Chiefs vs Muleshoe For District's Inside Track

It's always been a good rivalry—even a friendly rivalry. But this year's Friona-Muleshoe game has the most riding on it than any of their games in recent memory; maybe even in distant memory.

The Chiefs and Mules clash at 7:30 Friday at Muleshoe's Benny Douglass Stadium. From all we are hearing, a good percentage of the population of both towns will be on hand for the kickoff, come wind, rain or whatever.

The two teams and their fans have been pointing toward this game as the potential "biggie" all season long. Friona will be risking their 7-0 season record and 3-0 district mark against the

Mules, who come in at 6-1 and also 3-0.

Muleshoe's only loss was to Dimmitt, 28-21 in pre-district play. The Mules had some of their players on the bench serving a suspension, which no doubt figured into the game's outcome.

"They are big and quick, and they play great defense. Their defensive front is huge," said Chieftain coach Mike Scott. Coach Scott singled out tackle Matt Turney as Muleshoe's top defensive player. Turney is 6-4 and weighs 270 pounds. He may remind Friona fans of ex-Chieftain Quint Ellis, except a bit heavier.

Scott was also high in praise of Muleshoe

quarterback Matt McClanahan, a third-year starter who is 5-11, 170. "He is the guy who makes them go. He makes the big plays. He never gets sacks—he moves fast and gets rid of the ball," Scott commented.

McClanahan passed for 661 yards and five TDs a year ago, and is back at it with 656 yards this year, having completed 42 of 80, including six TDs. He has been intercepted five times.

Scott also singled out Muleshoe tight end/defensive end Dustin Cleavenger, who is "only" 6-6 and weighs 210.

Muleshoe's top rusher had been Gilbert Vela, who suffered a broken hand in the Mules' win over Littlefield and has not returned as yet. But Scott said that Vela's replacement took up where he had left off, and you couldn't tell much difference. Vela had rushed for 683 yards in less than six full games.

In the statistical rankings, Friona leads the Mules, averaging 391 yards per game to 323 for Muleshoe. The Chieftains have given up just 120 yards per outing to 172 for the Mules. These defensive statistics will be

sorely tested at Muleshoe.

Muleshoe is the "most experienced" team Friona has faced this season, having 14 of 22 lettermen back from their '97 team, which includes starters WB/CB Carlton Lewis, S B.J. Gonzales; QB McClanahan; TB Vela; FB Greg Pena; C Ismael Nunez; NG Joey Mata; OT Jonas Alfaro, OT Turney; SE Manuel Compolla and DE Cleavenger.

Muleshoe is the oldest opponent on Friona's schedule in point of time, being first met in 1926. After being an "off and on" rivalry through the 1960s (they didn't play at all from 1942 through 1957), this year's game is the 29th consecutive season the schools have met on the gridiron.

Friona holds an edge in the all-time series with 25 wins to 21 losses and a tie. If the Mules need any more incentive, which they probably don't, they also can point to the fact that the Chieftains have beaten their Bailey County neighbors 13 of the last 14 games between the two schools.

Ky Graham Near Perfect In Week 8 Football Contest

After several weeks of difficult contests, games thrown out, and awkward tie-breakers, week 8 proved to be a piece of cake.

Most games went as predicted. Well, almost. Lazbuddie sneaked by Silverton, Sanford-Fritch (a potential Friona playoff opponent) beat Dimmitt, and the New Orleans Saints upset Tampa Bay.

So the week 8 scores were higher than normal. Point total leader Mitch Smiley scored 14 in this week's contest, so he didn't increase the lead too far out of reach.

Ky Graham of Friona came out of nowhere and picked 17 out of 18 games correct in week 8. He only missed on Tampa Bay-New Orleans. It is the first time this year that a contestant has picked as many as 17 correct. Previous high was 16. Ky won the \$20 top prize.

To prove how easy it was, 7 players picked 16 out of 18. Since Dallas had a bye week, the tie-breaker used was Oilers 20, Bears 23.

Grabbing the \$10 2nd place money was Scott Brown, a regular player from Muleshoe. Scott's tie-breaker was Oilers 17, Bears 15, and 11 points off.

Last year's total point winner Mark Zachary of Abilene slipped into 3rd place and gets \$5 with his 13

points off tie-breaker of Oilers 20, Bears 10.

Other 16 game contestants and their points off were Josh Burleson (14), Jerry Gossett (16), Tyson Neill (16), Lana Bracken (17), Danny Guerra, Sr., (17).

Eleven of you managed 15 correct and even more were in at the 14 correct level.

Mitch Smiley maintained his overall lead with 110 points. A standings list is published elsewhere in the paper.

Tonight, the Chieftains take on the also unbeaten (in district) Muleshoe Mules. Muleshoe is infected with football fever and well they should be.

However, Chieftains Rule. Chiefs 34, Mules 13. Go Big Red. Good luck and good pickin' y'all.

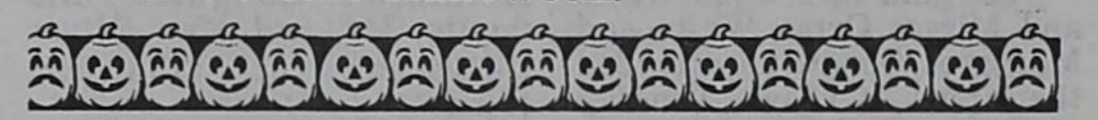
Parmer Co. Retired Teachers Meet

Voters Ready To Cast Ballots Tues.

With a vital governor's and lieutenant governor's race heading the ballot, a big percentage of Texas voters are expected to come out on Tuesday, November 3 to make their wishes known.

A good turnout is also expected in Parmer County, where early voting ended Friday.

Governor George W. Bush is opposed by Democrat Gary Mauro who is giving up his Texas Land Office post to make the race.

Although polls show the governor with a big lead, Gov. Bush stated in Amarillo this week that "The only poll that counts is the one that will be taken on Tuesday. I urge everyone to go to the polls and make their wishes known."

The lieutenant governor's race, on the other hand, may be one not decided until every vote is counted.

John Sharp, the state's Comptroller, and Rick Perry, state Agriculture Commissioner, have been waging a bitter rivalry. Both are popular office holders, and the only sure thing about this race is that the state will lose (at least temporarily) a good public servant.

On a more local level, state representative Pete Laney is opposed by Hollis Cain. Laney, who is also Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives, is favored for re-election.

