

## MY TURN

WHILE ENJOYING a juicy watermelon over the recent Fourth of July holiday, my adult children reminded me that when they were small, I used to tell them not to swallow the seeds or they would sprout in their tummies and the vines would grow out their ears.

What atrocious things we tell our children! Most of these were handed down to us from our mothers and grandmothers who used colorful little "white lies" to encourage the children to behave correctly. I guess that was before "time outs" and "getting grounded" were invented.

For instance, do you remember being told that "You'd lose your head if it wasn't tied on" ... "You can't fool me; I've got eyes in the back of my head" ... "The Old Buggerman will get you if you don't watch out" ... "You know just about enough to be dangerous" ... "I've talked to you about that until I'm blue in the face" ... "If you had a brain, you'd take it out and play with it."

It's a wonder any of us ever grew up with the ability to think for ourselves, or had an ounce of creativity left by the time we reached voting age. Who were the free-thinking individuals who came up with such indispensable items as the ball-point pen, the zipper, the flushing toilet, scotch tape, the safety pin, the screwdriver, and the toothpick, all the while his or her mother was saying, "If you don't quit wasting time with such foolishness as that, you'll never amount to a hill of beans."

Mothers of the pre-1950 vintage were really good at the ultimate guilt trip with such all-time favorites as: "You're not the only pebble on the beach" ... "Pretty IS as pretty DOES" ... "Your time will come" ... "Pride goeth before a fall" ... "You're going to send your parents to the poorhouse" ... "You embarrassed me so much I just wanted to crawl into a hole and never come out" ... "When I talk to you, it just goes in one ear and out the other" ... "You'd try the patience of Job" ... We were also in jeopardy of growing up to look like freaks, after being told: "Your eyes are bigger than your stomach" ... "Don't pout or you'll trip over your bottom lip" ... "Keep a stiff upper lip" ... "Don't bite your nails or you'll get fat" ... "Drinking coffee will stunt your growth" ... "Don't cut off your nose to spite your face" ... "Little pitchers have big ears." Then these admonitions would be followed up with "Don't look like that or your face will freeze that way."

There were several expressions reserved for young girls when they began to show an interest in boys: "I wouldn't trust him any farther than I could throw a horse" ... "You're known by the company you keep" ... "Going steady is like putting all your eggs in one basket" ... "You can't judge a book by its cover" ... "Better to be safe than sorry" ... "There are plenty of other fish in the sea" ... "Don't do anything you'll regret later."

Many of the old expressions centered around table manners: "Don't eat like a horse; chew with your mouth closed" ... "Don't make a pig of yourself." Many of us today blame our yo-yo dieting-and-gorging habits on growing up with such conflicting messages as: "Always leave a little on your plate for Mr. Manners" followed by: "Eat everything on your plate; there are starving children in China."

Then after we found out about Santa Claus, the Easter Bunny and the Tooth Fairy, we didn't for a minute believe Mom when she said, "This is going to hurt me worse than it does you."

## Chieftains Have "New Look" For 1996 Schedule

Friona High School's 1996 football schedule definitely has a new look, compared to the schedule lineup for the past 15 or 20 years.

For example, the fact that the Chieftains, along with Dimmitt and Muleshoe, were roped into District 1-AAA, after being district mates in District 2-AA for "almost forever."

As a result of joining four schools in the northern district, Friona will be playing Perryton as a district opponent. It's not only the first time for Friona to meet the Rangers in district-it's only the second time ever for the two schools to battle on the gridiron. The other time was in a bi-district game, played in Amarillo.

This Perryton game will also add to the schedule's new look, as the game is scheduled for 1:30 p.m. on Saturday afternoon, November 2. It's the first time in maybe 50-plus years for a Friona home game to be played in the afternoon.

As a result of the district re-shuffling, Friona was obliged to "trade Wildcat teams" on their 1996 slate of games. River Road and Friona had played on the opening weekend for the last 15 or so years. With River Road in the district, the Chiefs will travel to Littlefield to face that Wildcat team in the season opener Friday, September 6.

