





THE REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATION

Requirements for graduation from the Pecos High School is the completion of eighteen units of work. The required subjects are three units in English, Mathematics three, two in Science. Sixteen standard units must be offered. A standard unit is in-Washington, D. C., the silver cup terpreted as being the regular or solid courses or affiliated units. The standard units for the year 1921-22 are: English four, Mathematics four, History four, Science three or four, Latin two, three or four, Spanish two or three, Home Economics, Economics. In addition to the sixteen standard units two other standard units or two light units may be offered. A light unit is understood to be subjects in which there is no affiliation or has been considered a subjet for affiliation by the State department of education only recently. The light subjects are: Typewriting hand one, bookkeeping, one-half to one, music one-fourth to one, Sunday school work, one-fourth to one, commercial law, one-half, military training one-fourth, spelling one-fourth, home hygiene and inter-scholastic

The twelve required units above mentioned must be English one and two and either three or four, Mathematics one, two and three, Spanish one and two, in Latin one and two History any two and Science any two. The basis for the required sub-

jects is college entrance. The units which the High School holds at the present time are: English 4. History 4, Latin 3, Mathematics 41/2, Chemistry 1, Physics 1, General Science 1, Economics 1/2, and Home Economics 1/2.

All students will be required to take Algebra 2, unless a written request is presented from the parent stating that he desires the pupil to be excused from second year Algebra, inasmuch as the pupil does not expect to enter college. This algebra course is not required for graduation and is optional if the student does not expect to go to college but it is required for college entrance and this regulation is intended to avoid possible misunderstanding and disappointment

COLLEGE ENTRANCE AND GRADUATION

From The Whirlwind. Every student entering college must solve the problem of entrance

into the school of his choice. A word From The Whirlwind. perhaps here would not be out of place. The students graduating this year or who will graduate next year should take care to choose his course in such a manner that he can enter the school of his choice without having to take an entrance examination. Most colleges require fifteen units

for entrance. However, the fifteen units required differ as much as the schools differ. All require three years of English, two or three years of mathematics and two years of history. After these eight units are named the colleges vary in the seven other subjects required. Severa. schools ask that its students offer two years in a language. Such language will not accept but thirteen French. Schools requiring a language wil not accept but thirteen units besides the two in the language. Students may offer more but as only fifteen are needed and two of them must be language more than thirteen unites besides the language would be superficial. Other schools require science instead of a language.

Many students hesitate to take a subject which has not been affiliated by the department of education. After one has selected the fifteen for entrance into the college of ones choice it is wise to choose the additional subjects without reguard to the affiliation but for the good to be gotten out of same. The High School requires eighteen units for graduation. After a student has selected his fifteen entrance units there will be three fo free choice. There will always be subjects which are not affiliated. A subject must establish itself before it can be recognized. Sometimes it requires several years for a new subject to become affiliated. As an example, typewritting is not an accredited subject alone but is if taken with shorthand. The schools are not allowed to ask fo affiliation in typewriting at the present time. Would any student forego the practical value of typewriting because it is not accredited? If you have no choice between a subject without and one with affiliation it would perhaps be better to choose the one with credit which is recognized.

The High School at the present time has nineteen accredited units with the State Department of Education as follows: English, four units; Algebra, two units; plane geometry, one unit; solid geometry, one-half unit: trignometry, one-half unit; commercial arithmetic, one-half unit; ancient history, one unit; M. & M. history, one unit; English history, one unit; American history, one unit; economics, one-half unit; general science, one unit; physics, one unit; chemistry, one unit; home economics, one-half unit; Latin, three

The High School offers the following subjects some of which are seeking to be accredited this term: Spanish, three units; Stenography, one and one-half units; Bookkeeping, one-half unit: Home Economics, one additional unit; Physical Geography one-half unit; Physiology, one-half unit, and Civics one-half unit.




