

## Deadline For WTRT Scholarship Approaching

The April 10 application deadline for \$8,000 in scholarships to be awarded by West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative in May is rapidly approaching.

Scholarships are open only to students whose parents or guardians are WTRT members, or to students who are WTRT members themselves. Applicants must also be either high school seniors who are candidates for graduation this spring, have completed high school, or have received their GED.

The 1998 scholarships are funded through unclaimed capital credit funds that formerly reverted to the state. Scholarships are open only to eligible, qualified applicants in the Hereford, Friona, Bovina, Farwell, Lazbuddie, Dimmitt, Adrian and Vega school districts. Scholarships monies will be disbursed in increments per semester.

An official application form, accompanied by two letters of recommendation, must be submitted. One of the letters of recommendation must be from a teacher, principal, or counselor from the high school that the applicant is currently attending, or attended.

In Hereford, applications may be picked up only at the WTRT offices on South Highway 385.

Applications and rules may be picked up at the high school counselor's offices in Friona, Bovina, Lazbuddie, Farwell, Dimmitt, Adrian and Vega.

To be considered, applications must be fully completed, have no attachments other than two required letters of recommendation, and must be received at the offices of WTRT, Box 1737, Hereford, Texas 79045, no later than April 10, 1998.

Applicants may be asked to attend an interview at the discretion of the WTRT board. Mechanics of the

scholarships include the following:

- WTRT scholarships may be used at any state or church-sponsored college or university, or at any accredited vocational or technical school.

- Recipients must maintain a minimum of twelve credited hours throughout each semester, or have full-time student status at vocational or trade schools.

- It is important that as soon as enrollment or pre-enrollment for the fall semester is completed, that recipients send the Cooperative a confirmation from the registrar's office. Should a recipient drop out of school for any reason, the unused portion of the scholarship will be rescinded.

- At the end of each semester, recipients are requested to send a report of their grades to: West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative, Box 1737, Hereford, Texas 79045.

Last Friday Friona High School senior Sammy Perez stopped to tie his shoe and ended up in an Amarillo Hospital.

About 11 a.m., Friday, February 27, Perez was walking near the bus barn on Grand Street, returning to the high school building.

He said that he noticed a black dog a distance behind him but the dog did not appear to be a danger.

When Perez stopped and knelt down to tie his shoe, he says "the dog blindsided me." Without warning, the black dog, described as a "chow mix", attacked Perez's face, then ran away.

The youth suffered

puncture marks on his upper cheek, and severe bites to his lower lip area. When asked how many stitches it took to repair his lower lip, he said "the doctor told me he did so many he stopped counting."

For now, he is recuperating at home, anticipating a return to school by next week and, with luck, rejoining the Chieftains baseball squad in a couple of weeks.

With the help of the Friona Police Department, the black dog was located and is being held at the city pound for observation during a 10-day quarantine to check for rabies.

Sample ballots are printed elsewhere in the newspaper courtesy of Excel and Friona State Bank.

