> NEW SHEEP DIPPING ORDER PUT IN FORCE.

All sheep in Texas and New Mexico and in the counties of Apache and Navajo, in Arizona, are quarantined by the federal government. This means that they must be dipped at least once before being shipped out of the state, and twice if found to be

The federal government, through the bureau of animal industry, has been cooperating with the state governments in the three states, for the eradication of scabs, but has not been satisfied with the work done by the state in question. Hence this new or-

Locally this is of little effect, as but charts and maps of the interior of few sheep are raised near here. Very few sheep are imported from Mexico. The duty on lambs is 75 cents a head and on sheep over one year old it is \$1.50 a head while they must also be dipped, entailing a still greater expense. This makes the importation of sheep from Mexico almost prohibitive.-El Paso Herald.
