one of the world's ten best vacation spots to visit this summer. It has never been a secret to New Mexicans. New Mexico's newest attraction is the Caprock Amphitheatre in Eastern New Mexico and is the only outdoor theatre in the state devoted to historical drama.

The premier performance of "Dream On A Blue Horse," opens Friday, June 13 and runs through August 16, each night except Monday. Summer is for dreaming. Share the dream of outdoor drama in Eastern New Mexico. Enjoy this sparkling cowboy musical production under the stars.

"Dream On A Blue Horse," written by native New Mexican Rebekah Gossett, honors the lifestyle of the people of the land and the heritage of New Mexico. The musical's theme centers around the myth of an American hero, the cowboy—the myth of the man and the man himself.

The Caprock Amphitheatre, built by the New Mexico State Parks Division, seats 1,000 people, and is located 11 miles south of San Jon. The site can be reached by exiting at Exit 356, off I-40 at San Jon, for those coming from the north, east, or west. For those coming from the south, the amphitheatre is fifty miles north of Clovis, New Mexico on Highway 18 with the last 15 miles on Highway 39 north out of Grady, New Mexico. The amphitheatre, operated by the non-profit New Mexico Outdoor Drama Association, is recessed atop the national rimrock formation known locally as the "Caprock" and overlooks the beautiful San Jon Valley some 600 feet below.

Those coming to the area for the first time might also enjoy three fine fishing and recreational lakes within 30 minutes to an hour's drive of the amphitheatre. The grave of the infamous Billy The Kid, located at Fort Sumner, is only 90 miles away. Billy is part of "Dream On A Blue Horse," as is the legendary Pecos Bill and his gal Bluefoot Sue. The show is designed for all ages, from two to 102.

