CHASE AFTER CHILD ENDED

Mrs. Chandler Locates Husband and Child in Ashville, North Carolina.

After a chase of several weeks Will Chandler, who ran off from Toyah, taking with him the son who had been given to the custody of his wife, was located in North Carolina on August 20th, by the wife and mother.

It is vaguely hinted that a fight for the possession of the child will be begun in that state. He is what a special correspondence to the El Paso Morning Times has to say in this regard:

Asheville, N. C., Aug. 20.—After following her husband and small son through seven states, Mrs. Gertrude Chandler finally located them here today. She resides at Toyah Texas, and is said to have recently been awarded the custody of her child after a stiff fight in the courts. Another legal battle is anticipated here. Her husband is said to have left Toyah soon after the court proceedings with the child. Then began the pursuit which has just ended in this city.

Mrs. Chandler is a frail little woman and is pretty well exhausted as a result of the long chase.

Another Booster

J. R. Marmion, Field Agent for the I. & G. N. Ry. lands, who is also an enthusiastic booster for the Pecos and Toyah Valley countries, in conversation with R. M. Harkay, J. G. Love and others while in Pecos the past week, made the statement that the Toyah Valley lands were as fine if not finer for all kinds of fruit, than any of the great valleys of the Northeast.

Mr. Marmion travels extensively during the year, practically all over the United States. He says the time is not far distant when lands in this country will be selling for \$300 per acre in 10 acre tracts for orchards of all kinds. He also stated that white alfalfa is our staple crop at the present time, and cantaloupes will bring large revenue for our farmers, the true situation will be brought out in a few years by the fruit growers becoming interested in this country which will give it the standing it should have with all the irrigated valleys of the West.

Such statements as above from men who know whereof they speak, should encourage all people here now and induce others to come and plant small orchards, and we know the statement is true, for at this time no finer grapes, better flavored peaches or finer pears have been sold on the local market, than this year, and we fully agree with Mr. Marmion, that the proper value of this land will be established when 10 acre farms are found all over this country.

Good Rain This Afternoon

Pecos and the surrounding country received a good rain this afternoon, though we are unable to state as to the extent of the rain, from the appearance of the clouds it extended a goodly way in every direction. It will be of great benefit to the stockmen though not sufficient by any means.

Horses for the Fair Races

D. W. Christian, of Big Springs, one of the best race horse men in West Texas, writes the secretary of the Reeves County Fair that he has two-running horses in training and will be on the Pecos track during the Fair. Letters from Clovis, N. M., and Clarendon, Texas, state that good horses will come from those points.

The races seem to be a big drawing card for our fair and all local horsemen should commence early and train their horses, and try to keep at least a part of the purses at home.

Another Parcel Post Change

Washington Aug. 12.—The time appears to be close at hand when a remarkable defect in the parcel post system is about to be remedied. For reasons best known to the framers of the parcel post bill, books and other printed matter were barred from the low parcel post. This proves one of the more remunerative kinds of business in which the express companies are engaged and Postmaster-General Burleson has for some time been figuring on a way to annex this character of business.

Aside from the profit it would afford to the Postoffice Department, there is a wide field for usefulness in extending the parcel post rate to books, as it would enable libraries to reach out over a great territory for the purpose of serving readers.

Today the subject of bringing books under the parcel post system was taken up by Representative Lee of Maryland, who introduced a resolution in the house requesting the Postmaster General to investigate the subject and extend the parcel post rates to books in case he finds that the plan will prove financially satisfactory to the Department. The Lewis resolution can not pass at this session of Congress but its passage is not necessary to spur the Post Office department to a train in this matter as Postmaster-General Burleson is planning to extend the parcel post service over the entire field of express business up to the limit of weight that it will be practicable for the department to handle.

JAIL DELIVERY SUNDAY MORNING

Five Prisoners in the Pecos Jail Are Released By Unknown Parties.

Saturday afternoon Sheriff Tom Harrison could not resist the temptation of trying his luck with the funny trib and together with several others, hid himself off to the river for a little sport.

Sometimes during the night some party or parties who evidently had been awaiting just such an opportunity, by the use of keys already prepared opened the doors to the jail and liberated the prisoners confined therein.

Two of the prisoners already convicted, and having appealed their cases, refused to take advantage of the opportunity to escape, and early Sunday morning, came down and informed Mrs. Harrison that the other prisoners had escaped during the night. She immediately sent word to Mr. Harrison and gave the alarm.

A diligent search was made and while the escaped prisoners were tracked across the river, none of the four mexicans have been captured.

A telegram from El Paso announced the Pete Steen, charged with murder, had been captured in that city, was received by Sheriff Harrison and he left on the train this afternoon to identify and bring the prisoner back, should he prove to be true.

The officers are using every endeavor to capture the men and we believe that it will only be a matter of a short time before they are again lodging with Sheriff Harrison.

Cantaloupe Shipments

President J. W. Moore of the Pecos Melons Growers Association, upon being asked by a Record Times man for a statement regarding the shipments made by the association this season, said that at this time it would be impossible for him to make a statement that would be authentic, as he has not yet had the time to check up the shipments and get the balances.

He stated that he thought he would be in a position to give a complete statement in time for next week's paper.

The shipments to date will probably reach 17 cars including loose express shipments, and there are still some shipments being made by express.

PECOS REFINERY OPENS MONDAY

Will Begin the Manufacture of Refined Oils Early the Next Week.

Manager Robinson of the Pecos Refining Company informed the Record Times management that they would, after a delay of several weeks begin the refining of oil at their plant west of town, at Mann station, Monday.

Mr. Robinson and his associates came here several months ago with a proposition to our citizens that if they would donate a certain amount of land and take stock in the refinery they would establish a plant in this vicinity. Later they withdrew the stock proposition and immediately began the work of installing the refinery, after several delays in the arrival of the machinery they have at last reached the point of beginning operation as above mentioned.

Mr. Robinson assures us that the company will turn out such oils, naphtha, gasoline, etc., as will meet the demands of the people of Pecos and the surrounding country.

We are not in position to estimate the value of this enterprise to this section of the country, but it will be considerable cannot be doubted.


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


