### **Prairie Acres Planning** 20th Anniversary 'Party'

Sunday, September 8 will be a very special day for staff members and residents of Prairie Acres. The facility will be observing its twentieth birthday.

This first class convalescent home is one of the most visible results we have of this year's Maize Days theme, "Small Town, Big Dreams--Past, Present and Future."

It would have been an impossibility for a town the size of Friona to have such a fine nursing home had it not been for the wide-spread cooperation of business firms, civic clubs, study clubs and many, many individuals more than twenty years ago.

Several years before actual construction on the building began, the need for such a facility was being discussed and tentative plans were being made.

Early in 1975 a community-wide meeting was called and several committees were appointed to study the

different aspects of beginning such a project.

After much study and several surveys, a decision was made to call a \$350,000 bond election and individuals began a campaign to raise the remaining \$150,000 necessary to complete the project, which was originally a 60-bed facility.

The bond election passed by a whopping majority and within a few short months the \$150,000 was raised, land was purchased and the board of directors began work on the actual construction of a building.

Several months before the building was completed, an administrator and nursing director were hired and Merv Noah and Madie Schmidt, R.N., arrived on the scene to assist with final arrangements.

Before the completion date, Mrs. Schmidt had conducted a training program for sixteen nurse's aides, who would be eligible for

employment at Prairie Acres, through Parmer County Community Hospital.

When the building was completed, the furniture was moved in and final inspections had been made, the first occupant moved in. She was Della Osborn, a long-time resident of Friona who had been living in Hereford several years. The same day, four other long-time Friona residents also moved in.

They were Maggie Miller, Eva Jones, Lucy Welch and Ethel Adams.

A special program will be presented from 2-4 p.m. Sunday afternoon, September 8. This will be followed by church services presented by Bovina United Methodist Church from 4-5 p.m.

Jo Black well, administrator, joins residents of the home in inviting all relatives and friends to attend the program and church services which will follow.

## **Out Here**

"Daddy, what's that

"Daddy, what's that smell?"

"That smell means we are getting close to Nenaw and Papa's house, sweetheart."

"But what is it, daddy?"

"Out here, I think they call it money, honey."

Conversations like this would take place near the end of our 8-hour drive from Dallas to visit grandma and grandpa in Friona.

The kids in the back seat would sit up and sniff as we got nearer and the gentle hint of many cattle drifted up their little nostrils.

In their not-so subtle child-like manner, they would ask why nenaw and papa would want to live in a place that stinks.

These were city kids with a city daddy. Sometimes I wondered the same thing.

When you come to Parmer County it doesn't take long to realize the importance of cattle to the economy.

After over a year as a

take long to realize the importance of cattle to the economy.

After over a year as a resident here, I thought it was time to make my first visit to a feedyard and say hello to those beneficial bovines who spend all their time eating delicious cow food and getting fatter so we can eat them.

Since I spend most of my Mondays in Bovina, it seemed convenient to drive out west a ways and take a look at Caprock Industries' operation. What do I know? They all look alike to me.

Caprock manager Scott Nelson was kind enough to address my dumb questions, give me enough information about feedyards to make my eyes glaze over, and take me for a drive around the grounds.

This feedyard was started around 1967-68 as Parmer

This feedyard was started around 1967-68 as Parmer County Cattle Company by Cap Naegle and a group of investors that included former illustrations. zillionaire Bunker Hunt, the Dallas Hunt Oil family.

Caprock Industries, a division of Cargil Industries, who also owns Excel and a lot of other companies, bought the feedyard in 1986. From 1986 to 1992 it operated as a custom yard

1986 to 1992 it operated as a custom yard. I learned that a custom yard means "open to the public." If you have some cattle out in the pasture and

want to let the feedyard fatten them up and give them their medicine, the feedyard will rent you your

A custom yard will charge a deposit per head for each cow, sort of like a cow hotel. In a custom yard, you own the cattle until they are sold. In other words, you take the

risks.

For the first 20 days at Caprock, the critters get hay and silage to eat. After that, a nutritionist mixes up delicious formulated rations of feet self-matters and

a nutritionist mixes up delicious formulated rations of fat, salt, nutrients, and proteins. Nelson says the average stay at the cow hotel is 140 days and that Caprock uses 1,000,000 pounds of feed every day. That is a lot of "room service."

