## MADD Is RR Project Sponsor

Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD) will sponsor "Project Red Ribbon Campaign" through January 1.

Project organizers encourage residents to tie a red ribbon on the left side-view mirror or door handle of their vehicle as a reminder to pass the keys if they have been drinking.

The red ribbon also symbolizes the hope for a less violent future and a move to change the meaning of "tying one on," the release stated.

Statistics indicate that two out of five Americans will be involved in an alcohol-related crash in their lifetime, the release stated. Public awareness can prevent alcohol-related crashes, the release continued.

Other statistics related to the drunk driving problem are:

\*Every 23 minutes, one person dies in an alcohol-related auto crash;

\*Nationally, nearly 540,000 people are injured each year in alcohol-related traffic crashes, an average of one injury per minute;

\*Drunk driving is the most frequently committed crime in the nation today. In 1988, DWI arrests totaled an estimated 1,790,500.

\*In 1989, approximately eight teen-agers died each day in drunk driving crashes.

\*In 1989 in Texas, there were approximately 35,847 DWI-involved motor vehicle crashes with 1,306 people killed and 31,896 people injured.

## Lumbrera Returned To Parmer County

A former Bovina woman was extradited to the Parmer County Jail last Friday after a Kansas judge sentenced her to life imprisonment on Friday for the smothering death of her four-year-old son.

Diana Lumbrera arrived at the Parmer County Jail at about 3:30 p.m. Friday, where she will be held in lieu of three separate bonds of \$100,000 each, said Parmer County Sheriff Rex Williams.

Finney County District Court Judge J. Stephen Nyswonger of Kansas issued the life sentence Friday morning despite Lumbrera's protests of innocence.

She was convicted October 3 of smothering to death her four-year-old son, Jose Antonio Lumbrera, last May, while residing in Garden City, Kansas.

Luther Thompson, the assistant district attorney for Parmer County, said Lumbrera faces three capital murder indictments in

## Cotton Farmers Enjoying Harvest

Harvest is well along on one of the best cotton crops, if not the best ever seen in Parmer County.

A survey of cotton gins in the county on Tuesday of this week indicated that approximately 24,765 bales of cotton had been ginned as of noon that day.

Virtually every gin contacted said that they had at least as many bales "tagged in" for ginning as those they had already processed.

Jerry Butman, manager of Friona Farmers Co-op Gin, said he felt that the crop was just over 50 per cent harvested. "It has been an exceptional year. The yield is one of the best ever and the turnout is high." The price also is above average. It stood at 61.76 cents per pound on Wednesday.

The Parmer County ASCS office said that county farmers planted a total of 52,421 acres of cotton this year, but that of that number a total of 3,500 acres had been reported as "failed." That left approximately 48,925 harvestable acres.

# Friona Flashbacks

...from the files of The Friona Star

## 60 YEARS AGO--NOV. 14, 1930

The Friona Star will join the other newspapers of the state in an effort to help those who are out of work. After this issue of the paper and until further notice the Friona Star will run want ads for any man or woman who wishes to advertise for work free of charge. If you are looking for a job come and see the editor. If there are any little odd jobs you want done around the house put a want ad in the Star, someone needs that work and perhaps needs it badly.

## 55 YEARS AGO--NOV. 15, 1935

Friona and the surrounding territory received a light fall of snow, beginning in the early hours of Monday morning and continuing intermittently until nearly noon. Considerable portion of the fall was in the form of fine hail and consequently did not reach a depth of more than half an inch, but produced about one sixteenth of an inch of moisture, most of the snow disappeared during the afternoon.

## 50 YEARS AGO--NOV. 15, 1940

The machinery seems now to be getting underway for the calling of an election in Parmer County, for the issuing of a sufficient amount of County Bonds, for the hard-surfacing of State Highway No. 86, and State Highway No. 214, across the county as stated in last week's issue of the Star. The necessary petitions have been circulated, and will be presented to the County Commissioners Court, this week or at its next regular meeting. If these petitions receive favorable consideration by the Court, the election will be called for the earliest date possible, and if the results of the election are favorable to the bond issue, the bonds will be issued with the provision that they are not to be sold, unless the State is in a position to absorb these bonds with the one cent gasoline tax, as provided for in House Bill No. 688, passed at the regular session

of the 46th Legislature.

## 40 YEARS AGO--NOV. 9, 1950

"Years are but days, and days are but moments in Thy sight, Lord," spoke Rev. Jimmie Tidwell Tuesday as he gave thanks before a birthday cake bearing one hundred candles at the table of beloved Grandmother Thornton, centerian and Christian worker for near ten decades. Grandmother Thornton now living at the home of her grandson, Morey Bussell, northwest of Friona, time and again stepped across the floor Tuesday to greet her children, grandchildren and old friends many of whom she had not seen in a half century. There are 87 descendants in the family. Present to honor their mother were all four of her children. She has been widowed for sixty years, more than the lifetime of most of those paying their respects and sending gifts Tuesday.

## 35 YEARS AGO--NOV. 11, 1955

Smoldering fire in the 50,000 bushel wood and iron unit of the Bovina Wheat Growers elevator early this morning broke into the open to destroy most of the milo and kafir stored in that structure. A.C. Teter, firm manager, said that damage to the grain could reach a \$75,000 figure, with the building loss probably passing the \$50,000 mark. The fire started from unknown sources in the headhouse of the old structure, blazing into the open only when the elevator doors were opened, admitting air.

The annual meeting of the Parmer County Community Hospital stockholders was held Tuesday evening in Friona, with about 40 people present to hear the brightest financial report yet enabled in the local operation. Total assets of the hospital were revealed at \$167,546.02, with a net profit in 1955 more than doubling the previous three-year average, and some \$13,000 more than the 1954 report. Operating expenses

were up, also, topping the \$100,000 mark before the end of the audit period ending September 30.