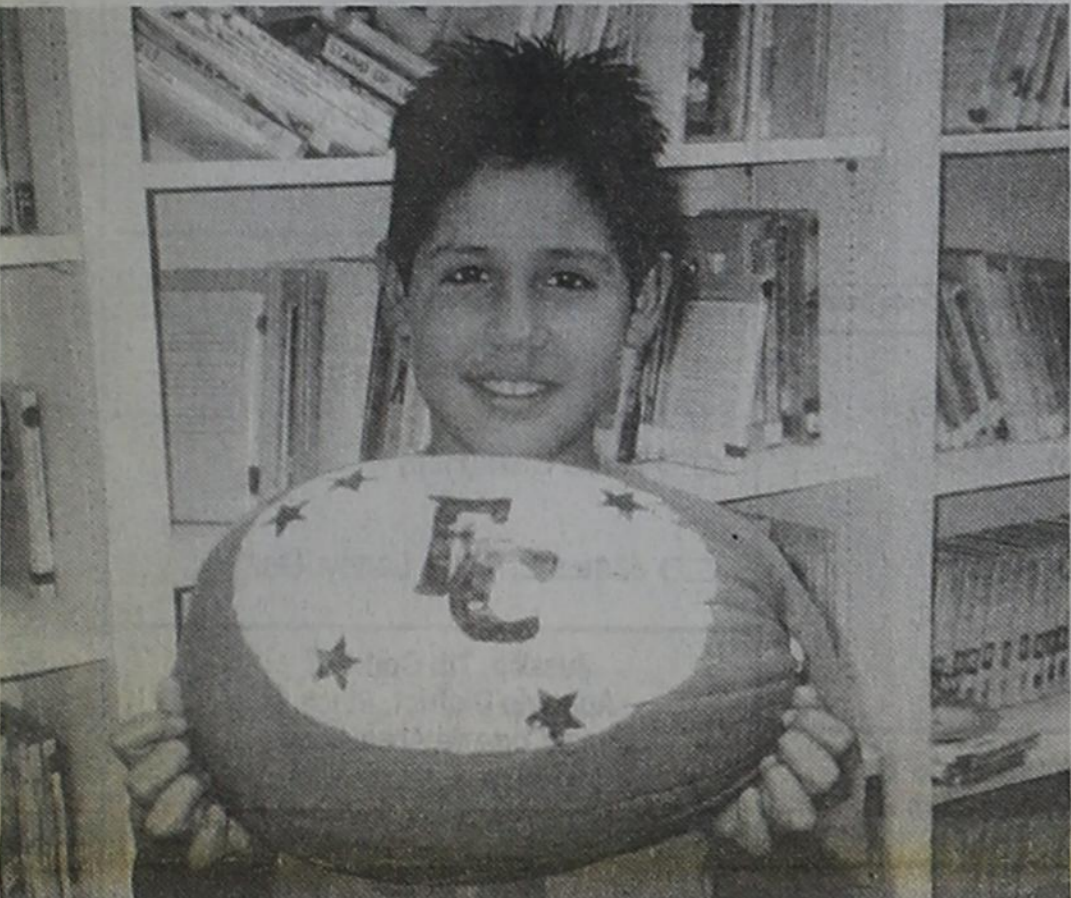

ROLL UP THE GARDEN HOSE, park the bicycles in the garage, hide all the lawn furniture, lock the dog in the bathroom, and stock up on snacks and goodies, because the little spooks and goblins will be roaming the town on Saturday night searching for that annual sugar-high known as Halloween.

Halloween is not my favorite celebration. I think I'd like it better if they'd change the name to "Fun and Frolic with Friends" night. As a harvest celebration and a time for youngsters to dress up in funny costumes, play silly pranks, and have a party, Halloween is great. But it has sort of evolved into something that seems to bring out the sinister side of some people.

I guess we actually enjoy the fantasy of trying to scare others and ourselves, because it makes the warmth and safety of our own everyday lives seem all the more secure by comparison. Those of you in my generation may recall hayrides and ghost stories around the campfire. Remember those old "It Floats" stories? What fun! But today, because there are a few sickos out there, we now have to warn our children not to go trick-or-treating at homes of people they don't know.

It all started with the ancient Celtic people of Gaul and Briton, who held a festival twice each year at the changing of the seasons; one on May Day and another one on the eve of All Saints Day, October 31st. This date marked the end of summer when the sun retreated, and darkness cooled the earth. May Day was a time to celebrate birth and renewal. So October must have seemed a fitting time to honor the deceased of the community. It became known as All Hallows' Eve, and over the years was changed to Halloween.

It stems from the word 'hallowed' which means sacred. You are familiar with the words of the Lord's Prayer which say "Our Father, who art in Heaven; Hallowed be thy name." During those early celebrations, I believe the Celts were simply honoring the sacred spirits of their dead, much as we do today on Memorial Day.

Of course the Celts and Druids were pretty superstitious people. If there were good spirits, then there must be bad spirits, too. They believed that any sort of light would offer protection against any evil spirits that might be out there, and so grew the customs of building bonfires, carrying torches, lanterns and candles.

The earliest lanterns were actually large turnips with holes carved out so the light of the candles could shine through and serve as a sort of early-day flashlight to show the footpath from one house to another. In the darkness, the lighted holes in a turnip looked a little like a scary face floating in the air, and so evolved the jack-o-lantern. Today we carve funny faces in pumpkins, which is a carry-over tradition from those old ancient harvest celebrations, when their lighted turnips would frighten off the "ghouls and ghosties and things that go bump in the night."

I used to get a kick out of dressing up and scaring the daylight out of the kids who came to the door on Halloween for trick-or-treat candy. I would stand very still in the doorway. Then just as the kids got about up to the front porch, trying to figure out if there was a dummy or a real person standing there, I'd jump out at them and go into my cackling witch routine. Some of them got so scared they turned around and left without ever stopping to get their treats. Now that I look back on it, that seems sorta mean. Guess I've mellowed. I don't enjoy scaring little kids anymore.

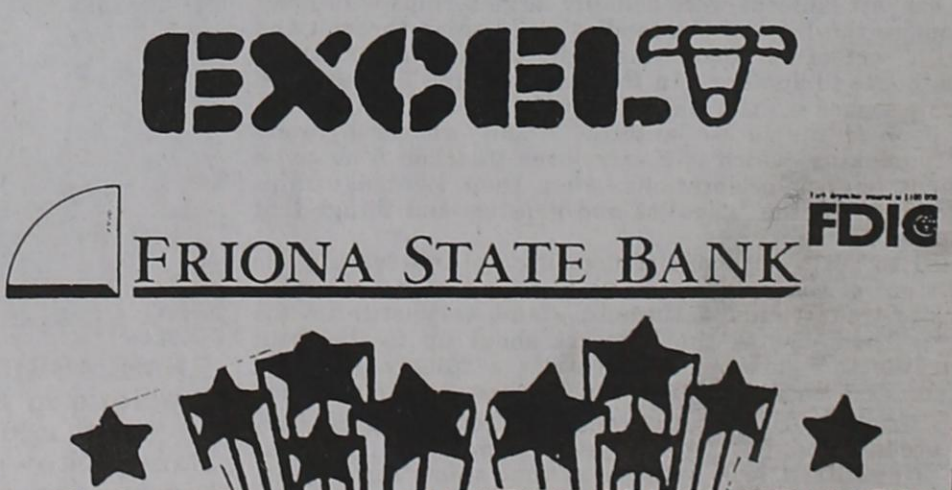

Chieftains Make Pirates Walk The Plank, 40-13

Cooper's Pirates had been described by Coach Mike Scott as a dangerous opponent, and for the first half last Friday, Cooper proved that the coach knew exactly what he was talking about.

