Gisella Breiner of Komistat, Hungary, sailed from home on the Holland American line steamship, "Ryndam," When she found after the ship had sailed that Kosher food could not be btained on board, she determined to fast the entire trip. She ate but little, some of her fellow travelers providing her with scanty morsels which they had brought on board on sailing. It was no wonder that when the nine days' voyage was over, she had to be carried ashore at Ellis Island, owing to her very weak condition, and within a day or two died, literally starved to death.

It is said that relatives in this country at once took charge of her body. which was buried in accordance with all the rights of the Jewish church.

Nitrate of soda is not so well adapted to farm rops such as corn and cotton and fruit trees for the reason that it is so expensive. Cotton seed meal contains its nitrogen in such a form that it is not washed from the soil and cannot be taken up by the plant until it has amonia and nitrate.
