MANY ARRESTED AND FINED ON SPINSTER DAY

LEAP YEAR STUNT DRAWS INTEREST, RAISES MONEY FOR LOCAL BAND FUND

"Spinster Day," Monday, March 15, was a big day in Hico for the women from eighteen to eighty years old, for they were the city officials on that date.

Miss Hester Jordan, city mayor for a day, was busy the entire time collecting fines from law-breakers who invariably joy-walked, ran red lights, and parked across their allotted space.

The streets were patrolled by Chief of Police Geraldine Rohne and her deputy, Billy Jean Williamson. All complaints against bachelors and other citizens were filed by City Attorney Louise Blair. Fines collected that afternoon amounted to about \$400.

The most exciting moment of the day came about 7:10 when two bachelors escaped from the city jail. A search party was sent out, but with no success, for it seems that the bachelors left town—do you suppose they were afraid to face the spinsters at their trial?

At 9:00 p. m. the city court of Hico, Texas, was called to order by the Chief of Police, Geraldine Rohne. The said court was called for the purpose of giving a trial to all bachelors in the community, for said bachelorhood was deemed a crime on this date.

Her Honor, Mayor Hester Jordan, swore in the following jurors, by having them place their right hand on the Montgomery Ward catalogue and repeat the oath. The jury was composed of Rex Ellis, Wallace Ratliff, Odie Patsick, Charlie Dowdy, Weldon Pierce, J. D. Partain, and Misses Irene Frank and Ruth Phillips; and Mrs. J. L. Chaney and Mrs. Morse Ross.

The following persons were called to the stand and questioned by City Attorney Louise Blair: J. M. Lokey, Elton Russell, Leonard Howard, Norman (Bucks) Cunningham, and Weldon Luker. After constant questioning, most of them broke under the pressure and admitted that they would marry if they could find a woman who "would support them"; just what do you think of that? Strangely enough, these men plead that "you can live on love only for a short time—it is nice to have three meals a day."

After hearing each person's explanation of why they are still bachelors, the jury passed sentences on them. (Mr. Lokey, don't forget those nylon hose that the women of the stand are to receive). Elton Russell received a suspended sentence of a year, and if at that time he hasn't married, he will have to pay a fine of \$100. Weldon Luker was fined \$100, and Leonard Howard has to buy a bottle of valve oil.

Other than trying these bachelors, the city court had one other case—that of Paul Neal, who brought his joy-walking case to court. In spite of the fact that Mr. Neal's lawyer, Herman Steele, put up a good case in his client's defense, he just couldn't get past the city attorney. Mr. Neal made his fine—only twice as much.

After the jury had given its final decision, the court adjourned, and the bachelors are still "on the loose."

Mrs. Grace Woodward Passed Away Sunday In Fort Worth Hospital

Mrs. Grace R. Woodward, devoted wife of C. L. Woodward, passed away Sunday night, March 14, at St. Joseph's Hospital in Fort Worth where she had been under treatment for several months.

Infinite medical care and tender, constant concern over her health and comfort had been unavailing in doing more than lessening her suffering in the latter days of a life that had been wrapped up in the lives of others.

Funeral services were held at 3 o'clock Tuesday afternoon at the Hico Methodist Church, conducted by the pastor, Rev. J. L. Ray, who was assisted by Rev. Tom Galloway, Presbyterian minister at Waco and former pastor of the deceased.

Interment was in the Hico Cemetery, with Meisner Funeral Directors of Fort Worth in charge. Pallbearers were J. B. Ogle, Max Hoffman, J. B. Ratliff, W. G. Phillips, S. E. Blair Jr., and Harry Yocham of Hico, and R. E. McMahan, Fort Worth and Boyd Greenway of Valley Mills. Flower bearers were members of Mrs. Woodward's music class.

As a young girl, Grace Roberts came to Hico as a music teacher. Two years later, on June 15, 1915, she was married to C. L. Woodward, who is now a retired banker, and they have made their home in Hico since that time. Mrs. Woodward has contributed much to the growth of Hico's music circles, both educationally and religiously. She continued teaching piano up to the time of her illness.

A silent token of the high esteem in which she was held by her neighbors, friends and relatives was the beautiful floral offering which was described as one of the largest ever seen here at a funeral.

Mrs. Woodward is survived by her husband, one brother, Lloyd Roberts of Beaumont, and one sister-in-law, Mrs. T. V. Lane of Pampa.

Death Closes Long and Useful Life of One of Erath County's Pioneers

A face that has long been familiar on the streets of Hico will be missing now since the unexpected passing last Friday, March 12, of G. H. Golightly. In spite of his advanced age, Mr. Golightly was extremely active and took a lively interest in his family, his friends and his affairs.

