THE BEAUMONT TRAGEDY.

It would be difficult to recall a more pathetic tragedy than that of the shooting down of Constable Holder in Beaumont and the causes leading thereto. Not long before a brute criminally assaulted Holder's 7 year old baby. The following day Judge Pope called a special grand jury in order that the accused might have a speedy trial and two days later an indictment was returned.

The case came to speedy trial and the accused was duly convicted and given a prison sentence of fifty years. It was a case in which every consideration of social order demanded, in the event of conviction, the full extreme of the law. There was not an extenuating circumstance, but the jury failed of its duty, and the injured father, maddened at the failure of the law, fell in a futile attempt to redress his wrongs.

The people of Texas are becoming extremely weary of the courthouse failures.

It is the rule, rather than the exception, that criminals either escape or are inadequately punished. Within the past two months there have been examples of the impotency of the law that are a disgrace to the civilization of which we boast.

It is idle to preach against lynch law when the courts produce such enormous and outrageous failures as that which occurred in the case of Gregerson. The day will come when the people will be so aggravated at such travesties upon justice that they will rise up and execute a terrible vengeance upon those responsible for them, un-

less the situation is speedily improved.

The next legislature will have no higher duty than to take this question in hand and enact such reforms as will render the enforcement of the laws and their penalties more certain.—Houston Post