The only other non-district games are against West Texas High September 13 and Shallowater September 20. Friona's meeting with West Texas also breaks new ground. Shallowater had been a district opponent some six times in the past 20 years.

## Grant Teaff Will Address Teachers

Grant Teaff, former longtime head football coach at Baylor, will be the motivational speaker for the Friona teachers at the FIRD "Faculty-Staff Development Day" beginning at 9:30 a.m. Monday, August 12.

Teaff, a native of Snyder, served as his team's captain all the way from high school to Angelo State University and McMurry University. He was named as All-Texas Conference linebacker at McMurry.

He began his coaching career as assistant coach at Lubbock High School, and served as assistant, then head coach at McMurry during a nine-year stint at the Abilene college.

He served as assistant coach and recruiting coordinator at Texas Tech for three years, then was head coach at Angelo State three years before becoming head coach of the Baylor Bears, a position he held for 21 years.

He retired from coaching following the 1992 season, as the "dean" of Southwest Conference coaches. His worst record at Baylor was 128 wins against 105 defeats, holding his own against the University of Texas, Texas

A&M, and Texas Tech.

At the time of his retirement, Teaff's 21-year tenure at Baylor ranked second in the nation for Division I schools, behind only Joe Paterno at Penn State.

Teaff coached Baylor to Southwest Conference championships in 1974 and 1980, and was named the SWC's "Coach of the Year" six times. He led the Bears to eight bowl appearances.

He was singled out as the Kodak "Coach of the Year" national honor in 1974, when he produced the "Miracle on

the Brazos." That year, he took Baylor to its first SWC title in 50 years and its first-ever appearance in the Cotton Bowl.

Teaff has a reputation as one of the finest motivational speakers in the country and also is much in demand as a speaker at coaching clinics for his expertise in Xs and Os.

He recently completed his fourth book, "Coaching in the Classroom." The book examines how techniques used by coaches to teach and

Students who are new to the district are encouraged to register from 8:30 a.m.-3 p.m. at the age-appropriate campus as soon as possible. "Please bring school and health records, birth certificates and Social Security numbers," a school spokesperson said.

To help insure the best possible first day of school, the primary and elementary campus will host a parent orientation meeting on Thursday, August 15.

Parents and students in the Primary School (grades ECE, pre-kindergarten, kindergarten and first) will meet at 7:30 p.m. in the Junior High Auditorium.

After the campus orientation, the children and parents will have an opportunity to visit the student's teacher in the assigned classroom.

Parents and students in the Elementary School (grades second, third, fourth and fifth) will meet from 6:30-7:30 p.m. in the assigned home room.

Home room assignments will be posted in each grade level hallway in the elementary building. Teachers will visit about a variety of topics concerning the school year.

The pageant will require two changes of clothing. The first appearance will be in playwear, and the second in dress wear (suitable for church).

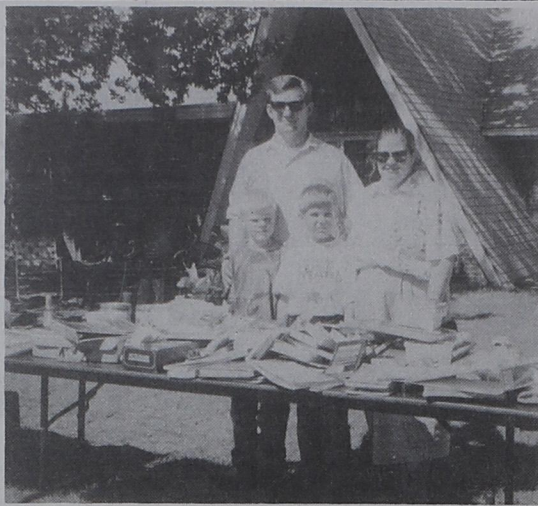
There will be no talent act in the pageant.

