



Allowing one-fortieth as a fair sample, we must still keep in mind that men whose shibboleth is the cross said whose efforts are consecrated to holy purposes every day in the year, including the revival season, do a great work. If, then, revivalists average 100,000 a year in Texas, it is not a wild guess to assert in a gentle, argumentative sort of way that the good and everlasting wearers of clerical robes at least bring into the sacred folds not less than 100,000 each year.