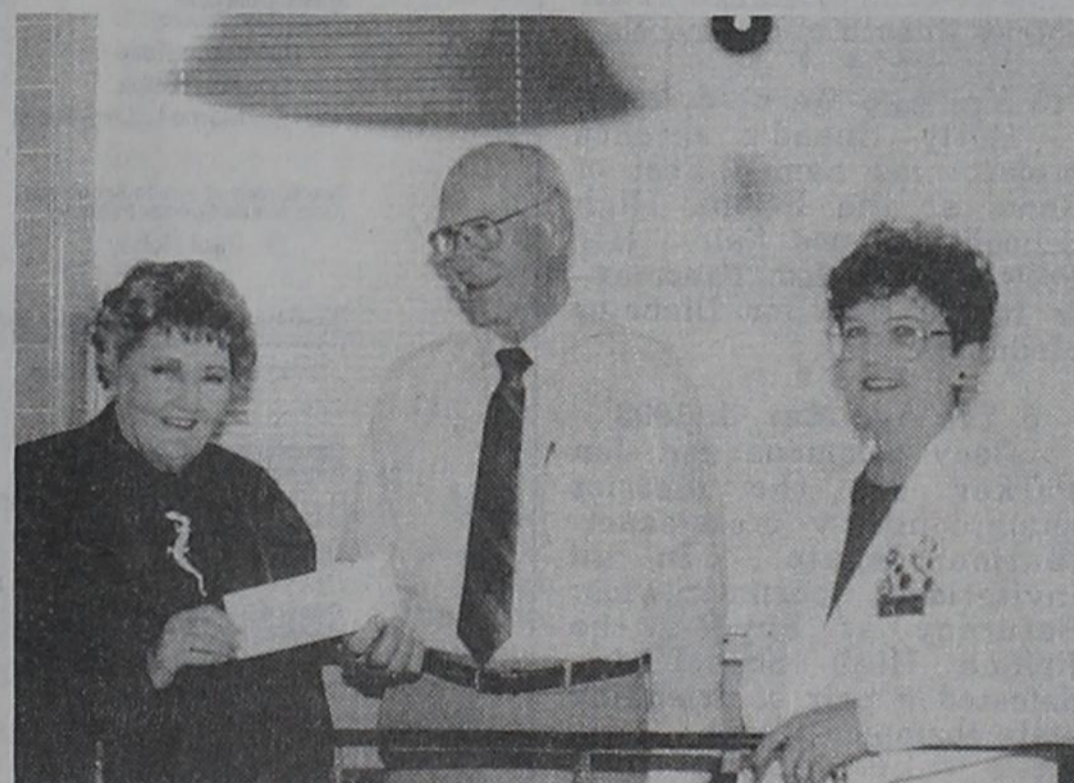

I'M SURE I DON'T NEED to tell my readers that we're living in an advanced technological world, in many fields. Since my field is publishing, which also depends on photography on a daily basis, I thought you might enjoy this story.

## Star Lites

USA TODAY published a chart last week showing how they were able to get action photographs from Japan back to America, and ready to go to press in less than 30 minutes.

Photographer Robert Deutsch and photo editor Alex Korab took a gondola to a midstation of the super-G run outside Nagano. They skied to a good camera spot near the course.

At 1:01 p.m. American Picabo Street whooshed by at close to 80 mph. Deutsch snaps photos with his digital camera. He takes the PC card (mini hard drive) from the camera and gives it to Korab.

Korab put the card into a Macintosh Powerbook computer that was carried up the slopes in a backpack. A cable connects the computer to a palm-sized cell phone. Korab transmits a photo via modem to a Mac computer at the USA TODAY office in Nagano.

At 1:20 p.m. (just 18 minutes after the photo was snapped), a USA TODAY technician in Arlington, Virginia used a communications link to open the photo in a Macintosh. He makes color corrections. The photo editor cropped and sized the photo. Color separations were made and placed on the page.

The page was then transmitted via satellite to USA TODAY's 33 print sites in the USA. Newspapers roll off presses with the photo of Street on page 1 of its sports section.

Through the use of the cell phone and laptop computer, a good hour was saved, since the photographer never had to leave the slopes.

The USA TODAY photographers were using somewhat fancier photo equipment than we use at the Friona Star/Bovina Blade. As we have done through most of the computer-age transition, Ye Ed has been watching and waiting for the price of this equipment to drop, and all the "bugs" be worked out, and then we might join the "big boys" in the digital camera department.

About the time Carol and I started our newspaper careers, the Polaroid-Land Company had introduced their "instant" cameras, which would produce a picture in about a minute. No need for darkrooms. We still have one of those cameras in our collection of items we hope to donate to an offset printing museum, if someone ever starts one.

We thought the Polaroid cameras were quite an achievement back in the 50s. And now, the digital cameras.

## 70 Yrs Ago-March 9, 1928

The Lazbuddie school is busy preparing a one and half hour play which will be given as soon as the new brick building is completed, which will probably be about one more week.

Raymond and Opal Jones have both moved their houses in from the farm and located them in town. Opal is occupying his house which is located in the northeast part of town. Raymond has been living in the E.B. McLellan house for several months.

## 55 Yrs Ago-March 5, 1943

A four-motored army bomber, enroute from Dallas to Clovis and carrying a crew of nine men, made a forced landing about sun-up Wednesday morning in a wheat field belonging to Russell O'Brian, 13 miles southeast of Friona. The plane had stopped in Lubbock, but developed engine trouble. Six of the men bailed out near Lazbuddie, and were picked up soon after the landing.

## 50 Yrs Ago-March 5, 1948

The Friona Squaws basketball team defeated McLean, 30-15 in the finals of the Girls District Basketball tournament at White Deer last Saturday night to walk away with the district

championship. The Squaws will enter the State Basketball Tournament at Hillsboro, Texas, for another try at the State Crown. They were runnersup last year. Four Friona girls won places on the all-tournament team. They were Mildred Mingus, Jean Horner, Wanda Robason and Doris Taylor.

