

HOLY GHOST **REVIVAL NOW**

REV. MR. CATES SAYS THAT'S WHAT HE INTENDS TO GIVE SAN ANGELO PEOPLE.

TWO SERVICES DAILY

Large Crowd Present Thursday Night for the Opening Meeting-General Hand-shaking and a

Rev. George C. Cates of Louisville, Ky., spoke at the Riverside rink Thursday night. The union revival opened with a large audience. The evangelist's sermon was well received and a great shaking of hands followed. Abut seven preachers, representing as many churches here and elsewhere, were present, and everybody seemed to enjoy the service.

Mr. Cates said there were four great illars under his work-the blood of Christ, faith in God, the preached word and prayer. He then emphasized and illustrated the first, urging the people to make much of the blood, and spoke briefly of the second admonishing everybody to exercise faith in God.
