Injured while playing at his home Wednesday morning, he was given prompt medical attention but never regained consciousness from the blow of a sharp instrument which pierced his head.

Friends and relatives were deeply grieved to learn of his death late Wednesday afternoon in Providence Hospital in Waco, where he was taken for treatment.

His grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. T. N. Howard and Mrs. J. R. Ford, live in Hico. Other survivors include his parents and two brothers, Don L. Howard and Roy Roland Howard, all of Iredell.

Rev. Ray Ellis of Iredell officiated at funeral services. Burial was in New Cemetery at Iredell, with Barrow-Rutledge Funeral Directors of Hico in charge of all arrangements.

Golfers May Qualify Now for Annual Texas Sand Green Tournament

Invitations have been mailed and golfers from Corsicana, Stephenville, Fort Worth, Dallas and other places are expected when the Bluebonnet Country Club sponsors the annual Texas Sand Green Championship Golf Tournament here September 1, 2 and 3.

Players who intend to compete for medalist status qualify by September 1, and they may play their qualifying rounds any time during the month of August. Entries may also be mailed before that time, stated the club directors.

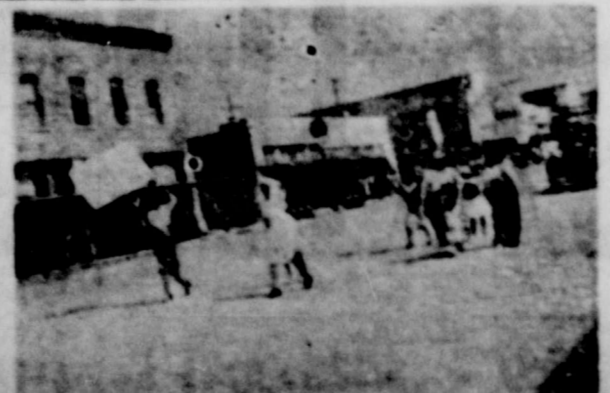

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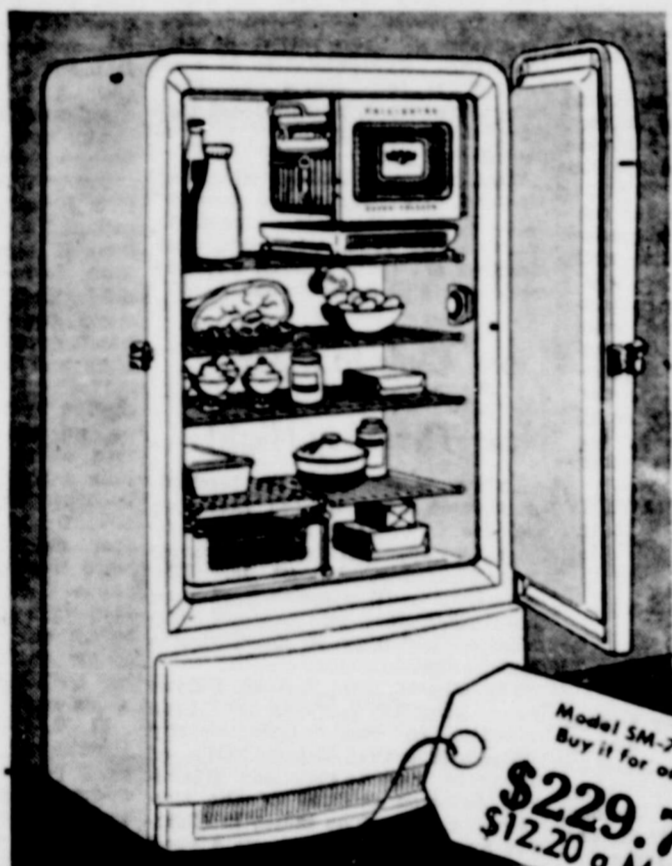
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

THE PICTURE IS CHANGED

The Reunion has come and gone the sixty-fifth time. Originally it was a reunion of Confederate soldiers who had lived, fought and suffered a war and its consequences. We saw them, the boys of the gray with the grace of aristocrats that they were, marching three deep and when the first arrived at the park the last of the procession were just leaving the city hall. But the last ex-Confederate has gone to a bigger reunion beyond the divide.

But we of a later generation who have fought foes who were over more formidable than Federals with guns in their hands can and still do march to the park where we meet many of our fellow countrymen of former years whom we once hobnobbed with back in the horse and buggy days—when cotton was king and Hico was the biggest retail cotton market on earth, when a preacher preached under a brush arbor for the glory of God and horse feed. We meet old boys who hunted possums and coons and skunks and watermelon patches by the light of the moon and on Saturday night bathed or fished for pollywogs in Honey Creek or Duffau Creek or Green's Creek or even the Majestic Bosque River any old time. These boys of yesteryear rode a pony or drove one to a buggy with his lady love beside him when he went to the big meeting at Hog Jaw or Bug Scuffle or Chigger or when there was a dance at a neighbor's on a frosty night or something.