## 30 YEARS AGO--NOV. 10, 1960

Sale of the Mobil Petroleum Agency here was announced this week by seller Keith Blackburn and buyer Gerald Wright. Blackburn, who has operated the business for the past eight years, will move with his wife to Albuquerque. Wright has farmed and been employed by several business firms since coming to the Friona area about three years ago. His wife, Laurie, will help operate the business. The transaction was effective Tuesday.

## 25 YEARS AGO--NOV. 11, 1965

A Friona group has received approval of their application to operate a daytime radio station in Friona, it was announced this week by the Federal Communications Commission. The new station, which will have a frequency of 1070 kilocycles, 250 watts, will be owned by a partnership of H.K. (Pudge) Kendrick, Bill McDonnel, Frank Spring and Joe Shields. The group, which will do business as "Parmer County Broadcasting Company," will locate its transmitter three miles southwest of Friona, just off U.S. Highway 60. It is not known where the studio will be located.

## 20 YEARS AGO--NOV. 12, 1970

Friona Consumers will hold open house for its recently-

completed building on Saturday, November 14. Consumers' new facility is located at Ninth and Main. The new building is 70x90 feet. It houses the company's offices, its retail floor for automotive and farm accessories and the tire department. Lewellen and Matlock Construction were general contractors on the building.

## 15 YEARS AGO--NOV. 9, 1975

Girlstown already had three mother cows, three calves and a pair of heifers, but didn't have the "male lead" they needed to start a cow-calf operation. Last Saturday, they got him--a three year old Hereford bull--from George, Kenneth and Harlan Frye, who farm southeast of Friona. The Fryes also donated a mother cow to go with the young bull. The donation brought Girlstown's new beef-cattle herd to ten animals. Receiving the gift for Girlstown at the Frye farm were sisters Joan and Betsy Toney and Girlstown Administrator Marshall Cooper.

## 10 YEARS AGO--NOV. 30, 1980

Two Friona couples were in Las

Vegas, Nevada last week, and missed the tragic fire at the MGM Grand Hotel by a matter of hours. Mr. and Mrs. Leland Gustin and Mr. and Mrs. Charles Myers had been in the hotel the night before, until a late hour, attending the show's headline attraction--The Mac Davis Show. At least 85 people were killed in the fire.

For the second time in a two-week period, the local area was hit by an early season snowstorm, which once again slowed outside activity considerably. Residents awoke on Tuesday morning, November 25 to find four to five inches of snow on the ground, with some drifts up to three feet.

## 5 YEARS AGO--NOV. 24, 1985

Friona High School almost made a clean sweep at the Littlefield District FFA Contests recently. Friona won six of the eight events, and placed second in another, qualifying for the area contests in seven events.

Friona's United Way campaign for 1985 stood at approximately \$8,000 as of Thursday, November 21. This puts the drive at roughly 66 per cent of its goal of \$12,710.

## Goodwine's Rites Held In California

Margaret Reeve Goodwine, 88, died November 13, 1990, in Quaker Garden's Retirement Home at Stanton, California. Memorial services were held in the Presbyterian Church in Bellflower, California, Saturday, November 17.

She was the daughter of Hadley and Adaline Reeve, who were pioneers of the Friona community and a sister of the late Floyd Reeve, Mamie Guyer and Malinda Schlenker.

She was born in Indiana on March 24, 1902 and came to Texas in 1918. She moved to California in 1924 and married Leland (Jim) Goodwine on November 3, 1924.

Survivors include her husband, Leland, of the home; a son, David Goodwine of Palmdale, California; a daughter, Lois Mullis of Anaheim, California; a sister, Rachel Weavil of Greensboro, North Carolina; four grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

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

# Squaws Stand 3-0 On Season

The Friona High School Squaws won both of their starts during the past week to post a 3-0 record as of Thanksgiving weekend.

The team downed Shallowater in a road game last Friday, 77-51, and then came home on Tuesday to dispose of Frenship, 65-45.

At Shallowater, freshman Renee Downey opened with a hot hand, sinking four baskets in the opening quarter, one from three-point range. Kendra Gordon also had four two-pointers and Mendi Milner added three from the field and a free throw as the Squaws grabbed the early lead with a 26-point opening quarter.

After a low-scoring second quarter, Friona cranked up its offense again following the intermission. Jenny Procter sank three

goals from the field, one from beyond the three-point circle. Alicia Widner also bombed one from long-range as the Squaws added to their lead.

Miss Gordon made another pair of baskets in the final stanza and Miss Downey sank another three-pointer as the team coasted to a 26-point win.

Miss Downey was the team's leading scorer with 18 points; Miss Gordon had 15 and Miss Widner 10.

Playing their first home game of the season here Tuesday, the Squaws were hosting a Frenship team that had barely missed beating annual girls powerhouse Lubbock Monterey last Saturday, 52-56.

Kendra Gordon's jump shot got Friona off and running at 2-0, and after the visitors scored a pair of baskets, Jenny Procter's three-point goal gave the Squaws a 5-4 lead. Although tied, the team never trailed after this.

Miss Gordon fed Miss Procter on a jump shot for an 11-9 Friona lead, and a minute later Miss Procter's three-point shot again found the net for a 14-9 lead and Renee Downey's pair of free throws made it 16-9.

Friona led, 20-14 at the end of the first quarter.

Frenship outscored the Squaws, 8-2 to start the second quarter, to tie the count at 22-all with 5:44 remaining before halftime.

That was the cue for Miss Procter, with a pair of quick baskets, one more from outside the circle, and Friona was back on top, 27-22 at the 4:16 mark.

Miss Gordon made a pair of nice layups in the last 3:15 of the quarter, helping the Squaws go to intermission with a 36-25 lead.