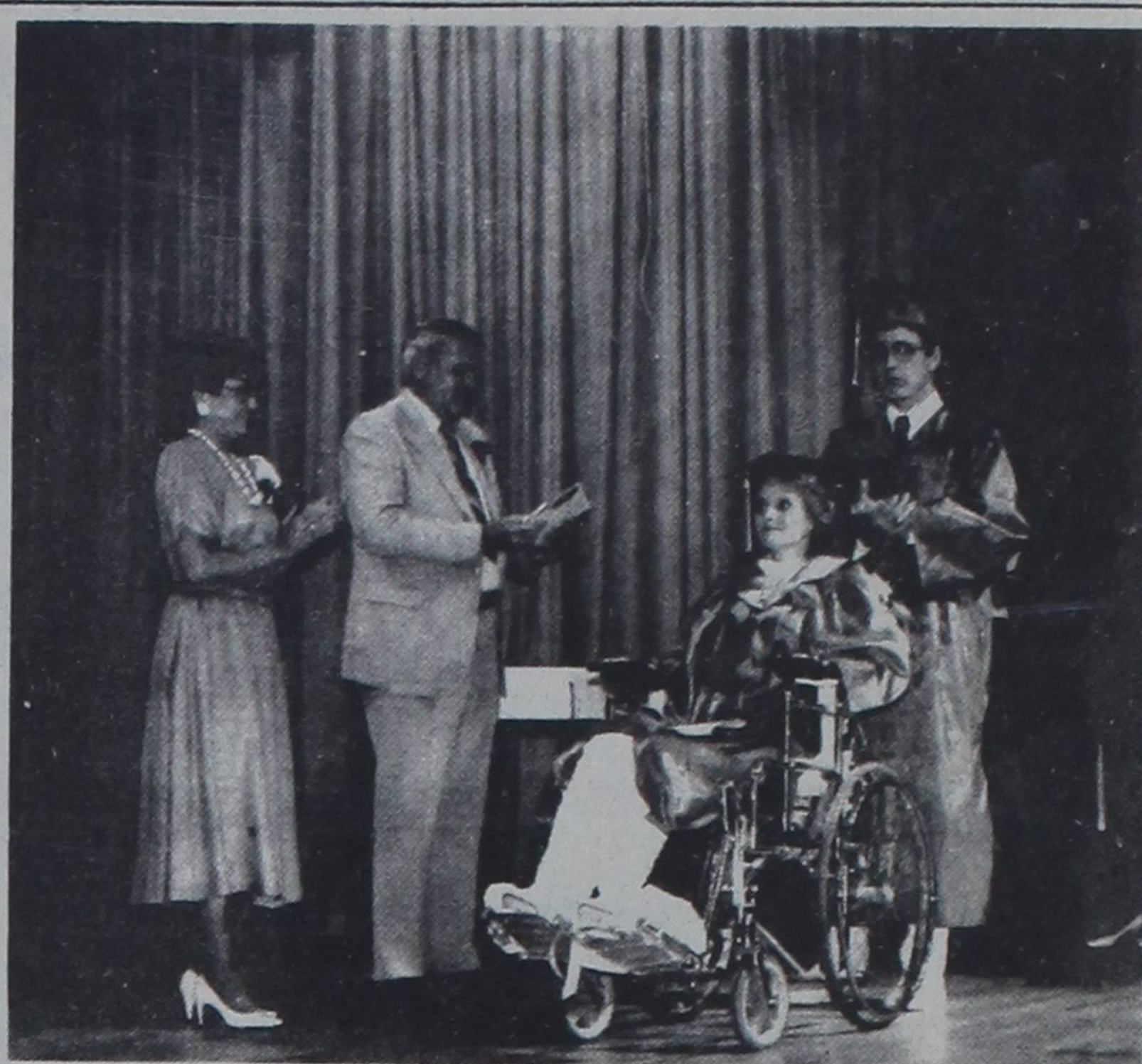

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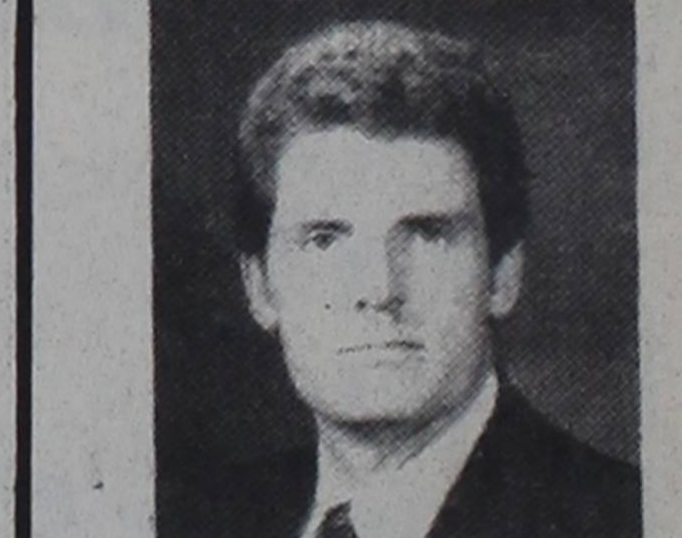

Angus Breeders Are Recognized

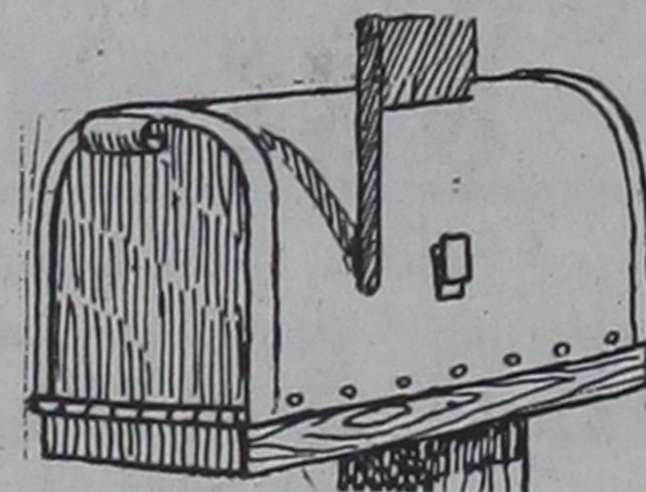

The 1986 Report lists 3,308 individual cows. It is published in the May issue of the Angus Journal and extra copies are available from the American Angus Association. The largest number of Pathfinder cows from a single herd this year is 78, and several hundred breeders have a single cow that qualifies for the exclusive listing.