For only the second time this season the Chieftains found themselves trailing at halftime, and were forced to do a come-from-behind act. They got on the "right page" in the second half, outscoring their opponents 33-0 enroute to the 40-13 win.

The win kept Friona unbeaten in district at 3-0, and for the season, 8-0, and was an important win.

But for the first 20 minutes of clock time, it looked as though the Pirates might take over the "S. S. Chieftain," as everything was going Cooper's way.

Friona took the opening kickoff, and on the fifth play from scrimmage, appeared to have grabbed an early lead when QB Justin Daniel hit Matthew Kendrick over the middle and Kendrick ran all the way into the Cooper end zone, only to have most of the play called back by a holding penalty.

Kendrick came back for a 10-yard run and Daniel hit Noel Grajeda on a 17-yard gain to the Cooper 13. But a fumble on the next play turned the ball over to Cooper inside their 10-yard line.

The Chiefs drove to the Pirate 25 on their next possession but lost the ball after a pair of QB sacks.

On Friona's third possession, the team determinedly drove 56 yards for a score. Kendrick had runs of eight, 10, 21, nine and two, the final two being for his team's first touchdown. Trent Cook's kick gave Friona a 7-0 lead with 7:04 left before halftime.

Gabriel Velasquez fielded Tony Duran's kick at about his 25 yard line, and it looked like Friona had the 130-pound mighty-mite two or three times, but he kept wiggling free and bouncing off tackles until he ran the kickoff all the way for a touchdown. The PAT kick tied the score.

After working so hard for the lead, Friona had enjoyed it for only 16 seconds of clock time.

If that wasn't bad enough, Friona faced a fourth and long from their own 18 a few minutes later. A low snap to the punter caused a blocked kick, which Cooper fell upon in the end zone, to take a 13-7 lead. The Chiefs blocked Cooper's PAT try, and that turned out to be the halftime score.

Friona wasted no time "righting their ship" in the second half. A Pirate runner lost the ball on a big hit on the half's first play, and Landon Martin claimed it for Friona at the Cooper 20.

Friona faced a big third and 17 at the Pirate 23, when Daniel made a shovel pass forward to teammate Sergio Campos, who motored into the end zone for Friona's

second touchdown. Cook's kick gave Friona the lead at 14-13, only 2:10 into the third quarter.

Duran's "squib" kick was never fielded by the Cooper receiving team, and James Evans recovered for the Chieftains at their opponents' 20-yard line. The PAT kick hit the right upright and bounced back, but Friona had taken a 20-14 lead. The quarter was still only 2:36 old.

Friona forced a punt on Cooper's next possession, the Chiefs taking over. A holding penalty against the Chiefs was offset two plays later when the Pirates roughed Cook while punting.

Two plays later, Daniel rolled out to the right, then

spotted teammate Landon Martin wide open at about the Cooper 15, and lofted a perfect pass that Martin caught in stride and legged it across the goal-line for a 46-yard scoring play. Cook's perfect kick made it a 27-13 Friona lead.

The Chieftains had scored 20 points in 9:09 of clock time.

Early in the fourth quarter the Pirates made their only serious drive of the second half, aided by a Friona penalty. But on a big fourth down play from their own 38 yard line, Friona stopped the threat with a good defensive stand.

The Chiefs then went on an "insurance" drive of their own. Kendrick gained ten and eight as the team crossed midfield. Grajeda added a ten-yard burst, and the two runningbacks swapped out, Grajeda getting a 12-yarder to the Cooper 12. Two plays later Kendrick went across standing up, and Friona had a 33-13 lead with 7:14 showing.

Three plays later, the Chieftains scored their second defensive TD in as many games when Duran made a leaping interception at the Cooper 27, and raced across the goal-line for a score. Daniel tried his luck at kicking the point, and it was just right, for the final margin of 40-13.

Daniel had an excellent night passing, completing six of seven for 156 yards, including three touchdowns.

Except for the holding penalty on Kendrick's catch/run, it would have been seven of eight for 221 yards and four TDs.

Kendrick passed the 1,000-yard rushing mark with his 109 yards. He has 1,018 overall.

Chiefs Continue To Hold Area Stat Lead

The Chieftains continue to be ranked at the top of both the team offense and defense for South Plains area class AAA teams, as tabulated by the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal.

Friona leads the offensive column by 65 yards over second place Dimmitt, and the defensive list by 52 yards over Muleshoe.