The picture is changed now. Cars, paved roads, electric refrigerators, air conditioning, picnics in the park are routine now. The boy that picked 1,000 pounds of cotton forty years ago is an old man now who would try to milk a freight bus on the run, while mama and the kids look in on a T.V. set. News of a kind is always with us, music of a sort has us swamped. We are dizzy; but after all we were taught in our younger days that lying and theft and deception were wrong; we of Hico still believe this old-time doctrine—as you see, Hico still is a pretty good place to go for relaxation from the world's tension.

You who left here in search of greener pastures, come back next year. Despite change and change and change, we still are ready and anxious to meet and talk over old times with you. We shall expect you, come back next year—let's live it all over again under the pavilion while the old fiddlers accent the past for us. I'm speaking for one.

"Let's Talk Live Stock"

Fort Worth, Aug. 3.—The Summer cattle marketing season rolled into August with prices at generally all time highs for this season of the year.

During the past week most cattle and calves and stocker and feeder lambs showed higher prices. This was a development that is contrary to the normal seasonal trend.

Many carloads of stocker and feeder cattle and calves went into Northern farming and ranching areas from Fort Worth this week at strong prices, some calves and yearlings \$1 or more above prices a week ago.

A factor in this movement has been the exceptionally good grazing available in fields and pastures in the middle west where rains have been abnormally large this summer.

This good grazing spells quick and economical gains in weights for farmers and ranchers there and with plenty of time to take advantage of it before frost, these buyers are getting in the market in large numbers each week. Most Midwest farmers are lagging this year in buying replacement stock. High prices, coupled with confusion over the ceiling and control laws which have been in the making, accounts for the fact that purchase of stockers and contracting for Fall delivery has been very slow.

There is a feeling current among stocker buyers in the North that stocker prices will break sharply in September and October. Their wait-and-see attitude stems from this belief.

Currently, prospects for winter wheat grazing in the Panhandle and Upper Plains section are very good. Some observers feel that there is season enough in the ground to get the wheat up to a stand without more rain. If later rains come, this could be another big year on the winter wheat pastures.

Some buyers are now putting up some suitable stockers with this in view. Generally buying types that can go either onto wheat or into the feedlot if the wheat does not develop.

It all adds up to a highly favorable Summer cattle market at a time when most of the Southwest is critically dry.

John M. Graham, who had some cattle in Fort Worth this week from his ranch near Graham, had a thief a while back. The fellow was literally a one-man crime wave. Seemed like he wanted to take everything that wasn't red-hot or nailed down. In addition to stealing seven cattle he took 800 pounds of wheat, 2,500 pounds of maize, 150 bales of hay and five or six tons of scrap iron. He left the house and barns, or maybe he was going back after them. Who knows?