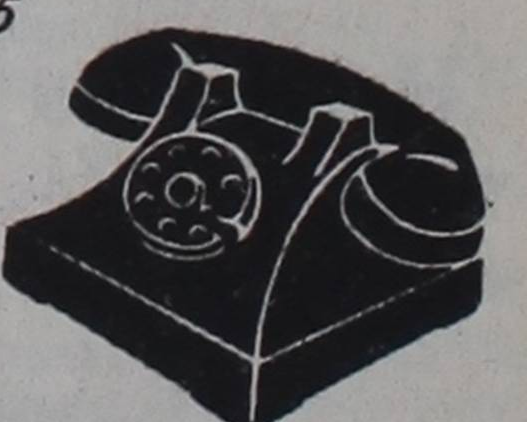

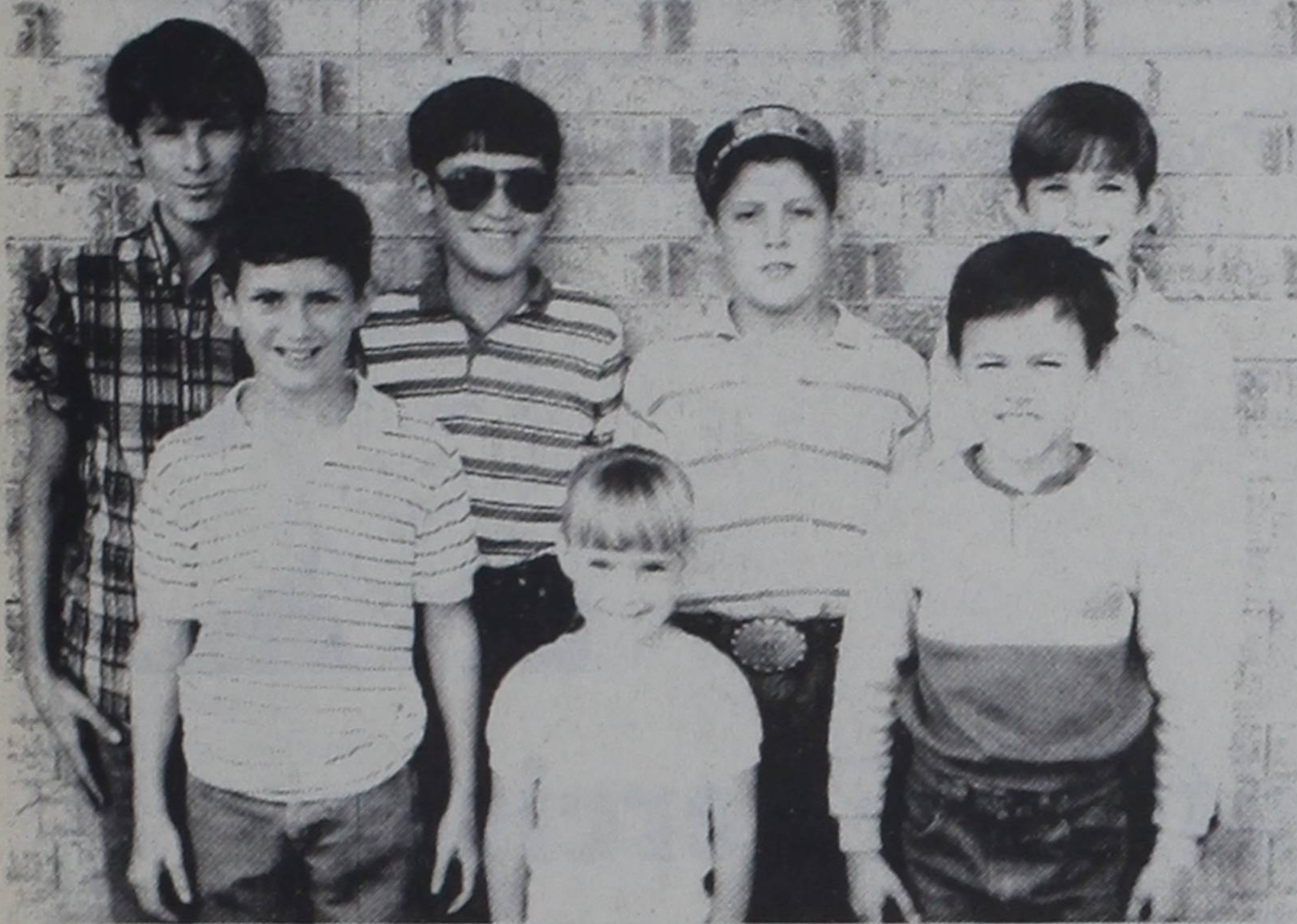

State Might Block Testing

Texas officials may be able to block Department of Energy attempts to place a high-level nuclear waste repository in the Panhandle, thanks to a bill passed in 1983 by Sen. Bill Sarpalius.

Sarpalius, D-Canyon, said the measure—Senate Bill 1018—requires anyone drilling a shaft through an underground aquifer to obtain a permit from the Texas Water Commission first. DOE must drill two shafts through the Ogallala aquifer before conducting further tests in Deaf Smith County, one of three finalists nationwide for the country's first permanent repository.

"Back in 1983, we suspected DOE might name a Panhandle site as one of the three finalists, and we knew they would have to drill a shaft through the aquifer before they could continue testing," Sarpalius said.

"We passed S.B. 1018 to make sure Texas had a say in the testing process," he said. "When DOE people go to start drilling the shaft, they're going to have to convince someone besides themselves that the Ogallala's going to be safe. They're going to have to convince the three water commissioners."

Ralph Roming, Texas water commissioner, agreed with Sarpalius' assessment.