## 45 Yrs Ago-March 5, 1953

Granville McFarland has been voted by the Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture Board of Directors as president of that organization for 1953. D.C. Herring continues as vice-president, and Arthur Drake was re-elected as secretary-treasurer.

## 40 Yrs Ago-March 6, 1958

Waggoner Carr of Lubbock, speaker of the house of representatives in the Texas legislature, will be the featured guest at the annual Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture banquet next Wednesday.

## 30 Yrs Ago-March 7, 1968

## 25 Yrs Ago-March 8, 1973

Joey Pena and Jesus Mata both singled with one out; Hanes drew a walk to load the bases. Pena scored on an error on Quint Ellis' grounder. Ismael Juarez got a two-RBI single, and Ellis scored on Aaron King's single, to make it 6-0.

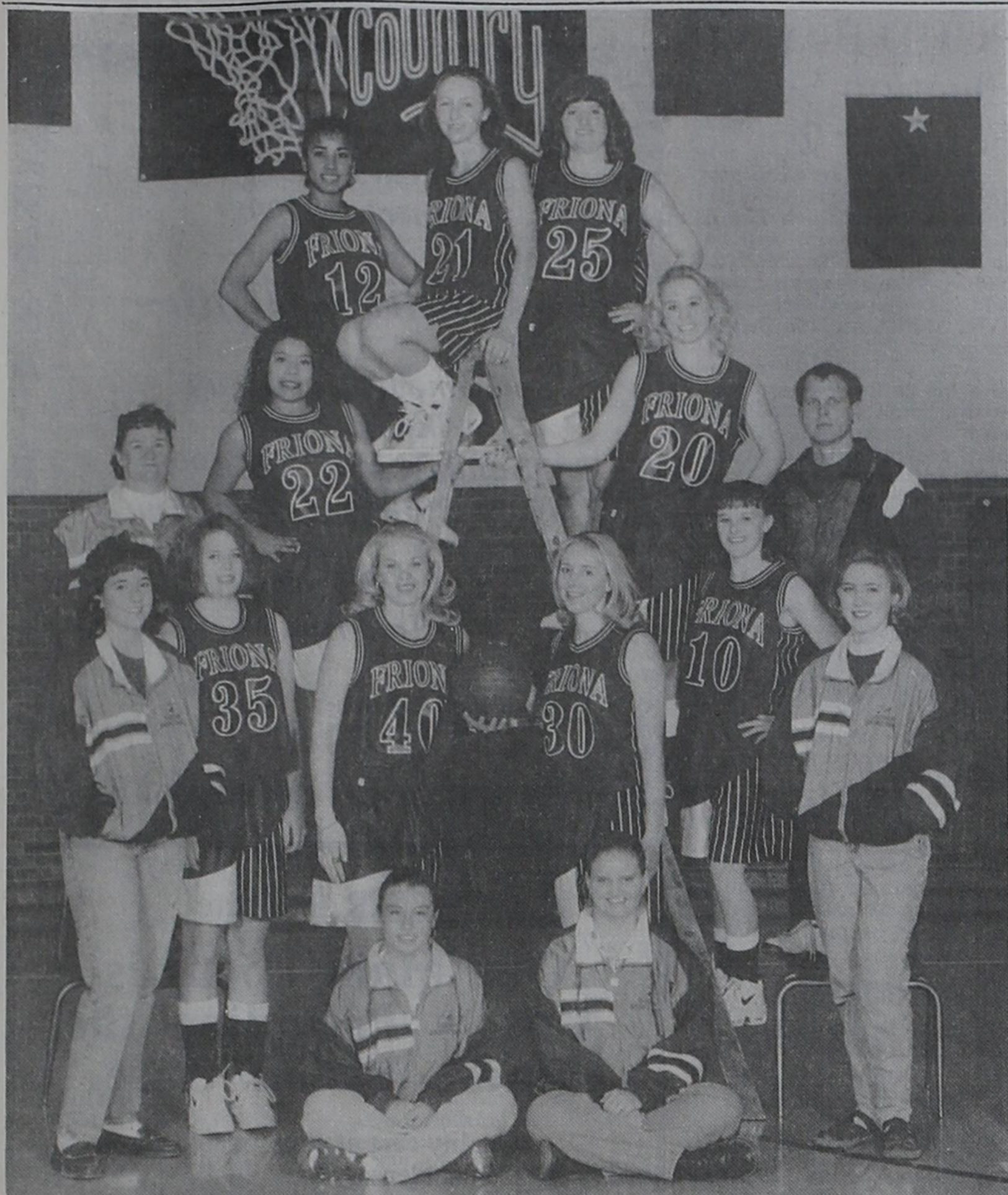
won the 1600-meter run in 5:37.

