Osborn, Schueler Named To Board

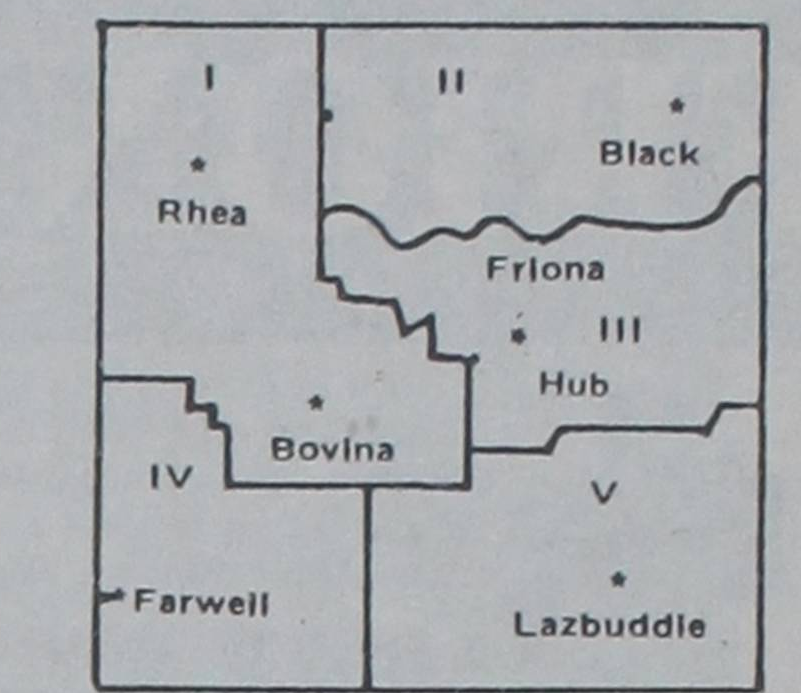
McFarland C. Osborn and Raymond Schueler, both Friona residents, were recently re-elected to the Parmer County S.W.C.D. board of directors. Schueler represents Zone 1 of the district while Osborn represents Zone 2.

The purpose of the Parmer County S.W.C.D., with headquarters in Friona, is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters.

The board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.

As two of five individuals serving on the district board of directors, Schueler and Osborn will be responsible for district policies and procedures for carrying out the district program within the framework of the Texas soil conservation law.

In Texas, there are 210 soil and water conservation districts. Each is a legal subdivision of state government organized by local agriculture landowners with the assistance of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board. Unlike most other legal subdivisions of state government,



S.W.C.D.s do not have the powers of taxation or eminent domain. All conservation programs managed by the districts are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator.

Parmer County S.W.C.D. was organized in April 1948.

Other zone representatives include: Kevin Welch, Zone III; Troy Christian, Zone IV and Mike Miller, Zone V.

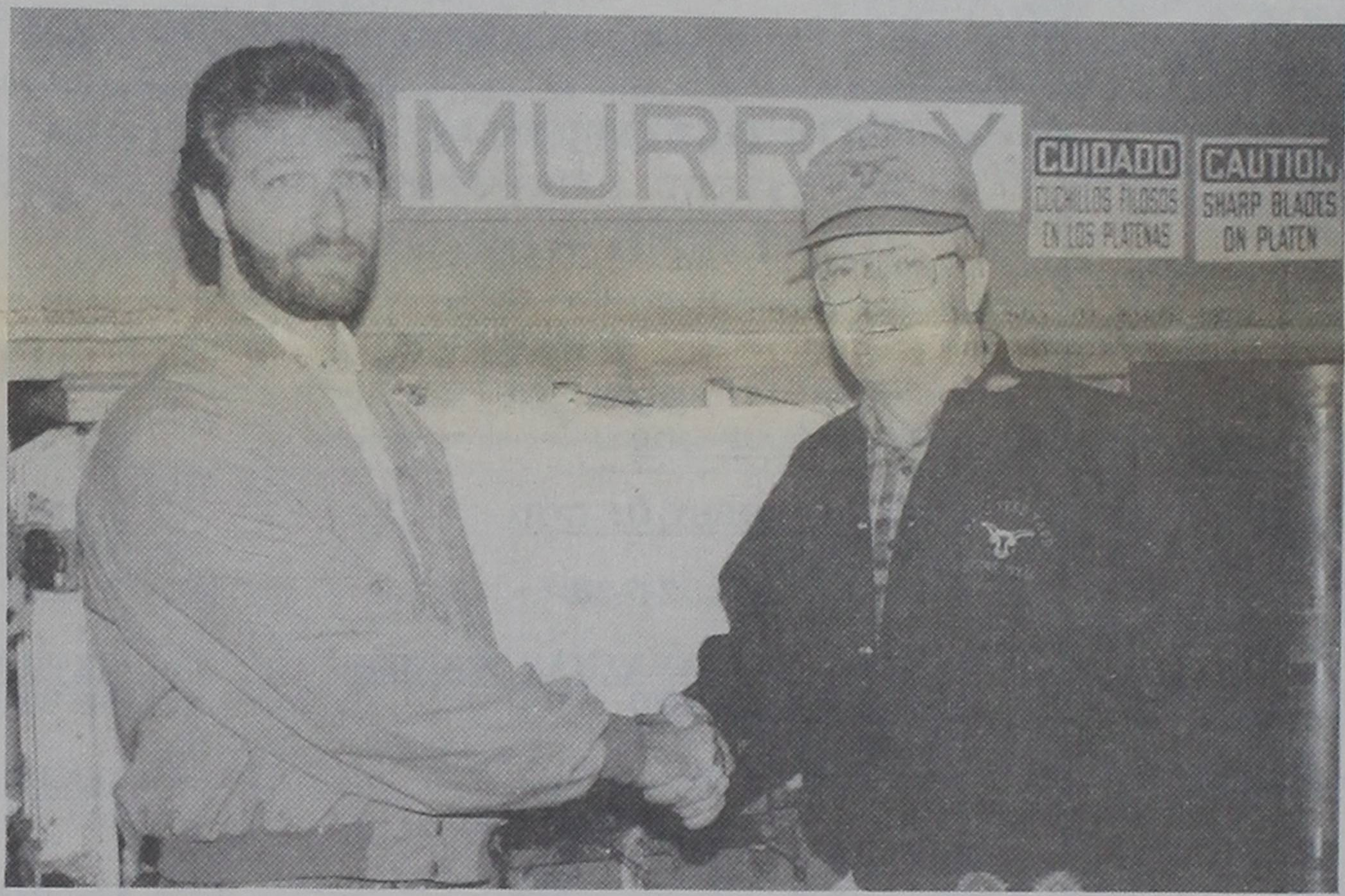

It is good to be back in Friona after a trip down to Southwestern Oklahoma. Crops in the Hollis-Altus-Tipton area are very good this fall. Some cotton had been harvested, but many fields were almost like snowbanks. Most of the leaves were gone and the open bolls were so big and fluffy.

Seeing cotton trailers as we used to know them is a rarity in that area. Almost every field that had been harvested was marked by a row of modules that from a distance looked kind of like a freight train with each box car being covered with a plastic wrap.

My Tipton kids, John and Geneva Osborn, keep busy helping take care of about eighty children who live at The Tipton Home, so I hardly saw them in the day time, but the evenings were fun.

One day we drove from Tipton

We had to determine where different families lived by the trees and an occasional cistern. A few farmers and ranchers still live on their land, but most of them own large acreages whereas when the land was filed on in the early part of the century, each man was allowed only 160 acres.
