The Friona Fire Department sent manpower but not

equipment to assist Hereford. Fire departments from Farwell, Rhea, Lazbuddie, and Bovina converged on what Sheriff Geries described as a "150-yard long burr fire" at the Parmer County Cotton Growers gin about 4miles east of Farwell on Highway 70-84. Smoke from the massive fire caused officials to close the highway. Blowing sparks from the burrs caused several adjacent grass fires.

Friona's Chief Taylor said

the fire in Hereford started at a feedyard and spread alongside Highway 60 and jumped into the median causing it's closing.

All available DPS troopers were called to duty Sunday for traffic safety control around the burn sites. Traffic was routed off of Highway 70/84 onto Highway 145 and FM 1731 through Bovina but strong winds and blowing dirt also caused 1731 to be closed for a brief period. Sheriff's department deputies assisted the troopers. Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) highway crews were also out helping with highway closings and assuring the roadways were safe to travel.

Sheriff Geries asks that all citizens be concerned and especially watchful during the burn ban period. If there are any questions about the burn ban contact the Sheriff's office at 481-3303. Your cooperation will save resources and maybe lives.

As for taking pictures, it is easier to take an action shot of a basketball fast break than taking a pig picture when they are running


around the ring snootin' for food. But when you get a good picture of a youngster and their animal it is really cute. Makes for good scrapbook stuff.

Neugebauer asks Bush for emergency funds

Congressman Randy Neugebauer has sent a letter to President Bush urging him to take the necessary steps that will allow more federal dollars and resources to be available so that Texas can recover from recent devastating grass

In the letter, Neugebauer and fourteen other members of the Texas congressional delegation support Governor Rick Perry's request for a federal emergency declaration for the Lone Star State.

"A federal emergency declaration would mean additional resources would be available to combat the fires, respond to this disaster, and help families and businesses affected by this emergency," Neugebauer said.

A presidential emergency declara cally qualify small businesses, renters, and homeowners to receive grants and low-interest loans to meet payroll, replace equipment, and help offset other economic injuries caused by the fires. Additionally, earlier this week, the Federal Emergency Management Agency authorized the use of federal dollars from the Nation's Disaster Relief Fund to help Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico to fight seventeen fires burning in those three states

Below is the text of the letter: The Honorable George W. Bush President of the United States

The White House 1600 Pennsylvania Ave., NW Washington, DC 20500 Dear Mr. President:

We are writing in support of Governor Rick Perry's emergency declaration request for the State of Texas in response to the devastating fires occurring across the state.

The Texas Forest Service (TFS) has responded to 1,946 fires consuming 112,319 acres in 2005. Since December, wildfires have consumed more than 100,000 acres destroying 241 homes and killing three people. On New Year's Day alone, more than 44,000 acres burned, including more than 70 homes and the entire community of Kokomo in Eastland County. High winds, gusting at times to 50 mph or more, prevented the launch of most air resources and, despite increased numbers, ground forces were unable to respond to all fires

This severe wildfire threat is a result of one of the state's worst droughts since 1996, when 250 fires raged The National Weather Service has predicted a combination of high winds and unseasonably warm temperatures, which will likely persist and intensify through early 2006, making it likely that the state will face additional devastating wildfires.

Affected citizens have experienced catastrophic losses and the state and local government resources have been severely challenged as a result of these fires. Therefore, we respectfully request your favorable consideration of this emergency declaration.




What if you only had one year to live? #1

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

The TCEQ will consider all public comments in developing a final decision on the application. The deadline to submit public comments is 30 days after newspaper notice is published.

The purpose of a public meeting is to provide the opportunity to submit comments or ask questions about the application may be held if the executive director determines that there is a significant degree public interest in the application or if requested by a local legislator. A public meeting is not a contested case hearing.





DECLARATION OF DISASTER FOR PARMER COUNTY

Whereas the County of Parmer on the 3rd day of January 2006 is under imminent threat of severe damage, injury or loss of life or property resulting from:

THE THREAT OF WILDFIRES DUE TO DROUGHT AND OTHER

WEATHER RELATED CONDITIONS; and

WHEREAS THE COUNTY JUDGE of Parmer County has determined that extraordinary measures must be taken to alleviate the suffering of people and to protect or rehabilitate property,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT PROCLAIMED BY THE COUNTY JUDGE OF PARMER COUNTY:

- 1. That a local state of disaster is hereby proclaimed for Parmer County pursuant to 418.108 (a) of the Texas Government Code.
- 2. Pursuant to 418.108 (b) of the Government Code, this Declaration of a local state of disaster shall continue for a period of not more than seven days from the date of this declaration unless continued or renewed by the Commissioners Court of Parmer County.
- 3. Pursuant to 418.108 (c) of the Government Code, this Declaration of a local state of disaster shall be given prompt, and general publicity and shall be filed promptly with the County Clerk of Parmer County.
- 4. Pursuant to 418.108 (d) of Government Code this Declaration of a local state of disaster activates the Parmer County Emergency Management Plan.