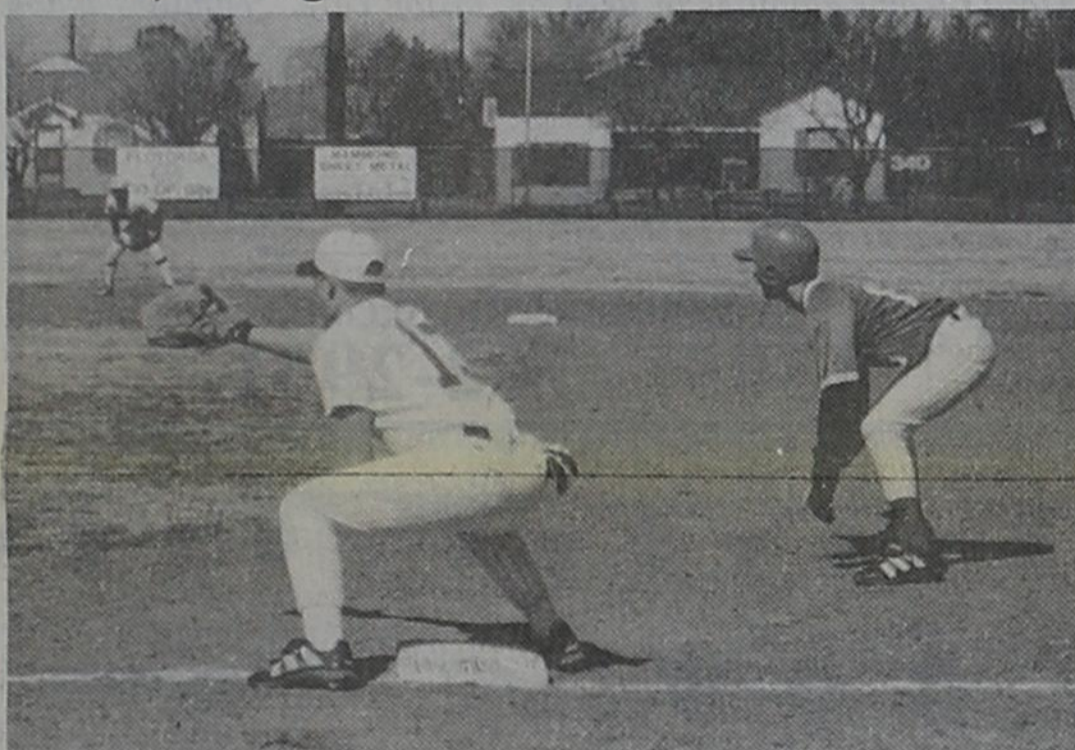

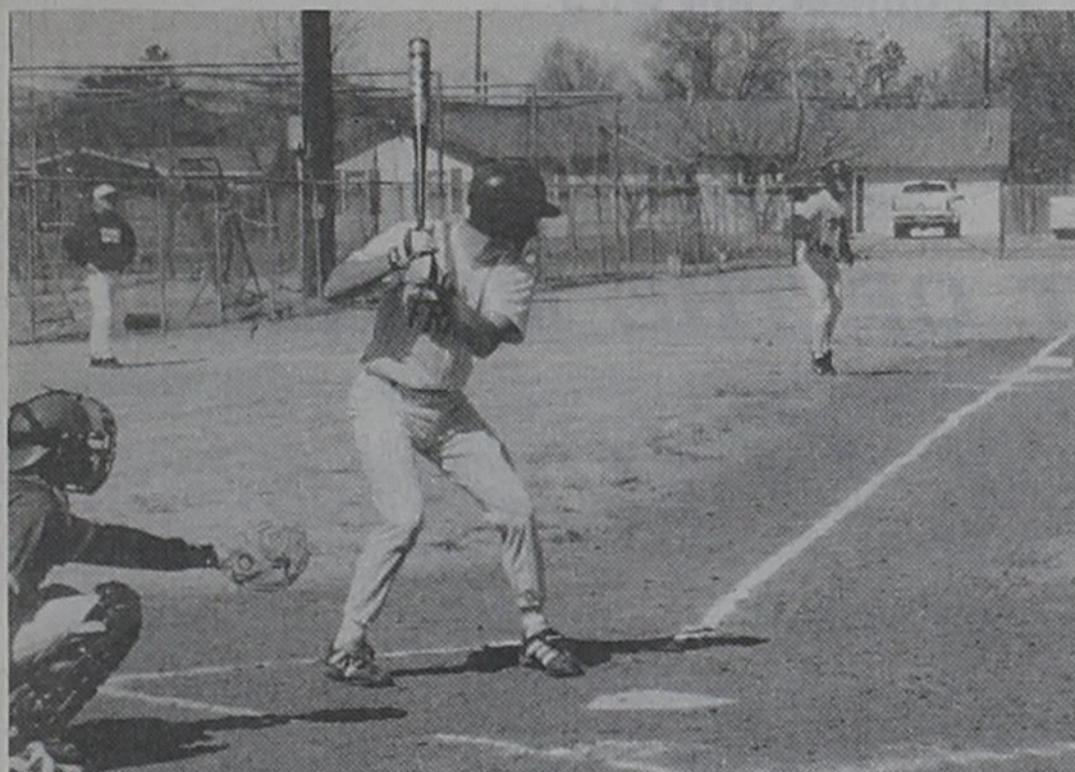
## Spencer Is First Team All-District

## Morgan Leal Wins Local Science Event

Friona fourth grader Morgan Leal won first place in a recent science essay competition at Friona Elementary. This is her essay about owl pellets:

This is Morgan and Brittney reporting from Friona Elementary School. We are in the fourth grade Science class, where the students are learning about the FOOD CHAIN. To go along with this lesson, they are doing a science project using OWL PELLETS. This report is going to tell about their work with the owl pellets.

Let me tell you what an owl pellet is. An owl hunts and eats during the night. Owls eat rodents, moles, shrews, weasels, and small birds. They are not able to digest the bones, fur, feathers and teeth. That is why they

have to regurgitate (vomit) every 20 hours. At first, the owl pellet is soft and squishy. That is when insects burrow and lay their eggs there. Hawks and eagles also form pellets.