Most cattle are brought in to a custom yarrd when they weigh 600-700 pounds and are sold when they reach a weight of 1100-1200 pounds. The owner of the pen pays the yard for feed and medicine and must figure in any cost due to death loss.

I figured out a couple of things real quick. The more a cow weighs when you bring him in, the less time it takes to reach a sell weight, which costs less.

Also I figured out that

to reach a sell weight, which costs less.

Also, I figured out that when you crunch the numbers at today's cattle prices of around \$67 per hundred pounds, an 1100 pound steer will bring \$737, not much of a per head profit margin by the time you pay your feedyard bill.

In 1992, Caprock became a "commercial yard." That means they buy the cattle from you and they own them and they take the risks.

Most of Caprock Bovina's

Most of Caprock Bovina's cattle are shipped to Excel, Friona, as are many cattle from other Parmer County


from other Parmer County yards.

To fill their six commercial yards, they have buyers in Oklahoma, Kansas, Texas, Georgia, Mississippi, and Florida, to name a few.
Caprock's one-time capacity in their six yards is 275,000 cattle. Caprock yards are located in Gruver (2), Dalhart, Bovina, Lockney, and one in Leoti, Kansas.

Scott Nelson has been employed by Cargill for 8 years, first as a kill floor supervisor at Excel. He has worked for Caprock for the last 4 1/2 years.

He is no stranger to feedyards. His dad was a long time feedyard manager and young Scott had plenty of jobs to do.

He manages an operation that houses an average of 31,000 head, but is rated to hold 35,000. Each year his



yard ships 70,000 head of cattle, or an average of 383 head per day.

To ship that many cattle requires 8,200 trucks in and out of the yard each year. The 70,000 cattle sold and shipped is equivalent to 42 million pounds of meat each year.

million pounds of meat each year.

Caprock here has 34 employees who work in the mill, yard, feeding, cattle, or the office.

The trucks that are used to feed the cattle are now computerized so the driver can automatically calculate the amount of feed used for each pen. That is important in a custom yard to compute the feeding costs for the cattle owners.

the feeding costs for the cattle owners.

Other employees, appropriately called cowboys, ride horses up and down the pen rows looking for cowproblems such as sick critters. Caprock is equipped with four cow hospitals where a "lay vet" treats minor problems. "Real" veterinarians make regular visits and are on call for serious problems.

Another feedyard operation is the silage pits. Local farmers sell silage to the yards for feed, especially this time of year. Caprock's five pits hold 40,000 tons of silage, or about 1,800 acres worth.

Nelson says the yard uses

Nelson says the yard uses 1.2 million bushels of corn each year at the mill or 6,670 acres worth.

each year at the mill or 6,670 acres worth.

As we were driving around the well engineered system of pens, alleys, and gates, I observed that Caprock must be one of the largest yards in Parmer County.

Scott Nelson was quick to point out that it was actually one of the smallest of the seven major yards. For example, he said, West Plains Feedyard's capacity is about 60,000 and Paco Feedyards handles 45,000. At any one time there are 265,000 head of cattle in Parmer County feedyards.

At, say, \$1000 per head, that is \$265 million worth of cattle in Parmer County.

Factor in all the cattle industry related employees' salaries, money paid to cattlemen, to farmers for the grain, to truckers for the grain, to truckers for the grain, to truckers for the salaries, and other area businesses. Not to mention taxes.

The amount of direct and

businesses. Not to mention taxes.

The amount of direct and indirect revenue produced for the county seems to be incalculable.

I forgot to mention that there is one steer at Caprock's cattle hotel that has been there for five years. They call him Precious and he now weighs 3,100 pounds, but he ain't going anywhere soon.

When Precious was a calf, he was very sick. One of the cowboys sat up all night with him to keep him from dying. Precious got well and to show his appreciation, he followed the cowboys around wherever they went.

his appreciation, he followed the cowboys around wherever they went.

Seems that when it came time to ship his roommates out to the packing house, Precious must have hid or something, because the cowboys insisted they couldn't find him.

Today he serves as a mascot and pet, with a pen of his own where he receives a few fellow cattle as visitors and the Caprock employees stop by to play.

Somehow I wish the cowboys and cattlemen of 1900, who herded their cows to the XIT railroad operation in Bovina, and shipped them to stockyards in Fort Worth or Chicago, could take just one ride around one of today's Parmer County feedyards.