EXECUTIVE ORDER OF PARMER COUNTY JUDGE

WHEREAS, by proclamation issued January 3, 2006 the County Judge of Parmer County declared a state of disaster for Parmer County, resulting from:

THE POTENTIAL THREAT OF WILDFIRES DUE TO DROUGHT AND

ADVERSE WEATHER CONDITIONS

WHEREAS, said state of disaster requires that certain emergency measures be taken Pursuant to the Texas Disaster Act of 1975 relating to Emergency

NOW, THEREFORE, the following regulations shall take effect immediately upon issuance of this order and shall remain in effect until the state of disaster is terminated:

- 1. The sale of "restricted fireworks" is prohibited. Restricted fireworks include "skyrockets with sticks" and missiles with "fins" as provided in 352.051, Texas Local Government Code.
 - a. A person selling any type of fireworks including restricted fireworks, shall at every location at which the person sells fireworks in the county, provide reasonable notice of the order
- 2. THE USE OF COMBUSTIBLE MATERIALS IN AN OUTDOOR ENVIRONMENT BY ANY PERSON IS PROHIBITED.
 - a. COMBUSTIBLE MATERIALS INCLUDE, BUT ARE NOT LIMITED TO THE USE OF ALL FIREWORKS, MATERIALS USED IN ACTIVITIES SUCH AS WELDING AND ANY OTHER ACTIVITY THAT COULD RESULT IN A FIRE.
- 3. THIS ORDER SHALL NOT APPLY TO AN OFFICIALLY AUTHORIZED PUBLIC DISPLAY.

In accordance with Local Government Code, a person who knowingly or intentionally violates this order commits a Class C Misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of up to state of the first of th

The Great Prairie Fire of 1906

The Great Prairie Fire

of 1906

New Mexico about 1899, running sheep over the eastern half is now Curry County. In 1901 he settled on the Frio Draw—18 miles north of Texico and 1 mile west of the Texas/ New Mexico state line. The following piece of history was burned and connected, and all furnished by Mrs. Val Baumgart, of mine was burned but for a niece of George McLean, and was written in 1941.

The Great Plains were just being settled and a young mar-ried couple decided to move out upon them and establish a home for themselves. They started from their Eastern home in a covered wagon, camping overnight wherever night overtook them. Before they started, someone had told the young lady that if they slept on a cornhusk bed on the ground, then the rattlesnakes would not bother her, as rattlesnakes would not go near a cornhusk bed. The lady complied with the rules as to rattlesnakes, but as there were fleas on the prairies, she got fleas in her mattress at every place they camped.

A fire starts

They finally arrived a point north of Fort Sumner, NM and camped for the night still using their husk mattress for a bed, but by this time it was so filled had one in 1906.) with fleas that they were kept awake most of the night fight-The next morning her husband thought he would pull a little joke on her by asking her a riddle—"What is the difference between a snake and a flea?" he asked her. She could not answer it, so he told her, " A snake crawls on its own belly, but a fleas crawls on some person's belly."

That made the woman mad, and she said she would surely get rid of those fleas, so she set fire to the husk mattress, and from that the fire spread for more than 100 miles! (This version of how the fire started is just one of the many explanations offered these ensuing

That was in 1906, and I lived an unusually wet season, and the prairie grass had grown so thick and high that hay could be cut on low places all over the plains. There was not much farming done there in those tons of this wild hay

I immediately began prepar-ing for safety from the rapidly approaching fire by getting everybody in shape to fight it. had sheep, and as sheep and fires do not mix profitably, I brought them in from the open range and placed them on a field of wheat, which was up and growing nicely. I knew that the fire would not sweep over that green wheat field. (If you were looking for an early wheat field in Curry County, I

With everything being in good shape at the ranch, my crew and several neighbors, started out to help fight the fire. When we came to it, we found that the burning front was 80 or 90 miles long, so we had to hunt for an end. We started west, and at a point about where Ruth, NM [Ruth was located between Broadview and the Frio Draw] is located, we found the John DeOliveira and Joe Rhea outfits working along the south wing of the fire, putting it out as they went.

Joe Rhea had a complete prairie fire fighting outfit, consisting of a large solid tin drag with chains dragging behind it, which was being dragged over the fire by means of two saddle horses, one on each side of the on the Frio Draw, a few miles fire line, by a rope, one end of north from Texico. By the time I got to the fire, there were 10 men in the crew, and by noon there were a hundred men in the fighting crew, headed by Joe Rhea. John DeOliveira drove the water wagon, which contained barrels water. The men took turns at fighting the fire, and the horses that were drawing the were changed often. South of Hollene the drag broke down, and to get another drag, killed a larger steer and skinned him, using the hide, head and legs for another drag.

About sundown we were joined by the Capitol Syndicate Cattle Ranch crew, headed by John Armstrong, the district manager for the Syndicate people. Armstrong had a good outfit, and as Mr. DeOliveira was worried about his ranch on the Frio [Draw], he turned back; but I went on east with the firefighters and took my turn at fighting all night.

As we were fighting a side fire and not the lead fire, we saw many wild animals, just keeping ahead of the fire. There were coyotes, rabbits, swifts, antelope, cattle, horses and a few deer. They did not seem to know that they could make a dash across the fire line, and escape without burned. Coyotes, that had run until they were exhausted, would lie down just ahead of the fire and lie there until most of their hair was singed off them, before they would move again; they being almost completely worn out. We knocked several coyotes in the head that were completely exhausted from run-

ning before the fire.
