



Tarleton's Dean Davis Buried Across Street From Beloved Campus

Stephenville, Texas, May 15.—Dean Emeritus J. Thomas Davis lies at rest today.

He suffered a heart attack at dinner Friday evening. He died at 9:20 p. m. in his beautiful brick home which he built when he retired as head of Tarleton. He had just turned 70.

Rufus Higgs called Dean Davis Stephenville's Number One Citizen. He would have liked that. Even as recently as last week he met with a committee investigating the possibility of a surface water system for Stephenville.

Nor did he confine his benevolence and interests to Tarleton, Stephenville and Erath County. He gained state and national renown. For two consecutive terms he was president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, and in 1942 he was named Top West Texan of the Year.

Many persons will long remember Dean Davis for his kindly advice. Students, faculty, and friends alike frequently consulted him on personal problems, and always found his vast wisdom gave solace and cheer.

After his retirement from administrative duties, Dean Davis became a familiar figure in the college recreation hall, and in nearby cafes, where over a cup of coffee he liked to visit there to students to faculty, to friends, he talked of current questions, of his home, of his family. Often he spoke of his wife to whom he attributed his success, and of his children—Willson, a fruit and vegetable dealer of San Antonio; William, head of the department of government at Texas Technological College at Lubbock; Dorothy, wife of an Eden, Texas, banker and ranchman. He loved, too, to talk of his grandchildren—Linda Lee and William Davis, Jr.; Jim Tom II, Carolyn and Donald Bruce Davis; Dorothy Anne and James William Green.

His last public appearance was in the beautiful college auditorium which was built during his administration. At an assembly, at which the college yearbook was dedicated, Dean Davis spoke on the spirit of Tarleton College. From the stage where so many times he had addressed Tarleton assemblies, he told of the two college organizations whose purpose is to create Tarleton spirit.

In the same auditorium Sunday afternoon his friends gathered for his funeral. It was a simple ceremony in keeping with his wishes. The flowers were beautiful. It would have pleased him to know that many faculty and friends, instead of sending flowers, gave to the J. Thomas Davis Scholarship fund and that the Campus Cops and Maintenance Men made up a private fund for their Dean, the man under whom many of them had served half a life time.

Reverend M. Marshall Smith, friend and pastor of the First Baptist Church, at which the Dean was a member, offered a prayer, read the Dean's favorite scripture, and said a few words. The choir sang two of his favorite hymns. Then to the strains of his favorite songs, "Drink to Me Only With Thine Eyes," and "The End of a Perfect Day" his friends said goodbye.

He was carried across his beloved campus, green and clean from the rain of the night before. The flag flew at half mast. Across the street in the cemetery, where later that day he was to have dedicated the chimes, Tarleton's beloved Dean Davis was buried.

Plenty of good seats for all eight performances of the original Texas Prison Rodeo at the State Fair Grandstand, June 3-10, are still available.

The Dallas appearance and the State Fair will receive 20 per cent. All performers are inmates of the Texas Prison System.

Mail orders should be sent to Rodeo Box Office, P. O. Box 7755, Dallas. Addressed, stamped envelope must be enclosed with check or money order made out to State Fair of Texas.

None of the performances are yet sold out, in spite of the heaviest early demand for tickets the State Fair has had for any event in many years, Stewart said.

More than 88,000 spectators can be accommodated for the eight nights of the famous rodeo in the enlarged Grandstand. More than 5,000 temporary seats have been erected to bring the capacity of the stands to 11,000.

This will enable thousands of North Texans to see the "world's widest rodeo" who have never before had the opportunity. The Dallas engagement is the first time in the 19-year history of the event that the rodeo has performed outside the prison walls at Huntsville.

Following his admission to the bar, Cobb served two terms, from 1936 to 1940 as county judge of McCullough County. In 1940, he was elected district attorney of the 35th Judicial District, composed of Brown, Coleman, and McCullough Counties—and served as district attorney of that district until June 1942, at which time he resigned to enter the United States Army.

Cobb served in the Army for approximately four years, during most of which time he was assigned to duty as an intelligence officer with the Army Air Forces. He spent more than two years overseas, serving in Italy, Africa, and Austria.