## 1996 Property Tax Rates In Friona ISD

This notice concerns 1996 property tax rates for Friona school district. It presents information about three tax rates. Last year's tax rate is the actual rate the school district used to determine property taxes last year. This year's effective tax rate would impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. This year's rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate the school district can set before it must hold a rollback election. In each case these rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes and state funds by the tax base (the total value of taxable property) with adjustments as required by state law. The rates are given per \$100 of property value.

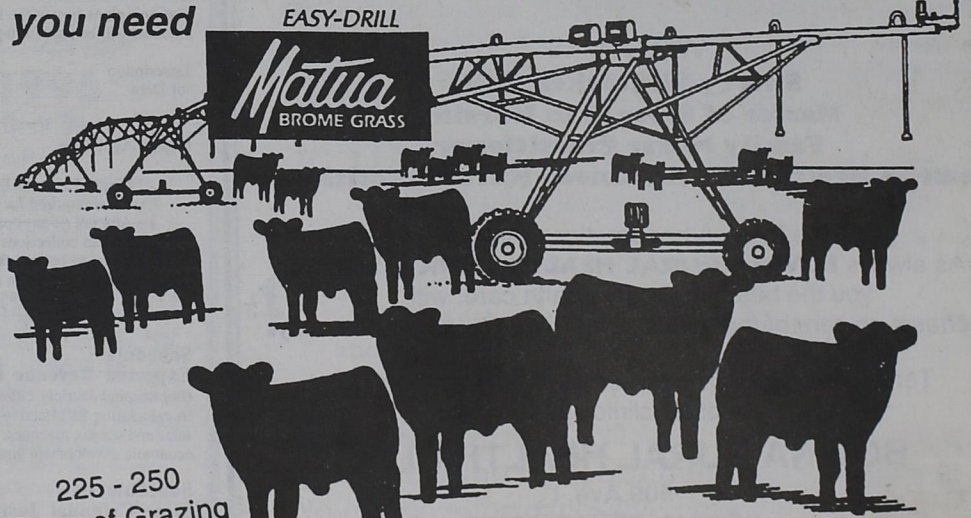

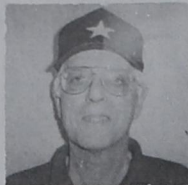

# Out Here

It is one of the most popular places in town. At any hour, day or night you are likely to find people there.

It is the only business I know of that you can go in even when it is closed.

The headquarters of this conglomerate is located in another state, but they have a branch in Bovina, Friona, and virtually every city of any size in the United States.

In addition to a business establishment, it is also sometimes a social gathering spot. Customers are apt to experience joy, sadness, anger, or laughter when they visit.

At times the parking lots are full. Some people are not in any hurry to leave. Most customers visit at least once a day. After all, this company has almost no competition.

The clerks in Bovina and Friona are always courteous and efficient and willing to help if they can.

The service provided is not only sought after but necessary to all of us. The amazing thing is, they don't accept credit cards. Cash or check only.

Have you figured it out? The official name of the business is the United States Postal Service. Most of us just say "the post office."

Can't you just hear some old boy saying, "I'll be back in a minute honey, I'm going to the United States Postal Service."

In the big city, it is a chore to go to the post office. They are usually downtown, crowded, and have their share of, shall we say, unfriendly, clerks. It is a hassle to go to a big city post office, so most people get their mail delivered at home.

Not so in Farmer County. Many of us, including me, have a post office box and a mailbox at home. After over a year out here, I still haven't figured out exactly why I stop by the post office box, then look in my home mailbox too.

As usual I have a few questions about certain "post office personalities."

There is the person who reads their mail before they even close their box. That person is usually standing directly in front of your box

so you can't get to it. There are the folks who take their mail over to the customer table, sort it, throw some away in the handy trash basket, then read the rest before going home.

Does it strike anyone else as odd that the post office provides a large trash basket and invites you to throw some of their mail away. Why can't we just sign a form authorizing the USPS to throw away certain pieces of our mail before they give it to us and save us the trouble.

There is always the "post office personality" that takes their mail out to the pickup and reads it all there, taking up a parking place that someone else needs.

