Representatives of Pecos and Toyah Chambers of Commerce in session here voted to ask legislature to pass law permitting formation of all of Reeves County, excepting the Balmorhea Distriet, into one road district and thus legalize the proposed district bond issue that would allow acceptance of state aid to build Bankhead Highway and connecting roads through Reeves County.

(signed) Chamber of Commerce The foregoing was the telegram dispatched after the meeting of representatives of the Toyah and Pecos Chambers of Commerce in the Pecos Chamber rooms Tuesday night.

Without a dissenting vote those present (and among them were some of the men paying the largest taxes in the county) voted to take whatever steps were necessary to hold a special election on a bond issue.

Judge W. H. Hunter, who has been connected with the First National bank here, is to leave the latter part of this week for Austin where he will visit the Highway Commission and seek a promise of as much financial aid as the state will give the county in forwarding their road building. County Judge J. F. Ross was also appointed as a member of the delegation but due to illness may not be able to make the trip.

If the State Highway Commission is able to submit a definite proposition, and if their figures have been as favorable as in the past, definite plans for the route and the kind of road to be built will be determined.

No definite action on the bond issue can be taken until after the next legislataure meets, as it was found late yesterday that the outstanding road district bond issue will make it necessary to secure a special act of the legislature to legalize the consolidation of the road districts. This legislation will be asked at the January session of the legislature.

An uninterrupted good road on the Bankhead Highway from Texarkana to El Paso is the ambition of the present highway commission, and it is the belief that this commission will give Reeves county whatever aid is absolutely necessary to have the highway completed across this county. Bond issues have been voted in every county in West Texas traversed by this highway or some other means have been taken to complete the road with the exception of Reeves county. Ward and Culberson counties have received special aid from the state because of their sparsley settled condition.

It is not the wish of the Toyah or Pecos backers of the road plan to construct only the Bankhead Highway. They plan to connect the other sections of the county to the highway and permit easy access to and from both towns.

Two other state aid highways are to be built by adjoining counties. Jeff Davis county plans a bond issue to build towards Balmorhea, while Pecos county is planning to construct a good road on the route of the Old Spanish Trail running from Fort Stockton to the county line in the direction of Saragosa. At Saragosa this road, if continued in Reeves county would connect with the Balmorhea road.

One plan presented for Reeves county, is for the construction of the Bankhead Highway across the county, and then for the building of the twenty miles from the end of the present gravel road south through Pecos towards Saragosa, where it will touch the Balmorhea irrigation district, and the construction of a road east from Saragosa to meet the improved Fort Stockton road. The Balmorhea district has \$34,000 in bonds to spend on roads, while their present bonded condition prevents them from issuing more for years to come. It is proposed to ask this district to connect Saragosa, Balmorhea and aid can be given them.

For the pasttwo decades probably no man in Texas nor the South has followed the iel-Baker College. These are live cotton market more closely than Mr. wires and will have something good Peteet, and he declares that the farmers are today faced by the most trying situation and threatened with the greatest loss in the history of the cotton industry in the Lone Star State.

"I have no patience with appeals to the business men to come to the rescue of the farmers by financing an orderly marketing of his crops," continues Mr. Peteet, "it is the business man's fair share of the job of feeding and clothing the world, himself included."

James Z. George, vice-president and general manger of the Texas Chamber of Commerce, has addressed a referendum upon the cotton situation to all members of the State Chamber, all chamber of commerce, and all banks of the state, asking for concerted action and requesting sug-

With regard to the situation and the necessity of every citizen of Texas and the South becoming interested, Mr. Peteet says: "Cotton hasbeen selling in primary markets in-Texas recently, at 20 cents and less, which is 15 cents a pound, or \$75.00 a bale below the most conservative: estimate of the cost of production that has come to my attention. Estimating the unsold portion of the crop at 60 per cent, this means that Texas farmers alone will pay \$135. 000,000 for the privilege of giving to the world this year's crop.

