THE PASSING OF AN ERA is so painful. For the past 62 years, four generations of western Texas Panhandle folks have flocked over to Clovis, New Mexico at least once each week to enjoy a wonderful family tradition known as "Let's go eat at El Monterrey."

Yes, sadly, the grand old lady of Mexican food restaurants has closed its doors forever. It was at a table for two in the north room where the little corner adobe fireplace was located. Bill brought me there from Lubbock when we were Texas Tech students on a date. First he toured me around Muleshoe where he grew up, I met his family, and then he said "We're going over to Clovis for supper."

About a year later, we stopped in again on the way back from our honeymoon in Ruidoso and sat at the same table for two in the north room. Later we had to find a bigger table as we brought our babies, first one, then two, then three, in their infant seats and spooned baby food into them while we scarfed down the enchiladas, tacos, sopapillas, etc. By the time they had graduated to the booster chair, they too were enjoying the unique flavors offered only at El Monterrey.

As adults, our children probably won't come back to visit us any more now that we can't run over to Clovis and eat at El Monterrey. Great Aunt Sis Reed must have been quite a cook. She started the restaurant in 1934, developed the recipes, stirred up the famous sauce; and the place had been in business at the same location, under the same family ownership ever since.

The Reed family came from Kansas with the railroad in the early 1930s. They bought a lovely Spanish ranch style home on Mitchell Street which had been built sometime in the 1920s, and Sis started cooking for some of the train passengers who would walk over from the railroad to eat with them. Later they bought another home and left the Mitchell Street place just for the restaurant.

After WWII, Sis' brother-in-law Colonel Weed bought into the business as a partner and in 1958 Weed's son-in-law Charles Smith bought the place outright. James Weed Smith has been the third generation owner for the past several years. He said the family is most grateful for the support they have received from West Texans for so many years.

There's probably not a human being in Bovina, Farwell, Friona, Lazbuddie, Rhea, Hereford or Muleshoe who has not eaten at El Monterrey at least once in their lifetime.

Smith did tell us that the El Monterrey sauce in the well-known little yellow and red can will continue to be marketed in grocery stores.

Last spring, Bill's old Muleshoe school chum, Wayne Bristow and wife, came to visit and of course we had to go to El Monterrey for supper. It was the first time they had been back this way in 30 years. They remarked on the unique experience of being able to step back into time where nothing was changed. The same masks with the glowing eyes graced the entry way. The same red painted tables...the same murals on the walls...the same wonderful tacos, the same huevos rancheros salad with the egg in the bottom of the bowl...all with a flavor that you just can't find anywhere else.

I, myself, will shed a tear for the demise of the best slice of lemon pie in the whole USA.

Area's Crops Make Great Turn-Around

Ensilage harvest has been underway awhile, and harvest of the area's corn crop is just getting started.

Based on early reports, the corn may be average to above-average in yield. This would be quite an accomplishment, based on the fact that when the crop was planted, the area had received less than an inch of moisture in the previous six months.

"This has been a very unusual year," said one elevator manager. "Given the circumstances, I think the farmers did a great job of raising anything," he said.

The rainfall in the area for the past three months has helped the crop considerably, although the rainfall amounts varied from farm to farm.

Corn prices had been high earlier in the summer, peaking at about mid-July, but they have been fluctuating considerably.

The rains received in the past couple of months have made conditions great for planting of the area's wheat crop. Wheat that has been planted has come up in very short order, it was reported.

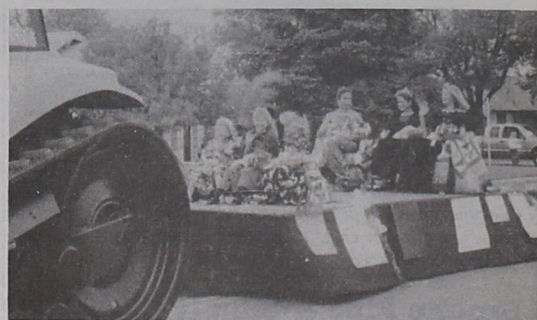
Rodeo Is Re-Scheduled

Ilene Osborn Is Buried Locally

Ilene McFarland Osborn, longtime Friona resident, died Sunday, September 15, 1996, at the High Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo.

Funeral services were held at the First Baptist Church of Friona on Wednesday, September 18, with Rev. Waide Messer, pastor, officiating.

Burial was in Friona Cemetery, under the direction of Ellis-Blackwell Funeral Home.

Born in Burnet County, Texas, near Bertram on March 14, 1907, she moved with her family to Parmer County near Friona in 1925. From 1925 through 1926, she attended Texas Tech University. She then taught at the Jesko School in southern Parmer County.

