ORIGIN OF THE DOLLAR SIGN.

Carliest Known Use of It was in 1797. Florian Cajori, professor of matnematics at Colorado college, says that trying the various cases. the earliest known occurrence of the \$ in print is in an American arithmetic, Chauncey Lee's "American Accountant." published in 1797 at Lansingburgh.

This fact was pointed out in 1899. A recent writer again calls attention to this arithmetic, says Professor Cajori, and then, with sweet simplicity of mind, conveys the idea that this publication constitutes the true original of the dollar mark. By this mental short cut he saved himself the drudgery of a research which has extended over several years.

After 1800 the symbol began to be used freely, both in print and in writing. On September 29, 1802, William A. Washington wrote a leter on the disposal of part of the bottom land above the Potomac, belonging to George Washington. Publicity would finally eatch the tax dodger The man, firm or big trust that renders property for taxation at a value of \$10,000, then turns around and makes a statement to Bradstreet or Dun's rating agencies that the applicant for a credit rating owns property worth \$250,000, should have the light turned on him so that the public can see the tax dodger in his true light. The publication of tax renditions would afford protection to the honest man and would compel the dishonest man to render for taxation all of his property. The cost of publishing the property renditions as shown on the tax asessor's books would be a mere trifle, while the valuations in the counties would be increased millions of dollars. The effect would be to lower the rate fifty per cent on the people who make an honest rendition of their property. 