"If we take as the basis of our calculation the bulk line cost of production' by which is meant the priceat which 80 per cent of the growers can continue to produce cotton at a profit, and which a competent authority places at 40 cents, this year's Texas crop at present prices, will fall \$180,000,000 short of returning to the growers the actual cost of production plus a reasonable profit.

"When to this direct loss to farmers is added the losses that will accrue to all lines of business by reason of decreased debt-paying and purchasing power of farmers, the total grows to staggering proportions.

"The financing and marketing of the cotton crop in such manner asto avoid these losses is not the task of farmers alone, but of all interests before the company officials expect that handle and consume agricultural products, for unless farmers can sell? their crops at a profit they will soon quit raising crops and dealers will have nothing to handle and consumers nothing to consume.

"I have no patience with appeals: to business men to come to the rescue of the farmer by financing an crderly marketing of his crops. On september 28 last, in his speech at Wheeling, Senator Harding said: "We did not go to war to make the world safe for democracy, or for humanity. 





Kingsville, Texas, Oct. 15 .- Rocke- American Red Cross Announces Budget of \$48,200,000 For Current Year.

NEW DISASTER RELIEF PLAN

Deemed Necessary to Protect United States \$21,000,000 Loss Than Last Year.

A program of relief and service toward which appropriations of \$48,-200,000 have been made has been outlined for the American Red Cross for the fiscal year, July 1, 1920, to July 1, 1921, according to official announce ment by national headquarters of the organization at Washington. The figures for 1920-21 are \$21,000,000 below. those of 1919-20, in which \$69,400,000

Important among the items of the budget for the present year is the appropriation of \$81,500,000 for relief in fereign lands, which includes \$11,000,-000 in purchased supplies en hand and not distributed.

This will enable the American Red Cress to continue its humanitarian effort to aid stricken peoples to re-estabdemics which threaten many countries and to efface largely the remaining traces of the blight left by the World War. Millions for Work at Home, When the disease was sweeping Central Europe last winter the American Red Cross, with the aid of the governments of afflicted nations, undertook the fight against it. Hospitals were established wherever possible and food and clothing were distributed to the undernourished populations, who by reason of their undernourishment were easy prey to the epidemics. Where disorganization contributed last year to the great inroads made by the disease, by virtue of its knowledge of the disease and the presence of well established hospital centers, the American Red Cross this year will undertake

the work with a new confidence. Including the total of \$11,000,000 in supplies left from the last fiscal year, the \$31,500,000 is \$21,000,000 less than the expenditures for 1919-20.

Appropriations for domestic activities total \$16,700,000.

The largest item of this "home" budget is \$7,800,000 for civilian relief work. This includes service and assistance for families of soldiers, sailors and marines, and work incidental to disaster. Of the total appropriation for civilian relief, \$5,000,000 is held in reserve for the carrying out of actual disaster relief.

Reduced Overhead Expense. The Red Cross invariably is the first thought of a community visited by calamity. With this in mind, it was determined by the Executive Committee in preparing the budget of 1919-20 to have a fixed reserve fund from which

For assistance to seldiers, sailors and marines in hespitals and in campa this year \$1,900,000 has been set aside. Four million two hundred thousand dollars has been appropriated for improvement of health and prevention of disease throughout the United States during the current twelve months. The Red Cross is co-operating fully with the United States Health Service in this work and through its Junior Red Cross is doing much to spread among children the principles of sanitation. An appropriation of \$1,-000,000 has been made for developing the peace time program of the Red Cross by service to its chapters in all

The appropriation of \$48,200,000 is exclusive of the local expenditures of the 3,000 or more chapters.

Administration expenses this year will be \$1,800,000. Last year they were \$2,300,000.

(By Annie Webb Blanton, State Superintendent of Public Instruction.) NEED OF MANY WORKERS.

It is when we try to inform the people of Texas as to the merits of any measure that we realize that Texas is not really a state—It is an empire. Compare the Lone Star State, with its 252 counties, with its neighbor, Oklahoma, which has 77 counties, or with tiny Delaware, which has three. It soon becomes obvious that to give adequate publicity to even the most meritorious measure, an army of workers is

When we remember, further, that the general attitude in Texas has been to vote against constitutional amendments, we realize that, the patriotic citizens of Texas must go out into the highways and byways to arouse the necessary enthusiasm for the educational amendment to make it the notable exception to the rule its friends all predict it will

NATURE OF THE AMENDMENT.

