"Many Texans have the idea that only a few highly trained western Historical Quarterly," specialists in the state, with elaborate equipment, can find evidence of cancer," says Dr. Bertner. "But, on the contrary, any careful doctor can detect conditions which may mean cancer, merely by using his eyes, ears, hands, and a few simple instruments which every physician has in his office.'

Dr. Bertner carefully made this distinction, however: "although all Texas doctors should be able to ends, the wall was raised, and detect what may be cancer it does take trained specialists to diagnose cancer postively. It takes a composed of pathologists, weighted down with rocks, and radiologists, surgeons, and some times gynecologists to search out and combat the disease.




# FOUR IMPORTANT THINGS TO REMEMBER:

- 1. The maximum amount of foreign material allowed in farmers' stock without penalty is 3%. For each 1% in excess of 3%, you are penalized .50 per ton up to 15%. Above 15% you are penalized \$1.00 per ton for each 1%.
- 2. The maximum damage allowed without penalty is 1%. For each point above 1%, you are penalized \$3.00 per ton.
- 3. The maximum moisture allowed without penalty is 7%. For each point above 7%, you are penalized 1% for each full 1%; however, for each point below 7%, you will receive a premium of 1%.
- 4. With the slotted screen now being used, all kernels split or damaged in threshing and handling go into shrivels. CAREFUL HANDLING WILL REDUCE THE NUMBER OF SPLITS AND SECURE FOR YOU A HIGHER GRADE.