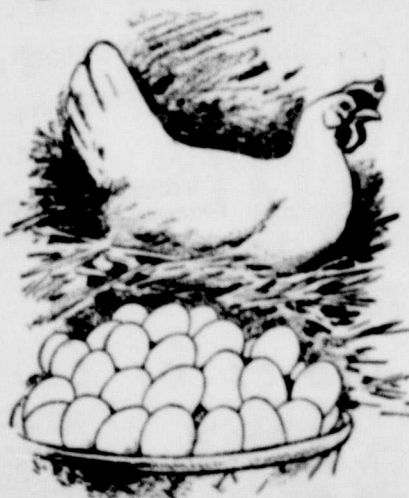

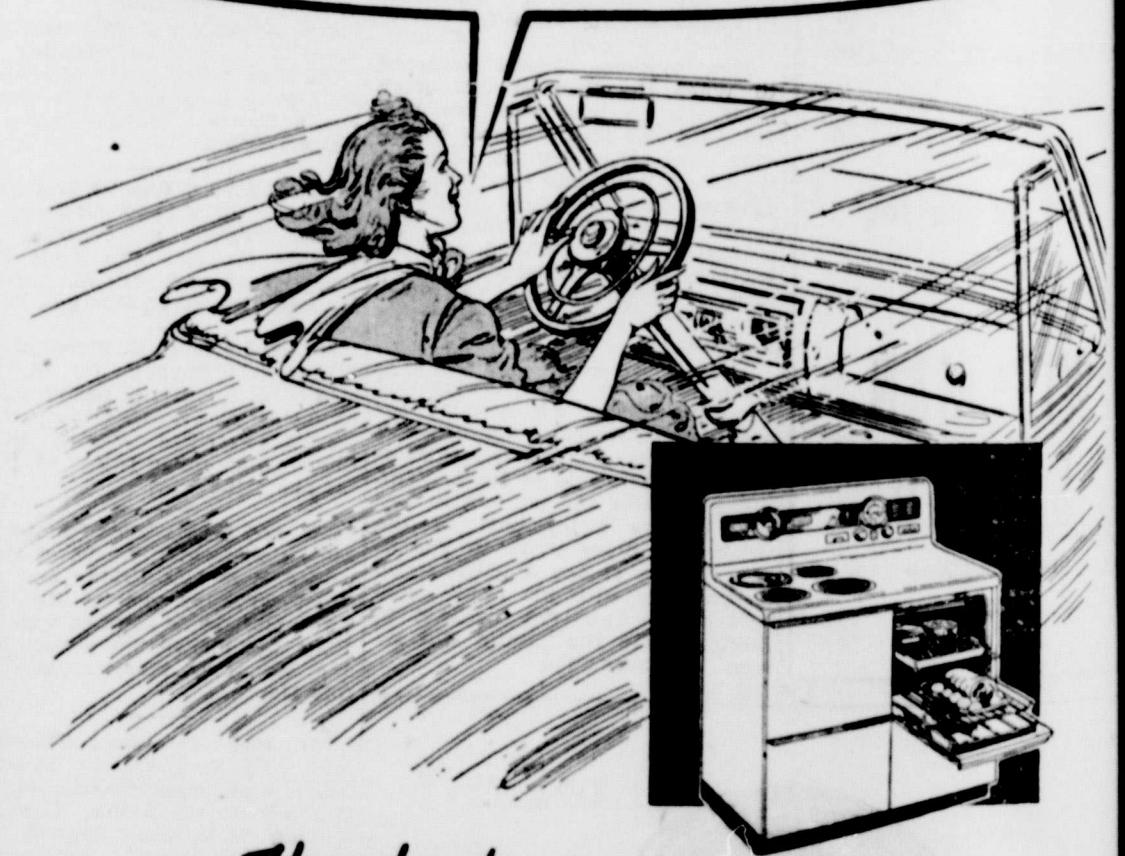

Bipartisan Congressional sentiment for an Air Force well in excess of the planned 80 wings was bolstered anew this week by the President's message hinting strongly at an upward revision of the 3.5 billion mark defense goal. The most talked figure on Capitol Hill now is 120 Air Force wings.

There are now 30 technical courses offered, from which selection may be made by the individual male graduate. REFERENCE blanks are available at the local U. S. Army and Air Force Recruiting station, together with a complete list of courses. Sign up—if you are accepted, you will be notified when to start your course—then you enlist! That's all there is to it.

WOMEN MEDICS IN DEMAND
—The Army needs women medical specialists. This week another call was issued for dietitians, physical therapists, and occupational therapists. And to get them, the minimum tour of active duty has been reduced from 21 to 12 months. Women interested may apply to any Army Headquarters or write to The Surgeon General, Department of the Army, Washington 25, D. C.

A RECENT SURVEY REVEALS THAT THE MAJORITY OF AIR RESERVE AND AIR GUARD OFFICERS recalled to service the first nine months of the Korean action, would welcome indefinite active duty. Sixty-seven per cent of the officers would like to remain indefinitely; 14% are agreeable to a shorter period of further duty, ranging from one year to no more than two years; while only 15% indicated they wanted out as soon as possible. One out of five airmen would remain on active duty indefinitely.

NEWS REVIEW ADVERTISING BRINGS RESULTS

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 22 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article XVI thereof a new Section to be numbered 61, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the several counties of this State; providing that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and authorized by the qualified voters of such county; providing the Legislature shall not be authorized to make an appropriation to pay any retirement or disability benefits administered by the municipal retirement system authorized under Section 61 of Article III; providing for the calling of an election and the publication and issuance of the proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto a new Section, to be numbered Section 61, which shall read as follows:

"Section 61. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the several counties of this State under such a plan and program as the Legislature shall authorize; provided, that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary and shall first be authorized by vote of the qualified voters of such county; provided further, that the Legislature shall not be authorized to make an appropriation to pay any retirement or disability benefits authorized herein. Administration of such system may be committed to the same body as may be set up to administer the municipal retirement system, provided for by Section 61 of Article III.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors at an election to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, and at said election the ballots shall have printed thereon the words:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees."

Each voter shall strike out one of said clauses on his ballot, leaving the one unmarked which expresses his vote upon the proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the foregoing proposed Amendment published as required by the Constitution for proposed amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. If at said election, a majority of the votes are "FOR" the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees, the foregoing proposed Amendment shall become Section 61 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, and participation shall be made by the Governor thereof.

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HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 22 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article XVI thereof a new Section to be numbered 61, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the several counties of this State; providing that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and authorized by the qualified voters of such county; providing the Legislature shall not be authorized to make an appropriation to pay any retirement or disability benefits administered by the municipal retirement system authorized under Section 61 of Article III; providing for the calling of an election and the publication and issuance of the proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto a new Section, to be numbered Section 61, which shall read as follows:

"Section 61. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the several counties of this State under such a plan and program as the Legislature shall authorize; provided, that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary and shall first be authorized by vote of the qualified voters of such county; provided further, that the Legislature shall not be authorized to make an appropriation to pay any retirement or disability benefits authorized herein. Administration of such system may be committed to the same body as may be set up to administer the municipal retirement system, provided for by Section 61 of Article III.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors at an election to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, and at said election the ballots shall have printed thereon the words:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees."

Each voter shall strike out one of said clauses on his ballot, leaving the one unmarked which expresses his vote upon the proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the foregoing proposed Amendment published as required by the Constitution for proposed amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. If at said election, a majority of the votes are "FOR" the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees, the foregoing proposed Amendment shall become Section 61 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, and participation shall be made by the Governor thereof.
