Up until this year, we had only followed in the papers or on TV, while the "football factories," such as Odessa Permian, the 4A Sweetwater Mustangs (did you see those accomplishments on the scoreboard at Mustang Bowl??), and other schools with a proud football heritage did one of their runs toward a state championship.

We had been watching, out of the corners of our eyes, how a group of young athletes started their junior high school years by winning all of their games, in the seventh and/or the eighth grade, and many of us had been thinking (and talking) about what might happen when this contingent of athletes got to the varsity level.

At about the same time that this group of athletes sprang upon the scene, Friona also became very lucky when a young man by the name of James Morton was made their head coach.

Having worked with Coach Morton for four or five years prior to this one, it just seemed that all of the right ingredients might come together about this time in FHS' football program.

And they did!

Coach Morton told Ye Editor his week that he wanted to part, ribund to his come unique professionals, which they do.

Morton says that after the Chieftains played Littlefield on almost even terms in their first game of the season, having a shot at winning on the Wildcats' home turf, he began to think big things might be in store for his team.

"Littlefield had a number of boys back from their 1995 team, that lost out to Ballinger in the regional finals last year. The score of that game was a tie, with Ballinger advancing on 20-yard line penetrations, and went on to the state semifinals." Coach Morton told us.

Morton says he began to think at that point that Friona could do what Littlefield and/or Ballinger had done the previous year.

Chieftains Gaining Some Recognition

Their season cut short by one game that they had hoped for reaching, the Friona High School Chieftains this week began receiving some accolaides in the form of post-season "dream teams."

'dream teams."

The team gained five spots on the all-district offensive team and four on defense. They also landed four spots each on the second-teams offense and defense.

Followers of the team probably thought the Chieftains deserved more credit than they received on the all-district squads. A prime example was when the district coaches favored River Road's Rowdy Lundergreen over Friona's Kyle Grimsley at the quarterback spot, offensive team.

Looking at the teams' head-to-head meeting, Grimsley led his team to 486 total yards, while the Chieftain defense held the explosive Wildcats to 311 yards. That's a 175-yard difference in Grimsley's and Friona's favor.

Early this week, the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal released its "All South Plains" class 3A team.

On that team, Grimsley was picked for the quarterback, Angel Vega at wide receiver and Landon Wiseman at center, on the offensive team.

On defense, Quint Ellis was picked at defensive end, Fidel Rodriguez as a linebacker, and Aaron King as a defensive back.

Rodriguez led the team in tackles with 146, including 89 unassisted. Ellis had 87 tackles on defense, nine sacks, three fumble recoveries, a pass interception for a TD, a fumble recovery for a TD, and a tackle for a safety,
Coach James Morton was chosen by the A-J as the "Coach of the Year" for Class 3A.

As of this writing, the class 3A all-star team for the Panhandle area, as well as the "Super Team," both picked by the Amarillo Globe News, had not been named. The former should be in Friday or Saturday's G-N, and the latter in Sunday's paper.

On the Associated Press Sports Editor's All-State team announced Wednesday, Ellis was picked as a second team lineman, while Angel Vega made the team as an honorable mention receiver.

Hereford's Holly Sugar Plant To Remain Open

HEREFORD-Holly Sugar
in Hereford will keep its doors
open at least one more year,
Imperial Holly and TexasNew Mexico Sugarbeet
Growers Association officials
decided in a meeting
Tuesday.

decided in a meeting Tuesday.

The association put out letters two weeks ago advising producers that Holly must have 25,000 acres committed for the 1997 crop by December 15 to keep the operation profitable.

"The response received from the association's request for early acreage commit-

"The response received from the association's request for early acreage commitments has been encouraging," the two parties said in a joint statement Tuesday.

"Based on the level of commitments received and indications from growers who have not yet committed that they are going to grow beets for the 1997 campaign, Imperial Holly has decided to operate the factory to process the 1997 crop," the joint release said.

Kenneth Frye, president of the Texas-New Mexico Sugarbeet Growers Association, said about 20,000 acres were committed for the 1997 crop, and the push will continue for more acres.

Old growers and new growers are signing up, he said. Frye said some positive growth is expected in the Dalhart area as well as the

tateline area south of

stateline area south of Bovina.

"They realize that we need to all pull together and keep striving to get that 25,000 acres to keep this factory going now and in the future," Frye said.

Holly pays out about \$20 million to area farmers and employs more than 300 people during the harvest campaign. In 1996, about 350 regional beet farmers harvested 14,000 acres for processing, which only occupied 37 per cent of Holly's factory capacity, Frye said.

Holly officials said sugar prices are expected to remain strong in 1997 due to the short crops being produced in 1995 and 1996 and the resulting tight supplies of refined sugar.

With the recent decline in

resulting tight supplies of refined sugar.

With the recent decline in grain prices, sugarbeets offer a particularly attractive alternative, association officials said. The recent changes to the sugarbeet purchase contract provide a higher payment at harvest and offer the grower in the Panhandle the best sugarbeet contract in the industry, they said.

