Scientists to Study the Case of a Harvard Professor-Relaxed, but Was Conscious.

HASN'T SLEPT IN 20 YEARS.

A Harvard professor, who has not slept in twenty years, but has taken his rest in the "twilight state," is the subject of investigations by the psychological laboratory of the universty

and the state psychopathic hospital. The "twilight state," in which the subject retains consciousness of all that goes on about him, is declared to be a scientific relaxation more satisfying than sleep and restoring the bodily vigor in about half the time required

by sleep. While the identity of the Harvard LOW Rate professor is kept secret. Prof. Hugo Munsterberg, director of the psychological laboratory at Harvard, who is a close personal friend of the sleepless educator, has made a close study of his case. Professor Munsterberg said his experience showed that it is scientifically possible to sleep without

Pneumonia Prevention. The end of the winter, far from

bringing a termination to the danger from pneumonia, in reality marks the beginning of the season when this 'disease becomes an extremely serious cause of increase of mortality. This is true particularly in large cities. In recent years this increase has become more and more marked and is all the more striking because of the decrease in deaths from other infectious diseases. Pneumonia has been aptly termed the "Captain of the Men of Death," displacing tuberculosis which for so long occupied that "bad eminence." The most important problem before the medical profession at present is the reduction of the deathrate from pneumonia. Considering the nature of the disease and the indevelopment and that with the instal- tense strain which it imposes on the lation of them here, we will be able heart, it is probable that the only through the prevention of the disease. The prospect of a cure for it in the popular sense of that term, according to the Journal of the American Medical Association, has grown less as we have learned more about the disease. While pneumonia would be the case for this section of most frequent during the colder portion of the year it is not dependent entirely on low temperature. The disease occurs at all seasons and in climates. It does not work its greatest ravages in the colder climates, but is rather rare in the cold of high altitudes and is almost never known to occur within the Arctic circle. spite of all their suffering from cold. Arctic explorers escape this danger Hence we must assume that cold acts in conjunction with some other factor in the production of the disease Pneumonia is favored by lack of sunlight and it occurs among those who are much exposed to dust or who have to breathe the emanations from the lungs of other people. Catarrhal processes affecting the air passages prepare the soil for the implantation of the germ of pneumonia. It is particularly a disease of city life and crowded living. With our present knowledge the prospects are hopeful for the control of pneumonia in the future through prevention. This is of special importance to the individual. HOME MADE KITCHEN CABI-NET EASILY CONSTRUCTED.

A Little Ingenuity and Work Will Produce a Contrivance that Will

Answer Purpose. Probably no truly domestic woman ever passes a kitchen cabinet, so perfect in its arrangements and so complete in details, without wishing she owned one, but the initial cost is, in most cases, prohibitive and she must do without. Doing without the patented cabinet, however, does not mean that a woman need do without the convenience, for with a little ingenuity and work and slight expenses she may achieve at home the same results. An ordinary kitchen table, but better yet, a pastry table, with flour bins, drawer and kneading board, serves as the foundation. If the ordinary table is used a shelf set under the top, about a foot from the floor, will serve admirably to hold two large flour canisters, one for white and one for graham or entire wheat flour.