One of my favorites are the people, men or women, who happen to meet in the parking lot and sit and visit or talk for 30 minutes, taking up two precious parking spaces.

Not long ago, my colleague Marlene Mueller picked up the newspaper's mail at 9 a.m. There were two good old "retired" boys talking on the post office lot, side by side in their trucks. Two hours later, she had to go to the post office again and guess what? They were still there.

A friend of mine recently complained about people who have a handicap license plate but do not park in the handicap space. He said they take a regular space but then he can't park in the handicap space, the only one available.

In Bovina, everyone within the city limits has to go to the post office if they want their mail. There is no home delivery, only route delivery.

I go there at least twice a week on Bovina Blade business. There are five parking spaces directly in front of the building and the two handicap spaces are farthest from the door. I need to ask Mrs. Bartlett why that is.

At least in Bovina you can park in front of the door. In Friona it doesn't make much difference where you park. The spaces are all on either side of the building.

Last week I heard on KGNC Radio that effective September 1 if you want to

mail any package that weighs more than one pound you must take it to the post office in person, otherwise the USPS will not accept it.

I had a few questions about that too so I went over to visit Valton Howard at the Friona post office. A conversation with Valton can go in many different directions.

He had not heard about the September 1st, one pound rule yet but we had some fun thinking about it.

If a post office employee finds a two pound package in those outside, blue mail boxes, what are they supposed to do with it? If you drop a two pound package in the box and go home, what will happen to your package? Who knows?

The object is, of course, to prevent bombs from going through the mail.

Val and I wondered how long it would take maniac bombers to invent a bomb that weighs less than a pound.

If you have a friend or relative that sells postal scales, this would be a good time for them to make a sales appointment with the USPS because every mail carrier in the nation will have to start weighing mail before they pick it up.

And here is a hint. If you sell or manufacture postal scales, double the price when you call the USPS. Even that would still be a good deal for the government.

See you at the post office. Save me a parking space.

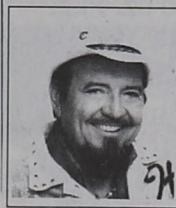

Clinton Ferdinand Homfeld 1909-1994  
(Editor's note: Each month, a resident of Prairie Acres Nursing Home is featured in the home's newsletter, "The Prairie Times." This month, the late Clinton Ferdinand Homfeld is featured. His story was on file and we thought his friends would enjoy it.)  
I was born on April 27, 1909 at Cooper Hill, Missouri. I did not like my name, preferred C.F. or Clint. I was raised with seven brothers and one sister. We lived on a farm in the hills and rocks of the Missouri Ozarks. I walked or rode a horse to school. I did not attend school for very many years, but did learn reading, writing and arithmetic.

I worked for other farmers in the area, then at the age of 18 went to Meade, Kansas to work for a farmer. In 1930, I came to a section of land fifty miles northwest of Hereford, Texas, which the farmer in Kansas had leased. Another young man and I put up a tent on what we thought was the right land, but found out the next morning that we were on the wrong land. We lived in the tent while we broke out the sod and planted wheat. Our wages were a share of the crop. We received 19 cents a bushel that year for our wheat.

We built a two room house and put the section back into wheat. That winter I went back to Missouri. On May 18, 1932, I married Flora Hunke from Bland, Missouri. I had worked for her dad in the past. In June we came back to Texas to that two room house.

Our nearest neighbors were five miles away, but people visited a lot back then. There were not a lot of people around, nor places to go, so we got together and played cards, or even had dances. We picked up groceries and fuel at Adrian, 15 miles away. We hauled water five miles for our milk cows. Flora sold milk and cream.

The dirt blew so bad in the 30's that sometimes we had to scoop it out of the house. We were asked a lot, especially by family in Missouri, why we stayed. I would tell them that I could not afford to leave, and my wife did not like the hills and rocks in Missouri.

We built two more rooms onto the house, and I purchased a piece of land to keep the owner from breaking up the grass, to plant a crop.