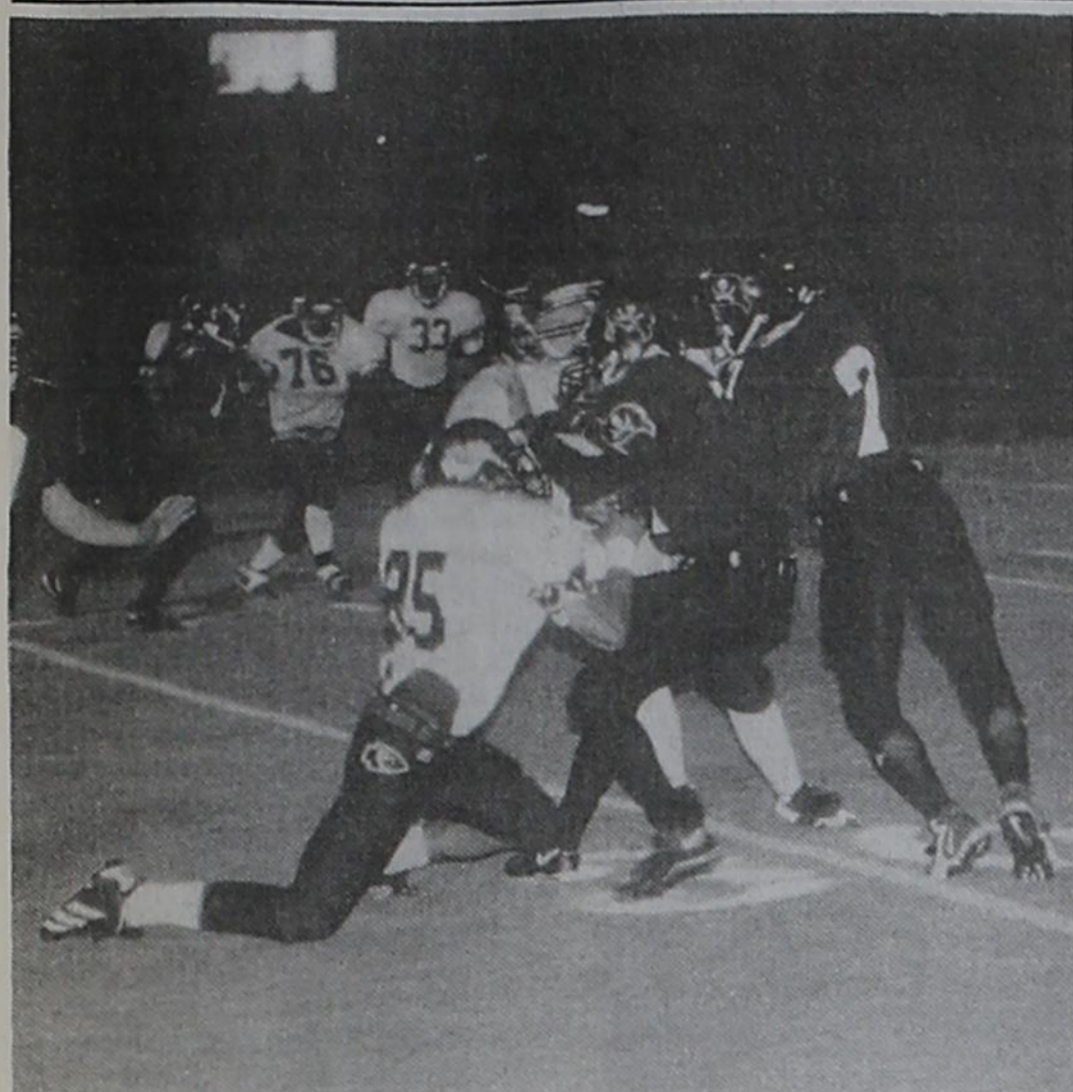

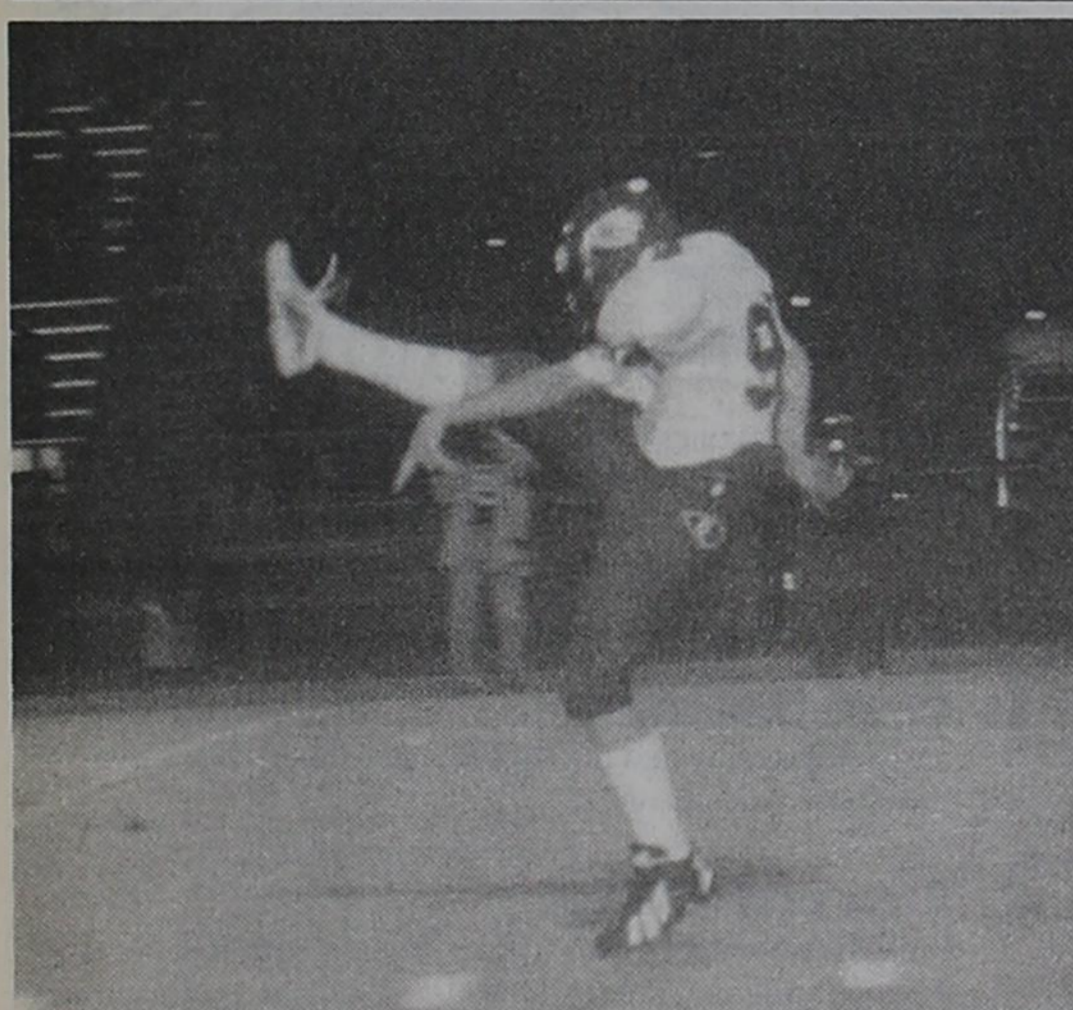

Coach Scott's Quotes:

"The kids did a great job of 'hanging in' until they got their game going. They showed a lot of character, staying with it like they did. We had a great second half. I was real pleased with the team's efforts."

**Friona-Muleshoe Rivalry:
One Of Oldest For FHS**

The Friona-Muleshoe series is the oldest in point of time of any rivalry on Friona's current schedule.

The two teams first met in 1926 at Muleshoe, with the Chieftains scoring an 8-0 win (don't ask how Friona scored eight--the two-point conversion was 50 year in the future).

In fact, Friona won the first three games between the schools before Muleshoe won five out of six, including three of the four games played during the 1930s.

