## NEW YORK DAILY TELLS ABOUT PECOS.

### Hearst's New York American Will Run Special Article About This City.

The Commercial Club, which is now securing publicity in some 75 to 100 publications of all sorts, next week will break into the New York American, a paper with a daily circulation of 1,300,000 copies. The matter was taken up with them and they advise the club that they will run an article about Pecos in their special edition to be gotten out for the National Land & Irrigation Show to be held in New York in November, at which show it is to be hoped that Pecos may be represented. No doubt arrangements will be perfected by which the city will be represented.

The past month has been a productive one for Pecos in securing special articles. Eight special stories have appeared in publications with circulations reaching into the millions. All of these, except two, have been published gratis, the other two were secured by purchase.

Some people doubt the value of municipal advertising—they are few—for the world now realizes that a city, like a great merchant or corporation, must advertise. 100,000,000 people in the United States are possible to reach, but only in one way, that through the gigantic force of America's press.

The ebb and flow of animal life as it quenches its thirst at the public fountain gives us an estimate of the wealth, population and prosperity of the community; the character, habits and occupation of its people, and the utility, pleasures and hardships of its citizens. There is no better place to study the progress of a community than at the public watering place.

Every village in Texas should have a public watering place and every city with water works should have drinking fountains where a stream of pure running water dispenses Adam's ale to the thirsty populace. Pure water and plenty of it is a good city builder.

In Midland we have greater opportunities for beautifying along lines of this kind than any town we know of. We have the water, plenty of it, yet it is a fact that we haven't even a place where a farmer may feel perfectly free to go and water his team when he gets in from the country to do his trading. Think this over. Maybe so this is something for the Commercial Club to take hold of. — Midland Reporter.

Say, Brother Watson, if you have time it will pay you to take a day off and come up to Pecos, the wonderful "City of Flowing Wells," take notice and inspect our water advantages and our fine flowing fountain in the center of the city, filled with fine fish, to which the farmers can drive their teams and let them have plenty of clear, cool water. This fountain is supplied by one of Pecos' 250 fine artesian wells. Pecos would be glad to see Midland lay aside her swaddling clothes and adorn herself in a more becoming city attire, taking a stand beside her younger sister who is so gallantly leading the procession. We admire Midland and the people of Midland their pluck and energy; but, oh my, Midland, unfortunately, occupies the wrong place on the map!

## The Crowd at the Rally

Editor Star Telegram: After reading the paper boosting the big rally yesterday, speaking of the number of people here, I thought if your paper is willing to be fair and give facts, I would submit a few for your readers, not that I want to detract from the occasion, but for your information and the public's. I submit the following as an estimate of the number of people here. In the first place, all the crowd had

to get to the stock yards (the Coliseum) on the street cars. Those who live here of course, had their own conveyances. The traction company has two classes of cars, one with eighteen seats which seat thirty-six people; one with sixteen seats which seat thirty-two people. The open cars which seat about as many as the large cars, thirty-six people. Now, from 7:40 yesterday morning till 12 o'clock the traction ran over the bridge to the north side.

73 small cars, 32 each, 2,336  
79 large cars, 36 each, 3,492  
19 Rosen Heights cars with about the same capacity as the large cars of the company, 684. Making a total of exactly 6,512. This is the number of cars that went over, and up to 9:30 the cars were not more than half filled.

From 9:30 to 10:30 the cars were about full and after 10:30 all the cars returning brought about from five to fifteen persons; say an average of ten; at least 1,500 had returned and from 11:30 to 12 the cars were full. Take 1,600 from the 6,512 and you have a possible 5,000 people out to the stock yards and, on a safe calculation, one-half of them were citizens of Fort Worth.

These figures were from actual count by one who was on the grounds.

There were thirty automobiles and they only carried persons on business and most of them returned before 12 o'clock. This don't look like 20,000 nor the half of 20,000. Facts are facts and cannot be controverted. Please publish this, as of general interest.

## OUTLOOK FOR DIRECT ELECTIONS IMPROVED.

### Believed It Will Pass Monday Without Amendment, Giving Congress Control.

From Dallas News.

Washington, June 9.—Senator Borah and other advocates of the popular election of Senators are confident the resolution submitting the proposed constitutional amendment to the States will be adopted by the Senate when it comes to a vote Monday whether the Bristow amendment to the resolution be accepted or not. The Bristow amendment gives Congress power to regulate by legislation the time and manner of holding elections for Senators under the proposed popular plan. This proposition is objectionable to many Senators, who fear that under it Congress in the future may undertake to interfere with the laws of their States disfranchising illiterate negroes.