The halftime layoff didn't hurt Friona as much as it did the Tigers. A pair of baskets by Miss Gordon, plus a three-point play by Elaine White and Lisa Weatherly's layup pushed Friona to its longest lead to that point, 46-29 with 1:43 left in the third.

Friona held a 50-32 lead at the three-quarter mark.

A basket by Miss Gordon and Alicia Widner plus a free throw by the latter player gave the Squaws a 55-35 edge with 4:49 to play and that was the ball game.

Miss Procter's 20 points topped all scorers, and Miss Gordon backed her up capably with 16.

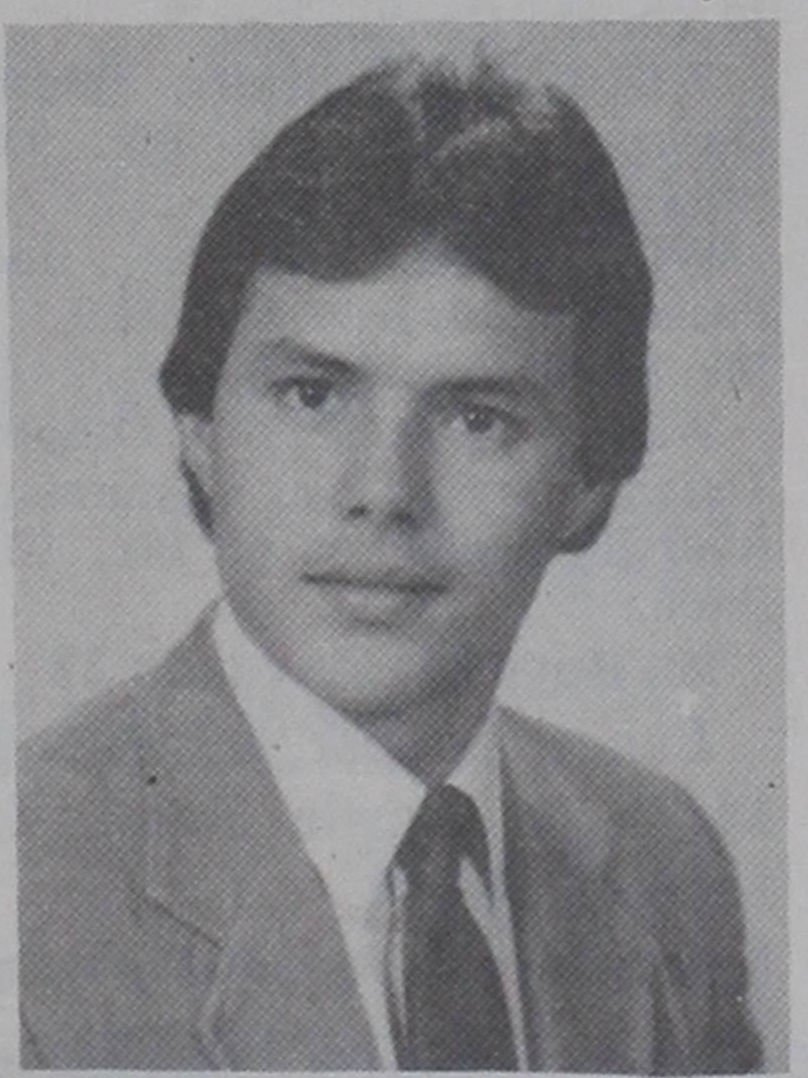

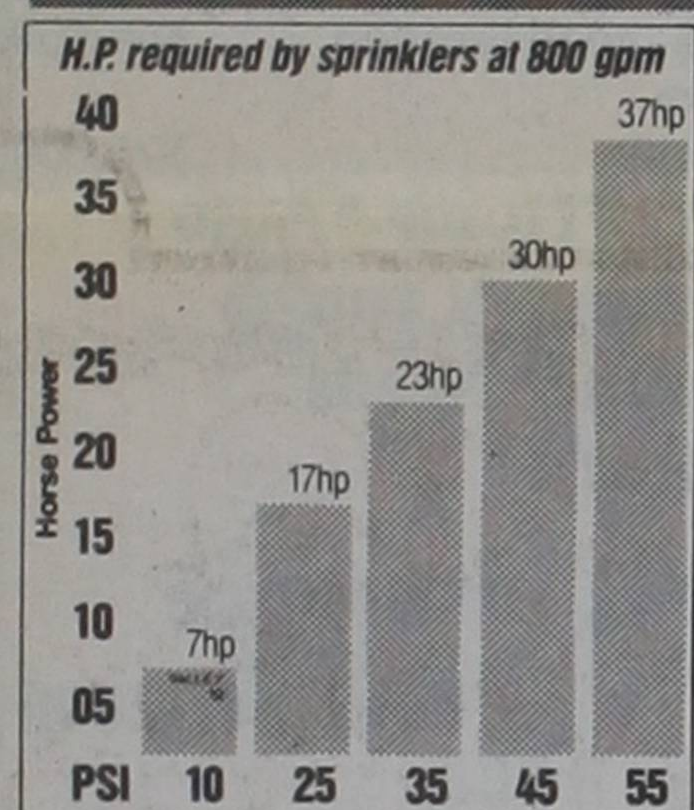

**The IRA Is Still A Good Idea**

Although Tax Reform first  
made headlines in 1986, it has not,  
like many other headlines of nearly  
five years ago, faded into  
obscurity. Confusion about the  
changes wrought by tax reform  
remains, particularly in regard to  
Individual Retirement Accounts  
(IRAs).

Two things about IRAs remain  
the same. Anyone under age 70½  
with earned income can contribute  
to an IRA. And, all contributions  
can earn tax-deferred income.  
Beyond that, eligibility and  
benefits vary according to several

a single working taxpayer not

to \$4,000 annually for you and  
your spouse.