When the students received their owl pellets, it was wrapped in foil. At first most kids thought it looked gross. In length, it was one and a half inches. It weighed a very light 3 ounces. It was oval shaped.

The pellet looks like a ball of mud. It felt like a big rock. The tools they used were tweezers and a metal pick. The students took the owl pellet apart very slowly and very carefully so they wouldn't break any of the bones. At the first sight of a bone, they just about went wild. Everyone found enough bones to form at least one

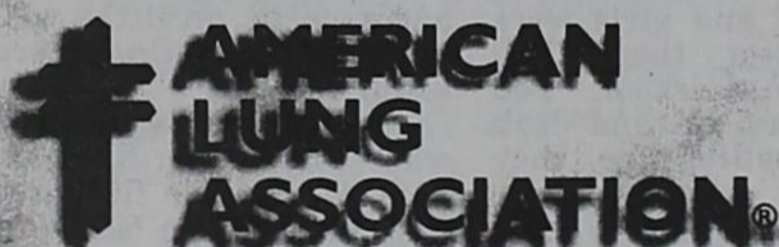
skeleton of a rodent.

This paragraph is mostly about how they put the skeleton back together. After the students took apart the owl pellet, they sorted the bones with a bone sorting chart. Then they got a picture of a rodent's skeleton. Then they put the skeleton back together.

The whole project took 5 days--3 to dissect and 2 to reconstruct. Some kids thought it was fun. Some children thought it was gross at times. Some students thought it was very interesting.