In connection with his candidacy for district attorney, Cobb stated that he intends to make an intensive campaign throughout the district and that he will make every effort to contact personally as many voters as time will permit and stated that he would appreciate investigation of his qualifications and ability to represent the State in the prosecution of criminal cases before the District Court of this district.

Joe Spurlock of Fort Worth, state commander of the American Legion, also spoke. The monument, erected on the courthouse square, was unveiled by a legion honor guard. Mmes. James Turnbow, Rufus F. Higgs, Charles Davidson, and Phillip Price placed a wreath on the stone.

The invocation was pronounced by Forrest H. Shelton, state American Legion chaplain. Ernest Rippe led the crowd in singing. County Judge Dale Harbin introduced Daniel. Dublin and Tarleton State College bands played and a TSC firing squad saluted the honored dead.

Harbin and the county commissioners then threw open the courthouse, which has been under reconstruction for eight months, to public inspection. Members of the Dublin and Stephenville American Legion posts planned the memorial program with chambers of commerce of both cities.







Chronic Diseases Represent Biggest Health Problem Now

Austin, May 15.—State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox believes chronic diseases represent the biggest problem facing health officials today.

Recent statistics compiled by the Bureau of Vital Statistics, Texas State Department of Health, show:

1. One-third of all deaths among 15-29 year olds are due to chronic diseases, with tuberculosis being the leader.
 2. "Well over half" the mortality in the 30-40 age group is due to chronic diseases, with heart trouble and cancer and tuberculosis being the leaders.
 3. "Almost 8 out of 10" deaths in the 45-59 bracket are caused by this disease classification, with the proportion rising to 85 per cent for those 60 to 74 years old.
 4. For those 75 and over chronic diseases cause 82 per cent of the total mortality. The slight decrease in percentage over age 75 is because of the high susceptibility to accidents, pneumonia and influenza among the aged.
- "When chronic disease is mentioned, too many people think of the problem as being confined to the middle-aged or older," the health chief said, adding that such an idea was not consistent with the facts.
- The term chronic Dr. Cox explained, means the opposite of acute. When applied to a disease, chronic means duration. That would mean cancer or tuberculosis is chronic, while smallpox or poliomyelitis is acute.
- "The significant thing," Dr. Cox indicated, "is that the chronic disease classification cause one-third of all deaths among young people in the 15-29 age bracket."
- "Obviously, that makes the teen ages the first age at which the diseases assume a major mortality role."

Evidence piles up in favor of early season cotton insect control. This year, of course, it's more important to lots of us than last year, because of acreage restrictions.

Also, a new angle to making the most out of cotton plantings come to light.

The government provides a free cotton classing service, under the Smith-Dokey act of Congress in 1937. This is the authentic grading and classing of cotton which establishes the staple length and quality of each bale and can save time and money for producers and handlers when they know the true specifications of a bale and can trade the cotton without having to re-sample it each time the bale changes hands.

Sometimes this multiple sampling leaves a mighty sorry spectacle of a bale by the time it reaches the spinner.

Not many cotton buyers and fewer cotton farmers are qualified to class cotton accurately. So when a farmer sells his bale to a buyer, naturally the price is such that the handler will be safe.

Established quality and the regular market news letter available from the government, helps cotton growers know what quality cotton they have and what the market price for that grade and staple.

Offices are located in Dallas, Abilene, Lubbock, Austin, Corpus Christi, and El Paso.

How many people do you know who have visited each of the 254 counties in Texas? We calculate we've made them all except 29 sometime or other.

When we run out of minerals, what are we going to use for power? Water-powered electricity? Fuel Alcohol? Atomic Energy? Chances are it will be something derived from vegetation. After all, isn't that what coal and petroleum are?

Solving the problems of food and feed, surpluses now isn't as simple as just eating it up. Nobody but the U. S. Government could transfer the surplus to the hungry people of the world and assure the producers a fair return, and if much of that went on it would be a "welfare world" or "welfare state."

Of course, one east Texas community handled its surplus tomato crop by tossing them at visiting politicians and at each other. They didn't make any more money raising them but they had a lot of fun.

This is election year, all right, but how is the tomato crop going to be? Watermelons are unhandy to throw. So is a bale of cotton.