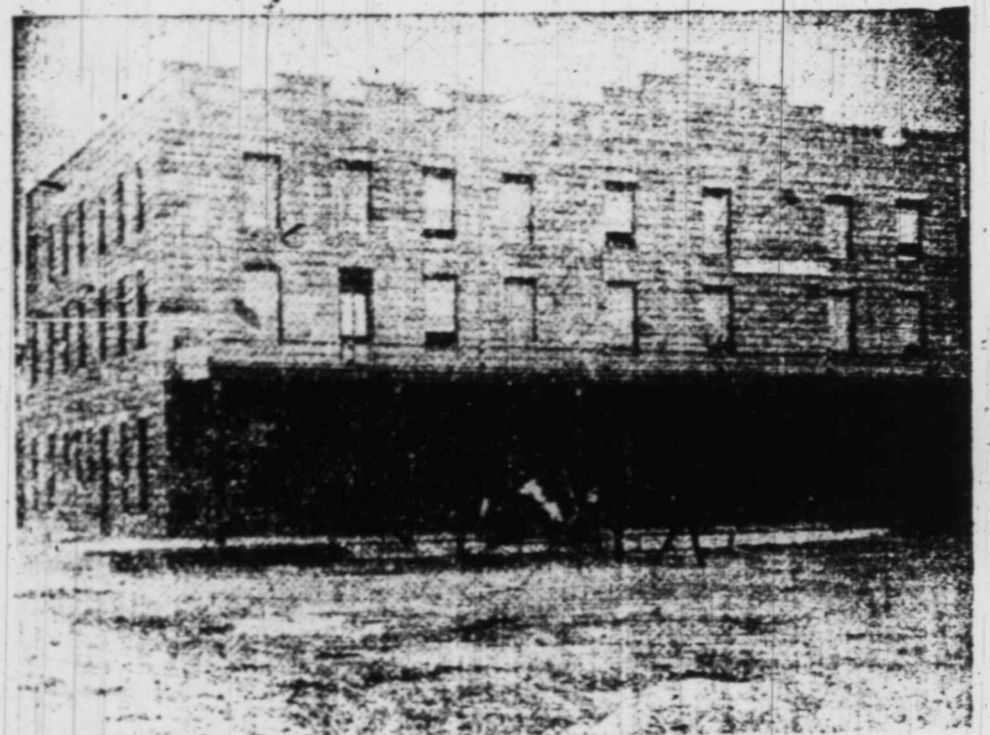
But it is not regarded as certain that the Bristow amendment will carry when it is put to a test in the Senate Monday. Senator Borah, who is in charge of the direct elections resolution, said this evening that the vote on the Bristow proposition would be very close and it would win or be defeated by one or two votes. But whether it is won or lost, he was very hopeful the direct elections resolution would command the necessary two-thirds majority

and go through the Senate. Many Democratic Senators would be for it on the final vote whether the Bristow amendment was adopted or not.

In the last Congress several Democratic Senators from Southern States supported the direct elections resolution, although the Sutherland amendment similar in its provisions to the Bristow amendment had been made part of it. Among these Senators were such men as Culberson of Texas, Clarke of Arkansas, and Rayner and Smith of Maryland. They took the position that Congress could be relied on not to attempt interference in the future with the laws of Southern States disfranchising illiterate negroes, no matter what powers it might be granted under the proposed constitutional amendment providing for the direct election of Senators. It is now said the number of Democratic Senators who will take this attitude Monday will be considerably larger than in the last Congress. Hence the confidence of the supporters of the direct elections resolution that it will be adopted whether the Bristow proposition be incorporated in it or not.

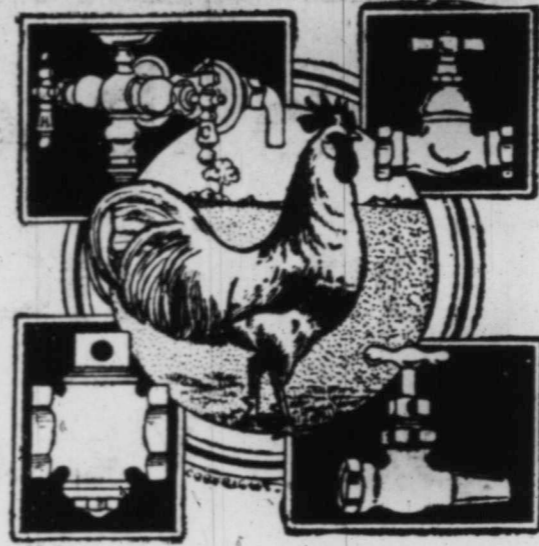