"It's important that those growers who have not finalized their 1997 crop plans complete their commitment so as to ensure that the association reaches its committed level of 25,000 acres," he said.

Exit Test Schedules Are Given

Individuals who have met all requirements for high school graduation but have not passed one or more sections of the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) or the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) may take the test this February.

Minimum Skills (TEAMS) may take the test this February.
Testing will be on the following dates: TAAS-February 25, writing; February 26, mathematics; February 27, reading; TEAMS-February 27, English language arts.
All individuals who wish to take the TEAMS test(s) must register in advance. This includes students currently enrolled in Texas public high schools as well as individuals who have completed all other high school graduation requirements.

The only individuals who must register for the TAAS test(s) are those who are no longer enrolled in school who have not met minimum expectations on all sections of the TAAS test or a student who will be testing in a district other than the district that they are enrolled in. A registration packet may be picked up at any high school campus, district central office of education service center.





Tatum's Speed, Heft **Too Much For Chiefs**

The Chieftain football team made more mistakes in the first half of their semi-final game against Tatum last Saturday than they had in all four previous

playoff games.

And the speedy Eagles didn't need a lot of help. They romped to 414 total yards against a Chieftain team which had allowed less than half that much yardage in its previous 14 games.

The result translated into a 48-loss at Texas Stadium, and the end of Friona's state championship

hopes.

"We had hoped to put the pressure on them and cause them to tighten up. But when they got that early jump, we couldn't do that," said Coach James Morton.

The Chieftain coach praised the offensive work of Quint Ellis, "He had an outstanding day in pass receiving. We didn't hdo a very good job of blocking. They were just too big and fast for us," Morton added.o

Shane Blackburn ran 32 yards with the opening kickoff, coming

Shane Blackburn ran 32 yards with the opening kickoff, coming very close to breaking it all the way for a touchdown. Blackburn's run gave Friona good field position at their own 42-yard line.

Kyle Grimsley was able to gain just a yard in two tries, and on third down he lofted a pass that webt over intended receiver Quint Ellis' head. The pass sailed right into the waiting arms of Tyrone Greenwood, and the Tatum defender had clear sailing up the left sideline had clear sailing up the left sideline

The kick gave the Eagles a 7-0 lead. Only 1:34 had elapsed in the

David Shelby returned the second Tatum kickoff to the Friona 30. The Chieftains gained 13 yards in two plays, but unfortunately an offsides penalty on first down worked against them.

And on third down, Grimsley

faked a handoff to Andy Kendrick, and then was sacked for a five-yard loss.



ies, in figures compiled this week.

Grimsley led the team in passing, with 1288 yards, and was second in rushing with 993 yards. Grimsley's total offense figure (rushing plus passing), came to 2,281 yards, which is the highest single season total since individual records are available, starting in 1962.

Grimsley completed 66 of 134 passing attempts, and connected for 14 touchdown passes, suffering only four interceptions. The Chieftain signal-caller gained 993 yards rushing on 153 tries, a 6.5 yards-per-carry average.

Kendrick was the team's rushing leader for the second straight year. He gained 1,376 yards on 163 attempts. Daniel Cuevas was the third leading rusher, gaining 811 yards on 149 carries. Cuevas' total would have been good enough to lead the team in many FHS seasons, but had to settle for third place this year. David Shelby added 604 yards on 126 attempts.

Kendrick also led the team in scoring for the second straight year, scoring 21

Kendrick also led the team in scoring for the second straight year, scoring 21 touchdowns and four points on rushing PATs, for 130 points. Angel Vega was runnerup with 105 points. He scored 11 touchdowns, 32 kicking point-afters, two running PATs and a field goal.

goal.

Kendrick's point total (130)
was the most-ever for a team
leader. Added to his total of
66 points his junior year
makes Kendrick the all-time

66 points his junior year makes Kendrick the all-time varsity leader with 196 points. Tony Perea had been the scoring leader since he scored 188 points in three seasons (1966-67-68).

Andy now ranks in second place for career rushing, with 2,194 yards in two years. Tony Perea gained 2,823 yards over a three-year high school career.

Grimsley now is Friona's total offense leader, career, with 3,204 yards. Broken down, that is 1,265 yards rushing and 1,937 yards passing. Grimsley narrowly passed up Blair Burney in this department. Burney, who started three years at QB and played three games as a freshman, totalled 3,195

successful grid season ever.

The Eagles not only sidetracked Friona's bid to make the state finals, but snapped the team's 13game winning streak, which started in the second game, 'way back in early September.

Kendrick's touchdown added to his team scoring lead, and his 130 points are the most ever scored by

an FHS football player. Vega's TD and three points-after gave him 105 points, giving Friona two men over 100 points. Angel is the only non-backfield player to ever score that many points. His 11 touchdowns are a record number for a receiver.

yards for his 33-game career. Grimsley got his 3,204 yards in 25 varsity games.
Grimsley's passing yardage were the most since Blair Burney passed for 1,511 yards in 1992. The 1996 Chieftains didn't pass nearly as much as the '92 team. Grimsley made 66 of 134 attempts. Burney had 273 attempts, completing 107 passes.

