Weekly SURPLUS NEWS WAA logo.

Veterans cleaned out the stock of surplus vehicles at a pre-Fourth of July sale at Red River arsenal by grabbing them off at the rate of approximately one and a half vehicles a minute.

Employing "cash and carry" sales tactics to surplus Texas real property for the first time, War Assets Administration will offer 100 buildings at Dalhart Army Air Field on a spot bid basis July 15.

War Assets Administration has decided to donate several thousand surplus dynamotors to schools and other public institutions.

Pistons, gears, engine assemblies, lamp bulbs, drive shaft flanges and bearings are included in lots of automotive parts and equipment placed on sale through Customer Service Center of the Grand Prairie office of WAA until July 16.

Household furniture now goes on the WAA market until July 14 through the Customer Service Center at Grand Prairie, Texas.

Ammunition lagoons at Pantex Ordnance Plant, near Amarillo, have been leased by WAA to farmers for the storage of wheat.

The equipment of the establishment is the very latest obtainable, having been provided by Fort Worth Fixtures who figured out and installed just exactly what is needed in every department.

Music is provided through installations of the Coin-O-Matic Music Co. of Stephenville and Clifton, and will be regulated to the volume desired by patrons.

With hours tentatively set at 11 a. m. to 11 p. m., they state that they will devote themselves to serving the public as fully as possible, with nothing but the finest of foods and service, and overlooking nothing which might add to enjoyment and appreciation of their patrons.

Veterans' News

Upwards of 150,000 World War II veterans are now taking correspondence courses under the G. I. Bill.

The courses cover a wide range of subjects, including such specialized studies as gemology, criminology, industrial plastics and air conditioning.

Veterans may be enrolled only in those correspondence courses for which contracts have been negotiated, VA said.

Three out of five, or 61 per cent of all World War II veterans are under 30 years of age, according to a new Veterans Administration tabulation.

More than two and a quarter billion dollars has been spent to provide education and on-the-job training for veterans of World War II.

The report showed expenditures during the first 10 months of the 1947 fiscal year increasing 350 per cent over cumulative prior costs.

Austin, July 8.—All the Texans who have had new or reconditioned motors put in their old cars were urged Tuesday to get their ownership papers in order.

A new law passed by the 56th Legislature and now in effect, provides that a new motor number be assigned by the Highway Department, after which the vehicle owner should apply for correction of his title papers.

Rats Are Serious Menace to Man's Health and Property

Austin, July 7.—Because of the economic losses they cause to industry and commerce and the annoyance they create in homes, rats have long been considered a serious menace to mankind long before their role as vectors of disease was understood.

It is necessary to public health, Dr. Cox said, "that a continuous rat control program be maintained in every urban and rural area throughout Texas. This is of especial importance on farms where rats may flourish by feeding on grain and other farm products."

The doctor pointed out that rats, like other living things, require food and shelter if they are to propagate and increase in number. Destroying their shelter and breeding places requires the rat-proofing of buildings and providing for periodic inspection of buildings to insure permanent safety.

New Officials See Healthy Condition In Current Report

A bright picture of the financial stability of this section and of the continuing soundness of the local banking institution is reflected by the current report of condition of the First National Bank of Hico, carried on another page of this issue.

Concurrent with the report of condition and accompanying statement, announcement is made of a change in officials of the bank through action of a recent directors' meeting, called July 3.

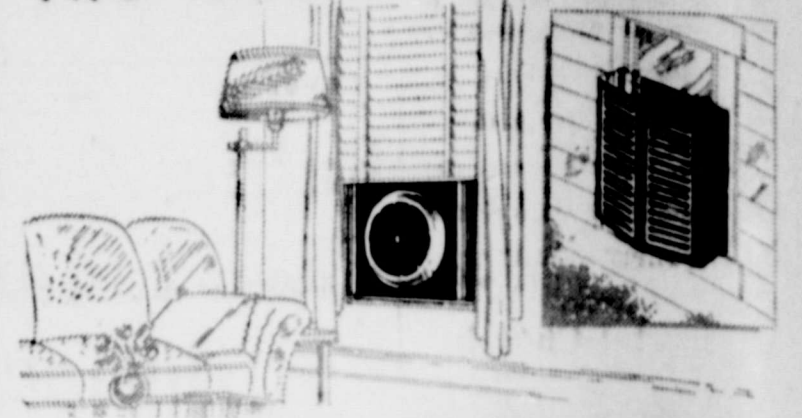



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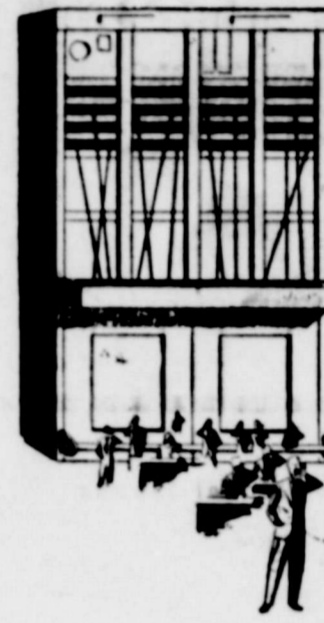
