New Baseball Park In Works Locally

The board of directors of Friona's Kids, Inc. baseball program announced plans this week to build a new baseball park adjacent to the West (Senior League and T-Ball) field.

"The board of directors would like to thank all of the businesses and individuals who have sponsored teams and donated money over the years to our program," said Dee King, spokesman for the group.

"We have purchased the land adjoining the big baseball park, and are in the process of building a new park and concession stand there," King said.

The concession stand is to be 480 square feet, and contain nice rest rooms and storage. The park will be for youngsters nine years through 12 years of age.

King explained that by building the new facility, it would be possible to have all of the baseball games played at one location, making it easier for parents with more than one child in the program.

The board has raised \$20,000, King said, but would need additional money to complete the project.

"We want to make this park something Friona and its youngsters can be proud of," King said.

At the same time, the baseball board is planning to make some improvements at the big park, which could also be used for high school baseball, if baseball is approved by the Friona school board.

"We are running short on money, and would appreciate any donations from businesses or individuals," the spokesman said.

Clayton Wins Judge's Race

In a record turnout for a runoff election, Bonnie Clayton received the Democratic nomination for Parmer County Judge last Tuesday, in a close race with B.K. Buske.

Mrs. Clayton received 781 votes (51.8 per cent), to 726 for Buske (48.2 per cent).

The election had been one of the most hotly-contested county races in a number of years. Buske trailed Mrs. Clayton in the first primary, 516-373, but made up a lot of ground in the last month, losing by just 55 votes.

Buske won six precincts, in addition to the absentee box, while Mrs. Clayton won four.

The difference was that Mrs. Clayton won Bovina and Farwell's precincts by a combined 79.6 per cent, while Buske's win in the three Friona precincts came to a 71.7 per cent margin.

Buske won Friona's Precinct 2 by 58-23; Precinct 2-1 by 245-101; and Precinct 2-2 by 93-22. He also had wins at Black, 14-13; Lazbuddie, 44-36, and Lakeview, 30-10. He claimed the edge in the absentee voting box, 88-70.

Mrs. Clayton won at Bovina, 221-54; Farwell, 201-51; Oklahoma Lane, 52-30, and Rhea, 22-19.

Friona had great turnouts in Precinct 2-1, where 48.2 per cent of the registered voters went to the polls, and 2-2, where 51.0 per cent voted (including absentees).

However, in Precinct 2, which votes at the Friona Fire Station, only 91 of 394 registered voters bothered to vote. This 23.1 per cent turnout pulled the three Friona polling places' turnout down to 42.3 per cent and may have affected the outcome of the race. Bovina turned out 44 per cent of their voters.

"I was gratified with the support and turnout. During the race, I have come across several opportunities for bettering the county, and I will try to do my part to see that these are carried out," said Buske.

He said he was pleased that his vote total had increased from 374 in the first primary.

Mrs. Clayton, who will become the first woman elected as county judge after next fall's primary, said, "I appreciate the support you have given me, and your continued support and confidence will be greatly appreciated."

In other Democratic runoff results, Parmer County again favored Jim Mattox in the gubernatorial race, with 799 votes to 433 for Ann Richards, the nominee.

They went for Tom Bowden for treasurer, 791-442 over Nikki Van Hightower, and favored Bob Gammage over Ross Sears, 829-363 in the Supreme Court race.

Parmer County also gave its vote to Amarillo neighbor Morris

Overstreet, 687, to 494 for Frank Maloney, who edged out Overstreet statewide in the race for the judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals.

Cultivating Traditional Values Offers Hope For Drug Problems

At a dinner party the conversation turned to Noriega, the Columbian drug lords and our drug abuse problem. Quickly people began offering solutions. Someone suggested shooting the drug criminals. "Just line them up against a wall and shoot them." Several voted for this option and, frighteningly, they were not joking. "Just cut off their hands," another said, "like they do in Iran." Someone else proposed locking the drug abusers up for a lifetime. "Build more jails, lock 'em up and keep them there, forever," she said.

The sage in our group suggested that these draconian procedures would offer no true solutions to the drug problem. Then followed a lengthy discourse, made tolerable only by the excellent dessert served by our gentle hostess, that I will, to the gratitude of all still reading, condense to a few lines.