If, on the other hand, either  
spouse participates in an employer-  
qualified retirement plan, the  
amount of your contribution that's  
deductible depends on your  
adjusted gross income (AGI). For  
couples with an AGI up to  
\$40,000, a full deduction is  
available. Between \$41,000 and  
\$50,000, the deduction is phased  
out. Married couples with a joint  
AGI of \$50,000 or above are not  
eligible for a deduction; however,  
they may still contribute to an  
IRA.

Single people who participate in  
an employer-sponsored retirement  
plan can still claim the full IRA  
deduction if their AGI is below  
\$25,000. Between \$25,000 and  
\$35,000, the deduction is phased  
out, and for those with an AGI  
above \$35,000, there's no  
deduction.

Even if you do not qualify for a  
full or partial tax deduction, an  
IRA contribution can still make  
sense. Remember, IRAs continue  
to offer long-term, tax-sheltered  
compounding of both capital  
gains and dividends.

Over a 20-year period, for  
example, an individual in the 28  
percent tax bracket making an  
annual \$2,000 IRA contribution  
that earns only 8 percent, would  
wind up with \$23,000 more in his  
account than an individual making  
the same investments without the  
benefit of tax sheltering.

Too many working taxpayers  
are neglecting their IRAs either  
because they don't understand  
them or they fail to realize the  
benefits.



### Local Doctor Is Recertified By ABFP

Dr. Robert S. Alexander, M.D., of Friona, has been recertified as a diplomate of the American Board of Family Practice (ABFP) as a result of passing a recertification examination offered by the ABFP. The physician thus maintains a specialist status in the medical specialty of family practice.

ABFP diplomates must continue to show proof of competence in the field of comprehensive, continuing care of the family by being recertified every six years. The family practice specialty was the first to require diplomates to be recertified on a continuing basis.

The written examination is designed to prove the candidate's continuing competence in the basic components of family practice--internal medicine, surgery, obstetrics and gynecology, pediatrics, psychiatry and neurology, and community medicine.

To qualify for certification initially, a physician must have successfully completed three years of residency training in family practice and passed an intensive certification examination. There are some 380 residency training programs in teaching hospitals and university medical centers across the United States.

Nearly 39,000 family physicians have now been certified in the specialty. Most are members of the American Academy of Family Physicians, the national association of family doctors. The Academy was the first national medical group to require members to take continuing study, and was chiefly responsible for securing specialty status for family practice.

## Ratcliff Selected To Seminar Staff

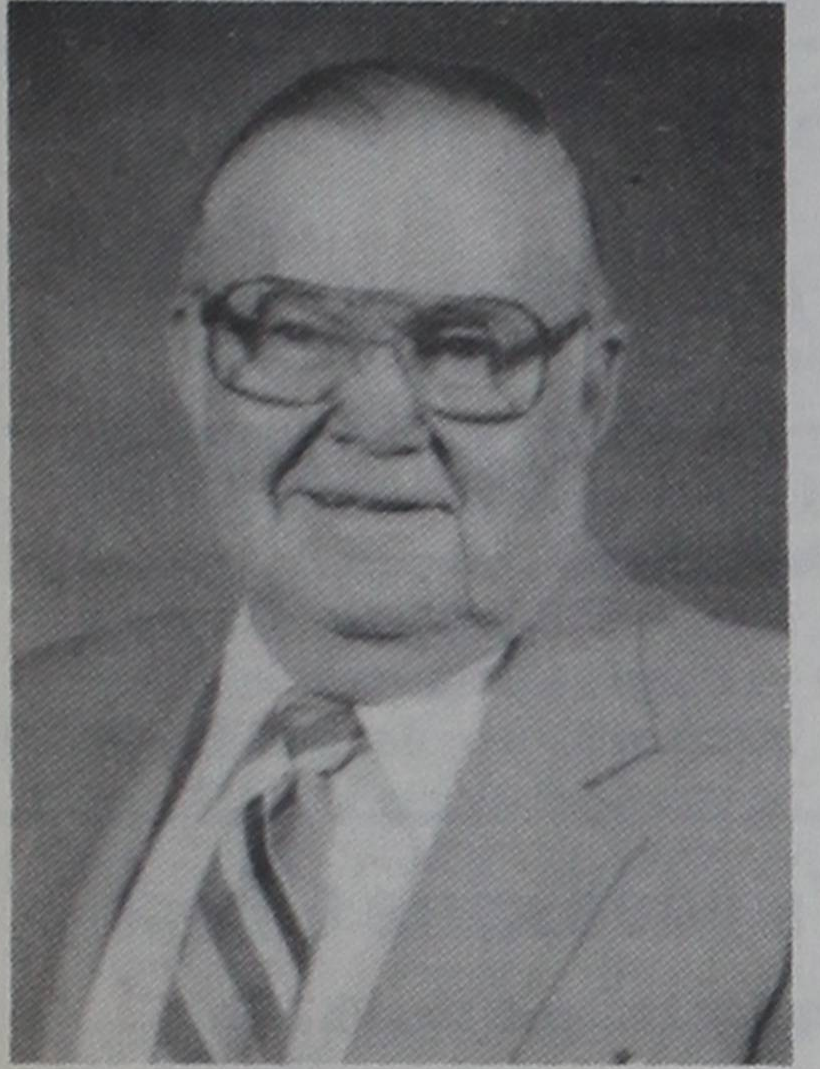
Hal Ratcliff, superintendent of Friona Independent School District, has been selected to participate in the 1990 training update of the Academy for Effective Schools Leadership.

Dr. Jansen gave a report on tax collections, construction progress, TAAS scores and finances.