"I can't speak for the other commissioners, but DOE will have to present an extremely strong case before they convince me they can guarantee the Ogallala's safety," Roming said. "It just doesn't make any sense to me to potentially contaminate the world's largest underground aquifer. The Ogallala is the sole source of drinking water for portions of six states. You contaminate the aquifer, and life in those areas will cease to exist."

"You've also got to consider the salt problem. DOE is going to be mining tons of salt from under the ground. How are they going to contain the loose salt and keep the West Texas winds from blowing that salt clear to the coast? If they don't contain the salt, they'll ruin farm production for years in the nation's largest agricultural area," the commissioner said.

Sarpalius said he expects DOE

to ignore Texas' permitting requirement and begin drilling the shaft anyway. If that happens, Sarpalius believes Attorney General Jim Mattox will have excellent grounds for another lawsuit.

"If they start drilling anywhere near the Ogallala without a permit, I'll start hollering for a suit," the senator said. "If they drill without a permit, they'll be making a mockery of states' rights. DOE, the Reagan administration, the whole federal government in effect will be saying 'Texas has no rights.'"

Sarpalius said he already has drafted a letter to Energy Secretary John Herrington, reminding Herrington of S.B. 1018. He said he would be surprised if the secretary responds to the letter.

"I hope I'm wrong. I hope DOE complies to the letter of the law, but I'd be shocked if they do," Sarpalius said.