On November 24, 1927, Ilene married Sloan Howard Osborn, who died January 26, 1987. Two sons preceded her in death. Jack Dean Osborn died May 18, 1932, and Robert Howard Osborn died January 8, 1978.

Mrs. Osborn belonged to the Friends of the Library and the Friona Heritage Society. She became a charter member of Modern Study Club in 1931, and was also a charter member of the Parmer County Hospital Auxillary. For both organizations she served as president.

She was the oldest continuous member of Friona's First Baptist Church.

She is survived by three children: Dr. Charles Osborn, Amarillo; Joe A. Osborn of Austin, and Sally (Mrs. Doug) Whatley of Amarillo.

Also surviving are four sisters, Katy (Mrs. Claude Osborn), Martha (Mrs. Roy Clements), Geraldine (Mrs. George Taylor), all of Friona, and Charlene (Mrs. Roy Lee Jones) of Ruidoso, N.M., and a brother, Robert H. McFarland of Tucumcari, N.M.

Quietly approaching the guinea hen's secret nesting place to take a peek at the lovely blue eggs and to hear their rhythmic "ka-trek" "ka-trek" sounds; sitting quietly on the bank of a red dirt pond while my grandmother fished on a lazy summer afternoon; waiting for the cornbread to be done in the old wood stove; taking my grandpa a cold drink out in the field.

Eating my first 'yellow' tomato, sitting on my grandpa's laps; getting a thrill out of riding my grandpa's burro Mucho; sliding down a grassy hill in a cardboard box; warming my hands by a pot-bellied stove and hearing the wood crackling in the fire.

Sitting on a bench at the dinner table; walking down to the creek; climbing the hill to watch the Doodlebug, an old steam engine passenger train; eating biscuits and homemade apricot jam.

Picking bouquets, sitting on Trigger, grandpa's horse; seeing my grandma's sweet smile light up as she came to visit my fifth grade class; sitting on my grandpa's 'horsie' and being called 'his sweet Texas granddaughter.'

One of my grandmothers passed away when I was only six so I mostly just remember how she looked: her very long, auburn hair which she rolled and twisted into two large, neat buns fastened

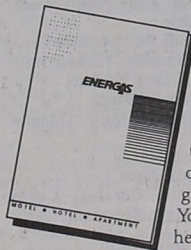

Chieftains Score Impressive Win

If the FHS Chieftains don't quit spotting their opponents a couple of touchdowns before making a score of their own, Coach James Morton may develop high blood pressure.

Last Friday at Stinnett, the Chieftains let the home team take a 14-0 lead before coming back for a 21-14 win.

The West Texas High School Comanches, who advanced to the state quarter-finals last season, had won 13 of their last 14 games, including eight straight in regular-season play.

The win was a "must," if the talent-laden Chieftains were going to earn the respect they had been given in pre-season polls.

"It was a big win--no doubt about it. Now, if we can just adjust our attitude and play well from the first of the game, we'll be a better team," Coach Morton said.

Wide receiver Angel Vega was a sparkplug in the Chieftains' comeback. Quarterback Kyle Grimsley found Vega all alone on a 34-yard touchdown with 1:26 left in the first half. Vega's PAT kick made it a 14-7 game.

Grimsley slipped out of a sack attempt by the Comanches, and found Vega all alone in the end zone.

Friona then shut down WT, and blocked the kick, to take over at WT High's 33-yard line. On third down from the 24-yard line, Vega was wrapped up by defenders, and one of them slapped the pass from Grimsley. But Vega trapped the ball on his shoulder for a first down, and Andy Kendrick crashed in for the TD with just a second left in the half.

Vega's kick was blocked, and WT was holding a 14-13 first half lead.

"That cornerback was real fast, but after he tipped the ball, I caught it on my shoulder. I was all freaked out by catching it that way," said Vega, who caught five passes in the game for 86 yards.

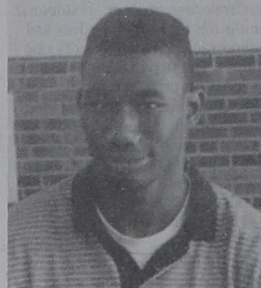
"That touchdown catch was one of the greatest catches I've ever seen. You won't see a better catch than that on the NFL highlights," Coach Morton said.

Friona dominated the second half, allowing just 21 yards total offense.

Friona pulled an on-side kick to open the second half, and drove toward a lead touchdown. The drive stalled, but Friona regained possession at their opponents' 33-yard line.

It only took Friona three plays to score. Kendrick broke 24 yards for the TD. Quint Ellis ran for a two-point conversion, and Friona had gained the lead for the first time, 21-14.

The Chieftains seemed well on their way to score a clinching touchdown in the final quarter. They produced a 17-play, 70-yard drive that used up over seven minutes of the quarter.