"To understand the drug difficulties we must look at our country's history," he said. Following World War II, we had our Camelot years of the 50's, characterized by prosperity, wholesomeness and the progressive fulfillment of the American dream. Our parents, impoverished by the Great Depression, wanted the best money could buy for all of us. Suddenly most of us had more than enough--t.v.'s, stereos, two-car garages, second homes, condominiums--causing us to be carried away by self-perceived importance. The omnipotent belief that we had all the answers led to an atrocious involvement in the Vietnam War. We sent our poor, 18-year-old unfortunates to the jungles of Vietnam, where they were taught to kill before they had learned to shave. But this war of limitations (take a hill one day with horrific losses, and walk away from it the next) taught us mistrust for our leaders that Watergate later confirmed.

"Our country's confusion," the pundit said as he arose from the table to get a third cup of coffee, "led to apathy and self-

gratification." If we couldn't depend on our country's leaders to be forthright, strong and model good behavior, then we might as well live one day at a time and enjoy ourselves as much as possible. After all, wouldn't it be possible for one of our maniacal leaders to drop the bomb at any time? We must live each day to the fullest, enjoy ourselves and forget about others. Drugs began to creep into our lives.

"The problem, then," said the pedagogue as we left the table for the comfortable sitting room, "lies in mistrust of leaders, concern for the individual, looking for the easy way, feeling a lack of permanence, and, most important, a spiritual vacuum."

In the midst of our don's pedantry we found truth and each of us began to envision more appropriate solutions to our drug problem. We must believe again in the future. We must have confidence in our God, our government and ourselves--and we must stop spending and wanting more and more.

This new decade marks the time for all of us to become more service-oriented. Let's serve our communities. Help out in children's shelters. Assist in retirement homes. Teach a Sunday School class. Let's spend more time alone with ourselves in prayer, meditation, reading, learning and developing our talents so we can better serve others. Service provides lasting happiness.

We must also turn to more traditional values. We must find ways to stop family deterioration. We must make time to show love for our children. We must pay serious attention to our marriage vows.

Finally, and probably most important, we need to find hope in our spiritual lives. All of us must work on understanding our spiritual blessings: that though our earthly lives are transient, our spiritual lives are permanent. We must become more cognizant of the law of sowing and reaping, realizing what we sow affects the lives of many others.

The answer to complex problems often rests in simple solutions. Cultivating traditional values offers the best hope in defeating drug problems.

David Hough Has Registered Angus

David Hough, Friona, has been recognized nationally by the American Angus Association for having eight registered Angus cows included in the American Angus Association's 1990 Pathfinder Report.

Only 950 of the more than 24,000 members of the American Angus Association are represented in this year's report, according to Richard Spader, executive vice president of the American Angus Association with headquarters in St. Joseph, Missouri.

The Pathfinder Program identifies superior Angus cows based upon recorded performance traits that are economically important to

efficient beef production. These traits include regular calving and heavy weaning weights, reports John Crouch, director of performance programs for the American Angus Association.

The 1990 Pathfinder Report lists 3,420 individual cows. It is published in the May issue of the Angus Journal and extra copies are available from the American Angus Association. The largest number of Pathfinder cows from a single herd this year is 100, and several hundred breeders have a single cow that qualifies for the exclusive listing.