"Throughout the site-selection process, they have ignored the wishes of the people in the Panhandle," he said. "They've ignored our concerns. They've brought a lot of dog-and-pony shows to Hereford and Tulia, but they've never really answered our questions. DOE hasn't said anything yet that convinces us this repository is safe."

Sarpalius and Roming also criticized DOE for trying to promote the repository as an economic blessing for the Panhandle.

"DOE is trying to build this dump as some sort of savior for our part of the state," Sarpalius said. "I don't think it will help that much. Sure, they're going to employ as many as 200 people, but less than five per cent will be hired locally. It's not going to create that many jobs, and, frankly, I think we can pump our economy back up without their help."

Roming echoed the senator's comments, saying, "I don't know exactly how much DOE is saying the repository will help, but economic assistance will be a moot point if the repository contaminates the aquifer. If the water goes bad, no one will be able to live in the region anyway."

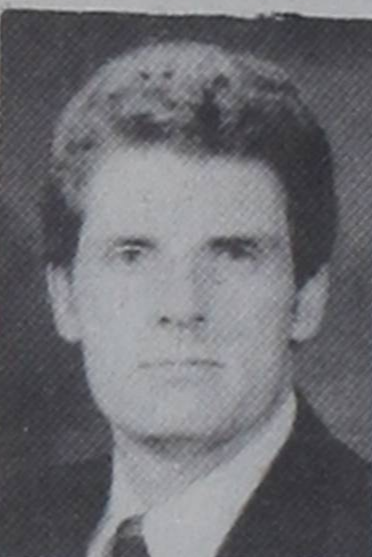

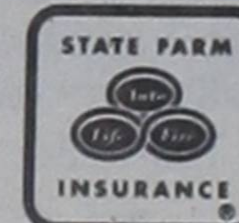

Clovis Hospital Offers Program

Daybreak, an intensive outpatient program for alcohol and chemical dependency, opened May 2, the first such program in the eastern high plains area. The outpatient program is designed to serve patients living within one hour driving time of Clovis. Although affiliated with Clovis High Plains Hospital, the Daybreak offices are located at 21st and Sasser Streets.

Daybreak provides a positive, effective answer to the painful consequences of abusing alcohol and other drugs. Program director for Daybreak is James G. Ates, MA, and Medical Director is Oswald Graham, MD.

Statistics tell us that the majority of individuals who abuse alcohol and drugs continue to work and live with their families. All suffer physical and emotional effects of this abuse. The program offered by Daybreak is targeted at both the alcoholic and his or her family, offering intensive counseling for all family members.

Companies need to address alcohol and drug problems in their employees because it significantly affects the financial performance of the organization. Every working day money is lost in absenteeism, productivity, accidents, workmen's compensation claims, grievances, medical claims, property damage, poor decision, and low employee morale.

The Daybreak Intensive Outpatient Program offers a way of starting over. This program allows the patient and family to participate in treatment together while continuing to work and meet other family obligations.

Following professional assessment and diagnosis, a treatment team composed of Daybreak staff, the patient and family will develop an individualized treatment plan. The patient and family attend a four-week intensive schedule of education and counseling which meets four nights per week. The Medical Director supervises all treatment and works with the patient's family physician to resolve any medical problems.

Patients are encouraged to attend Alcoholics Anonymous or Narcotics Anonymous, and the family, Al-Anon or Nar-Anon. Before discharge, the patient, family and Daybreak staff design an aftercare plan which will help keep the patient and family on the road to recovery.

Most insurance companies now recognize alcoholism and drug dependency among their covered illnesses and provide payment for medical care and expenses. Daybreak staff will help patients determine if insurance will pay for treatment services.

A typical counseling schedule consists of meetings from 6 to 9:30 p.m. four nights per week, with such items as group therapy, lectures, discussions, and individual counseling. To obtain further information about Daybreak, interested individuals may call Jim Ates, program director, at 763-5534.