Friona kept the drive going by converting on third down four times, and once on fourth down.

But on first and goal from the three, Grimsley was jarred loose from the ball, and WT recovered. It was the only lost fumble of the whole game, by either team.

Friona's defense forced the Comanches to punt from their own end zone, and Friona was able to run out the final three minutes of the game.

Chieftain fans held their breath after the punt, as one official signaled a Friona fumble, which would have allowed WT to keep the ball. But after a huddle on the field, the refs ruled that Vega's knee had touched the ground before the ball rolled free.

"The offensive line was the key to the win. With the exceptions of a couple of plays on third and short yardage, we were able to control and move the ball. Grimsley threw well, and also ran well

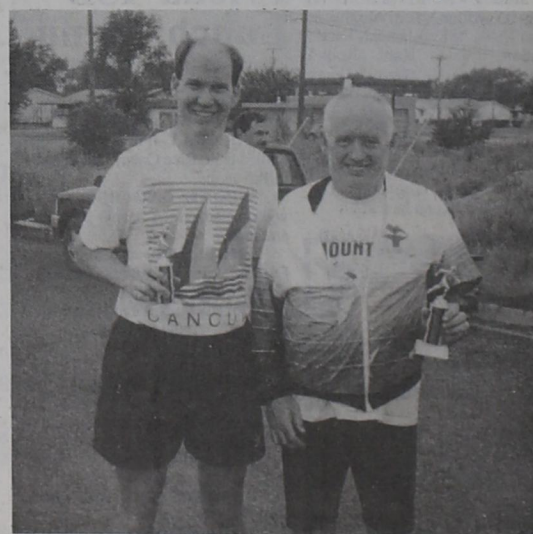
C. Cooper is Player of the Week

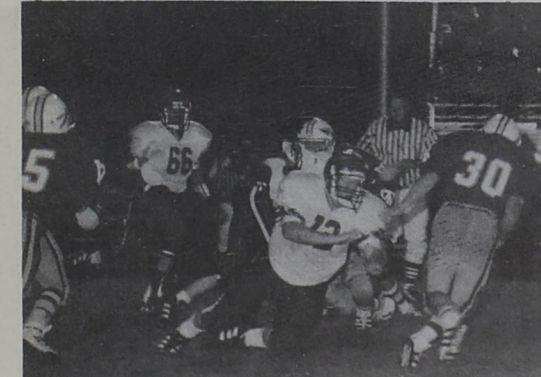

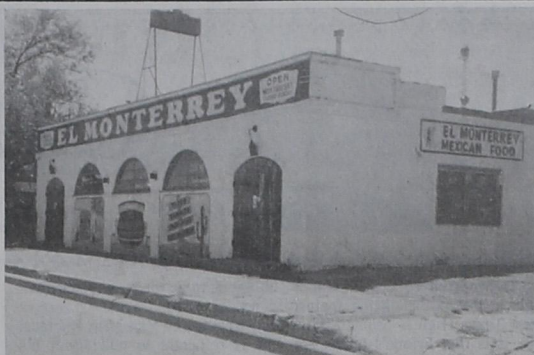

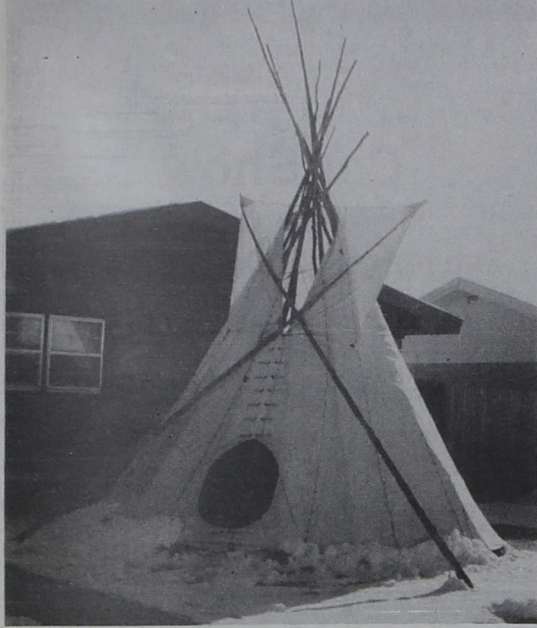

Out Here

It occurred to me the other night at the football game against West Texas High at Stinnett, how nice it is that Friona's teams are called Chieftains and Squaws.

My high school was the Hillsboro Eagles. Now that I look back, we didn't have a song to sing or a sound we could yell that sounded anything like an eagle.

When you go down the mascot list of teams with names like Bobcats, Wildcats, Cranes, Loboos, or Pirates, you can't help but notice that it is impossible to simulate what they sound like into a yell.