Texas now has a district tax limit of fifty cents on the hundred dollars of property valuation. Only two states, Texas and Virginia, have so low a limit. Half of the states of the Union have no limit on the tax that districts may vote for school purposes. The unjust side of this tax limit is that while large cities are exempt from this provision, the village school and the country school are shackled by its terms. The proposed amendment to article 3 of section VII of the constitution will grant the same privilege to all schools-It will permit the country school district as well as the city to vote fer its schools such support as it deems necessary.

THE AMENDMENT DOES NOT RAISE TAXES.

The proposed amendment does not raise taxes, nor does it permit any school board to increase taxes. It simply leaves each district free to continue its present support to its schools, or to increase this support, if it chooses. Before any tax can be increased, the rate must be decided by a vote of the taxpayers of the district. This amendment is, therefore, a measure of local self-government.

ATTITUDE OF THE POLITICAL PARTIES.

The state democratic convention of 1920, at its recent meeting in Fort Worth, endorsed the passage of this amendment as a part of the platform of the democratic party. The republican candidate for governor, in a recent address, stated that he would prefer that the people of Texas should fail to vote for him than to fail to vote for this amendment. At this writing, other parties have not expressed their atti-

A MISTAKEN IMPRESSION.

A few persons have expressed the opinion that, since their districts receive from the state more than they pay to the state, it would be best to vote against the amendment, and let the state support their schools. The mistake in this is (1) that the state can not and will not continue to support those who do not help themselves and (2) that such an attitude is condemned by most of the right-minded patriotic citizens of the state. The four million dollar appropriation was made by the legislature to tide over the emergency until the amendment can pass. The legislature will have no convenient surplus next year, to appropriate; for the tax rate has been lowered. Moreover, many members of the legislature have declared that, if the people vote down this amendment in November, they will make no more appropriations to the schools from the general revenue. Some of them have asserted that they will even vote to discontinue the two-milliondollar appropriation for rural schools. If the amendment fails to pass, the schools will have no recourse. Two thousand of them closed their doors last year. Our teachers will flock to other states, where a living wage is offered. Many have already gone. STATE SUPPORT THE SAME FOR CITY AND COUNTRY SCHOOLS.

The politician frequently harps on the difference in support of country and city schools. This difference lies in local support. The state gives the same per capita for the country and the city child. It favors the country child, in that it makes a special appropriation of two million dollars for rural schools. While Texas stands tenth in state support of schools, it ranks as forty-fourth in local support. Shall

OUR RANK IN EDUCATION. The Russel Sage Foundation in its recent investigation of all the states of the Union ranks Texas as thirty ninth in education. Shall a state that is first in size, first in agricultural products, third in production of oil, and seventh in wealth be satisfied to remain thirty-ninth

DANGER TO DEMOCRACY.

Texas is about ten per cent illiterate. Twenty-five per cent of our children do not advance beyond the fourth grade. The average is the sixth grade. That means that, in future, we shall have a sixth-grade citizenship. The only safeguard of the democratic institutions founded by our forefathers, the best protection against bolshevism, the wisest economy for the state, is education. Give the country boy and girl a fair chance! Work and vote for the Better Schools Amendment on November 2nd.

The company has erected an office, store and warehouse building at Orla, 35 miles north of here on the Santa Fe Railroad, and several other buildings, and are gathering machinery in the warehouse for their plant, which it is proposed to erect about 17 miles west of Orla. Several carloads of the machinery have already arrived.

These deposits are reported to be located in the portheastern part of Culberson county with three exceptions, which are in Reeves county about 20 miles northwest of Pecos. Regarding the depth of these depos its the report says:

"Just how deep the deposits extend is at present impossible to say, The deepest working in the district extends down about 33 feet. There is good sulphur at the bottom of this deepest excavation, and it probably continues for some distance further