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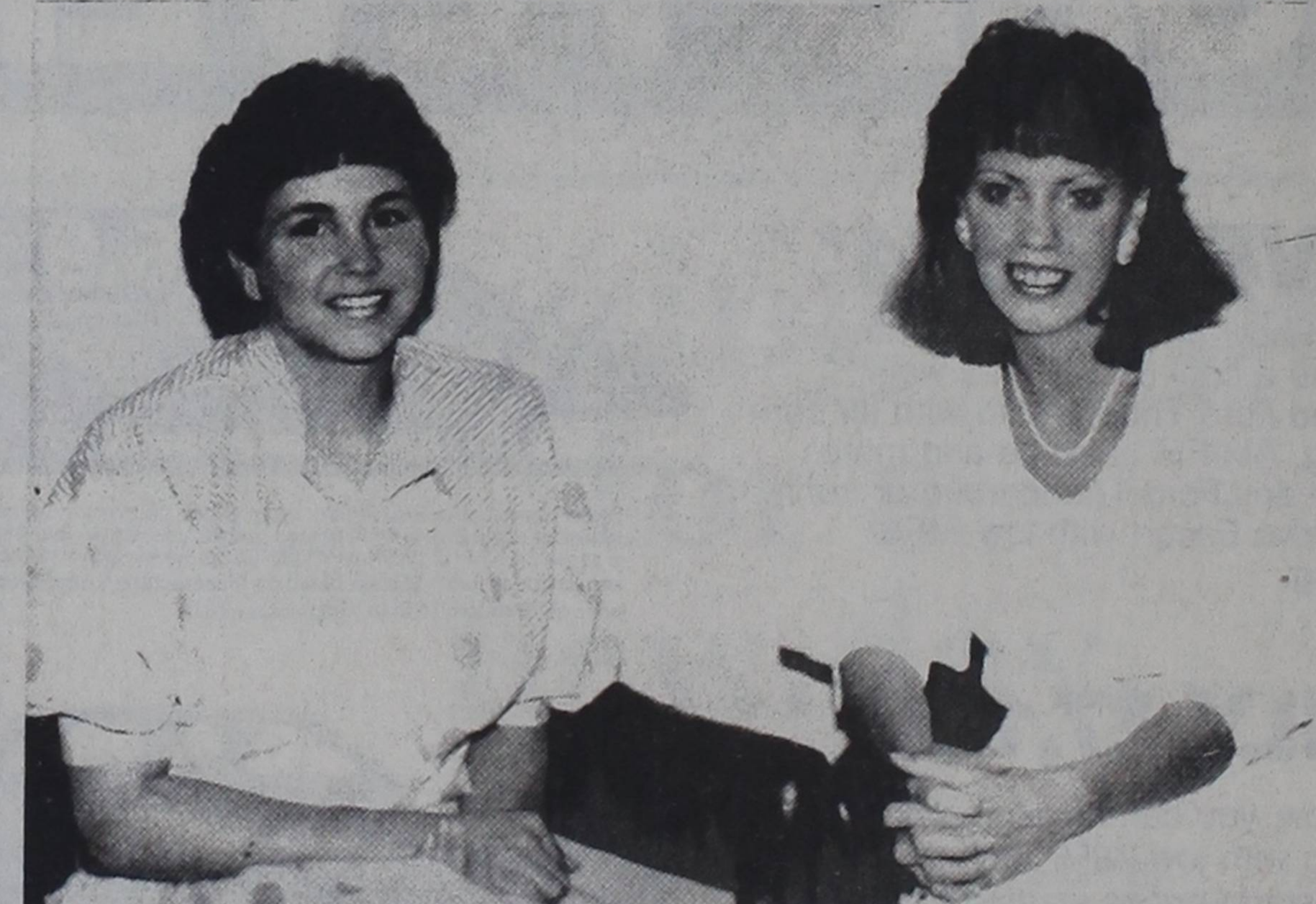
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Double Ring Ceremony Unites Kelly Wood, Gregory McClaran

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
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
