

Sermon Preached by Rev. J. B. Cole Sunday, March 2.

Text: Gen. 15.

We naturally draw back from criticising the dead, even though it be ever so clear that they are open to adverse judgment. But if we do so it is often the case that the living are wronged by such a course. We rob them of the benefit of example and at a time that the example is most powerful. But we may feel perfectly secure in such a course as is persued by the Bible. The Holy Spirit has set the lesson for such criticism and has wonderfully set out the summary of men's lives and has preserved their example for all time and said that such example is "profitable" for us. 