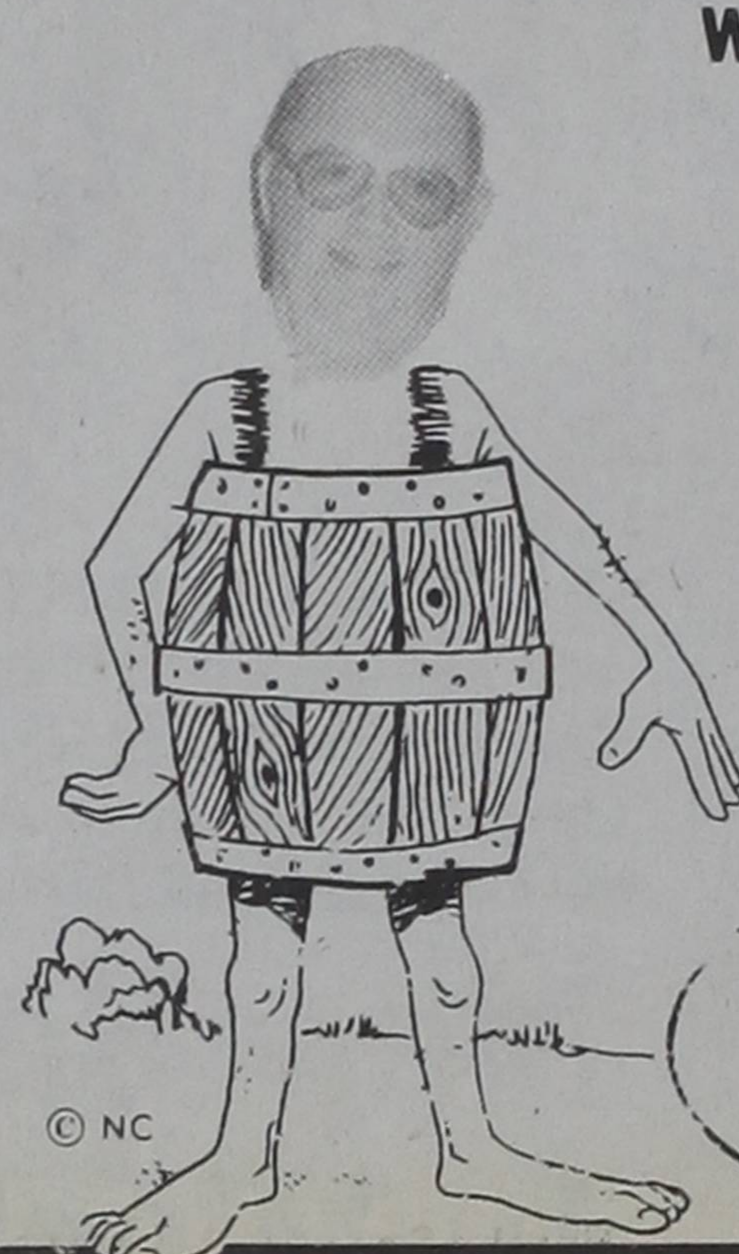
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Youth Cagers Wind Up Year