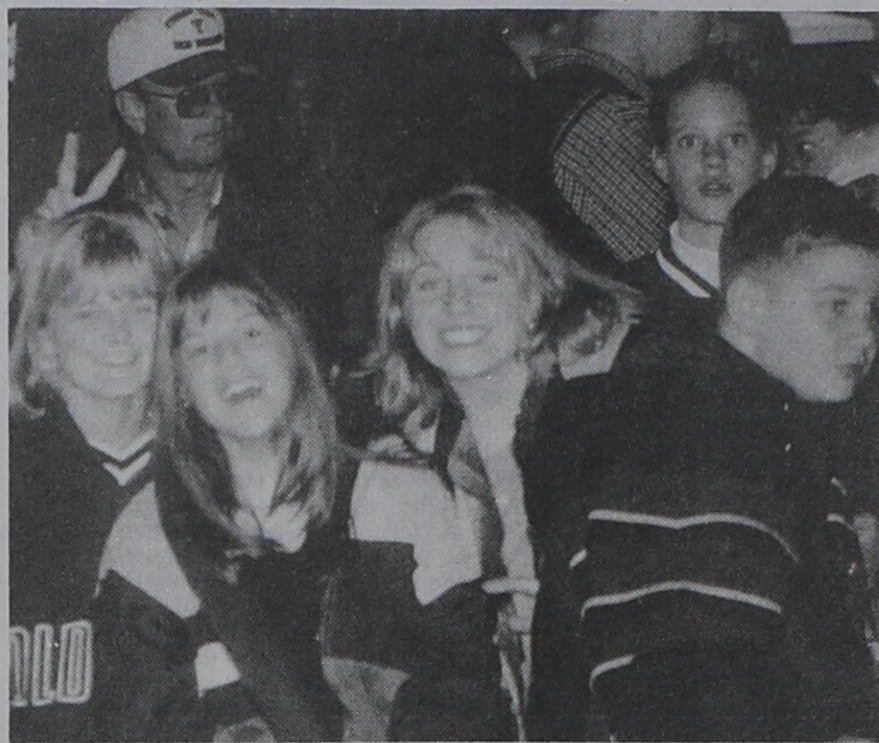
After their 1941 game, the two schools did not meet on the gridiron again until 1958. Muleshoe was usually in a higher classification than Friona.

Then, after almost two decades of playing "most years" as pre-district opponents, the two schools became district mates for the first time in 1976, and this week's game makes the 23rd consecutive time it has been a district game for the teams--although none more vital for both schools as this week's.

Muleshoe held a 20-12-1 lead in the series before Friona unreeled eight straight wins, 1984-91, and went into Friday's action having won 13 of the past 14 games. That gave

Friona an edge of 25-21-1, the 1958 game being a scoreless tie.

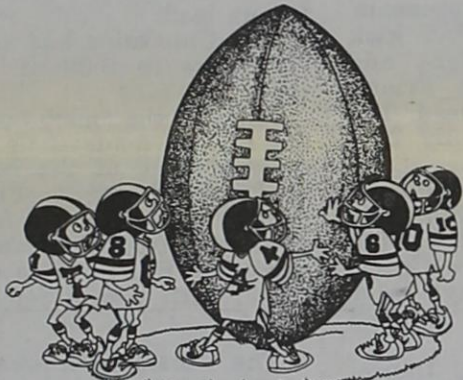

I'm Not Superstitious: Our Get Back Get Away Coach Is Back!

It is the time of year to get serious about superstition and witchcraft.

I'm not talking about Halloween witches. I'm talking about Friday night high school football superstitions.

Fans, coaches, and players are dusting off their favorite lucky charms and pre-game routines as the season winds down. Especially those with playoff hopes or rivalry games.

Last Friday night Bill Ellis, Mike Hutson, Clint Mears and I car-pooled down to the Lubbock Cooper-Friona game. I'm glad they knew where we were going.

The city limit sign just off the Tahoka highway said we were entering Woodrow, Texas. The Pirate football field was about the only thing there.

The Fighting Chieftains were 7-0 and four sports experts were predicting some pretty serious hurt for Cooper on the way down. I hauled my camera bag and folding chair out to the field, like I always do.

There were familiar surroundings. The stands were full of Chief fans, the team managers were going about their customary pre-game duties. My photographer colleague Don Spring arrived. All was in order. I thought, as we waited for the kickoff.

I paid scant attention as I noticed Coach Bob Ferguson, on crutches, heading along the stands and up to the small wooden building that was the visitors pressbox.

In a freak incident the night before at Friona's JV game, Coach Ferguson was hit in the calf with a roll of tape thrown from the stands. The blow bruised some blood vessels and put him on crutches.

I distinctly remember getting an uneasy feeling. Something did not seem quite right, but I chalked it off to pre-game jitters.

Bill Ellis took a seat up in the box with our coaches who would be hooked up by satellite to the coaches on the field. During the national anthem and coin toss, my mind wandered, trying to figure out why the uneasy feeling persisted.

The Chiefs took the field and played like a bunch of boys being forced to take piano lessons. The fire and teamwork that had earned them a perfect season was evidently back home in the locker room.

In the first half, Friona touched the ball over 30 times and Cooper ran about 12 plays. Penalties, sloppy play, and lack of concentration followed the Chiefs to the locker room at the half, behind by 13-7. It was only the second time this year that the Chiefs had trailed in a game.

Something was definitely missing for these boys this night. It was too quiet on the sidelines. But not up in the pressbox.

Coach Bob Ferguson didn't like what he was seeing on the field. They say he was pretty rough on the pressbox walls a few times. Usually he has lots of room to roam on the field. The 8 X 10 foot pressbox was taking a pounding.

The other coaches suggested that since he was not sitting down anyway and since the players could not hear him, he might be more at home back down on the field for the second half.

As the second half kickoff was in the air, I realized what had caused that uneasy, gnawing feeling I had before the game.

The familiar sound of "get away, get away and get

people to describe Coach Ferguson as a teacher and coach, the one word used most often was "intense." On the sidelines he is the most mobil of this year's coaching staff that averages at least 50 miles of pacing per game.

He can also get a point across to a player. I think it is called chewing their butt. But more often than not, his comment to a player coming off the field is, "good job son, good job"

Joe Bob Ferguson was a 5A all-district defensive end at Plainview high school, where he graduated in 1980. One of his coaches there was Kevin Wiseman, now the Friona Junior High principal.

Wiseman says that Ferguson was a "yes sir, no sir" type of student who always showed up on time and gave it his all. "Yes" he said, "he was intense in high school too."

Ferguson graduated from WT in Canyon in 1988 and went to Dumas as junior high basketball and track coach.