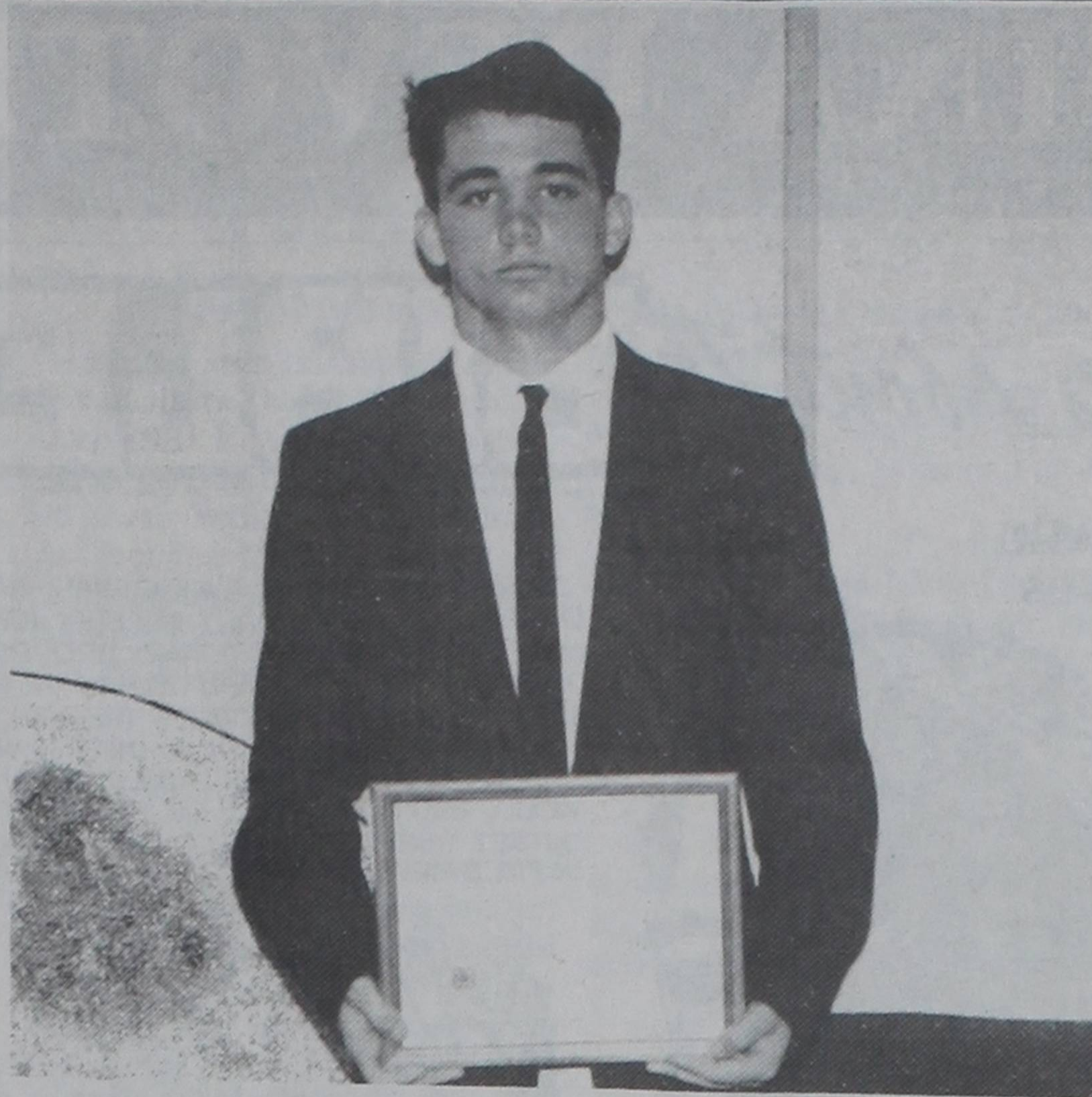
There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

## IN PARMER COUNTY

# Cotton Crop Eyes All-Time Yield Record

Bolstered by a great run of "Indian Summer," the crop harvest in Parmer County has made tremendous strides in recent weeks, with virtually all harvest operations completed except for cotton and sugarbeets.

Through the first 22 days of the month, the temperature has topped the 60-degree mark 16 days and has made it into the 70s or 80s ten days.

Dennis Printz, plant manager of Hereford's Holly Sugar Corp. facility, said early this week that the harvest of the 1990 sugarbeet crop was just over half completed.

"The sugar content of the 1990 crop is about average, but the crop's yield is up by a couple of tons per acre. The weather has cooperated nicely, as we have had to close the factory down only four or five days," Printz said.

Meanwhile, a survey of Parmer County cotton gins this week showed that a total of 24,765 bales of cotton had been ginned --and that may represent only one fourth to one-third of the 1990 crop.

Every gin contacted indicated that they had about as many bales "tagged in" and awaiting ginning as they had already ginned.

Also, gin officials estimate that the harvest may have just passed the 50 per cent mark.

"It has been an exceptional year. The yield is one of the best

ever, and the turnout is high," said one ginner.

The price also is above average, and this bodes well for cotton producers in 1990. The price stood at 61.76 cents per pound on Wednesday of this week.

According to what the ginner said this week, the 1990 cotton crop may be in a position to challenge the county's all-time production record of 80,525 bales, in 1962. The 1962 production came from approximately 49,000 planted acres of cotton.

Parmer County farmers planted a total of 52,421 acres of cotton in 1990, according to a spokesman for the Parmer County ASCS, but of that number a total of 3,500 acres were reported as "failed."

That means that approximately 48,921 harvestable acres of the crop were left.

With only one interruption from the weather, the 1990 cotton harvest has gone rather smoothly. Barring any unforeseen delays, ginner are expecting to work into the new year to get the 1990 crop ginned.