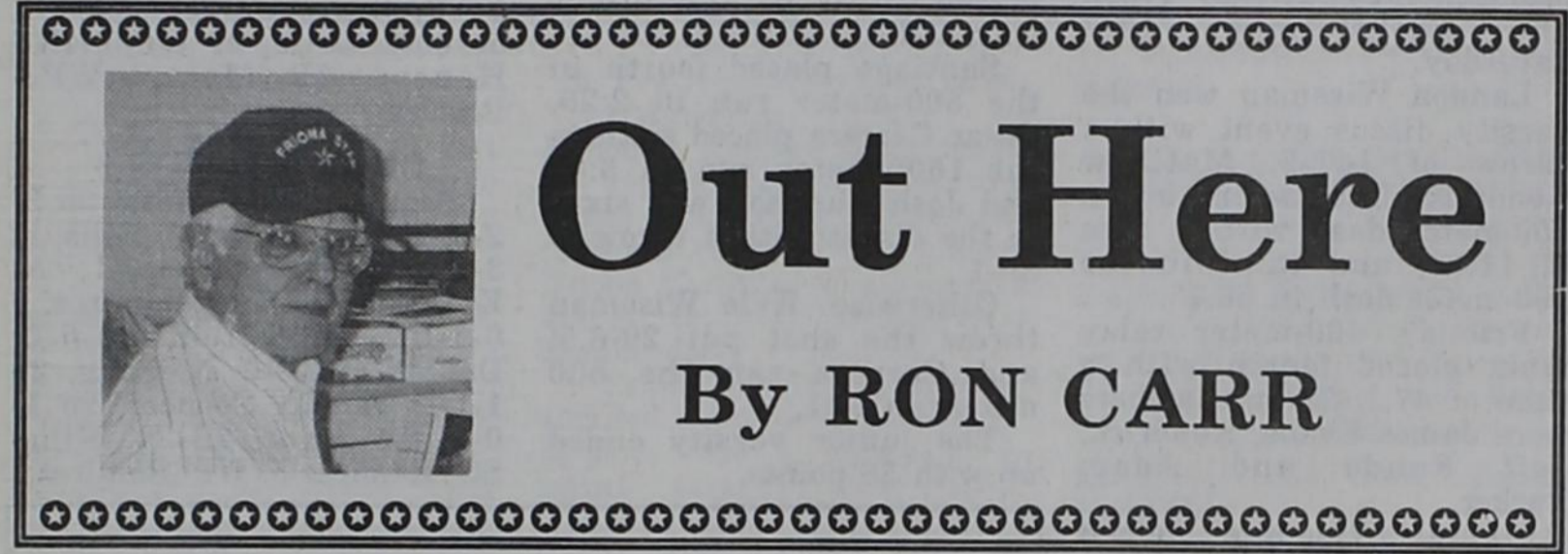

# Out Here

"I sure enjoy reading your column sometimes."

When a local lady said that to me last week, I wasn't sure if she meant she only reads my column sometimes or reads it every week and only enjoys it sometimes.

Either way there are some positive benefits in working for a weekly newspaper out here in the southwest corner of the Pothandle.

One positive is working with the kids of Parmer County. Next week is observed as Public Education Week here in Friona and Bovina, so I decided to stop bashing Billy Jeff and talk about a more important subject, Kids.

I believe that the future of planet earth lies with the children. To paraphrase, "train up a child in the way he should go and when he is old he will not depart from it."

Some say we are not doing a very good job "training up the children." Education in general has been taking a bashing from the White House to the state capital.

It bothers me (and quite a few teachers) to have standardized tests when we don't have standardized children.

I spend a lot of time at the schools in Bovina and Friona. I am often there during the day when classes are in session and at many of the extra-curricular events.

I usually have my camera handy, especially along the sidelines at football, basketball, and track meets. We take pictures of science projects, drama rehearsals, and kids doing kid things.

I owe thanks to the principals, teachers, and coaches for their courtesy and cooperation in letting me "hang around" taking pictures and gathering news.

I have been around the schools for three years now, so my face has become familiar to many of the students.

I get referred to as the "newspaper guy, Zach's daddy, Mr. Carr, and Ron", all of which gives me great satisfaction. Most of the kids like to have their pictures taken, especially the young ones. Sometimes the older ones grumble but they smile and are nice anyway.

Last week, we traveled to Canyon to cover the Chiefains vs. Dimmitt basketball game in the West Texas A&M gym, known as THE BOX.

It was crowded, it was noisy, and it was full of pressure and emotion. It was a game which makes hometown folks hurt for their kids. One more basket, a couple of free throws, that could have made the difference.

Many of the Friona fans who made the trip to THE BOX didn't even have kids playing basketball or any

other sport. They were just fans who went along to support the kids and watch an exciting ball game.

Now switch to the next day. The junior high auditorium about 2:30 p.m. A different kind of pressure, but pressure no less.

The Parmer County Spelling Bee drew a considerably smaller crowd than the game at THE BOX. The twelve or so young people seated in chairs across the stage, large cardboard with numbers around their necks, were finalists in the county bee.

One would go on to the regional bee in Amarillo. It was sudden death competition. Miss a word and out you go. The last one standing in this brutal contest would be declared the winner.

You could feel the nervous tension as each youngster approached the microphone to recite their name and school before the 50-75 people in the audience.

The boys and girls were dressed better than they normally are at school. You need to clean up and look nice at a spelling bee, they were told.

As you came to the microphone, Mrs. Teena Hughs read you a word. You repeat the word and spell it.

Each bee kid had the right to ask Mrs. Hughs to repeat the word, give a definition, and use the word in a sentence.

These, of course, were good ways to delay the inevitable if you didn't have a clue how to spell the word in the first place.