Not so with the Chiefs and Squaws. The band strikes up "Cherokee", the fans raise their arms in the tomahawk chop, and what do you have? Instant school spirit, led by the cheerleaders and Tammy Spencer in costume as this year's Chieftain mascot.

There is one other element of school spirit that appears each year about this time. Joe Murphree's Tepee.

You've seen it in the end zone during home games and at the homecoming bonfire last Thursday. Maybe you thought it was just a plastic prop from the high school drama department store room.

Wrong, Kemo Sabel! It has a history of its own.

Joe Murphree graduated from Friona High School in 1967, attended West Texas State for "almost a couple of years" before enlisting in the U. S. Army in January, 1970.

After basic training in Fort Ord, California, and a helicopter mechanic training school in Fort Eustis, Virginia, Murphree shipped out to Viet Nam as a full-fledged helicopter mechanic.

He spent his tour of Viet Nam at a carved-out base they just called Bearcat. During the second half of his one year tour, Murphree served as a flight engineer. That meant he rode along on the choppers' missions to be ready to repair them if needed.

Like many Viet Nam veterans, he is reluctant to talk about his experience in much detail. He was in firefighting, shot at, and under bombing attacks. But he describes the flight engineer part of his tour as "the fun part."

He returned to the U. S. and mustered out of the Army in February, 1972. For the next few years he "knocked around" in Friona, Colorado, and Amarillo.

During this "knocking around" stage, Murphree worked in Colorado for another Friona native, Johnny Baxter. Baxter was a logger and Murphree helped him build and operate a sawmill up in the mountains of Colorado.

The logging crew lived in whatever they had. Murphree laughs about "living in his van at 10,000 feet." Two couples who worked on the crew lived in tepees.

He said they were always comfortable. They would build fires inside the tepee to keep warm and cook and sleep. Compared to his van, Murphree says the tepees were "real nice."

So he asked the two ladies to make him one. They sewed tepees as a part-time business and sold them all across the area.

But, with a Colorado winter approaching, Murphree migrated back to Friona before they finished his portable wigwam. The year was 1977. Joe came back to Friona and has been here ever since.

In the meantime, the ladies finished his tepee and shipped it to him. To the best of his memory it cost about \$250 to \$300 to make.

Back in Friona, he farmed for 3-4 years, drove a "bull-hauler" and gas truck before going to work for Kendrick Oil Company over nine years ago.

During all that time, the tepee was in the garage or storage shed.

It is no small feat to store it since it has 15 poles in all and is 15 feet tall and 15 feet in diameter when erected.

Joe says that by himself it takes about 45 minutes to set up, or 30 minutes if he has help. It is made of a thin, heavy-duty, water proof canvas. Joe says that it is so waterproofed that gray duct tape will not stick to it.

After he got the tepee in 1977, he never even set it up until a couple of years ago when a friend asked him to bring it to a Chieftains homecoming bonfire.

It goes without saying that the tepee was a hit and has been ever since. The original poles were Aspen but they were too crooked to suit him, so last year he took his boys and they cut new pine tree poles.

Since he sets it up several times a year now, a guy just don't need to be aggravated by crooked poles. Life is too short.

He told me that he thought the two ladies that made the tepee almost twenty years ago were hippies that lived around the mountains. I couldn't help but smile at Mr. Murphree. This soft-spoken gentleman with the easy smile and graying ponytail has a hint of former hippie himself.

He hopes to spruce up the tepee with some "outdoor Southwest" art if he ever gets around to finding someone to paint it.

These days instead of fixing helicopters, he is the pump mechanic at Kendrick Oil, responsible for keeping the gas pumps flowing at the 15-20 Kendrick locations around the South Plains. He and his wife Audrey have two teenagers at home and Joe has a 14-year-old son in Albuquerque.

He says, "The school told me not to call anymore and ask if they want the tepee set up. They said just bring it until I die."

For now he only sets it up at home games and the bonfire. But I suspect that if the Chieftains were to advance in the playoffs, Joe could be persuaded to haul it out of town.

In the meantime, when you hear "Cherokee" and do the tomahawk chop at the next home game, don't forget to appreciate the tepee over behind the end zone. It is a real one. A perfect symbol of the FHS Chieftain and Squaw spirit.

And be proud that you are not a Lobo fan.

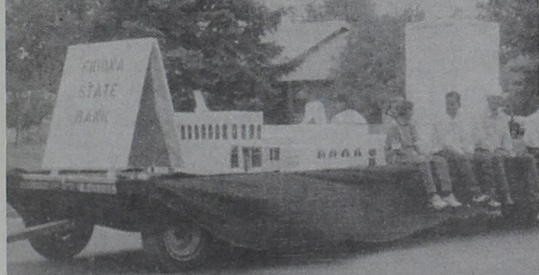