He tried the business world for a while, as a real estate broker and financial planner. But, declaring that the business world was not for him, he became a teacher and returned to coaching.

He and wife Diedre moved to Friona in 1992 with son Alex, now 7. They are expecting the second little

Ferguson around November 10. (That is a Tuesday. He ought to be able to make the Friday night playoff game.)

Ferguson is the only remaining member of the James Morton varsity coaching staff. He has been around these boys since they were in the 6th & 7th grades. They like him.

He has been a benefit to the relatively young coaching staff that is new to Friona this year. Coach Barnes is an especially "spirited" defensive coordinator who Coach Ferguson pulls off the field by his shirttail on occasion.

Tonight we play Muleshoe. Both of us are 3-0 in district. The Mules have their best team in years, after a string of losing seasons.

They don't like Friona. I heard they were bringing in extra bleachers for the expected crowds. I'm not superstitious but I will wear my lucky clothes tonight. And I'm not getting a haircut before the game.

To show Muleshoe just how we feel about superstition, Chieftains quarterback Justin "Bird" Daniel wears number 13.

But there is more bad news for Mules fans. Our get back get away coach Bob Ferguson will be on the sidelines. Zap. Take that.

Friona 34, Muleshoe 13. Go Big Red!

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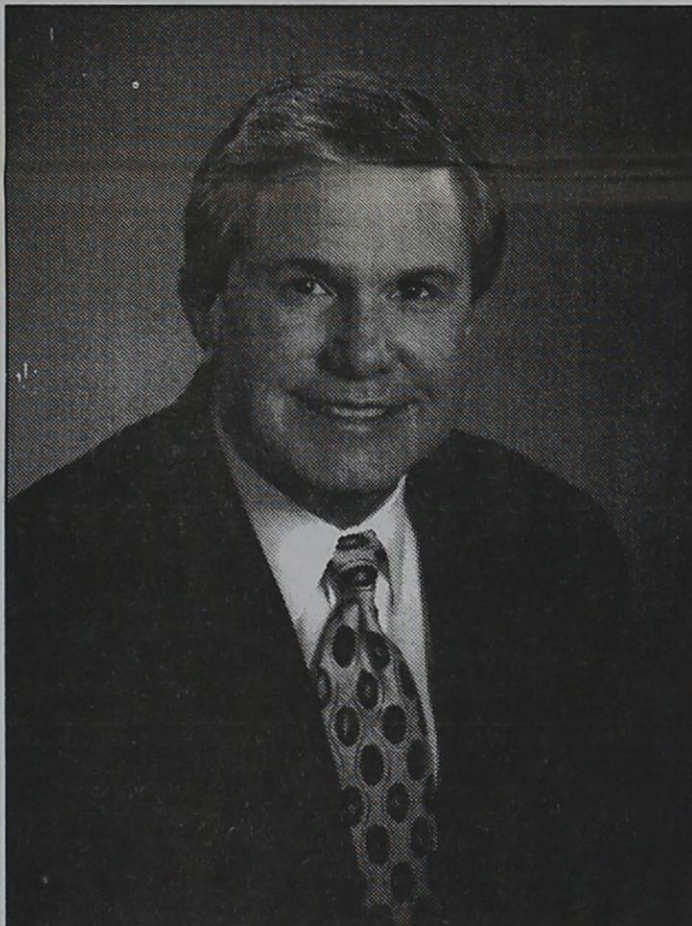

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COTTON NEWS
 FROM PLAINS COTTON GROWERS, INC.

Help is on the way after Congress and the White House approval of legislation containing \$5.975 billion in much needed disaster assistance for farmers and ranchers. Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. (PCG) was among the first to call attention to the serious effects of the 1998 drought and is now actively involved in formulating a plan to distribute approximately \$1.5 billion in direct disaster assistance to affected growers. Over \$3 billion is being made in the form of supplemental Ag Market Transition Act (AMTA) payments. All that must be determined by the Secretary of Agriculture is when to make the supplemental AMTA payments available. The flip-side of the coin is the administration of the 1998 disaster assistance funds. Agricultural industry and USDA officials are working diligently to formulate a plan which accomplishes the wishes of Congress and distributes the money to those who lost all or part of their crops as the result of the 1998 weather conditions.

Currently two options for delivery of disaster assistance have surfaced. The first is through the crop insurance program and the USDA Risk Management Agency with no requirement that crop insurance have been purchased to qualify. The second is through the USDA Farm Agency via more traditional program guidelines. Both proposals have pluses and minuses attached and PCG will be looking closely to make sure the final delivery vehicle is the one which maximizes timelines and provides the maximum support to cotton producers who suffered the most. Work on the delivery method is moving ahead and PCG is concentrating on helping develop the best, fairest system possible. Additional information will be made available as soon it is finished. Helping the needy is the goal of a food drive being conducted through the USDA Agricultural Market Service's Cotton Division and the South Plains Food Bank. The drive will run through November 16 and arrangements have been made to get non-perishable food donations collected by area cotton gins. Cash donations are also welcome and can be sent directly to the South Plains Food Bank at the following address: South Plains Food Bank, 4612 Locust Avenue, Lubbock, Texas 79404. The donations will be collected by drivers for Lubbock Classing Office sample hauler Jerry Meers and delivered to the South Plains Food Bank. Gin managers are encouraged to put up a collection point in their office and let the drivers know when they need to pick up donated items. Cotton producers across the High Plains are being encouraged to participate and donate non-perishable food items. The effort is being sponsored by the Lubbock Cotton Classing office, the South Plains Food Bank and area cotton gins. The donations will help support the Food bank through the holiday season and beyond.

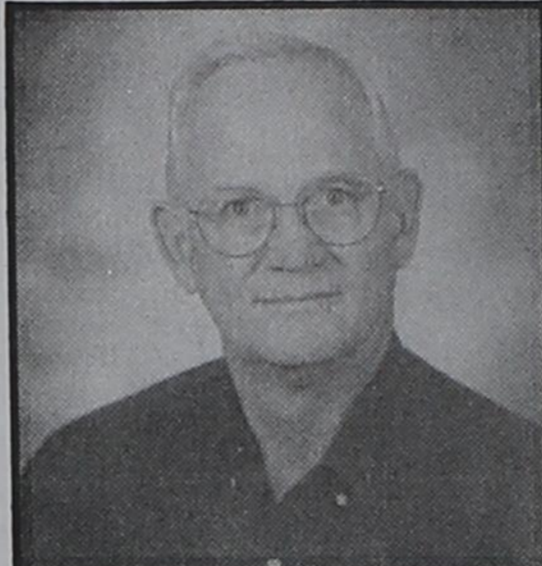
FSA Accepts Disaster Loan Applications

Parmer County was declared eligible for Farm Service Agency (FSA) disaster emergency loans on July 2, 1998. Generally, that means that farmers who have lost at least 30 per cent of their production due to extreme fire hazards, conditions that occurred from June 29, 1998 and continuing, are eligible for FSA loans. Proceeds from crop insurance are taken into account when determining eligibility. FSA Ag Credit Manager Thomas S. Taylor is urging farmers who are interested in receiving an emergency loan to get their applications into FSA as soon as possible. Taylor said, "We hope farmers will get their applications in early rather than waiting until near the deadline which is March 2, 1999. The longer they wait, the more chance there is for long delays. If the applications come in early, we can avoid backlogs and speed up the process." The FSA office is located at 109 Third Street, Farwell, Texas, phone (806) 481-3349.