One youngster was given the word "avid." After a long pause, she missed it. She got the "av" part, paused, then added "ad." Take off the stringed cardboard number and have a seat.

I spell for a living, but some of the words threw even me. I discovered that if I stop and think about a word, the word becomes harder to spell.

One young man drew "hypothesize." For the rest of

his life, he will remember that it takes an "e", not an "i" to spell the word.

When I was in a school bee once, I missed "personnel" by putting two "l's" at the end. I've never forgotten.

Mrs. Hughs gave one contestant the word "phonetics." The youngster spelled it phonetically, "finitics." Have a seat please.

All the contestants would get their word, then a far away look, a cautious spelling, and an immediate look down at the judges for the verdict.

Some spelled with caution, others with outright confidence. Right or wrong, I'm spelling this word.

At the end, there were two contestants left standing. The winner is declared when one student misses a word and the other one spells it correct, then spells one additional word.

If they miss the second word, the other gets a chance, and so forth, until the winner has spelled a final correct word.

Left standing this day was Charlotte Rumph of Bovina. She is a fifth-grader. She was in the senior bee because she won the junior bee in Bovina.

Ironically, Charlotte finished third in the County junior bee, but won the senior version.

From the pressure of making a free throw at THE BOX, to spelling the final word to win a spelling bee, the fact is they are the kids who are the future of the planet.

They are individuals in their own right. Influenced by their parents, their teachers, and the rest of us.

Above all, they are not standardized. And they never should be.

## Viola Maciolek Submits Life Story

Every month a resident of Prairie Acres Nursing Home submits a story about his/her life's history to be submitted in the home's newsletter, "The Prairie Times" and for printing in this publication. This month we feature Viola Maciolek.

I was born May 13, 1907 to John and Ardelia Day in Hill County, Texas. I had a sister, Jewel, and a brother, Emmitt, older than me and a sister Sis (Verna) and two brothers, Alton and Carroll, younger than me. My dad farmed and my mother was a housewife. We lived at Prairie Valley, and went to school and church in the same building. We lived close by so we could walk to school and church. In the summer time we had church in a brush arbor. We had lots of singings back then.

Dad would take us out of school to help on the farm. I finally got behind in school and didn't finish which wasn't a big deal at the time.

All of my immediate family are deceased.

In 1926 I married Fred Bandy. We had three children, W.F. (Bill), Clara and Eugene. We share croppeds and also farmed on our own in several places around the Wellington and Clarendon areas. We milked cows, had pigs, raised chickens, guineas and turkeys and a garden. We grew cotton, maize, watermelons and vegetables.

The day Clara was born I pulled cotton all day pulling Bill on my cotton sack. I went in late that evening,

got the turkeys out of the trees and in the pen and she was born that night. The doctor was a little shocked that I had done that.

The year Eugene was two years old, we had to move to Amarillo when he took double pneumonia. He was in the hospital about sixty-five days and nearly died.

In 1946 we moved to Friona and ran a laundry for awhile. Later I washed dishes in the City Cafe ran by Casey Dunn.

All of my brothers lived in Friona with their families. I also had cousins and their families who lived here; Will, Sam and Caison Jones and their sister, Vivian Hughes, so we had several relatives here when we moved to Friona.

In 1949 I moved to Amarillo where I worked as a seamstress making drapes; a nurses aide at Northwest Texas hospital, a care taker for different ones in their homes; I also worked for Underwood's Bar-B-Que and did some catering for them. My last job was in a convalescent home in Amarillo. I worked there for several years until my retirement in 1980.

I married Wayne Maciolek in 1969. He was a truck driver for a van line and moved furniture and household goods all over the United States until he had to have a leg amputated. I went with him some when I wasn't working and if the trip wasn't too long.

Wayne was born and raised in Pennsylvania, we

went to visit his family there one time, he had twelve brothers and sisters.

Wayne died in 1992. My son Bill was in the service and spent time in the Philippines. He was discharged in 1947. He married Mary Phipps of Friona. They lived here until 1972 when they moved to Panhandle where he farmed. They have five children, Kathy, Janice, Jeannie, William and Alecia.

Kathy is married to James Adams and is a teacher in the Amarillo school system. They have two children, Jamie and Jennifer.

Janice is married to Rusty Henson and they live in Quitaque and she also teaches. They have two sons, Walt and Wes.

Jeannie is married to Tommy Allbritton, they live in Seymour and work in a cleaning business owned by his family. She has one daughter, Lauren.