He was reported to have suffered a fall the day before, and was hospitalized in Hico, with his condition not known to be critical. But early Friday morning he passed away, grieving his loved ones, and throwing a pall of sadness over the community.

Had he lived one more week, Mr. Golightly would have rounded out 89 years of a full life. He was born March 19, 1859, near Oxford, Ala.

He was married to Ellen Higginbotham December 6, 1885. She preceded him in death January 25, 1942. To this union five children were born, two boys and three girls. All were present for the funeral. They are: Mrs. A. E. Denman, Hico; Geo. B. Golightly, Hamilton; Mrs. G. C. Miller, Hico; Mrs. J. C. Whitesides, Hico; and John Golightly of Hico. Besides the children he is survived by nine grandchildren, six great-grandchildren, and one sister, Mrs. Dora Carter, who was ill and not able to attend the funeral.

Mr. Golightly and his family moved from Alabama to Runnels County, Texas near Ballinger, in 1891. He moved to Erath County near Stephenville in 1892, and then to the Claiborne community in 1900. He had lived in the same home since that time and his family.

He was a charter member of the Claiborne Methodist church. There being no church building there when he moved to the community, he bought a lot and gave it for a building site. He was instrumental in the building of the church.

He joined the Methodist church at an early age and lived a devoted life through these many years. He was a man who always put God first in his life and by his own life he has proven to many that Jesus never fails.

He and his son, John, were engaged in raising Hereford cattle, having one of the outstanding herds in this part of the state.

Funeral services were conducted at the Claiborne Methodist Church Sunday, March 14, 1948 at 2:30 p. m. by Rev. Oran Stevens, District Superintendent of the Claico district. He was assisted by the local pastor, Rev. E. W. Holt, Bradford Corrigan of Hamilton sang "In the Garden."

Pallbearers were I. E. Durham, Grady Wolfe, Hub Alexander, Ray Stipe, W. E. Alexander, and A. L. Thompson.

ALL DOGS SHOULD BE VACCINATED, COX SAYS; --OR SUMP'N, SAY WE

Austin, March 17.—The recent death of a child in South Texas from rabies emphasizes the danger of this disease and its importance to public health.

According to a statement which has just been released by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, there were 1,969 rabid animals discovered by laboratory examination in Texas last year. There were undoubtedly many more rabid animals running loose which were never examined. Since most of these animals were dogs, children are especially vulnerable to this dreaded disease.

"All dogs should be vaccinated annually as a rabies control measure," Dr. Cox said. "When a child is bitten by an infected dog, the dog should be penned up for observation for ten days. If he shows no signs of illness at that time he is not rabid, but if he sickens, he should be killed in such a manner as not to injure the brain. The brain should be packed immediately in ice and sent to the State Department of Health for examination. If rabies is shown to be present there is still time to begin anti-rabies treatment of the child."

Cities and towns should take firm steps to control the presence of stray and ownerless dogs since they remain unvaccinated and are usually the principal source of rabies.

# HOME NEWS

By HELEN HALE

**CURTAINS** may be washed with less danger of tearing if they are placed in a pillow case or sack. Do not have the water too hot.



Eru tint may be restored to faded curtains by adding either tea or coffee solution to the rinse water.

Good, fresh air smell will stay in towels if they are removed from the line outdoors before they are quite dry, folded and then run through the wringer. Do not iron.

**THIN CHIFFON** and lace collars and vests may be cleaned by placing over a bath towel and scrubbing gently with mild soap suds. Rinse in the same way, then shake off excess moisture and press.

Ruffled curtains are easy to flate with a curling iron to make them look like new.

**BLACK SILK** is easily cleaned by shaking and brushing well. Sponge the right side with strong cold coffee. When almost dry, press on the wrong side.

Paint spots on fabrics usually yield to treatment with a solution made of equal parts of ammonia and turpentine. Saturate until the paint loosens. Wash in warm soap suds.

If scorch spots are very slight, dip in cold water, rub with soda and leach in the sun.

**GLYCERINE** should be kept handy for removing tea and coffee stains from linen.

Iodine stains are easily washed out with plain cold water. If the stain is not allowed to dry.

Car grease should be rubbed with lard and soaked in gasoline until loosened, then wash in lukewarm water and soap.

Grass stains may be removed from white clothing by soaking in alcohol before washing.

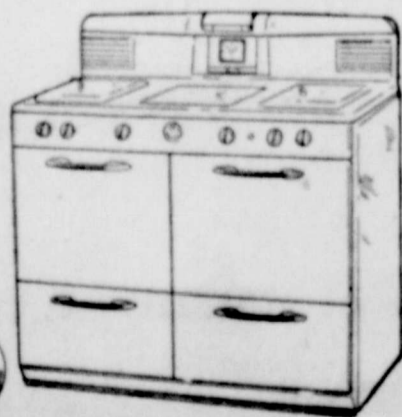