I did not want to see the grass plowed up with the chance it would blow away. We also leased more land to farm and started feeding cattle on the grassland. We witnessed the development of that area and welcomed new people starting out on their farming ventures. We saw a lot of these same people leave when it did not work out for them, or they were not willing to deal with the hardships.

We raised three boys and a girl, Kenneth, Lloyd, Glenda and Jerry. They went through school at Adrian. We attended a country church, but did most of our business in Hereford.

My youngest son has stayed on the farm, and with his wife and children, do most of the work, with the help of my oldest son. After my wife died in 1988, I stayed with my oldest son until I came to Prairie Acres in 1993.

With such a lineup and no charge other than the regular gate admission, the Curry County Fair's \$10 season pass offer is expected to get plenty of attention. Here's a bit more on the entertainers:

**Kim Blakey** was raised on a cow ranch near Causey, New Mexico and developed a unique style of singing and song writing as a youngster. The lure of music took him away from the ranch to pursue a career in the music business. Kim formed the popular Timbrelina band in Ruidoso and spent the past few years touring the U.S. and several foreign countries.

Kim recently completed a contemporary western album entitled "Friends," which captures Kim's abilities as a singer and song writer.

The **Jose Brothers** are a duo comprised of Clay Lindley, cowboy comic, and Gil Prather, accomplished musician, comic and song writer. For several years, the Jose Brothers have brought their special blend of humor, cowboy poetry and music to audiences in Arizona, Colorado, New Mexico, Texas and Nevada.

**Bob Wills' Texas Playboys** features the original western swing sound made famous by the late Wills when he brought the band out of Oklahoma. Longtime lead vocalist, Leon Rausch, will be among the performers. Also featured is guitarist, Tommy Allsup, whose music career has taken him from playing with Buddy Holly and the Crickets to producing albums for the Texas Playboys, Asleep at the Wheel and Hank Thompson and his Brazos Valley Boys.

**Tommy Shane Steiner** is the 22-year-old son of former world champion bull rider, Bobby Steiner, and Joleen Steiner, a two-time national champion barrel racing qualifier. Tommy Shane's grandfather, Tommy, and his great-grandfather, Buck, were both inducted into the Rodeo Hall of Fame.

But Tommy Shane is blazing trails of his own, with cover boy looks and a voice to match. He is backed by the Texas Steam Band, an extremely talented group of musicians formerly known as Bubba Cox and Lariat.

**Don Walser** grew up poor in Lamesa, Texas, and shared bills with fellow Texan Buddy Holly, but he worked days for the National Guard and continued playing music at night. By the early 90s Walser and his Pure Texas Band were the toast of Austin, playing an old fashioned brand of country and western music with a sound that is unmatched.

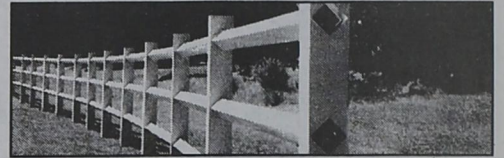
**Cindy Nix** has been involved in country music for a number of years and has been seen everywhere from rodeos to conventions, weddings, class reunions and fairs.

## YOUR EYES

### Swimming And Your Eyes



Nature provided our eyes with a built-in cleansing system: we blink several times a minute, washing tears over our eyes. But some of our modern-day activities—including swimming in treated pools—sometimes causes damage that tears alone can't fix.

Conjunctivitis—old-fashioned "pink eye"—is a familiar summer problem. Ordinary, noncontagious conjunctivitis is generally a reaction, sometimes allergic, to the irritation of chlorine. But pools also harbor bacteria and help more dangerous conjunctivitis spread among youngsters swimming together. It's wise to see your eye doctor to diagnose and treat either kind.

If you wear corrective lenses, do not try to swim with contact lenses. Soft contacts, especially, can absorb chemicals that may irritate the eye. Swim goggles can be made with corrective lenses, even with ultraviolet protection for outdoor use. These offer the added advantage of keeping chlorinated water out of the eyes.
