

EcoTheater Is Demonstrated

Joyce Marshall, an EcoTheater playwright-director, of Dallas, Texas, recently presented a demonstration of this community theater method for members of the Parmer County Historical Society. EcoTheater is drama that is developed from the stories of a local community and uses residents who have no acting experience.

Marshall, with the assistance of her husband, Gene, presented three vignettes. "At the Beauty

Shop" allowed the audience to be in on the thoughts of three women as they got their hair fixed. "Bananas" is a comic scene of a husband/wife dispute over bananas. "The Teenagers" involves two high school friends, one of whom has dropped out of school. All of these scenes were developed from oral history and life experiences, using the EcoTheater method of writing/improvisation/rewriting.

Marshall, a Friona High School graduate, is playwright-director of an EcoTheater seed company in Dallas and teaches week-long EcoTheater workshops nationally.

The MDA currently sponsors some 500 individual research projects worldwide. It also supports some 230 outpatient clinics nationwide, where people with any of the forty muscle disorders covered by MDA programs receive medical care, orthopedic aids and related services.

Baby Boomers Could Be A Big Influence On The Stock Market