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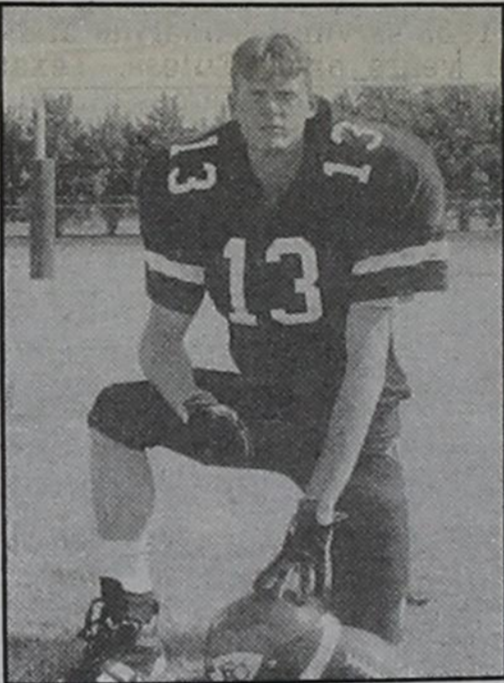

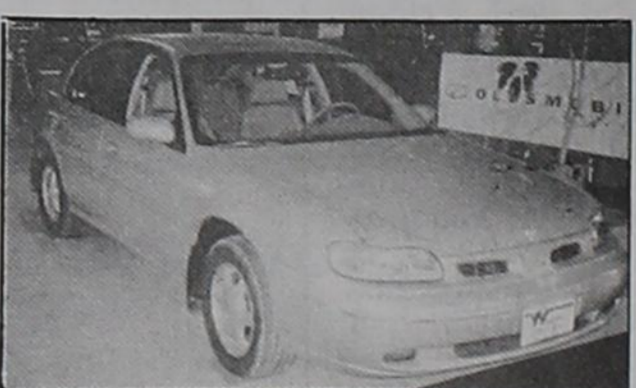

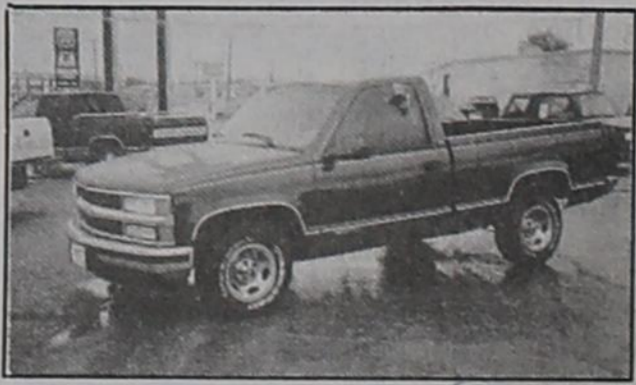

The old Congregational Church on 6th Street has a lot of new windows, thanks to the generosity of many local citizens.

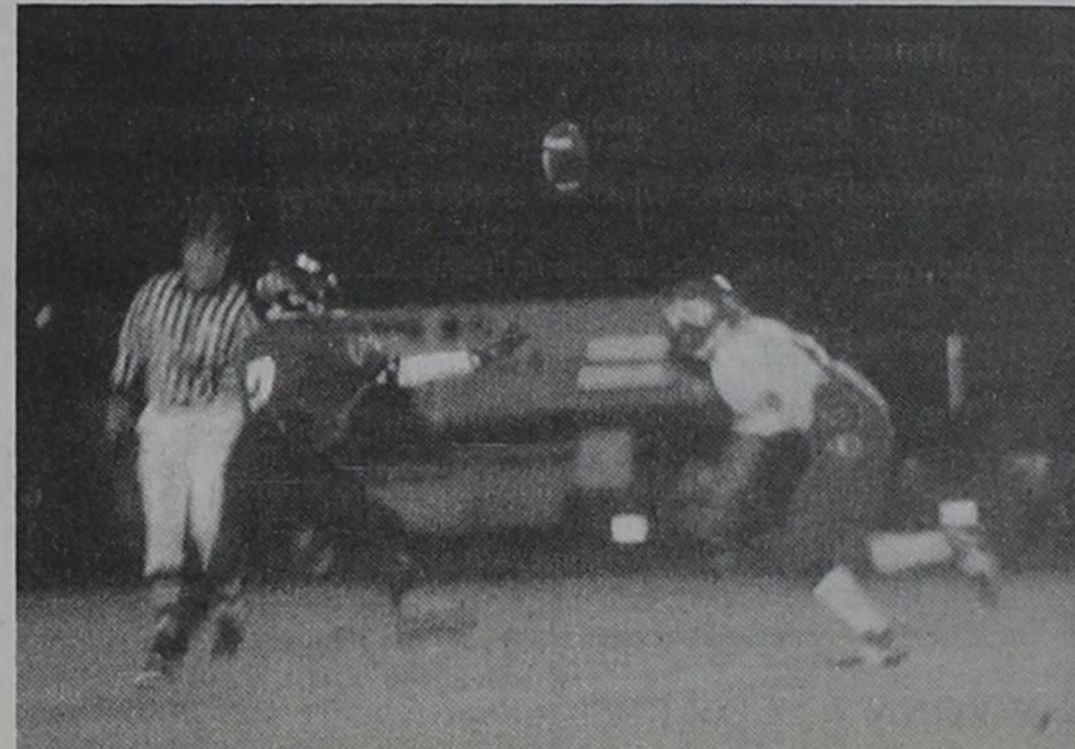

Letter To The Editor



Dear Bill & Carol:

The Amarillo Daily News ran a story on October 15 about the theatre at Canadian, Texas, being renovated and up-dated at a cost of \$700,000, and being re-opened to show movies again.