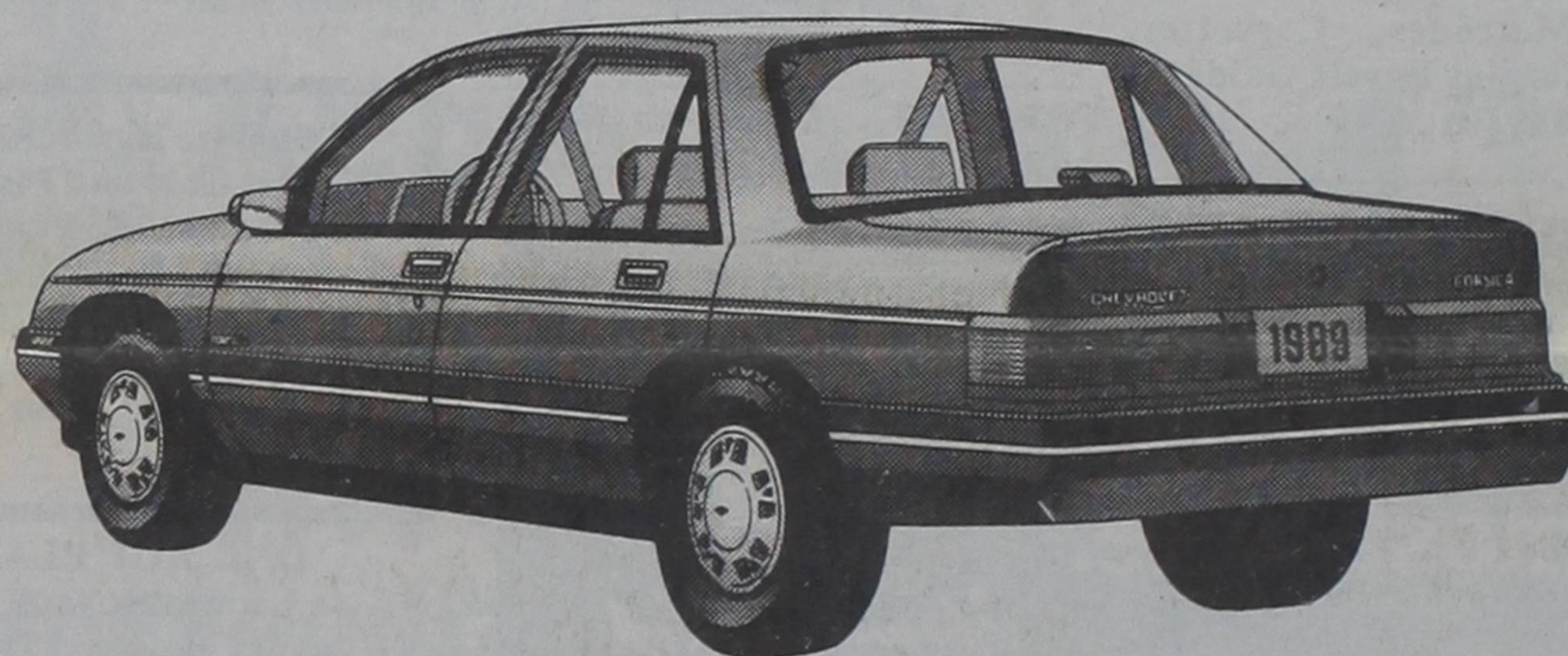

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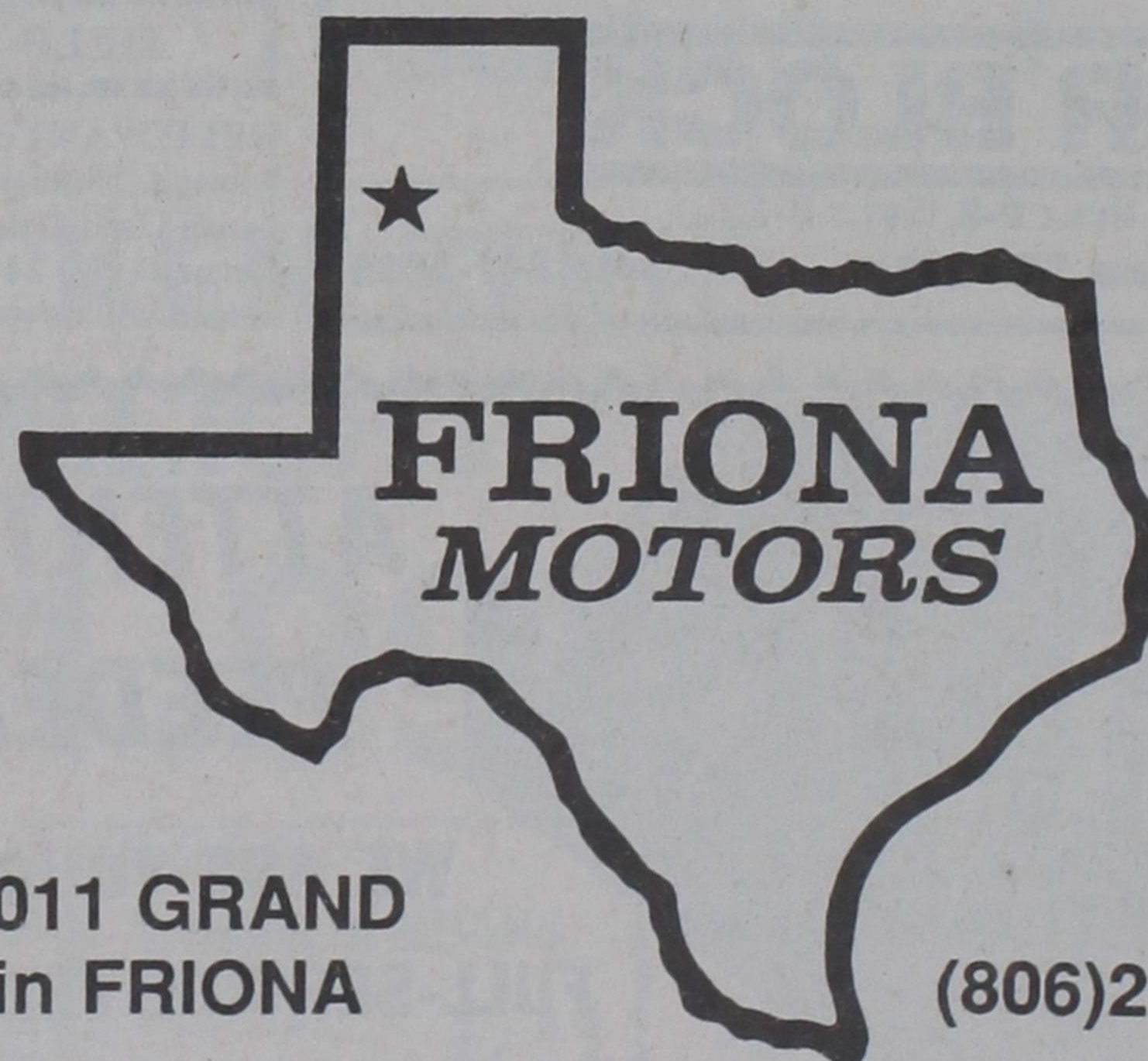

