All at Sea.

Publishers' Press. Madrid, Nov. 15 .- Eminent legists here have been pointing out for the edification of orators and writers who in various countries have been makng personal attacks on the Spanish sovereigns, that they are all at sea as regards King Alfonso's prerogative of mercy. In accordance with the Spanish constitution, the monarch has theoretically the right to pardon condemned criminals, but this right cannot be exercised even in regard to crimes at common law and minor offenses, unless the pardon is proposed with the sanction of the government by the Judicial Council. In the case of Senor Ferrer the government did not think it desirable to recommend him to the clemency of the sovereign, one of the prime reasons being that it would have looked like yielding to mences from abroad. The king himself could not have taken the initiative without doing violence to the constitution, and is therefore completely absolved from all responsibilty.



Paris, Nov. 15 .- Mr. Rodman Wanamaker is apparently determined to be the first American millionaire to atan aeroplane from Mr. Bleriot, and struct him how to fly,

The aeroplane ordered by the American is somewhat larger than the machine in which Bleriot crossed the English Channel, having a sustaining surface of approximately 200 square feet in the main wings, while the Channel machine spread only 150 square feet of wing surface.