Through the use of module-building, farmers are hoping to be able to get the crop out of the field, and were given a report that shows open weather at least through Monday of next week.

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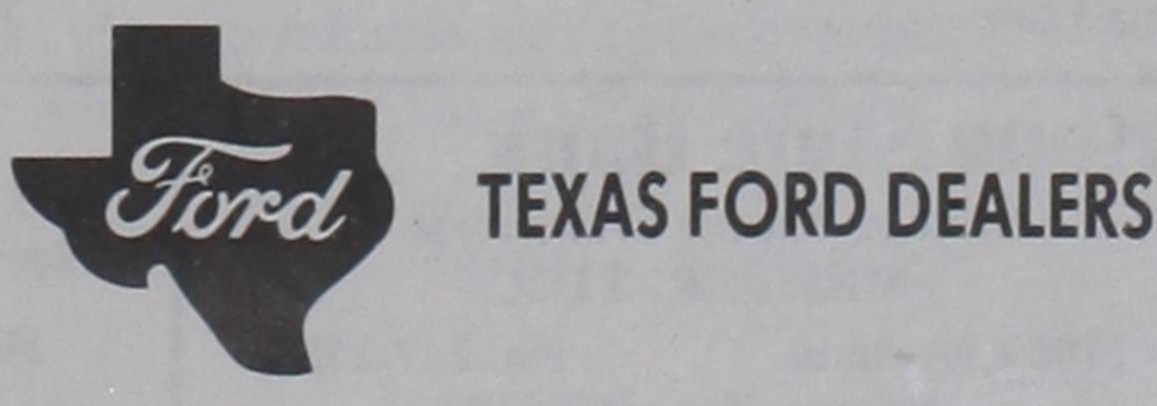

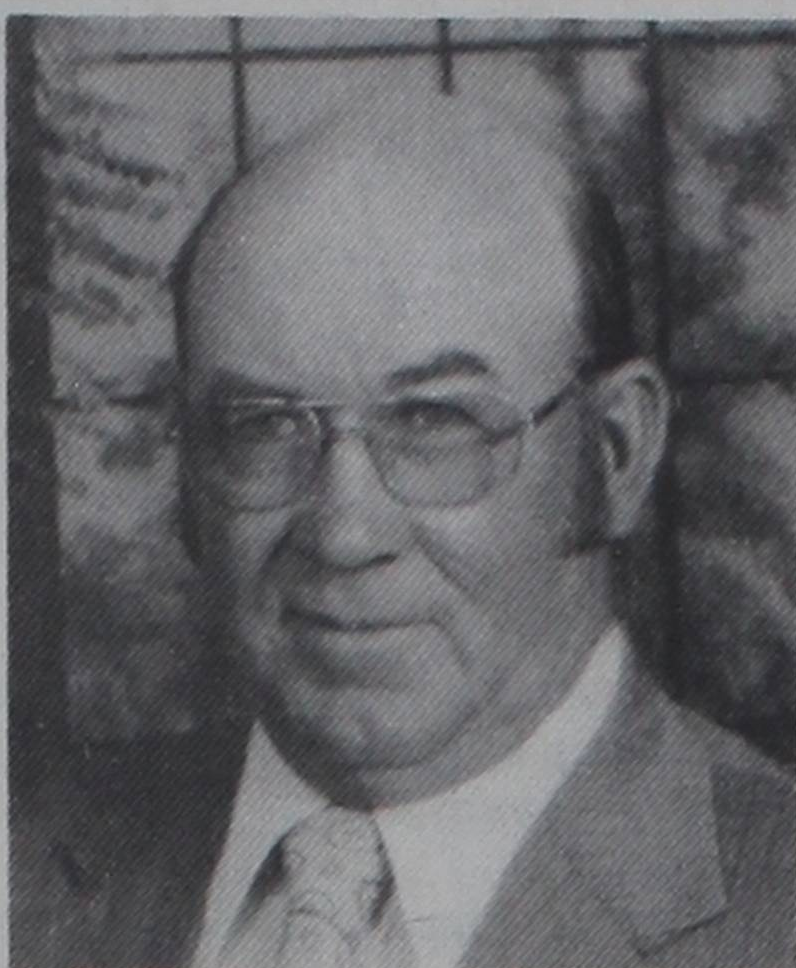
Hamilton was a farmer and was a member of Calvary Baptist Church.