Cattla operations are pretty scientific now but one custom remains from the old days.

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

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

# Morton, Chiefs Eye Landmark Season

James Morton, on the eve of the start of his fifth season as head football coach at Friona High School, has seen both sides of the coin in his tenure at FHS.

Morton inherited a team in the fall of 1992, his first season, that lost all ten games.

the fall of 1992, his first season, that lost all ten games.

After a rebuilding season in 1993, when the Chiefs improved to 5-5 on the field, things really turned around in 1994.

The '94 Chieftains, who finished 7-3-1, won their district title. It was the first football title for FHS in nearly three decades. Last year, the team had an outstanding season, again at 7-3, but had to settle for third place in district.

The team scored impressive non-district wins over River Road, Dalhart and Tulia, and went 4-1 in the first half. But Friona lost to Shallowater, 27-17, and to Littlefield, 26-15, for a 3-2 district mark.

Morton surely feels considerably better than he did in his first couple of years. He welcomed 18 lettermen at the beginning of workouts, including nine defensive starters, six offensive starters on the offense, the entire secondary returns from a team that allowed an average of just 12.8 points per game. The Chieftain defense scored one shutout, and allowed no more than seven points in four other games.

Prior to getting game, or

Prior to getting game, or even scrimmage experience, the team has lost big offensive lineman candidate Billy Garner, a 255-pound senior, to a knee injury. Just how long the injury will sideline Garner was not known earlier this week.

"Staying healthy will be a key to our season. With the new, larger district, we only get three non-district games, so we're going to have to be ready to compete considerably earlier in district games," Coach Morton says.

The six returning offensive starters are back from the wishbone team that averaged 25.3 points per game a year

wishbone team that averaged 25.3 points per game a year ago.

Senior running back Andy Kendrick gained 818 yards rushing in 1995, and led the team in scoring with 66 points on 11 touchdowns.

Kendrick also caught eight passes for 104 yards.

Senior Kyle Grimsley returns at quarterback, and will run Friona's wishbone offense this fall. Back-up players to Grimsley are juniors Aaron King and Jesus Mata.

Other candidates for running back are seniors Shane Blackburn, Jesse Mendez and David Shelby, along with juniors Daniel Cuevas, Abel Escobedo, Jeff Hamilton, Luis Ramirez and Orlando Rivera.

Junior tight end Quint Ellis is another of Friona's offensive starters returning. At 6-5, 220 pounds, Ellis provides a great passing target, but also is valued as an excellent blocker in Friona's run-oriented wishbone attack.

Senior Eric McInroe (5-10, 180) and junior Gabe Goodwin (5-9, 160) are the other candidates for tight reasilver was onen this year.



Mr. Schmidt bought his \$2000 Cannondale bicycle in San Francisco and headed east, bound for Jonesboro, Arkansas.

Then, helmet in place and feet locked onto the pedals, Mr. Schmidt headed east again on Highway 60, bound for Germany.

Why Jonesboro? His son is a helicopter pilot there. He said that he was taking the bicycle back to Germany with him. The same model would sell there for more than twice the price he paid in the U. S. He said that he left San Francisco four weeks earlier and that it would take another two weeks to reach Jonesboro.

After many years operating a gas station in Freiburg, Schmidt has been a school superintendent there for the past 18 years.

He planned to fly home from Memphis, Tennessee, after a visit with his son. He said he would arrive in Freiburg on September 5 and school starts on September 6.

Schmidt, who is divorced, said this is the sixth time he has bicycled across or around the United States. On a seventh occasion, he and his son toured the U. S., including Alaska, by motorcycle.







#### Why Gas-Permeable Lenses?

Recent improvements in contact lenses have enabled people with astigmatism to wear contacts successfully. However, because astigmatism is related to an out-of-round lens, and soft contacts conform to the natural shape of the cornea, these are appropriate only for a mild degree of astigmatism.

A better option for the highly astigmatic is often the hard, gas-permeable lens. This combines a firm, supportive shape, allowing clearer and more stable vision, with a more comfortable plastic that permits oxygen to penetrate and reach the eye. The lenses are bigger than ordinary contacts, but nothing like the oversize lenses of years ago.

Other advantages: many of these lenses feature a slippery surface that wards off protein buildup and, because the gas permeability prevents corneal swelling, there's less "spectacle blur" when the lenses are removed.