The Friona Squaws' track and field team qualified three individuals for four events, plus their 1600-meter relay team, for regional competition, at the district meet held locally last weekend.

Freshman Mendi Milner was Friona's lone first-place winner, taking advantage of a last-second break to win the 300-meter hurdles race with a time of 48.43.

Dimmitt's Wendi Ethridge had a slight lead over Miss Milner, but tripped over the final hurdle. That helped the young Friona runner edge Tian Younger of Floydada, as Miss Ethridge had to settle for fourth place.

Kendra Gordon qualified for two regional events, placing second in the shot put with a 32-4 1/2 throw. She was just a half-inch behind the district champion, Monica Swint. Miss Gordon later placed second in the 800-meter run with a clocking of 2:35.45 for her other regional spot.

Jenny Procter was second in the 400-meter run with a 61.88 effort, to likewise claim a regional berth.

Friona's 1600-meter relay team had some bad luck, but it wasn't all disaster.

Miss Gordon, running the third leg, had given the Squaws about a ten-yard lead over second-place Tulia, but the handoff between herself and Miss Procter was bobbled, and the baton rolled off the track and onto the grass.

Luckily, the Squaws were in lane one, and the baton was retrieved and Miss Procter finished in second place for a regional spot. Friona's time was 4:15.27.

Other members of the relay foursome were Alicia Widner and Miss Milner.

Renee Martin, another freshman, is the regional alternate in the 1600-meter run, placing third with a time of 6:10.36.

Miss Milner added a third place finish in the 100-meter hurdles in 16.61.

Other point-winners were Martha Aronce in the 1600-meter run at 6:31.37; Freda Lafuente in the 3200-meter run at 14:41.34, and Miss Martin in the 800-meter run with a 2:45.25 effort.

Misses Aronce and Lafuente are also freshmen, attesting to the Friona team's "youth movement" for 1990.

The team scored 71 points, for a fourth-place finish as a team.

FHS Earns Spots At Regional Meet

The Friona Chieftains qualified for eight individual spots plus a relay team in the regional track and field meet, as a result of the District 2-AAA meet held at Friona last Friday and Saturday.

Paced by a pair of sweep wins by their long-distance runners, the Chieftains placed third as a team in the meet, scoring 116 points.

Senior distance runner John Edd Duke was the meet star for the Chieftains. Duke won the two-mile (3200 meter) run in Friday's only running final, in the good time of 10:08.48.

Duke came back on Saturday to win the 1600-meter run with a time of 4:47.33.

In both of the distance races, Friona's Ramon Sanchez finished as runnerup to Duke, and qualified for the regional meet in both.

Sanchez had a time of 10:31.23 in the 3200 meters and 4:52.07 in the mile.

Jeff Stowers won his specialty, the 300-meter intermediate hurdles, equalling his best time of

the season at 39.43.

Both Stowers and Duke are ranked in the "Boys Track Honor Roll," with Stowers currently at third place behind only two 5A runners, and Duke at sixth, also better than any other area 3A runner.

Brian Herring peaked at the right time, clearing six feet even and snaring the win in the high jump event. It was the first time this spring for a Chieftain to score a win in one of the field events.

Ismael Rocha placed second in the 400-meter run, to claim another regional spot, with a time of 51.64, and Curtis Brady likewise placed second in the long jump, with a 20-6 3/4 leap, for another regional berth.

Also qualifying for regional was Friona's 400-meter relay team, which placed second to Tulia with a time of 45.02. Team members were Scott Houston, Ismael Rocha, Andre Duran and Jeff Stowers.

Brady is the regional alternate in the high jump. He placed third after clearing 5-10.