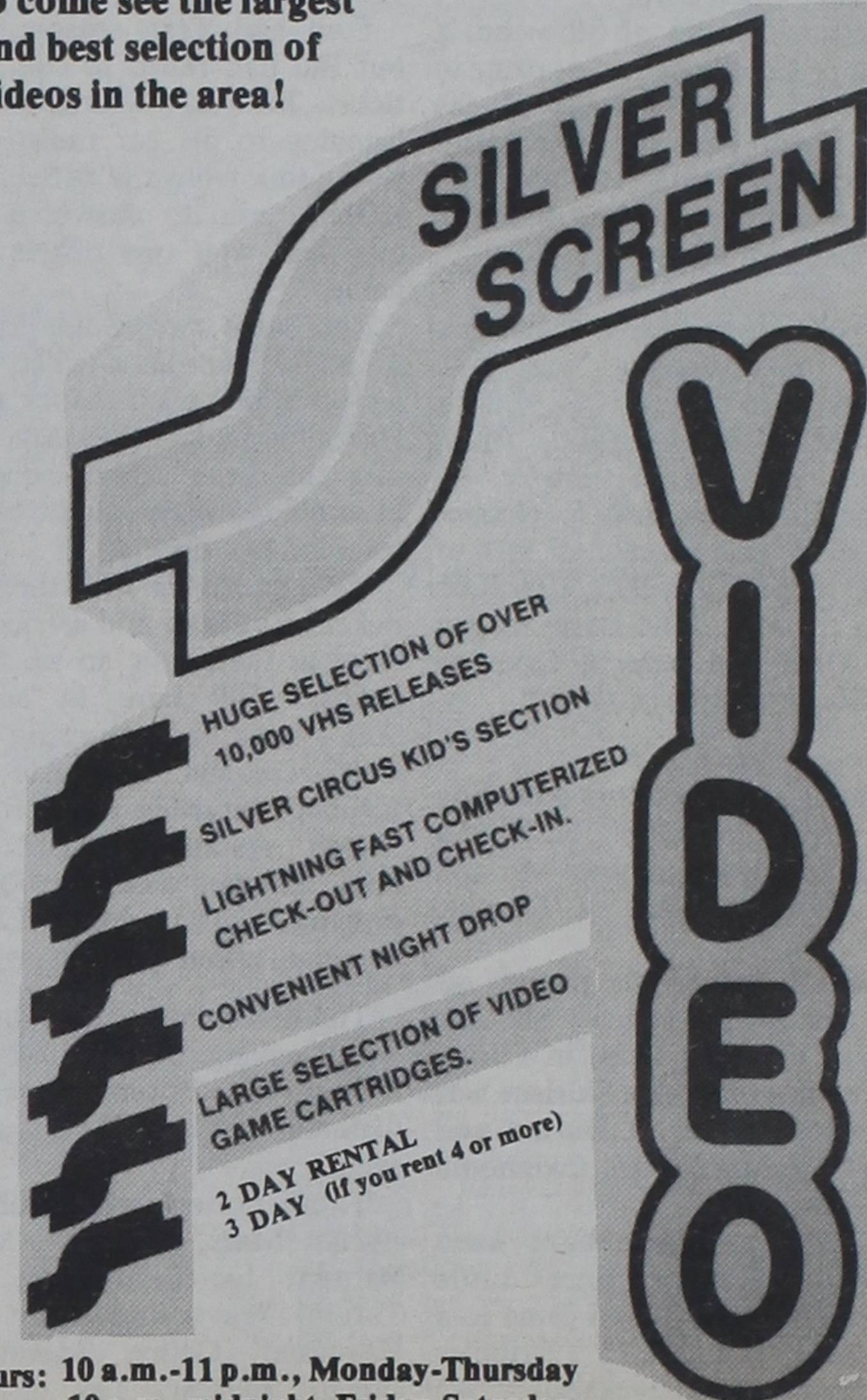

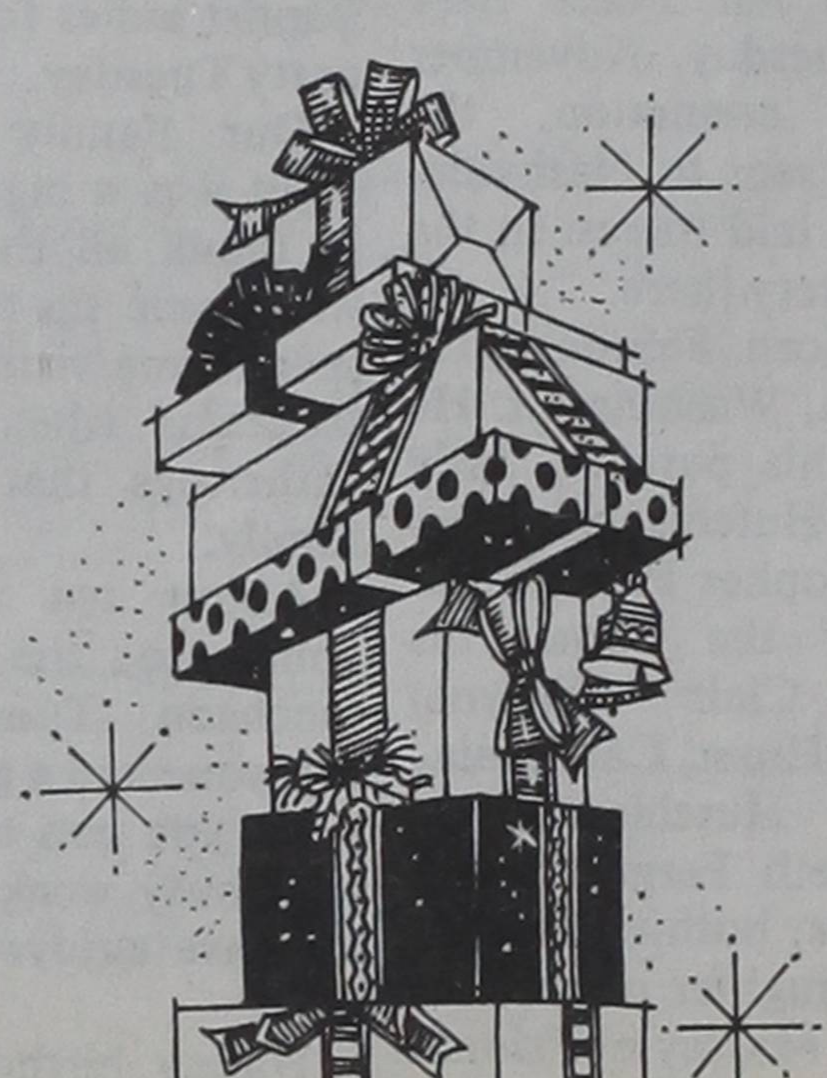

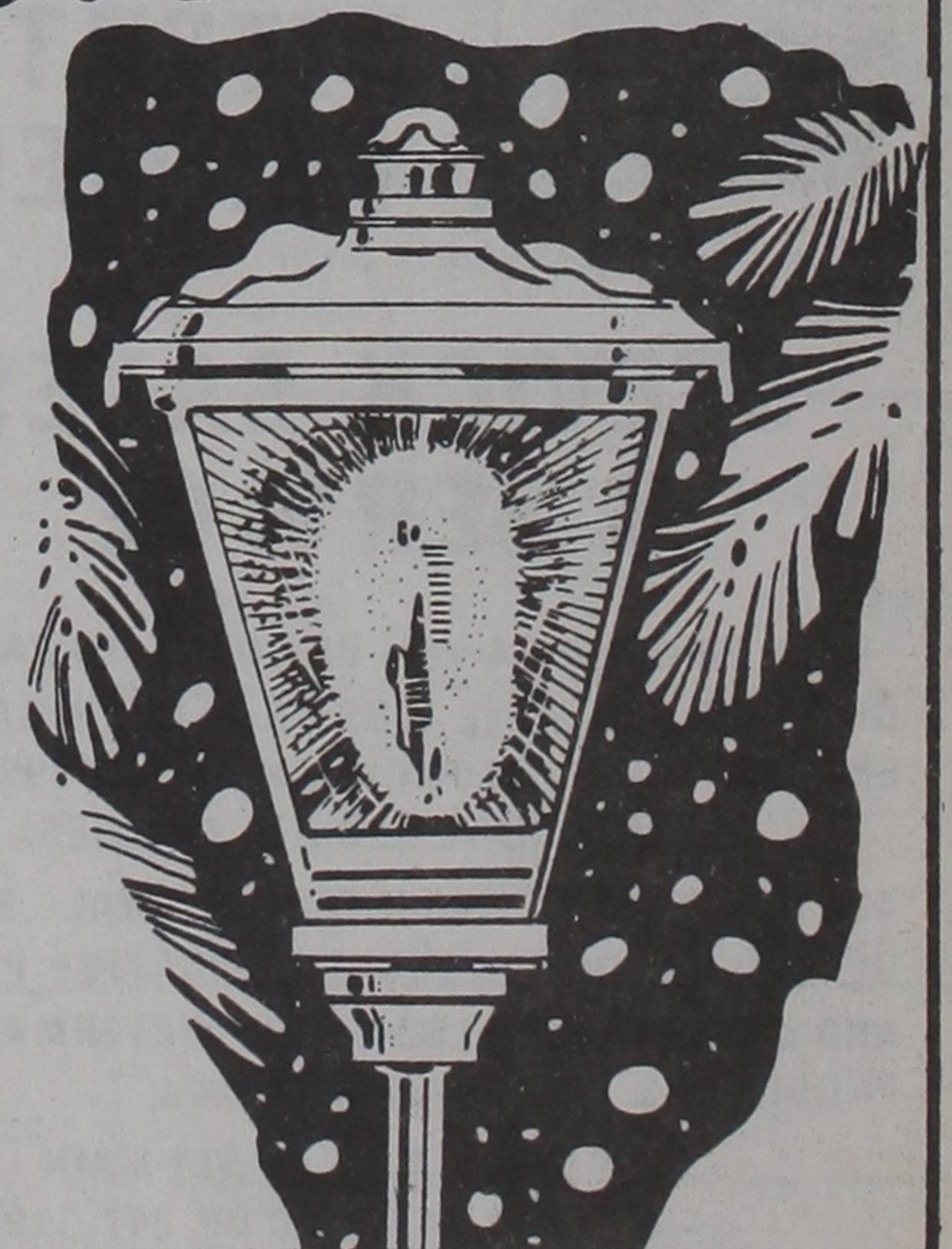

# Chieftain Cagers Top Ponies; Stand 2-1 For '90-'91 Season

The Chieftain varsity cagers won their second outing of the season at Shallowater last Friday, 66-41, before falling to a tall and talented Frenship team at home Tuesday, 81-63, for their first loss of the season.

The week's action left the Chieftains with a 2-1 season record as of the Thanksgiving weekend. Charlie Snead hit a trio of baskets, the third one from three-point range, as the Chieftains broke out to a 15-7 first quarter lead over the Mustangs on Friday.

Snead's pair of baskets and a four-point effort by Koby Rogers helped Friona go to intermission with a comfortable 28-15 lead.

Steven Dickson came in to add a pair from the field and Snead kept up his scoring touch in the third quarter. Friona still had a 42-30 lead as the quarter ended.

The Chieftains had a big fourth quarter. Snead hit another pair from the field and was four for four at the line. Dickson sank six free throws in a row and Brian Herring added six points: two from the field and two at the line.

Snead tallied 20 points for the second straight game, and Dickson added ten to lead the Chieftain point-makers.

Tuesday the Chiefs hosted a tough class 4A quintet, and literally had a Tiger by the tail. The Lubbock team's only loss to date was a 61-59 overtime thriller at Denver City in their season opener. They routed Canyon Randall, 91-81 in their other start.

Koby Rogers' goal gave Friona a 2-0 lead, but sadly it was to be Friona's only lead of the night. The Tigers outscored the Chiefs, 13-3 in the next five minutes to take a 13-5 lead. The visitors had a 17-10 lead at the first quarter buzzer.

Frenship built a 23-12 lead, but baskets by Warren Duke, Rogers and Brian Herring cut that to 25-18 with 3:04 left in the half.

Again the Tigers gained a ten-point edge at 33-23 with 1:03 left, but Snead and Duke each scored in the last minute to trim the margin to 35-28 at the half. Snead's goal was a three-pointer.

Snead caught the Tigers napping to begin the third quarter, scoring a pair of quick baskets, as the Chieftains pulled to within three at 35-32.

But the visitors outscored FHS,

9-2 to take a 44-34 edge midway through the third stanza.

Snead led Friona's scoring with 17 points and Barnett had 11.