William lives in Amarillo and works for a pharmaceutical company and does lots of traveling.

Alecia lives in Amarillo and works for an insurance company.

My daughter Clara is married to Norman Daniel and lives north of Canyon. He runs a car lot in Amarillo and she helps him some and is a housewife. She had five children.

Steven lives in Amarillo and works at J.C. Penney's. Paul works in Savannah, Georgia for a television station. He has one daughter, Linda.

Arnold and his wife live in Ponca City, Oklahoma where he works for Conoco. They have two sons, Nathan and Zan.

Edwin and his wife Tammy live in Amarillo where he runs a used car lot. They are expecting their first child.

Eileen and her husband Bee Pullian live in Austin where she works for the Texas Water Commission.

Clara's oldest daughter died in 1967 of a cerebral hemorrhage at the age of 19.

My son Eugene is married to the former Patsy Reed. He spent two years in the service from 1952 thru 1954. He was stationed in El Paso, Texas and Thule, Greenland.

Eugene and Patsy live on a farm southeast of Friona where they farmed for many years and he has just recently retired. They have four boys, Johnny, Clay, Todd and Chad.

Johnny and his wife, Carla, live in Plano and he coaches football and teaches at Richardson Lake Highlands. They have a son Brandon and a daughter Kari. Their daughter Jamie died in 1985 at the age of 7 1/2 weeks of Sudden Infant Death Syndrome.

Clay and his wife Tamela live on a farm southeast of Friona where he farms. They have three children, Joseph, Valerie and Adam.

Todd and his wife, Lori, live in Howe, Texas where he coaches and teaches school. They have two children, Chelsea and Levi.

Chad is a resident of Lubbock State school. My life has been full with my brothers and sisters, my children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

I moved to Prairie Acres in December of 1995. I would like to thank all of the help here and all the residents who are nice and kind to me. This is a good home.

**Older Texans May Serve In Group**

Texans sixty years of age and older have an opportunity to become a representative from this region to the Texas Silver-Haired Legislature (TSHL) beginning March 1, 1998. These legislators work with the Texas Legislature on senior issues which may become law. If you are a person sixty or older and a registered voter, you may file as a candidate for election in the TSHL now through March 31, 1998. Terms are two years. TSHL members pay their own expenses. Even those who don't choose to run are encouraged to vote in the elections. Elections for your TSHL representative will be held May 26, 1998. **Sharp Gives Money For Law Training**

State Comptroller John Sharp delivered more than \$6 million in supplemental training funds to 2,147 local law enforcement agencies across the state. "More than 53,877 Texas peace officers now have additional funds for ongoing law enforcement training. The good news is the state's smaller law enforcement agencies--many of them hard-pressed for training funds--share in this allocation," Sharp said. Law enforcement agencies across the state are required to meet standards set by the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Officer Standards and Education (TCLEOSE). Amounts received by Parmer County law enforcement were: Friona Police, \$1,180.66; PC Sheriff's office, \$1,532.59; Bovina Police, \$740.16; and Farwell Police, \$652.10.

**Deadline On Forfeited State Land**

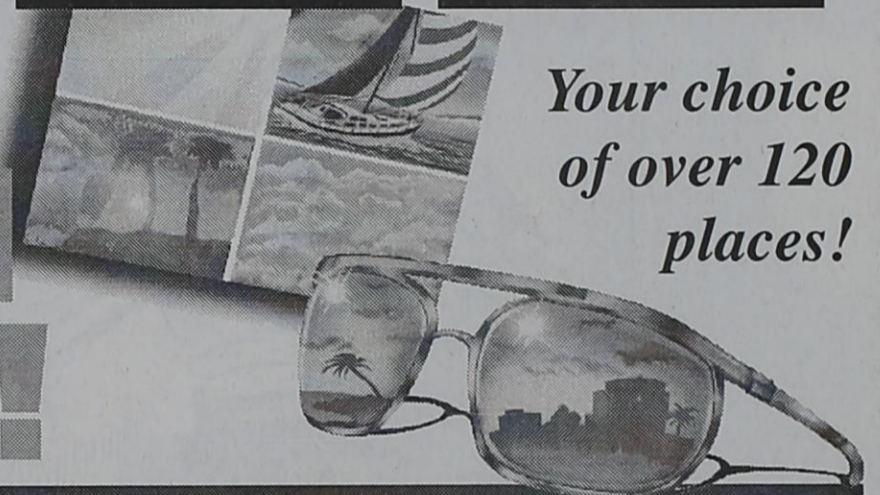

### Eye Care For Diabetics