The story said the theatre has shown movies since 1909 as the Palace Theatre, had its name changed to the "Queen" in 1916, showed its first "talkie" movie in September, 1929, was destroyed by fire in 1931, rebuilt and reopened again as the "Palace" in 1932, and has been showing movies ever since.

Their opening show after the present remodeling was "Armageddon," starring Bruce Willis, on Friday, October 16. All tickets were free for the opening night show. The theatre seats 289 customers in "push-back" seats of 1940s vintage. All of the fixtures, lights, fountain, etc., are authentic '40s and '50s models.

Rob Talley is the theatre manager. Salem and Ruth Ann Abraham own the building which they purchased from Talley and leased back to him.

Why should I care about any of this? From about September of 1928 through January, 1929 I was privileged to see "silent" black and white (gritty) western movies each Saturday afternoon in this theatre. I saw my first movie in this theatre, and saw my first live stage show there.

The live stage show was

"Buster Brown & His Dog Tige," which was selling Buster Brown shoes. Buster was a comic of sorts, as well as an acrobat, doing tricks along with Tige, turning flips, pratt falls, hand-stands, etc., and whatever Buster did, Tige could do also.

The cowboys in those movies wore tall, pointed hats and everyone including the horses moved in jerks. You figured out the story by what you saw happen and who the bad guys were by who got shot. Yes, the villain actually tied the fair maiden down onto the railroad tracks while the engine was blowing smoke just yards away. Scaaaaary!

I attended school in Canadian with some of the Abraham kids of my age, and spent all of my spare pennies for licorice sticks at the first Mr. Abraham's store (the first Mr. Abraham to be in Canadian).

My family, which included me and my brother Ross, moved to a farm near Canadian from Wheeler, Texas, a distance of 25 miles, by covered wagon pulled by mules. Took the entire day to make the 25 miles. Another first (and last) move via covered wagon.

The mostest and bestest part of this story is that it happened to me more than 70 years ago, and the theatre and myself are both still in operating condition, except I don't have any '40 or '50s model parts.

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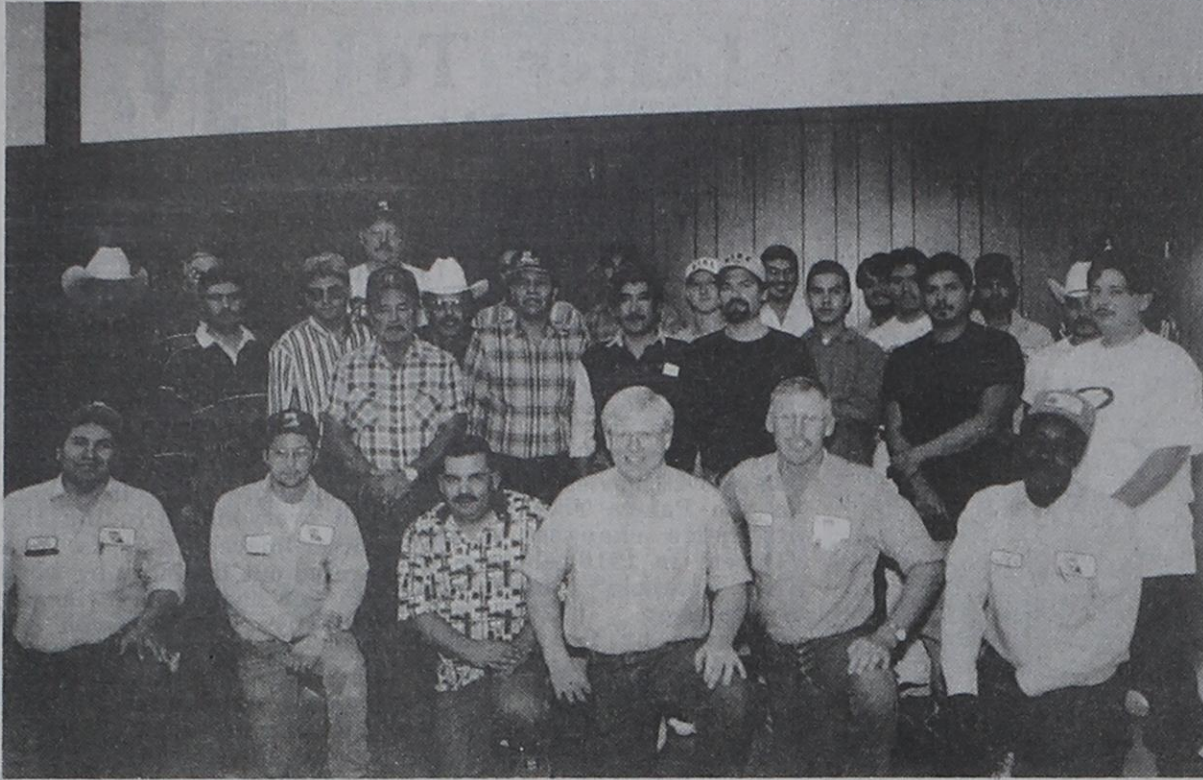

YOUR EYES

The Kid In The Eye Patch



Remember when Sally Brown, Charlie Brown's little sister in the Peanuts comic strip, wore an eye patch? She had amblyopia, or "lazy eye."

Amblyopia is a fairly common eye disorder in young children. One eye sees sharply and the other doesn't. Without treatment, the brain learns to depend on the good eye and ignores what the less capable or lazy eye sees. Eventually, the child loses effective vision in that eye.

The eye patch forces the child to use the eye with poorer vision. Eyeglasses may be prescribed, too. Started early enough, professional treatment often can restore binocular vision.

Ideally, a child's vision should be tested by the age of three in order to spot and correct any visual defects before the child comes up against the visual demands of school.

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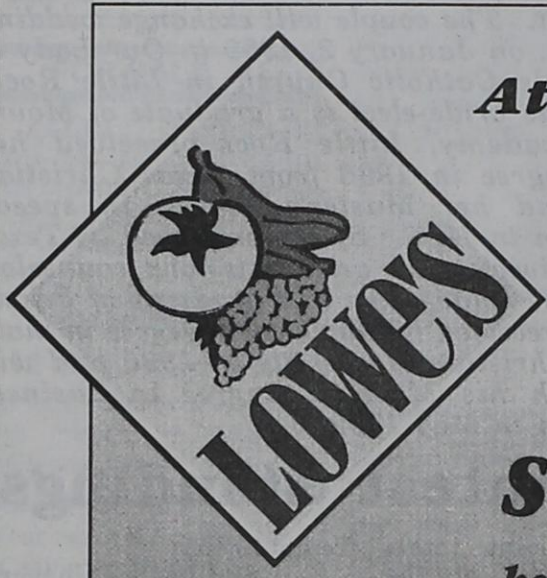