Houston placed fourth in the intermediate hurdles race with a 43.56 clocking.

The Chieftains' 1600-meter relay team flirted with a regional spot, holding second for a time before being edged out by Dimmitt for the berth. Friona's time was 3:31.63. The foursome was made up of Andre Duran, Jeff Stowers, Saul Espino and Ismael Rocha.

Otherwise, Brady placed fifth in the 200-meter dash at 23.74, and sixth in the 100 meters at 11.57.

Warren Duke placed sixth in the 800-meter run with a 2:12.58 time.

Hector Perez placed fifth in the discus throw with a 121-9 1/2 effort.

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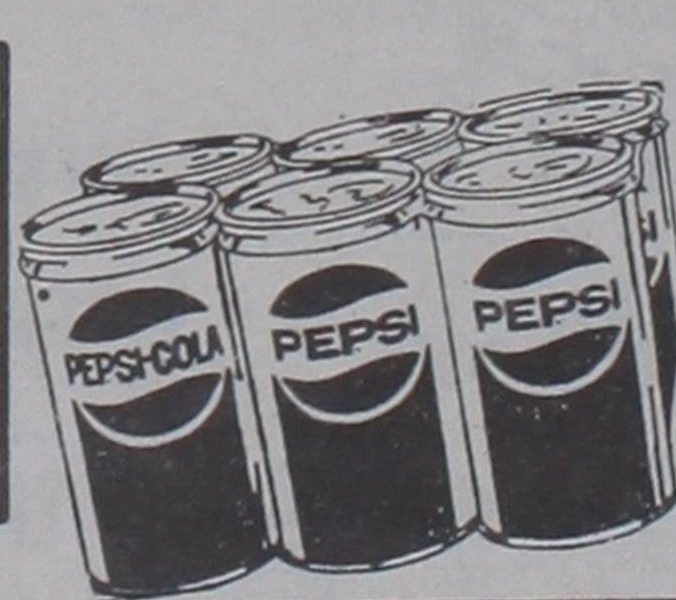

1. My hands are small; please don't expect perfection whenever I make a bed, draw a picture, or throw a ball. My legs are short; please slow down so that I can keep up with you.

2. My eyes have not seen the world as yours have; please let me explore safely; don't restrict me unnecessarily.

3. Housework will always be there. I'm only little for such a short time-please take time to explain things to me about this wonderful world, and do so willingly.

4. My feelings are tender; please be sensitive to my needs; don't nag me all day long. (You wouldn't want to be nagged for your inquisitiveness.) Treat me as you would like to be treated.

5. I am a special gift from God;

please treasure me as God intended you to do, holding me accountable for my actions, giving me guidelines to live by, and disciplining me in a loving manner.

6. I need your encouragement but not your praise, to grow. Please go easy on the criticism; remember, you can criticize the things I do without criticizing me.

7. Please give me the freedom to make decisions concerning myself. Permit me to fail, so that I can learn from my mistakes. Then someday I'll be prepared to make the kind of decisions life requires of me.

Chris Tannahill Retires From Army After 20 Years

Major Tannahill is qualified in UH-1 "Huey" helicopters, UH-60 "Blackhawk" helicopters, and U-21 airplanes. Chris' obvious, keen interest in aviation was cultivated by Elvie Jennings at Friona's Benger Air Park.

Through his career, Chris also had varied assignments in both helicopter ambulance and hospital supply and medical logistics activities. He was a helicopter ambulance pilot in Viet Nam (1971), Fort Riley, Kansas (1972-75), Fort Rucker, Alabama (1978-81), and Schweinfurt, Germany (1984-86). He was assigned as a medical supply officer at Fort Rucker, Alabama (1976-78), Landstuhl, Germany (1981-84), and Fort Irwin, California (1986-90). He spent over six years overseas during his 20 years active duty.

Major Tannahill's awards include the Viet Nam Campaign Medal, Viet Nam Service Ribbon, Overseas Service Ribbon, Army Reserve Service Medal, Air Medal, Army Commendation Medal, and the Meritorious Service Medal. He also wears the Master Army Aviator Badge.

He presently resides in Tacoma, Washington where he is employed as distribution manager for the Multicare Medical Center. His wife, Gigi, and his daughter, Christie, will join him soon in Tacoma. His son, James, continues to attend the University of Nevada at Las Vegas.