Kendrick's rushing total, 1,376, was the most for a team leader since Tony Perea set the FHS season record with 1,736.

Angel Vega's 852 yards receiving is a new season high at Friona High School, although Brian Herring's 46 catches in 1992 is still the highest number of catches. Vega made his yardage on 33 catches, averaging 25.8 yards per catch, a new record. His 11 TDs on receptions is another new Friona record. When Herring caught his 46 passes in '92, he scored just four TDs.

The 1992 team was Coach Morton's first year as head coach. The passing totals were a bright spot in the team's 0-10 season record.

was packed with excitement from start to finish in Friona's first 15-game season, saw these individual efforts:
Kendrick had the longest run from scrimmage, 90 yards, in the Monahans game. Grimsley had an 80-yard scoring run against River Road.

Kendrick had a game-high 227 yards rushing in the Monahans game. It was the seventh highest mark in FHS' football history, and Kendrick was the first Friona player to top the 200-yard mark in a game since Ismael Rocha gained 243 yards against River Road in 1990.
Grimsley hooked up with wide receiver Angel Vega on a 73-yard scoring pass play against Perryton in an afternoon game. Vega snagged three TD passes in the game. It was Friona's biggest passing game of the year, 213, just edging the 192 total against Tatum in the state semi-finals.

The Chieftains set a single-season record with six consecutive games with over 400 total yards. Their highest total was 506 yards against Dalhart. Friona gained 415 yards rushing

against Dalhart and 414 against Sanford-Fritch.

Vega had a 70-yard punt return against Perryton.

The Chieftains are by far the highest scoring team in FHS history with 454 points. However, they have to share the points-per-game average of 30.3 with the 1951 team, which outscored their opponents, 273-47 while fashioning a 7-2 record for Raymond Cook.

The '51 Chieftain team's 47 points are the fewest for a season of at least nine games. That's an average of just 5.2 points per game, which still challenges FHS teams after 45 years.

On defense, Fidel Rodriguez led in tackles with 146, nearly 50 per cent above the second-place tackler, Luis Ramirez, who had 105. Rodriguez had 57 unassisted tackles, and Ramirez had 31, Eloy Trejo was third with 103 tackles and Juan Santiago had an even 100.

Cecil Cooper led in sacks with 11; Quint Ellis had nine and Hugo Santiago eight.

King led in interceptions with 10, eight coming in four playoff games. Ellis and Cooper each had three fumble recoveries.

Sector Funds Can Be Roller Coasters

Roller coaster riders like steep plunges.

Roller coaster riders like steep plunges. Investors don't.

To help minimize the risk of potential plummets, many investors turn to mutual funds. Because funds diversify your investment among a variety of securities, the risk of being hurt by a decline in any one security is reduced. To diversify your investment even more, most mutual funds invest not only in a variety of securities, but also in a variety of industries.

funds invest not only in a variety of securities, but also in a variety of industries.

However, sector funds are different. They confine their investments to stocks of companies within a specific industry—for example, communications, electronics, health care, aerospace, precious metals, natural resources, foreign investments, utilities and more. Investors buy sector funds as a way to participate in one particular industry, yet own a variety of companies within that industry.

Owning a sector fund can be like a roller coaster ride. If the fund's industry does well, the fund can climb dramatically. But if the industry has a downturn, the sector fund can experience an even steeper drop than the overall industry.

In the 1970s, many people believed the world was headed for an unprecedented shortage of oil. The price of oil skyrocketed, and the experts predicted that we would have to religiously of energy. Energy stocks began making new highs, and it didn't take long for energy sector funds to be developed.

Then the U.S. re-evaluated its dependence on foreign oil. Suddenly, the entire industry changed. Energy stocks declined across the board, and sector funds took an even harsher blow than the over-

all market.

Although sector funds can be hurt the most when an industry suffers, they also can perform the best when an industry is strong. Therefore, some investors move in and out of different sector funds, trying to forecast which industries will do best during market and economic cycles. This is called sector rotation trading, and it's often advocated by mutual fund newsletters that promote short-term trading.

While appealing on paper, sector rotation is elusive in practice. In "The Mutual Fund Letter," Dr. Gerald W. Perritt says that trading sector funds "is one of the best ways I know to ensure your investments under-perform the overall market." Professional investors find difficulty achieving superior results, and individual investors inevitably wind up with long-term returns that don't reward them for the risks they take.

This is not to say that nobody should invest in sector funds. They may be appropriate as part of a diversified investment portfolio. However, they require more study and understanding than the typical mutual fund.

When evaluating a sector fund, compare its investment record to the performance of the industry. Typically, sector funds follow the industry in good times and bad. With professional management, however, sector funds may offer better results than you could obtain by randomly picking individual stocks within your chosen industry.

Sector funds may masquerade as typical mutual funds. Be sure to find out what kind of roller coaster you're getting onto before you invest.
